Devils Bend Golf Course Results

May

Surprisingly the forecasted storms never appeared at Devils Bend; in fact the sun was out and shining for almost the entire day. Unbelievably, despite its reputation for bad weather, the sun actually never vanished behind the clouds until it finally disappeared behind the mountains on the horizon, just minutes before the last player in the final group sank his putt on the 18th green.

Despite the perfect weather conditions there was still plenty of carnage and floods. There was water flowing everywhere from the floods of tears coming from the Richmond supporters, as “Greg, Mal, Nathan and Tony” wallowed in the misery of yet another last minute defeat. The biggest flood in Devils Bend history was recorded later in the day because their tear ducts continued to run as the four boys went out in sympathy with their beloved Tigers and not one of them was able to post a score of Nett 80 or better.

Carnage was everywhere, the scorecards told a familiar story with not a single player managing to shoot a score of par or better and as a contrast to last months results, scores of 10 or more (Newell’s) appeared on a great number of score cards. Mal, Geoff and Rick all registered a Newell. Tony Mac had a Newell plus and Highway was not to be out done and therefore he accrued a spectacular 10 over par 13 on the par three 3rd hole to show why the term “Newell” has become a permanent insertion in the Sunday Leave Pass dictionary.

Geoff Cooper has written his way into Sunday Leave Pass history and added a new word into the SLP jargon in the process. Prior to hitting off on the first tee Geoff had a feeling things weren’t quite write. Given that the first group of players were 30 minutes late hitting off the first tee and with the prospect of the sun disappearing before the golf had finished, Geoff was actively lobbying and campaigning for a rule to be created so that players could pick the ball up after 10 shots so as to speed up the flow of play. This was a great theory and it would have helped Tony and Newell by a couple of strokes however in practice it is not a feasible option because we actually record the number of putts, track greens in regulation, putting statistics etc. etc. so it is vitally important that we finish every hole in its entirety. If we picked up our balls when things got just a little bit tough it would be at the detriment of the club archives and how else could we have the Sunday Leave Pass club records like Jamie Bruntons score of 18 at Albert Park in July 2004 to beat.

Unfortunately or fortunately depending on the way he looks at it, Jamie will no longer hold the record of the highest score on a single golf hole, the record has stood for nearly 13 years although a few guys have gone close to knocking him off. Chris Sfiligoj fell only 2 shots short when he dumped five balls in a row into the dam on the 12th hole at Devils Bend last year. Newell nearly debuted and beat the record on his maiden round when he got trapped in a back and forward loop between the bunkers on the 7th hole at Kingston links in 2014. Had his 16th shot a bladed wedge not hit the flag pole, wrapped itself in the flag and then dropped within 12 inches of the cup, Newell may still have been playing the hole today.

Geoff was the player who finally managed to surpass Jamie’s longstanding record. Geoff was sitting greenside for only 3 strokes on the long par 4 fifteenth hole. He actually had a brilliant round going and was already preparing his victory speech after averaging just 6 shots per hole for the round thus far.

The say you shouldn’t count your chickens until after you have got past Colonel Sanders’ house, but unfortunately on this occasion Geoff had started counting. As a result he not only lost all of his chickens, but he scrambled his eggs and got the turkey baster rammed up his temperature valve for good measure. Poor Geoff who has been bragging for the last 2 months about his new found competence in the sand after a getting specialist bunker lesson with the RACV Golf Club golf professional was forced to give 19 demonstrations of his new technique. Geoff hit his ball in the sand when his 4th stroke caught the lip of the bunker. After

what seemed like a lifetime later he finally 2x putted, closing the hole with a score of 24. Barry, Newell and Tony

MacIsaac all generously grabbed a rake each in order to help Geoff to rake the bunker, but even still they finished in the dark 25 minutes after the group in front of them and only after half of the field had already packed up, had their drinks paid their fines and gone home. The committee have already convened and passed a motion for any score of 20 or more to be changed in the Sunday Leave Pass lexicon from a double Newell to a “**Geoffrey**”.

Geoff had a score of 80 on the back 9, forty nine of those hits coming in the last four holes (33 over par- his handicap is 29). It's no wonder he was so parochial about capping the scores at 10.

If a score of 24 (A Geoffrey) wasn't a feat in itself, Geoff also managed to conjure up a Newell (Score of 10 or more) after being on the front of the green for two on the 17th hole after butchering what was a perfect drive, followed by a sublime approach shot. As it happened Geoff had accidentally commandeered, Newell's golf ball by mistake and was forced to take a penalty for playing the wrong ball. Once he played his actual shot from his real golf ball he hacked his way towards the hole and turned what started as a brilliant day on the golf course into a devastating afternoon.

Highway's day started badly and didn't get much better from there. In the chaos a bedlam that was the organization of the Devils Bend tee-times and despite starting more than 40 minutes after our allocated tee times the golf course did not have enough golf carts to fill the booking order for the 4x carts that we had reserved for the day. Newell had generously arranged the golf carts for the last two groups, however while Rick, Dale, Todd, Vedran, Geoff and Tony Mac were racing around the fairways doing doughnuts and jumps in their buggies, Newell was left to dragging his heavy golf bag over his shoulder for the first few holes while he waited for the pro-shop to find a returned cart to fill the quota. Newell blames his score of 119 on his having to carry his clubs and the damage it caused to his body but we showed him a picture of Damien (the perfect human specimen) and we reminded him that Damien carries his clubs every time he plays, which silenced that theory quite quickly.

Having said that, there might be something in the theory because Damien's golf game did go downhill towards the end of the day, although his finish wasn't anywhere near as dramatic as Geoff's curtain call, Damien did start to suffer from Jet lag after the 19 hour flight from New York started to catch up with him. Damien had been in the United States until Friday night and only got back in to Australia on Saturday afternoon just in time to clean the clubs and jump in the car ready to play golf with the boys in the social club. Now that is commitment. Damien started the day with a 260 meter 5 iron straight down the middle of the fairway and continued to hit strongly for the first 12 holes before his game became slightly unraveled. Damien had two four putts and was left wearing the three putt monkey vest on three separate occasions after losing it to a fellow player only to three putt the very same green. Damien finished double, triple, double bogey, bogey, double bogey and still finished in fourth place and only four shot in arrears of a championship title.

The homeward turn was where the majority of the damage occurred. Vedran Martinovic three putted almost every green including an extraordinary 5x putt as he too choked and threw away a good position in the field. Vedran came close to winning the NTP prize on the 13th hole however he somehow managed to miss the cup four times and finished the hole with a six. Vedran actually had 25 putts in 9 holes and a total of 45 for the day.

Rick was thinking the game was easy when he chipped in for a zero putt on the first hole. The only problem was that when he arrived at the second hole he suddenly had no idea of the speed of the greens. Consequently he over hit a couple past the flag left a couple short and like Vedran he did what was once thought to be impossible, he had a 5x putt. To his credit Rick remained calm, he resisted his urge for club throwing and minimized his temper tantrums, and he then recomposed himself and finished the day in the top five with score of Nett 80.

There was an eerie silence around the golf course and it wasn't just Rick remaining becalmed that was the reason.

The Supecoach was notably absent on Sunday, hence the silence. However, although he was not playing golf with us the outspoken glory shooter was quick to highlight and make sure we all heard about his best shot for the day.

Ball control has been a recurring problem with Fil. He has a good swing and excellent timing however he seems to always be off target and missing the hole.

He could be easily fixed and no longer have the ball spraying issues but unfortunately although he himself is a self-professed Supercoach, Mark is not open to listening to advice.

Some experts have said the issue might be that he is using the wrong grip, and it has also been said he is too strong with the right hand, whereas others have identified that he is using a too stiff a shaft.

Shanno Cummins (Cider) you would have thought would be the perfect person to help his fellow left hander through the problems of in-accurate shooting, but it may not be the case. After a favorable outcome on the first hole, while lining up to score on the 2nd hole, Shane managed to whack a shot he into the root in front of him but his ball bounced back and hit him-self in the chest. After



shooting a score of 74 and winning at Dorset Cider had very high expectations, however the penalty stroke for hitting himself broke Shanno's heart and he never fully recovered.

Speaking of broken hearts and recovery, we would like to wish Gerard MacIsaac a speedy recovery. Last month Gerard was express posted into hospital to have a five way heart bypass surgery. Gerard never does things by a half. We had never even heard of five way heart surgery because the heart only has four valves, but apparently the artery leading to the heart was so clogged with pies, beers and hot chips that they had to bypass it as well. From all accounts Gerard is doing pretty well after the 7 hour surgery but it might be quite a few months before we see him out on the golf course again. According to his brother Tony it was only a 7 hour surgery, not because it was a difficult operation but because it took the surgeon 5 hours to find his heart in the first place. All of our thoughts and hearts go out to Brendan Seagrave, unfortunately John Seagrave, Brendan's dad passed away during the month. For the benefit of the newcomers or the uneducated we thought it would be a good opportunity to go through the player rankings and point scoring system again.

Sunday Leave Pass competitions are run using Stroke so you need to count every shot that you play and you need to finish every hole (even if it takes you 24 shots to do so Geoff. Each players Nett total score is then calculated by deducting the players handicap from the Gross score. If a player doesn't have an official Sunday Leave Pass handicap then a temporary played to handicap is allocated on the day using the Callaway handicapping system.

Once the player's Nett score is calculated they are ranked from lowest score to highest score. (BeerWench) Where more than one player has the same Nett Score then the place allocations are decided based on a countback system.

The count back system is formulated as the following.

*Total number of stableford points scored on the back nine holes.

*In the event that both players have the same stableford score on the back nine it then reverts to the number of stableford points scored on the eighteenth hole. If this is the same then it goes to the 17th hole, sixteenth hole, fifteenth hole until a players has a better hole and therefore has a higher stableford score than the other.

Once all of the players are ranked then the Seasons Championship points are allocated according to the position in the field.

The player in 1st place gets 15 points, 2nd place 14 points, 3rd place 13 points, etc. etc. Any player who completes the round however finishes ranked outside the top 14 and is placed between 15th spot to BeerWench then they are all allocated 1 championship point for attending.

The player with the most points at the end of the year is crowned the Points champion irrespective of how many rounds a person has played. If one person plays 13 rounds for the year and the person in 2nd place has only played 10 rounds but is close to the same score then that is bad luck to the person in 2nd place. All players are invited to play the entire fixture. We reward participation rather than perfection and performance so if you play more often you will end up with more points.

For the benefit of all concerned and especially the new comers we have included a detailed explanation as to how the handicapping system works. What is important to note is that during the early rounds your handicap is dictated by your best scores. If a player has a very low out of the ordinary round, this will become the anchor point and will hold your handicap down very low.

The more rounds you play the more the scores average out until you have after you have completed 18 rounds or more where you handicap becomes a more accurate and true reflection of your playing ability. At this point your handicap becomes the average of the sum of your best 8 scores from the most recent 20 rounds multiplied by 0.93 which becomes your handicap.

HANDICAPS

The changes to player's handicaps are as follows:

BOLD RED NUMBERS- refer to players whose handicap has gone out

BOLD GREEN NUMBERS- refer to players whose handicap has come in

BOLD BLACK NUMBERS- refer to players whose handicap has remained unchanged

NON BOLD NUMBERS- refer to players who didn't play this month so handicap has not changed
