Beacon Hills Golf Course Results August

After three good scores in a row, any hopes Stu Cooper had of catching up on the Championship Leaderboard went out the window with a snap hook on the first tee. If that wasn't bad enough his second shot was also pulled 70 meters off target to the left and only just missed striking the group standing on the second tee by a matter of inches. A couple more duffed shots and a missed gimmee Putt and he finished the hole with a big fat lady. An eight on the first hole turned out to be one of Stu's better holes. He posted a very disappointing 118 Nett 99 and finished convincingly in the beer wench position with his second worst score ever.

There must be something about the Beacon Hills track that gets the better of people. As is often the case there were very few smiling faces in the car park and the tales of woe were an all too common song. It's hard to imagine why the scores were so lacklustre, especially since the conditions were so idyllic for golf. Considering the rain we have seen over the past few months, the course was in wonderful condition. The fairways were groomed perfectly, the greens ran true and fast and the sun shone down from a clear blue sky.

Tony MacIsaac was relishing the bright winter sun as it gave him an excuse to wear his pride and joy, a pair of the most modern designer eyewear out on the market. Tony looked as though he would be better placed accompanied by the Hollywood "A List" walking the red carpet or even at a Prince Harry Pool Party than at a Narree Warren golf course. As soon as he sauntered onto the first tee with his dark sunglasses ensconcing his eyes, Tony earned the

Nicknames Maverick and Hollywood, but by the time he had racked up his 4th 3putt green over the first 6 holes, his playing partners had reverted to calling him Stevie Wonder and Ray Charles because he was putting like a blind man.

Geoff Cooper had vision impairment problems of his own. At one stage he arrived at the tee with his driver, glove, and golf tee but no golf ball. It was only after the rest of his playing group had teed off that he discovered that he had lost his ball. Well actually he hadn't lost the ball rather he had left in the suction cup holder at the bottom of his geriatric putter ball picker up device and had put it back in his golf bag still with the ball attached.

Later, on the 10th hole when Geoff hit his recovery club out from under a cluster of trees he lost his ball again. The moral of the story is to watch the ball when you hit it and then you will see where it finishes. Not that Ron Parsons learnt from Geoff's misadventure. On the 17th hole Ron actually managed to chip in for a par from off the fairway but he didn't get to see the shot go into the hole because he had turned his back on the ball to select his club ready for the next shot because he thought he hadn't hit the ball hard enough. Initially he wouldn't believe his playing partners when they started jumping for joy and cheering excitedly, so he was pleasantly surprised when he walked up to the flag and discovered his Slazenger 4 sitting at the bottom of the cup. Old Ron nearly holed out again on the 18th when he hit a lovely 7x iron to within a meter of the hole. This time he nearly jumped out of his skin when his playing partners mockingly advised him he'd got it the hole again. Unfortunately Ron's failing eyesight meant he was unable to make out the action on the green from 130 meters away, so he took their cheers and celebrations as the truth. Ron hasn't moved so fast or been so excited since he was 15 and was told by his girlfriend that he was allowed to get to 2nd base if he took her to the drive-in movies. So imagine the disappointment he felt when he got to the green and discovered his partners were pulling his leg.

Peter Hutson was a pretty excited boy once he discovered that he had won himself a longest drive title. After Mick Harper and Big Ball Breasley missed the fairway during their attempts to win the prize it was just a matter of waiting for the last group to pass through the 12th hole before Peter could officially claim the title. It could easily be argued that on this occasion the longest drive prize may have technically been won by default since more than half a dozen players hit the ball further than Peters marker but they all failed to finish on the cut surface.

Whichever way you look at it there was no doubt that Peter definitely earned his Nearest to Pin title on the 15th hole. Peter hit the perfect pitching wedge from the elevated tee into the 126 meter par 3 hole. From the moment he struck the ball it was always going to be close, the ball pitched within 30cm of the flag stick and that's pretty much where it finished. It was an easy tap in Birdie for Pete and a very valiant attempt at scoring an eagle. The ball came close enough to a hole in one that Geoff Cooper was rumoured to be experiencing pains in his wallet as the possibility of him having to give away a free winery tour came in his opinion sickeningly too close.

Pete may have fallen just shy of the perfect shot, however big Mick hit three of them in a row. Over the past 18 months the big fella has had a few chances at winning the Eagles Nest prize but this month it all worked perfectly for him. Only last week Mick raided the Eagles Nest at his home course at Waterford Valley when he scored an eagle on the 11th hole and won 20 golf balls for his effort. Now he has suddenly added to his ever increasing golf ball stockpile because he has been rewarded with another 30 Golf Balls from the Sunday Leave Pass Social Club stash for his eagle 3 on the third hole at Beacon Hills. It took a crushing driver, a perfectly struck five wood and a 20 foot putt from the back of the green to make the eagle come to life. Apparently Steve Powne was more excited about Micks eagle, than he was when he, himself chipped in for an eagle on the 3rd at Dorset back in 2007.

As well as the eagle, Mick also scored the lowest round for the day. He shot 79 off the stick and finished the round in first place with Nett 71. Although things nearly got away from him, when he choked coming down the last hole. Mick's driver had been pretty solid all day, but on the 18th he fluffed it, instead of the normal perfect contact he hit under the ball and skied it. The ball still travelled 300meters but more on a vertical plain rather than a horizontal ball flight. When the ball did finally come down from orbit, his drive had only just made it past the ladies tees. To make matters worse he then dug a huge trench down the fairway when he hit his 5 wood fat. Incredibly despite having 2 shots Mick was still left with 200 meters to go on the 300 meter hole. Fortunately for the Big Fella, two solids shots and a one putt allowed him to escape with a bogey and with just a slight loss of face from what was otherwise a faultless round of golf.

It shows how the ability to recover from trouble and more importantly make Putts can really help to keep your score low. Greg Breasley hasn't quite mastered the art of putting yet. On Sunday, Big Ball Breasley was holding his own and he was driving the ball out from the tee into similar positions as Mick Harper was, but unfortunately his short game was not quite as polished. Rather than sinking putts for Par and Birdie and eagle, Greg accumulated 4 or 5 donations to the charity fund for fines for the dreaded four putt where he turned birdie attempts into double bogies and Par putts into triple bogies. Greg even went as bad as to have a 6putt green. When you consider the greens were relatively flat and ran very true compared to the rollercoasters we played on last month at Rosebud, it is hard to believe you could actually have a 6putt, but Greg did, so you obviously can. Admittedly Greg had literally just stepped off the aeroplane from a 6 week European holiday so he may have had a bit of jetlag to contend with as he was still operating on European time and probably felt like he should have been at home in bed.

Slinky was not suffering from jetlag but he still had a bit of difficulty with the flat stick. Our coilly friend drove like a champion, but as he got close to the greens suddenly things went astray. If you thought Greg Breasley 6xputt green was a feat, imagine the surprise when Slinky scored an 11 on a par 3, with seven of those strokes being putts. One thing is for certain you could never accuse slinky of being an angry man. It could be expected that after 7 putts, almost every bloke would have cried and thrown a temper tantrum, but not slinky he still was un-phased, he simply smiled and kept on keeping on. Even when he rolled his golf buggy and he lost all of the contents out of his golf bag as it cascaded down the steep cliff face on the 16th green, the Slinkster just plodded back up the hill, albeit 10 minutes after the rest of his group had completed the hole and moved to the next tee undeterred by the adversity he had endured.

Once again with the small field all participants were able to pick up plenty of championship points. Mick Harper took maximum points with his Nett 71 to maintain his position at the top of the championship point's leader board. After finishing runner up for the past 2 years Big Mick has set his eyes firmly on a first place finish this season. With young Matt MacIsaac falling out of the equation after suffering a broken leg this month, only Tony Grasso looks as a potential rival for the end of year Championship. Tony continues to loiter around the top of the monthly place rankings. He finished in second place, just beating Greg Parsons on a count back with 73 Nett. Ron Parsons played a very good round of golf and he finished in 4th spot just ahead of the Mark Williamson who played his first round with the Social Club and was given a Callaway Handicap of 22.
