Congratulations to Fil for joining the elite group of the 100 rounds club. He has been one of the most colorful social club members over the last 15 years. So, it was fitting that such a colorful character spent his 100th round bound by the responsibility of carrying the pink vest. Fil carded his career worst score last month at Devils Bend and consequently he won his 4th Beer Wench title with a score of 114 off the stick. Color was the flavor of the day, as Fil switched in and out of the fluorescent yellow three putt monkey vest, evidently it appears as though the two times putting champion (2016 & 2018) could not cope with the tricky Rosebud greens and his super power putting skills without a putt preview seemed to elude him. Fil four putted the 14th green and only lost the fluoro vest on the 18th green when Todd three putted from 10 feet.

The good news for the rest of the field is that Fil will get the opportunity to wear the Beer Wench vest again next month too, and that's because, although he improved his score by 9 shots compared to his round in May, he still finished in 41st place from a field of 41 players, giving him his 5th Beer Wench title and his second in succession. It was comforting to see Brendan MacIsaac counselling the supercoach after the round. Especially since they found so many common interests during their walk around the beautiful Bayviews golf course. The boys have requested to be room buddies on the golf trip at Club Barham and they have conspired between the two of them, to win all of the Beer Wench titles between now and December so that it all but guarantees for one of them to win the title of Beer Wench of Beer Wench.

What a magnificent winters day Rosebud produced, once the early morning chill and the frost lifted, we were rewarded with the most perfect Winter's day. Brilliant weather produces, brilliant golf and that is just what the statistics showed. There was a four-way tie for the top spot, another 2 players fell just short of the magic number and there was another threesome composed of (SOS, Cam Ross and Wayne) who were all so very close to a happy ending. Although they shared the satisfaction of scoring a 69 with each other they were all 2 shots short of coming first. Incredibly, 11x players shot scores of par or better.



Bayviews is a great little golf course, it has a fun mix of holes, and the final outcome for your score is 100% determined by your ability to quickly work out how to putt on the treacherous greens. If a golfer comes to terms with the fact that the ball will always break towards the water, no matter how you make the read of the terrain, the scores come down very quickly. The truth is however that most people just can not get their head around this concept and the putting scores blow out.

We had 41 players walking the fairways on Sunday, and from the collective group the flat stick was used 1536 times at an average of 37.47 putts per player.

Greg Parsons, David Burns and Adam Cooper all had heart-starter moments when they chipped in from off the green for a none putter. Slinky and the Supercoach both went 18 holes without making a 1 putt green, whereas the rest of the field shared 129

amongst themselves. Tony Grasso and Mick Harper were the best contributors to the one putt green tally with both boys achieving 7x one putts from 18 holes.

If you thought the greens were easy to work out then you would be wrong, not a single golfer was able to negotiate the entire 18 holes without making a three putt. As a collective group we had many more 3 putts than 1 putts, and the final count was 160 exchanges of the fluoro yellow vest at an average of 3.9 three putts per player. The biggest shot wasters with the flat stick were Jaxon, Greg Breasley and Greg Parsons who each three putted or worse every second green. Peter Alphabet was not much better with his 7x turns of wearing the monkey vest.

At least the snaky, fast greens were good for one thing. The end of year drink tab balance received a big boost as a result of the struggles with the putting surface. Rumor has it, that Rick the fine master will be around rattling the fine jar at the houses of the 16 players who made four putts or worse. If he doesn't knock on your door tomorrow then please could the following guys transfer their fines into the club account especially if you did not already pay your fines in advance.


Burnsie was the only player to rack up a 5xputt green but there was certainly lots of carnage created on the score card with the putter failing to deliver the goods time and time again. Interestingly, even some of the guys who featured at the top of the leaderboard still left plenty of shots out on the golf course. SOS hit the 3rd best score for the day, even with 81 off the stick in the bag he could have gone much lower especially since he had 4x three putts for the day.

Phil Plane scored the equal lowest Nett score at Bayviews. Although a three under par Nett 67 is a great result at any time, one can't help but wonder what he could have possibly scored if he was more in tune with the putter, Phil had 39 putts over the 18 holes, so he certainly wasted a golden opportunity to do something really special. It is not very often that the person with the (equal) lowest Nett score for the day still records a Newell on his scorecard. Incredibly despite shooting 3 strokes better than his handicap it should be noted how Phil's score was impacted by having a 10 on the par 5 thirteenth hole. When every shot counts against the rest of the field it is a great effort to waste 5 strokes on a single hole and still be able to post a competitive score. Obviously, the rest of his round except for the putting must have been very spectacular.

There were some very spectacular shots played amongst the entire field. With 41 players you would expect a little bit of greatness. Last month there was only half a dozen birdies made, this month there was more than double that. In fact, there were more birdies racked up on the stats sheet than there were Newell's (score of 10 or more). Surprisingly, Big Mick failed to make it onto the birdie crew honor board again this month. Despite shooting 77 off the stick he did it without making a single birdie. 11 pars and 7 bogies was a pretty consistent round however it just was not good enough to reach the top of the points distribution.

It was interesting to see that Mick didn't make any Birdies at Bayviews especially since he was in such good form with the putter. While most players struggled to hit the ball in the hole it looked as though Mick could hardly miss. Evidently the Fairway to green game was the greatest issue for Micks game on Sunday and it showed because the big fellas greens in regulation stats were well down on his usual high standard.


Mick only had 30 putts for the day but that is what is to be expected after you have been having a working bee at home and the final product looks something like this.



The birdie Kings were Wayne James who bookended the front nine with subpar scores on the first and ninth holes. Steve O'Sullivan and Leigh MacIsaac were also multiple birdie makers. Leigh was in good form on the longer holes, he made Birdie on

two of the three par 5 holes and it was just a shame he hit his 2nd shot on the first hole out of bounds or else he could have made par or birdie on this hole as well and gone Subpar on his scoring average for the par fives.

Leigh seems to be in a happy place with his golf and life as a whole. As the youngest adult member of the social club he seems to fit right in with the older group. The age gap doesn't seem to faze him in the least, in fact he seems to relish the attention from the older generation. As it seems to be the case with his social life too. Golf course has boundaries but love has none.



While Leigh was crafting his skills on the bigger holes, Steve O'Sullivan on the other hand likes the smaller ones. A sub 300-meter par 4 hole is often called a big boy's par 3. SOS was very good on the drive it close, and pitch or putt it closer concept. He birdied the 269m Par 4, 9th hole and also the 250m par 4, 12th hole. It was a shame neither of these holes were selected as the NTP second shot challenge or else he would have had a golf ball or two coming his way. Having said that, SOS did make a 2 putt par on the 7th hole so he was on the green in regulation just not close enough to knock off Gerard MacIsaac who hit his approach to inside 4 feet of the cup.

It was going to take an awfully good shot to knock Gerard off and hit the approach closer to the pin on the 7th green, although a couple of guys did manage to do so. In fact, both Adam Cooper and Burnsie chipped their golf ball into the hole with their approach shots into the 7th green. Unfortunately for Adam it wasn't his 2nd shot because he had already racked up 3 shots in the bunker before he finally holed out. Burnsie was not much better, normally a zero putt green would yield an eagle, birdie or at least a par especially on a sub 300meter downhill par 4 hole, however in Burnsies case he was just happy to settle for a bogey, because it was a welcome relief from the pain of the multitude of triple and quadruple bogies he had recorded on the scorecard and let us not mention the 13 (Newell plus 3) which he racked up on the 16th hole.

Slinky put his 2nd shot in the green side sand trap on the par 4, 7th hole, but he then put his 3rd, 4th, 5th, 6th, 7th, 8th and 9th swings in the very same bunker, luckily he finally managed to get his 10th shot out and over the green. He eventually went on to finish the short par 4 with a solid Newell + 3. In truth, other than this one bad hole, Slinky hit the ball quite well except his putting was ordinary all day.

The 9th hole was the center point for many trials and tribulations. Greg Parsons holed out a very nice chip-in from the fringe of the ninth green for par. This was a welcome relief for Greg who was a physical wreck every time he was called to use the putter. Greg 3x putted 7 out of 9 of the holes on the back nine and even with his zero putt and 2x one putt greens he still finished the day with 42 strokes played with the shortest club in his bag.

Leigh MacIsaac did not bother with the chip shot, pitch shot or even an approach iron in to the ninth hole. Leigh smoked his driver over the big gum tree which grows in middle of the fairway, his ball started straight at the flag stick and with a gentle draw his ball flew all of the 250 meters to the back left hand corner of the green. It was a tough eagle putt, long with a right to left double break and it was also downhill, Leigh was not shy in giving it a crack. Leigh finished the hole with a three-putt par however it was a valiant effort although he narrowly avoided a \$2 fine because he was very close to putting from on the green to off the green.

Stu Coops drove through the back-right hand corner of the ninth hole however his outcome was even worse than Leighs. 2x chips and 2x putts for a bogey is a very disappointing outcome when you were initially pondering the prospect of an eagle 2.

Rick Turcinovic was thinking eagle or at least a birdie after he smoked is driver around the corner on the Par 5 thirteenth hole. On what was otherwise a pretty tough day for Rick he was delighted to hit the ball forward let alone 246 meters straight down the middle of the short cut grass on the 472-meter hole. So unexpected was this outcome that Rick had not taken into consideration that the group in front were only 200 meters ahead of him and still playing their shots.



There was only one thing louder than the call of **FORE!!!!** as the ball rolled through the middle of the group in front, and that was the call of **“YOU F@#^ing GOAT F@#^ing, F@#^head”** after Rick then went on to take a further 12 strokes to hit his ball the remaining 226 meters to get it into the hole.



It is probably lucky that Phil Plane is a little more tolerant of his misfortunes than Rick is, or else the town of Rosebud might have been closed down for noise pollution. Phil played a magnificent flag chasing tee shot into the par 3, 11th hole. He was a sure thing to win the Nearest to Pin prize until his ball pitched and landed in the middle of the green only meters from the flag stick but then to Phil and all of his playing partners surprise the ball then spun backwards, rolling down the slope of the green towards the water and eventually gathered so much momentum that his ball finished up rolling off the green completely.

It was such a good shot left unrewarded especially when he later found out that SOS claimed the NTP prize for his tee shot which was only 4 cm on the green and 23 meters from the flag stick.

Dale Robinson was never going to win the NTP prize on the 11th hole. Under the pressure of three groups watching him tee off, the nerves got the better of the normally unflappable Dale and he butchered his swing with his trusty hybrid. Dale was called to task and given the bank account details to transfer his \$5 fine for not hitting past the ladies markers, and he was then asked to double up again because his second shot was still short of the red tees.

Rick Turcinovic thought it was a great joke to see Dale in sufferance, that was until it was his turn to step on to the tee. Under the piercing angry stare from Dale looking back at him from the group in front. Rick faltered. Although his ball initially travelled beyond the squatters tees, he still copped a \$5 fine because his drive smashed into a tree and ricocheted backwards some 40 meters before disappearing into the thick scrub further behind the ladies tee than where Dale had been.

You could be forgiven for thinking that the big old dead tree trunk was straight in the middle of the fairway especially since with the very next shot David Burns managed to step up to the plate and belt his ball not just into the tree, but into exactly the same spot that Rick had just dented. After an unsuccessful cursory look for his lost golf ball Rick then dropped a new ball into play and of course, you would not believe it unless you saw it for yourself, he actually speared his ball straight into the same tree and more importantly into the dint where he and Burnsie had both already hit the trunk. By the time they had finished the barrage on the deadwood, it had caved in to reveal a perfectly shaped golf ball sized hole and an angry bees' nest in the innards.



Todd Neilson didn't quite knock a hole into a tree trunk however he did create a major disturbance in the bunker. Brendan MacIsaac describes what happened on the 8th hole as the Supercoach and Todd Circus show. It is hard to believe you could lose a golf ball in the bunker, but then again if you have Todd and Mark in a group almost everything is possible. In this case the boys pretty much lost 2 balls in exactly the same sand trap and what was more entertaining was that when they finally located one of the missing balls they suddenly discovered that they were both playing not only the same brand of golf ball (Bridgestone) but they were also both playing one with the same number. (Bridgestone 4) We have said previously how important it is to clearly mark your golf ball with a unique identifying feature so you can easily prove it to be yours, and with this incident it is a clear demonstration as to why it should be done.

On a side note and to prove the point, while searching for Douggo's ball on the 13th hole he found a Taylor Made golf ball with a giant blue "N" scribbled on it. I knew straight away that this ball had once belonged to Newell Richards so I was able to drop it into his letter box on the way home. He was ever so grateful for getting his ball back, but also disappointed to hear that it was sitting out in the open and he had taken an unnecessary penalty. If he had of just looked a little bit further around the corner than where he had been searching for his lost ball then he would have avoided the two-shot penalty which ultimately cost him the monthly crown.

Sorry I digressed from the Todd and Mark circus show. Firstly, here is a challenge: somewhere in this photo is a Bridgestone 4 golf ball. Can you find it? And the Second challenge, once you find the Bridgestone 4 how would you set about getting it out of the sand?



A) Dig it out with your hands



B) Stand and dig to deliver



C) One foot in one foot out



D) Kick it with your foot



As you can see from the images above, because they could not conclusively determine who's ball was who's, Todd was given the most difficult of the two shots from where the Bridgestone 4's had buried themselves but it wasn't before 5 minutes of entertaining argumentative conversation and name calling. The final verdict was founded on the premise that it was Fils 100th round so he should get to choose which ball he wants to claim as his.



In the end the karma gods came good for Todd. He was able to extricate his ball from the impossible position whereas Fil stuffed his bunker shot and ended the hole with a 7 on the score card. Well done and thanks to Brendan MacIsaac for capturing the situation on film, especially this awesome action shot showing the moment of impact.



The supercoach was not all to happy to have Brendan capturing photographic evidence of his Leather wedge worthy and Angry man antics and he demonstrated his disapproval by blading his 7 iron straight into Brendan's golf buggy from almost pointblank range. It is funny that Fil would be upset about being the center of attention especially since as far as he is concerned everything is always about him. I mean while Todd was playing what was voted as the **“shot of the day,”** Fil was too busy taking a selfie of himself to see the shot or celebrate the victory which was Todd's genius to extricate his ball from out of an impossible lie.



While Mark Sfiligoj was relishing in his own beauty, many others were laughing in his face. While standing on the 7th tee an errant golf ball came flying out from nowhere and nearly clonked poor Steve Dawson on the head. There was no call of FORE!! and no clear evidence from where the ball had been struck from. It was concluded that there was a possibility that the ball may have been hit by the Supercoach because he was on the vicinity, well on the 9th Tee some 83 degrees off target and 100 meters away and it made sense that he probably hit the shot because it was perfectly clear he was having yet another shocker and it looked as though he was already well on his way to securing back to back Beer Wench titles.

As it turned out, it was not Fil who played the wayward shot because his drive had gone left instead of right and the 100-meter journey was well beyond his driving capabilities. The top placings for the Bayviews round were all incredibly close. First place was a four-way tie. Each player will be able to look back at their round and rue an incident or two which would have otherwise elevated them to the top of the table. Somehow with 39 putts and a Newell on the scorecard Phil Plane was still able to claim the 15 championship points and the prestige and honor which comes with winning a monthly title. Steve Dawson came in second on the count back ahead of Tony Grasso and Newell Richards. I cannot recall in the 196-round history of the Sunday Leave Pass if we have ever had a 4-way tie at the top before.

Adam Cooper continued his white hot form finishing just one shot adrift and sharing the score of Nett 68 with Mick Harper who scored the lowest gross score for the day (77 of the stick is a very credible number and it is fair to say Mick should be disappointed to be robbed of a win after posting such an impressive score.)

A countback was used to determine most place allocations, so it was all of the golfers who scored well on the holes from 10 through 18 who received the higher ranking.

*Total number of stableford points scored on the back nine holes.

*In the event that both players have the same stableford score on the back nine it then reverts to the number of stableford points scored on the eighteenth hole. If this is the same then it goes to the 17th hole, sixteenth hole, fifteenth hole until a player has a better hole and therefore has a higher stableford score than the other.

To qualify as the Champion of Champions title a member needs to win a monthly title. All of the winners from monthly championships who are attending the golf trip will then play off for the title based on total accumulated stableford points from 9x Randomly selected holes. The Winner is the person with the most points over those holes, in the event of a tie a Countback applies.

NOTE: The Winner of the December title is eligible to win however they only get to count scores and use only 8 Randomly selected holes.

Points are hard to come by this season, with fields of players in excess of 30 players each month so far, it is a big ask to finish inside the top 14 to get multiple points. Every missed putt, each lost ball or duffed chip has a huge impact on the final place rankings and the count back system can be influential on how the day pans out for you. The scores on the back nine are very important as they are regularly the determinant of the end results because when more than one player finishes with the same Nett score then the places are calculated based on the total number of stableford points scored on the back nine and then narrowed even finer down to individual hole scores starting from the 18th hole and working back.

This year, your playing handicap will fluctuate around your documented handicap index. When you play an easy course such as Ringwood or Dorset then you will actually play off a lower handicap than you normally would. On the other days when we invite you to play a harder course such as Eynesbury, we will add a few extra shots to your arsenal just to give you more hope of avoiding total anxiety and depression.

With so many players posting low scores this month the handicapper got remarkably busy. Adam Cooper get ripped off a further 1.2 strokes, Brendan MacIsaac seems to be moving to far away from the Beer wench rankings so he was docked 0.4 strokes after his Bayviews round. The handicapper took pieces off Brent, Cam Ross, Heathy copped a massive whack, he will front up to Eynesbury 2.4 strokes lighter on the handicap, although the difficulty of the course will pad his play to handicap a little. Mal, Newell, Peter, Phil, Ron, SOS, Stu, Tony Grasso, T Mac, and Wayne also cooped a good hit. Mick has moved down to his lowest club handicap and at 7.3 he is giving a lot away to the rest of the field. Fitzy's news clubs come with a covenant and that is he must now play off a lower handicap, but that is nothing compared to Dawso who must have rubbed the handicapper up the wrong way when he played with him on Sunday, because suddenly Dawso has had his handicap reduced from 23.7 to 17.6. That is a huge difference.

A total of 12.1 shots disappeared off the balance sheet overnight, it was like a stock market crash and the carnage might be huge especially since we are fronting up to the hardest golf course we encounter. Eynesbury is nicknamed Bowral because more centuries have come out of that location than any other spot in the state.

As a new member of the Social Club the Callaway Handicapping system is used to give the player a daily played to handicap for the first couple of rounds. Once they have played 3 rounds, they are given a temporary club handicap using the original AGU handicapping system. After 5 rounds they are then switched across to the current slope handicapping system.

This system is used for determining fair allowances for social golf events that attract novices or occasional golfers. A player's Callaway handicap is determined after each round by deducting from his/her 18-hole gross score the scores of the worst individual holes during the first 16 holes of the round.

In the computation of handicaps under this system:

- No hole may be scored at more than twice its par,
- half strokes count as a whole,
- the 17th and 18th holes are never deducted,

For example, if a player scores 99 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (3 worst holes) +1

If a player scores 82 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (worst + ½ the 2nd worst hole) -1

If a player scores 120 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (five worst holes) +2

After 3 rounds they will be allocated a temporary handicap using the old AGU handicapping formula and then after 5 rounds they are elevated onto the official Slope handicapping system which was use thereafter for all club competitions.

For those people interested in the mechanics of the handicapping system it can be best explained as the following.

How to calculate a GA Handicap

To calculate a player's GA Handicap:

- you must firstly identify the player's most recent 20 scores,
- you then determine the 'Played To' value for each of these scores,
- you average the best 8 'Played To' values,
- and finally you multiply this average by 0.93. The resultant figure (to one decimal place) is the player's GA Handicap.

* If a player's handicap record contains a lesser number than 20 scores, the number of scores used to calculate the player's handicap is as listed in the table below.

* There is no requirement for a player's most recent 20 scores to have been returned within a specific timeframe. For example, the most recent 20 scores may span a period of three years or they may span a period of three months.

* Once a player's handicap record contains 20 scores, the next score they return will result in the oldest of the existing 20 scores being removed (to be replaced by the new score).

Full Technical Procedure for Calculating a GA Handicap

STEP 1 – Use the table below to determine the number of scores to be included in the GA Handicap calculation:

Number of Scores in Player's Handicap Scores to be Used in the Record Calculation

5 to 6	Best/Lowest 1
7 or 8	Best/Lowest 2
9 or 10	Best/Lowest 3
11 or 12	Best/Lowest 4
13 or 14	Best/Lowest 5
15 or 16	Best/Lowest 6
17 or 18	Best/Lowest 7
19 or 20	Best/Lowest 8

Note: When the handicap record contains more than 20 scores, the GA Handicap calculation uses the best 8 of the player's most recent 20 scores.

The player with the most points at the end of the year is crowned the Points champion irrespective of how many rounds a person has played. If one person plays 13 rounds for the year and the person in 2nd place has only played 10 rounds but is close to the same score then that is bad luck to the person in 2nd place. All players are invited to play the entire fixture. We reward participation rather than perfection and performance so if you play more often you will end up with more points.

SOS (El Presidente') has extended his lead at the top of the leaderboard and Ronnie and Stu are both hanging around but neither of them did much to improve their standings. Mick is moving into position to challenge for his back to back title defense although he is going to have to play well to be competitive off his low handicap.
