

Yarrambat Golf Course Results October

The fairytale finish to his 100th round was all so, so very close for Tony MacIsaac. The year 2016 has already been dubbed the year of the underdog and the experts and the media will be talking about the last 12 months as a phenomenal period of history when the impossible became possible and the unexpected became the norm. Whether it is the Earths proximity to the planet Uranus, the global change in atmospheric Methane or some other unforeseeable force, there is no doubt that eventually the experts will find some scientific reason why the year 2016 has produced more miracles for the global history archives than any other period of time and interestingly Tony Mac almost became part of it on his 100th Sunday Leave Pass round.

Tony came within inches of adding the fifth NTP title to his career accomplishments when he played a brilliant 5 iron onto the 8th green. Luckily Tony was at least able to knock in his 12th successful career birdie putt into the hole (his 3rd Birdie on a par 3) and he won the raffle tickets for the skin jackpot on the 8th hole and then from that moment on it was a procession of good scores all of the way back to the car park.

It was a golden day for T. Mac, unlike many others he never looked like posting a Newell (Score of 10 or more) his putting kept him in the game and he was unlucky to only finish in 4th place as he only finished just 2 shots off the leader. The good news is 2016 is still alive so there is time still to live out the fairytale especially when next month is out in the eastern mountains (Marysville) where Tony is reputed to play his best golf. Tony's two best finishes have been 2nd place and both rounds were played at Warburton which is another picturesque, mountainous, bushy golf course that suits Tony's style of game.

After a week of heavy downpours and an uninviting weather forecast on Sunday, the weather turned out to be pretty good, however it was Stu Coops who rained on Tony's parade. Stu shot 38 on the front nine and still left several shots still out on the course. Mick shot the lowest score for the day with 79 off the stick. Nett 70. 

same Nett score the player rankings are then determined firstly by the total number of stableford points scored on the back nine and then if that is the same then the placing is allocated looking at the number of points scored working backwards from the 18th hole, 17th hole etc until someone has a better score.

Stu Cooper has been docked a shot this month, Mick Harper with 79 off the stick has been savaged by the handicapper moving back down to 8.8. Poor Cliffy Rowe can't catch a break and his good rounds keep coming back to bite him. Cliffy was given some respite last month as he temporarily went out to 11.8 but that didn't last too long as the handicapper as decided with another score in the low 80's he better to be playing off a handicap of 9.3.

Interestingly not one of our players actually went out this month. Every member either remained on the same handicap or came in a bit.

For those people interested in the mechanics of the handicapping system it can be best explained as the following.

How to calculate a GA Handicap

To calculate a player's GA Handicap:

- you must firstly identify the player's most recent 20 scores,
- you then determine the 'Played To' value for each of these scores,
- you average the best 8 'Played To' values,

- and finally you multiply this average by 0.93. The resultant figure (to one decimal place) is the player's GA Handicap.
- o If a player's handicap record contains a lesser number than 20 scores, the number of scores used to calculate the player's handicap is as listed in the table below.
- o There is no requirement for a player's most recent 20 scores to have been returned within a specific timeframe. For example, the most recent 20 scores may span a period of three years or they may span a period of three months.
- o Once a player's handicap record contains 20 scores, the next score they return will result in the oldest of the existing 20 scores being removed (to be replaced by the new score).

Full Technical Procedure for Calculating a GA Handicap

STEP 1 – Use the table below to determine the number of scores to be included in the GA Handicap calculation:

Number of Scores in Player's Handicap Record	Scores to be Used in the Calculation
3 to 6	Best/Lowest 1
7 or 8	Best/Lowest 2
9 or 10	Best/Lowest 3
	This is what is killing Cliffy Rowe at present
11 or 12	Best/Lowest 4
13 or 14	Best/Lowest 5
15 or 16	Best/Lowest 6
17 or 18	Best/Lowest 7

Note: When the handicap record contains more than 20 scores, the GA Handicap calculation uses the best 8 of the player's most recent 20 scores.



As a new member of the Social Club the Callaway Handicapping system is used to give the player a daily played to handicap for the first couple of rounds. Once they have played 3 rounds they are given a temporary club handicap using the original AGU handicapping system. After 5 rounds they are then switched across to the current slope handicapping system.



This system is used for determining fair allowances for social golf events that attract novices or occasional golfers. A player's Callaway handicap is determined after each round by deducting from his/her 18 hole gross score the scores of the worst individual holes during the first 16 holes of the round.

In the computation of handicaps under this system:

- -No hole may be scored at more than twice its par,
- half strokes count as a whole.
- the 17th and 18th holes are never deducted,

For example if a player scores 99 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (3 worst holes) +1

If a player scores 82 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (worst + ½ the 2nd worst hole) -1

If a player scores 120 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (five worst holes) +2

After 3 rounds they will be allocated a temporary handicap using the old AGU handicapping formula and then after 5 rounds they are elevated onto the official Slope handicapping system which was use thereafter for all club competitions.

Just a reminder that next month we will be playing at Marysville and as part of playing there we have the option of taking part in the Marysville Golf Club Annual championship tournament. For those that have never played in it before please be aware that it is a great day. \$60 will include Green Fees for 27 holes of golf and lunch and entry into all relevant eligible prizes for the day. We will also be running our own 18 Hole Sunday Leave Pass competition as per any other month with the same NTP, Longest drive and all the usual fun and frivolity that we get upto. The event is run as a shot gun start so everyone needs to be there on time and to register with the competition organizers who will allocate us tee times etc, etc. Be warned that there is the possibility that we get mixed up in the field however the organizers will try to keep us together as much as possible.

There is the option of only playing 18 holes instead of 27 holes and I will find out the specifics and price if some of you would rather only do the one round of golf. As this is a formal competition any players who hold an official golf link AGU handicap will be eligible to enter into the A, B or C grade handicap events. Unfortunately as good as we think we are the SLP handicap is not a globally recognized and acceptable handicap so those who are not registered with Golf Link can only win the SLP handicap 18 hole event and enter the gross competition and win any or all of the NTP and longest drives on offer in the Marysville Competition.

I will be chasing confirmation numbers as early as next week so I can liaise and coordinate with the event organizers so please RSVP ASAP.
