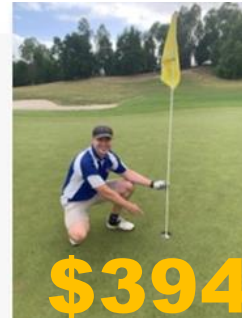




SUNDAY LEAVE PASS 2022

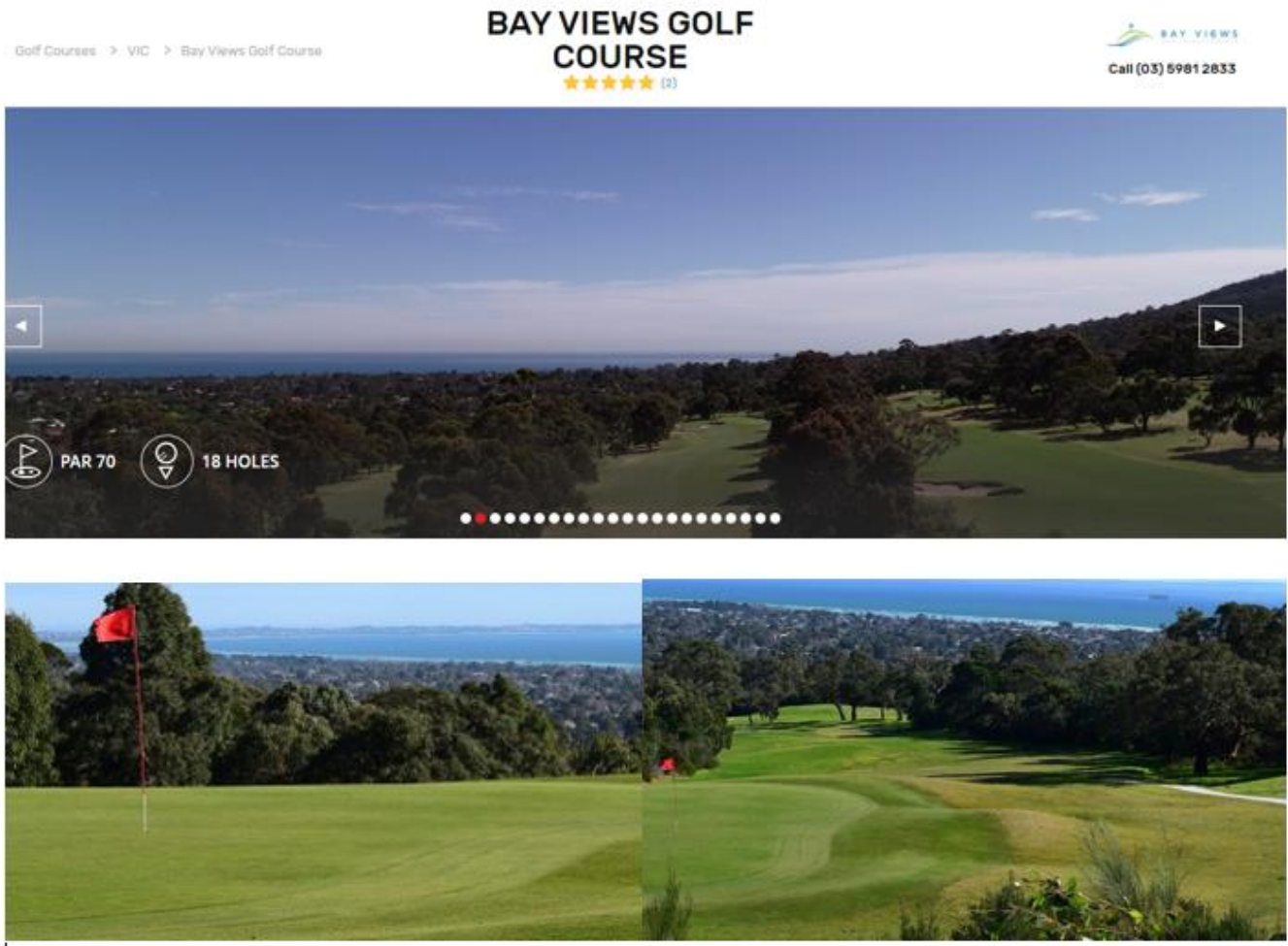


COMPETITION TIME

It was a wet and cold start to the day, however we struck it lucky and by the third end of the hole the downpours eased the clouds lifted and we were blessed with a pleasant walk around the beautiful and scenic Bayviews golf course.





Normally I would be so, happy to see Tony MacIsaac's name up in lights, knowing that he had added another monthly title against his name would normally get me excited and proud. It had been lean pickings for Tony. It took 132 rounds for him to notch up his first ever win and there has only been a couple since then including a 9-holer at Spring Park during Covid. After nearly two years as a lepper and banned from golf, Tony has come back with a vengeance in mind. He was the 2nd runner up at Eagle Ridge and this month he went two positions better.

It is hard to imagine where things might have been, were it not for the 2020-2021 SLP seasons getting impacted by lockdowns, because Tony was robbed of his chance to win the points championship last year when he was on top of the points championship leaderboard before being closed out and banned from using the golf courses.

Now that he is back on the SLP circuit, Tony has rocketed up the points leaderboard. After shedding the cobwebs at Spring Park with a beer wench worthy round, he has amassed 28 points in the next two rounds he has played. This is an incredible effort when you think that many of us have played 7 rounds and have struggled to win that many points.



The only issue with Tony Mac's success at Bayviews was, that it comes with my demise. Tony finished the day breaking the 100 barrier with a score of 99 Nett 71. On the other hand, my scorecard read Nett 71 but that was only because Fitzzy had a case of premature documentation and marked my score on the 7th hole before I finished the hole.

Once the eraser was taken to the score card and the 4 was changed to a 5, it was Tony Mac who managed to get his chance at the golf trip playoffs and myself falling one stroke short in second place with an adjusted score of Nett 72.

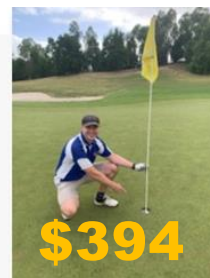
Speaking of second place, it was a very short stint in the runners up position for Wayne James. After moving up into bridesmaids position after the Eagle Ridge round, Wayne succumbed to the pressures of the position. It seems Wayne didn't feel comfortable standing in Mick Harpers shoes and relinquished 2nd place to the 10x times crowned Bridesmaid Mick Harper, who has returned to his rightful spot at No# 2 on the championship points table. The poor showing at Bayviews saw Wayne James falling down 4x positions back to 5th ranking a sure sign of the closeness of the competition and the importance of each shot.

Mick Harper had an interesting day, he shot the lowest gross score for the day 81 off the stick, with 8 pars and 2 birdies, were it not for a double bogie and 2x uncharacteristic triple bogeys he would have gone very close to unseating Tony Mac as the monthly winner. Interestingly it was a par 3 hole the 11th which resulted in Mick racking up a triple bogey and from then on, he was chasing his tail trying to play catch up.

Mick caught up a few shots very quickly with some A-grade shot-making including a near hole in one on the third hole. Mick caressed his 9-iron to 14cm of the hole and amazingly the ball pitched on one side of the cup and then spun sideways in front of the cup to the other side. It should be said, this is not the first time this year Mick has almost holed out for an Ace; it was the easiest of tap in Birdies however the HOLE IN ONE JACKPOT remains intact and up for grabs for the next person to make the perfect shot

Although Mick's tee shot came heartbreakingly close to the hole in the 3rd green, his drive on the longest drive 4th hole was heartbreaking because it actually landed in the hole.

As Mick wound up for a power drive, he didn't think for a moment that his ball would disappear into a hole in the log which not only cost him the chance of adding his name to the longest drive winners, but also a triple bogey 8.

Mick uncharacteristically hit a hook into the trees on the left-hand side of the fairway and although he had a good bearing of where the ball landed, when he arrived to play his next shot, unfortunately the ball was nowhere to be seen. Just as Mick was about to drop a new ball and play his fourth stroke from where the ball was assumed to be lost, on a whim Cider decided to look into the knot hole of a fallen branch. Much to the surprise of all involved in the search, incredibly there was Mick's Titleist Pro V1x tucked up in the dark crevice of the wood.

If there was ever such a thing as an unplayable lie then this was definitely it, although the good news was by finding the ball and being able to take an unplayable, it saved Mick a shot as he was entitled to take relief at the expense of 1 stroke instead of the 2-stroke penalty (stroke plus distance) for dropping for a lost ball.



Mick finished the hole with a triple bogey (8) and a couple of nominations for the Bushwhacker award.

Anthony Emmerson also found himself polling votes as the Bushwhacker award in 2022. Egg found himself in the bush more often than he was on the fairway and some of the miraculous shots he pulled off from difficult lies were so good you could write a book about them. Despite his wayward adventures, Egg finished the day in 3rd place and were it not for a disastrous 9 on the last hole he would have walked his way into first place.

Eggs drive on the 18th hole ended up under this odd, shaped tree. He then plays his second shot, the ball hits under the trunk and drops straight down. He plays his third shot, and it only travels a few metres again. By the time he rolled his putt in on the final hole ended up scoring 9 on that hole and it cost him the 15 championship points and there is nothing funnier than seeing him when he gets so pissed off.



Interestingly Mark Fitzpatrick found himself stuck behind exactly the same tree. After hooking his drive into the scrub along the fence line on the ninth tee Fitzzy found his ball in the deep scrub and with only a small window of space to hit the ball back into play and that involved hitting a low stinger under Eggs odd-shaped tree.

Mark's aspirations were far greater than his ability and he knocked his ball flush into the tree branch. Fortunately for the family working on the garden in their backyard the ball did not ricochet out of bounds towards them, although they did hear the whack and ducked for cover as they got a firsthand view of the shot. The couple had a great laugh at Fitzzy's expense, and he was more than happy to share the joke and told them he couldn't have expected anything different.

Jaxon Fitzpatrick was lucky to keep his ball on the golf course let alone in play when he hit a Stu Coops worthy drive that crossed over two fairways from the intended direction. Jaxon hit off from the elevated tee, his drove comfortably cleared the trees on the RHS of the 8th tee, cross over the 5th fairway and came to rest on the far side of the 2nd fairway. Jaxon could have quite easily claimed the longest drive, especially since his ball was nearly 300 meters away from any of the drives of his playing partners.





It was a challenging day for Jaxon, and it wasn't just the driver he had his struggles with. Jax had 44 putts for the day and finished at the bottom end of the field rankings. It is little wonder he was keen to get home and back to bed, especially after spending the night before doing bourbon shots with Cider and SOS.

His old man knew Jaxon was in for a tough morning when he received his first text message from his son at 803am with a very simple message. "Go Home?????" Clearly Jaxon was in a bad way right from the first shot of the day and things only got worse from there.

Jaxon will soon learn that sometimes the best cure to a hangover is to stay drunk. As seasoned veterans many of the SLP members have been working on this theory for years, and it is not uncommon to find a few empty beer, bourbon or CC cans scattered around the bins at the early section of the golf course. It came as no surprise when, in the middle of the fairway on the 13th hole, what originally looked like a longest drive marker, turned out to be an empty bottle of red wine. If you were wondering what makes up 27-putts over nine holes, it is basically 6 three putts, a five putt and a couple of regulation 2 putts. Newell Richards had the biggest putt score on a single hole, amazingly despite having a 6 putt on the 15th hole and then 4x putting both the 17th and 18th holes Newell still out only 39 putts for the day.

The Bayviews greens are reputedly treacherous. Despite the rain, the three-putt monkey came out early in every group and then it bounced around from person to person as regularly as Jordan DeGoey does on a Bali midseason bender. The theory behind putting at Bayviews, is to allow for plenty of break taking into consideration that the ball will always move towards the water irrespective of the lie of the land.

Gerard MacIsaac was best able to adapt to the difficult putting conditions, and despite getting a fine for a four putt green and even with a couple of turns at the three-putt monkey vest he was able to produce the best putting performance and negotiated the course using the putter just 31x times for the day. Gerard's putt score was helped by a chip in for par on the par 3 third hole.

The best way to avoid a three putt was to miss the green and chip your first shot close or even better than that to actually chip it in for a noner. There were plenty of guys who cottoned on to this tip from the proshop. Luckily the holes were quite wide and receptive, and the result was quite a number of chip ins for zero putts.

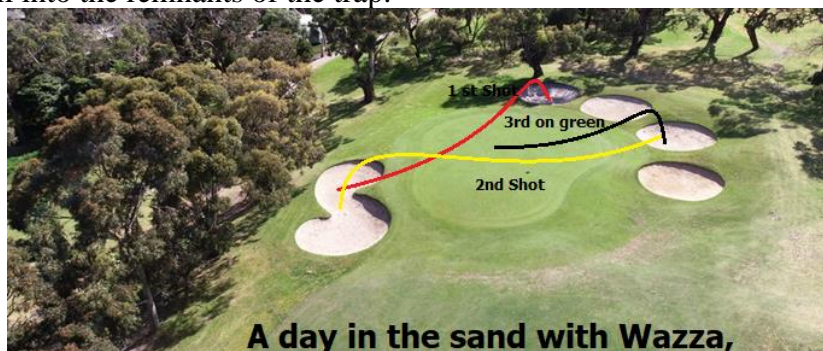
Leigh chipped in on 15th hole to make up for a 4 putt on the 14th hole. Anthony Emmerson didn't even pull his putter out of the golf bag on the 14th hole because he holed out with a wedge for a par from about 30 meters out. Tom Kellythorn is no stranger to putter avoidance, not only is he the only player to ever make a hole in one, but he is also a regular name on the list of chip ins. Clearly Tom knows where the hole is and he knows how to hit at it, Sunday was no different as he managed to have a noner on the 8th hole to salvage a par on a poorly played hole.

Wayne James chipped in on the 6th hole and nearly again on the 18th hole. The irony of the shot on the 18th hole was that Wayne lipped out and his ball finished inside a meter from the hole which he proceeded to tap in the putt and in doing so he claimed the longest putt prize. From 23 players on the course the longest holed putt on the 18th green came in at 95cm. A significant regression from the previous efforts required to claim the long putt prize.

Westy had 5x goes at claiming the longest putt award, unfortunately when he finally got the ball in the hole his final putt was from inside the marker so the only claim he could make was for the \$2 fine for being the last person to wear the three-putt monkey vest in his group.

Wazza Perrett made an incredible chip in on the 4th hole. Waz was the third player to hit an approach after Fitzzy had knocked his ball to within 2 meter and then Stu Coops had gotten inside Marks ball. Warren was down the bottom of the hill, couldn't see the flag and had to chip his ball over a bunker. As he stood over the ball, he was hoping for nothing more than to avoid the bunker and to possibly hit the green, he didn't think for a moment that his next action would be pulling his ball out from the bottom of the cup after chipping in for a bogey 6 with zero putts.

The day wasn't always roses for Wazza though, he had a 6 on the par 3 seventeenth hole and of those 5x of them were played with the putter. Even with 40 putts over 18 holes, the flat stick was still not Wazza's most frequently used club. Warren appears to have taken his retirement and sea change a bit too literally. Wazza has a fixation with spending as much time as he possibly can at the beach and that includes while he was playing on the golf course. According to the Bayviews golf course profile, there are 76 bunkers on the course and of those Wazza played a shot in at least 53 of them. If there was sand in front of him Warren was guaranteed to land in it and therefore his sand wedge was his most used club for the day and the grooves were pretty much worn down to bare steel by the time he slammed the clubs back into the boot of the car. Even on the 8th hole where the bunkers had recently been filled in and converted to turf, Warren still managed to hit his ball into the remnants of the trap.



As you would expect after 53 shots with the sand Wedge Wazza was pretty good at getting out of the traps. By the end of the day, he was even talking about setting up a business and represent himself as a golf professional and charge people to learn how to get out of the bunkers.

Wazza wouldn't be the first SLP member to fraudulently promote himself as a golf guru, without the required qualifications. The Supercoach has been handing out free advice for over 18 years and he still can't go a complete round of golf without getting fined for not hitting the ball past the ladies tees.

However, the most blatant and arrogant false misrepresentation is still Anthony Emmerson who has his name embroidered on the back of his golf bag for all to see. One has to be a pretty good golfer to go down that road, although Egg is good, however we still don't think he is that good.



The round of golf itself was very quick, with a two tee start and very few players in front of us, meant we coasted around the course. For a Sunday morning to be done and dusted in 4 hours is an incredible feat especially on a course as hilly and challenging as Bayviews.

Thanks as always to Colin Ewart who proves himself time and time again to be a great club man. Col took up the apron and volunteered to cook the BBQ as he does every time, we have one. Well done and thanks Col it is very much appreciated what you do for us all.

It was nice to sit around and have a beer and a chat after golf on Sunday. The reason most of us turn up each month and put up with the four hours of frustration and disappointment is for the comradery and social component that comes at the end of the walk. Sunday Leave Pass is a leave pass from the pressures of family and home life and it is nice to share a joke and a story with people with similar interests.



Luckily no-one was in a hurry to get home on Sunday because the drive home was a crawl to say the least. A combination of the wet roads, peak hour from weekend returning holidaymakers and a broken-down car meant it was a long, slow crawl home. The average speed to Bayviews was 100km an hour even when following Wayne James cross country tour of regional Victoria, whereas the journey home the car was lucky to get over 24km per hour.

When we finally caught up to the cause of the traffic congestion, we were half expecting to see Rob Underwood parked into the median strip after finishing his 3rd bottle of red. It wasn't Undy's to blame although the car on the flat bed truck looked remarkably similar to the red buzz box Mick Harper gets around in.

The day was not without its scores of 10 or more. Newell proved why a Newell is called a Newell. He had the most Newell's for the month by making a Newell on both the 14th and 18th holes. Colin and Greg Parsons both came to grief on the 4th hole trying to win the longest drive prize. Simon Galloway averaged 20 meters per stroke hit, when he made an 11 on the short 245-meter par 4, ninth hole. There were a couple of uncharacteristic names to pop up on the Newell wall of shame this month, it is unusual to see Ben Nichol and Shane Cumming added to the list, which goes to show anyone can make a Newell. Westy came close to going the full 18 holes without a Newell on the score card, however he succumbed to the hardest hole on the golf course and his 5-putt on the last green gave him a Newell plus 1 (11). Barry Hemsley also made an 11 however it was Rob Underwood who scored the biggest Newell for the day. Undies made a Newell and a half (15) while he hacked his way up the 12th hole. The empty bottle of red was found on the 13th. Go figure.

Fitzzy's entire day was poetry in motion, he hit the ball like a changed man, and he was even arguing hard on whether he is allowed to wear the beer wench vest as part of his standard monthly uniform. It was only a couple of blowout holes which otherwise kept Fitzzy out of the big points for the month, he put on a show of big drives and an A-grade class chipping whenever he missed the green. 6 pars was a very good return and proved that Fitzzy is a much better golfer than his handicap index suggests, especially when you consider the best return was 8 pars and that was by the single figure handicappers.

Tony MacIsaac wins June 2022 with 99 off the stick Nett 71. Stu Coops ran a very close 2nd place with his best performance for the year. Anthony EGG Emmerson continues to be a serial pest around the top end of the leaderboard and podiums, Eggs only demise is that he is so unpredictable, half the time he cancels his round at the last minute because he struggles to drag himself out of bed on a Sunday morning if he gets on the liquid refreshments and stays up too late on Saturday night. Egg has always featured in a competitive position in the points championship so if ever he strings together a season where he plays 11 or 12 rounds, he will be a very hard man to beat.

Leigh MacIsaac has managed to iron out the creaks and cobwebs from 18 months out of golf. Leigh strung together 7pars and shot a round more to his capabilities by breaking 90 for Nett 75 and 4th place. With a top 5 finish at Bayviews Mick has found himself in his favourite spot on the points leaderboard. Mick likes a good Bridesmaid and history says once he gets into the bridesmaid's grasp, he very rarely lets it go and he struggles to go any further up the offerings.

For those players not familiar with the scoring process, listed below is the format we use in Sunday Leave Pass competitions.

Once all of the players are ranked then the Seasons Championship points are allocated according to the position in the field.

The player in 1st place gets 15 points, 2nd place 14 points, 3rd place 13 points, etc. etc. Any player who completes the round however finishes ranked outside the top 14 and is placed between 15th spot to BeerWench then they are all allocated 1 championship point for attending.

For the benefit of the newcomers or the uneducated we thought it would be a good opportunity to go through the player rankings and point scoring system again.

Sunday Leave Pass competitions are run using Stroke so you need to count every shot that you play and you need to finish every hole. Each player's Nett total score is then calculated by deducting the players handicap from the Gross score. If a player doesn't have an official Sunday Leave Pass handicap, then a temporary played to handicap is allocated on the day using the Callaway handicapping system.

Once the players Nett score is calculated they are ranked from lowest score (Monthly title winner) to highest score. (BeerWench) Where more than one player has the same Nett Score then the place allocations are decided based on a countback system.

The player with the most points at the end of the year is crowned the Points champion irrespective of how many rounds a person has played. If one person plays 13 rounds for the year and the person in 2nd place has only played 10 rounds but is close to the same score then that is bad luck to the person in 2nd place. All players are invited to play the entire fixture. We reward participation rather than perfection and performance so if you play more often you will end up with more points.

Although Steve O'Sullivan still has a commanding position there has been lots of position shuffling from the players beneath him. To win the year SOS only needs to remain a consistent points collector and therefor minimize the opportunity for the chasers to significantly bridge the gap. The pressure remains on the rest of the field to catch him which is going to require a couple of monthly titles and regular top 5 finishes for the remaining games this year.

Gerard would have been in the hunt for the points championship except that he has given up 3 rounds to his external pennant commitments. There will be a window of opportunity soon because SOS is going away and will miss the Devil Bend Round. If Mick as his nearest rival wins at Devils Bend the buffer on the top of the ladder will suddenly be reduced to 2 points.

The ball must be clearly on the CUT surface of the green or fairway to win NTP or longest drive. If it is not on the fairway it doesn't count.

Each player won 1 ball each.

Bayviews statistics included, 5x Birdies and 81x pars, 144 bogeys, but the scary part of the round was the fact there were more 105 double bogies and 11 Newell's (Score of 10 or more). As a group we had 951 putts at an average of 38.04 putts each. There were 109 exchanges with thee three putt monkey vest. \$24 worth of fines for 4 putting or worse including 9 four putts, four 5xputts and a 6 putt by Newell Richards was the worst score on a green.

"SKINS" are distributed to those players good enough to win a hole outright. If more than 1 player got the lowest score on a hole it is Jackpotted until an outright winner occurs.

Just a reminder that for every round you play you are automatically awarded a raffle ticket to go towards the end of year raffle, then extra tickets are issued if you wear the official club shirt. Plus, the monthly winner has the option of exchanging the number of balls owed to Raffle tickets for the end of year prize draw as can be any nearest to pin or long drive or other ball prizes.

A par on the seventh hole was a good one fir Mark Fitzpatrick as it netted him 5 skins. Westy and Greg Parsons have both improved their chances of winning a prize in the raffle by claiming 4 skins and therefor 4 extra tickets each in the prize draw. On the first round this year when he hasn't had a birdie, Stu Coops has finally won a skin jackpot and he did so by making a par instead of a subpar score.

The low handicap is brutalizing Mick Harper and despite another two birdies added to his Eclectic total this month, it was not enough to add his name to the skin's allocations. Gerard won a skin however it also was not claimed from any of the three holes that he birdied.

For those who have forgotten about the powers bestowed on the Blue Jacket here is a reminder of how it works.

As the Champion of Champions Steve will be able to ask any Sunday Leave Pass member to buy him a drink, it is limited to only receiving one drink per member (beer or soft) over the entire year and it can only be done so if he is wearing the Champion of Champions jacket at the time. This of course does not include new members who did not play at least one or more rounds in season 2021, but not exclusive to those who attended the golf trip. So, if he manages himself correctly, he should be looking at up to 42 free beers or soft drinks over the next 12 months. Now, that is a prize worth aspiring for.

The other condition is that Steve must be the one who consumes the drink, he cannot use his power to buy beverages for anyone else. There is also a catch where, if Steve asks someone who has previously shouted him a drink, then he must immediately buy them a drink instead. **Steve can also kick in the balance of \$2 per shout to upgrade his beer to bourbons if he prefers to.**

Remember that Steve must be wearing the jacket, He must continue to wear the jacket while he is drinking. If it is too hot to wear the Champion of Champions jacket that is OK, just choose not to wear it and then you are not eligible for a free drink. All purchased drinks are to be opened so they cannot be taken home for future consumption or to give to dinner guests or visitors. A traveller for the drive home is OK so long as it is opened, and Steve is the one who drinks it.

Remember: In order, to qualify as the Champion of Champions a member just needs to win a monthly title. All of the winners from the monthly championships who are attending the golf trip will then play off for the title based on total accumulated

stableford points from 9x Randomly selected holes. The Winner is the person with the most points over those 9 nominated holes, and in the event of a tie then a Countback to determine the winner applies.

NOTE: The Winner of the December title is also eligible to win the competition however they only get to count their scores by using only 8 Randomly selected holes.

For the newcomers, we have included a brief description of how the countback system works.

When more than one player has the same Nett Score (such as in the example below from Spring Park then the place allocations are decided based on a countback system.

The count back system is formulated as the following. *Total number of stableford points scored on the back nine holes.

*In the event that both players have the same stableford score on the back nine it then reverts to the number of stableford points scored on the eighteenth hole. If this is the same then it goes to the 17th hole, sixteenth hole, fifteenth hole until a player has a better hole and therefore has a higher stableford score than the other.

The table below shows examples of the countback system as they occurred last month at Spring Park.

In order to win the Season Championship trophy, you need to play regularly and consistently to about your handicap or better, and it is the handicapper's responsibility to make sure that this doesn't happen. After every round, the scores are assessed and then the handicaps are adjusted according to your performance. As was the case last year we have adjusted the handicap formula to take into consideration the difficulty of each golf course, using the course slope index.

What we have done is simply aligned the Sunday Leave Pass handicapping process with the one used by golf link and by all golf clubs around the globe using the world handicapping system. Although your SLP handicap is unofficial and therefore it cannot be used to formally enter organized golf competitions and tournaments, it still should be an accurate reflection of your golfing prowess and a measure of what your GA (golf Australia) handicap would be if you subscribed the \$150 per year to get an official handicap.

Your playing handicap will fluctuate around your documented handicap index. When you play an easy course such as Ringwood or Dorset then you will actually play off a lower handicap than you normally would. On the other days when we invite you to play a harder course such as Eagle Ridge, Devils Bend, Werribee Park or Cape Schanck we will add a few extra shots to your arsenal just to give you more hope of avoiding total anxiety and depression.

Only the winner Tony Mac, Stu Coops in 2nd and Anthony Emmerson all on the podium positions were docked any shots off their handicaps, Greg Parsons also came down nearly ½ of a stroke but that is because based on his current form if he even reduces his putting score by 3 strokes, he will be almost unbeatable.

Most of the field saw no changes to their handicaps. Although there were a few touch ups which could be helpful to Ben, Col, Newell, Phil, Simon, Dawso and Tom Kellythorn

Jayden Orger, Greg Spence and Duan Robinson all have one round left using the Callaway handicapping system and then they will be switched across to an official Sunday Leave Pass handicap for two rounds using the original AGU handicapping system before they will be given their formal handicap Index using the Slope handicap system once they have completed 5 full rounds with the social club.

As a new member of the Social Club the Callaway Handicapping system is used to give the player a daily played to handicap for the first couple of rounds. Once they have played 3 rounds, they are given a temporary club handicap using the original AGU handicapping system. After 5 rounds they are then switched across to the current slope handicapping system.

For those people interested in the mechanics of the handicapping system it can be best explained as the following.

How to calculate a GA Handicap

To calculate a player's GA Handicap:

- you must firstly identify the player's most recent 20 scores,
- you then determine the 'Played To' value for each of these scores,
- you average the best 8 'Played To' values,
- and finally you multiply this average by 0.93. The resultant figure (to one decimal place) is the player's GA Handicap.

* If a player's handicap record contains a lesser number than 20 scores, the number of scores used to calculate the player's handicap is as listed in the table below.

* There is no requirement for a player's most recent 20 scores to have been returned within a specific timeframe. For example, the most recent 20 scores may span a period of three years or they may span a period of three months.

* Once a player's handicap record contains 20 scores, the next score they return will result in the oldest of the existing 20 scores being removed (to be replaced by the new score).

Full Technical Procedure for Calculating a GA Handicap STEP 1 – Use the table below to determine the number of scores to be included in the GA Handicap calculation:
