CENTENARY PARK GOLF COURSE – FRANKSTON'S HOME OF PUBLIC GOLF

Centenary Park Golf Course has a long history in Frankston, originally formed as the 'Frankston Municipal Golf Club' in 1938 and situated in Yuille Street Frankston – on land which is now part of the Frankston Hospital and Pentland Gardens. In 1974, the Frankston Council decided to relocate the course to its current location. Designed by golf professional Bill Clifford. The club was renamed Centenary Park Golf Club in 1986. Centenary Park Golf Course has prided itself on being one of the most accessible courses for the public and the local community, ensuring golf remains a fun and enjoyable experience for players of all abilities.

Some might say fun and enjoyable are not quite the right words to describe their experience on Sunday!!!!!!!

March

The question was asked whether Adam Cooper would have the ability to go back-to-back and claim two monthly titles in succession. Quite simply the answer was "NO", in fact Adam only just managed to avoid going from the penthouse to the 5#!thouse because two of the players who turned up on Sunday were totally incapacitated by injury. After a commendable round at Gardiners Run (6th place) and then when Adam put forward such a dominant round at Warburton, all of the money was on him staying at the top of the leaders-board. Unfortunately for the younger Cooper brother it was not the case, Adam actually got 20 shots worse in the space of 30 days and it was only Cam Douglas (Broken arm) and Thomas Cooper (Broken ankle) who posted worse scores than him on Sunday.

It was bookend Coopers and Douglas' at Centenary park with one from each family featuring at the top of the place rankings and another at the bottom of the points distribution. Fortunately for me I landed on the good side of the ledger for a change even if it was only by a countback narrowly defeating Brent Douglas. In the family feud challenge at the tail of the field it was Cam Douglas who beat Thomas by 1 stroke to avoid wearing the pink vest.

At least, despite there severe ailments Thomas and Cam fronted up to play on Sunday which is more than we can say for a few others. Less than a month ago Cam was involved in a serious motorbike crash. He had a head on collision with another trailbike rider and as a result of the accident he broke his arm, smashed his ankle, ribs and his dislocated his knee, yet Cam still committed to playing golf. Thomas Cooper severely sprained his ankle on Thursday afternoon while taking part in a school sports competition. He was unable to bear weight on his leg all week, in fact he only threw down his crutches in order to sit into the car on Sunday morning as he left for golf. Thomas required a golf cart to navigate the golf course and he played most of his shots standing on one leg to hit the ball, yet despite the obvious pain and discomfort Thomas gritted his teeth and posted a score. Albeit a very bad one.

It was a big effort for both Cam and Thomas to accept their place in the field when they definitely had valid excuses not to play, especially once it was revealed that several others had pulled the pin for far lesser conditions. Jamie Brunton was laid up on bed on his back, he didn't elaborate on whether he actually had a sore back or if it was a wedding anniversary thing. Glenn Douglas pulled the pin on doctor's orders citing an injury above the shoulders. Carrying the burden of the entire Douglas family on his shoulders had to lead to straining the muscles sooner or later. Chris Sfiligoj cancelled at the last minute because he had a stomach ailment. He claims he ate a dodgy kebab, but it was probably more likely he just didn't have the guts to face the Bulldog supporters after his beloved Magpies put on such a poor showing on Friday night. Mal Griffiths was also a late withdrawal. Mal wasn't necessarily sick it was more that the missus confiscated his leave pass, and he didn't have the neither the heart or the spine to stand up to her.

For those players who did front up to Centenary Park, it was an interesting and character-building day. Centenary has always been one of the best golf courses on the Sunday Leave Pass fixture, so it was a little disheartening to turn up and see the course in less than, optimal condition. The greens were atrocious, they had more bumps than a Papua New Guinean back street road. It was impossible to hit a straight flat putt and even the shortest of tap ins would see the ball bouncing around and deviating off-line in any number of different angles.


After recording such good putting statistics last month, it was interesting but not surprising to see a significant turnaround for the worse in March. As a collective group we had 972 putts at an average of 36 putts per player which was 2 shots worse than the Warburton round. Thomas Cooper made his contribution to the putting statistics by amassing a career worst total of 47 putts. Thomas putted himself into last position and his putting total included 2x four putt greens, and 7 turns at the 3putt monkey vest. Thomas did not manage to make a single 1 putt for the day and his longest sequence of 3putt greens was 5 in a row between the 12 and 16th holes.

You have to be a pretty bad putter to do worse than Greg Parsons however on this occasion Thomas certainly did. By comparison to Thomas' shocking performance, Greg did OK with the flat stick, however he still had 43 putts including 8 three putts and a four-putt green, that means every 2nd hole he had a 3 putt or worse. It is pretty hard to post a competitive score when you are wasting so many shots with the flat stick.

Stu Coops proved how a score is built around the number of putts you have. Stu ranked as the number one position in the putting rankings and as a direct result of his 29putt round he ended up taking home the 15 championship points and the monthly title. Stu had six 1 putts and a chip in which ultimately enabled him to gain 8 shots back on the field.

Bad putting seems to be a young person's condition, historically it is always the juniors who rack up the big totals with the putter. Jaxon averages 39.67 putts per round, Thomas averages 38.76 putts and even Dale Robinson's son, Matt had an average of 39 strokes with the shortest club in the bag per round he played.

There is a famous saying in golf which is: "drive for show and putt for dough". Greg Parson was never going to take him any money with his putting efforts however he did have people talking when he smashed his drive, long and straight down the middle of the fairway on the longest drive competition hole. Apparently, Wayne James was pretty proud of himself as he wrote his name on the long drive marker. Wayne had played his best tee shot for the day and was quietly confident that so long as Mick Harper missed the fairway, he was in for a fairly good chance of claiming the Longest Drive prize. Unfortunately, for Wayne it wasn't to be the case and his name did not last long at all. In fact, the ink didn't even get a chance to dry on the marker because while he was addressing his ball and preparing to play his second shot, Greg Parsons in the group behind him smashed a monster drive which rolled straight past him (almost through his legs.) With the helping breeze and a touch of built-up aggression Greg hit probably his longest drive ever, according to the measuring device the ball travelled a distance of 270 meters (just under 300 yards.) The drive held on for a long time as the candidate for Longest Drive before it was finally beaten, it was only when one of the players in the back of the field got lucky and with the aid of a strong gust of wind Stu Coops managed to land a drive on the fairway and rob Greg of the title he rightfully deserved to win.



Hopefully for Stu, Greg doesn't hold grudges like Wayne James does. Evidently Wayne was so angry that Greg had hit his drive through him while he was playing a shot and perhaps as means of revenge for knocking his long drive marker off, on the very next hole Wayne hit his drive targeting at Greg who was waking off the 15th green. It is no easy feat to hit a ball at the group playing behind you however Wayne managed to do it. As Greg and his playing partners were walking down the path to the next tee, Wayne hit a big snap hook which smashed into the trees along side the walking track and the ball ricocheted sideways nearly decapitating Greg and Rick in the process.

It is one thing to be hitting golf balls at Greg Parsons however if there is one person you do not really want to make any angrier on the golf course it is definitely Rick Turcinovic. Wayne was lucky he didn't hit one of the guys or who knows what might have happened to him.

Even without people raining balls down on him Rick had a pretty rough start to the day. His drive off the first tee literally fell off the tee and landed still inside the teeing box. I am not sure if we have a fine for failing to get past the markers that you are playing from, but if we did have one then Rick would have had to pay it. Rick then he proceeded to hit his second shot straight into the lake. His 4th shot from the drop zone in front of the lake on the right-hand side of the fairway then disappeared directly into the other water hazard on the left-hand side of the fairway. At that point everyone started to tremble, knowing it was going to be a goat f#@king angry day. Rick started his day with a 10 and things did not necessarily get any better from there, so it didn't come as much of a surprise to see a dismantled golf club sticking out of the rubbish bin on the par 3 eighteenth hole.



Perhaps the reason the fine jar topped up so very quickly when Rick started barking out his orders, was fear of reprisal, personally I thought it was a better option to chip in a few coins or a piece of folding stuff rather than further anger the beast.

Speaking of chipping in, it is worth mentioning those winning moments out on the golf course. Shane Cummings chipped in for an easy par on the 15th hole. Stu Coops drove his tee shot to pin high on the fringe grass on the 11th hole then said to his playing partners, "that is a good result, I will have 2 chips and a putt to make a par. Stu went one better, Although, he did have the two chips the second one rolled into the hole to make a birdie with zero putts.

Anthony Emmerson chipped in for a three on the par 5, twelfth hole. Well, it wasn't so much as a chip in but more of a fully-fledged wedge shot from 80 meters away. Egg played two exceptionally good long shots to set his ball up in the middle of the fairway and therefore left himself an easy wedge distance into the flag stick. He hit the ball perfectly, it sailed over the pin, landed 2 meters past the hole, checked, and then spun back into the cup. It was the perfect shot. This was Anthony's second eagle in the short time he has been playing with the social club.

Eagles Nest



After Anthony raided it, the eagles nest jackpot returns to the starting balance of 6 golf balls and then one ball is added for each month that it does not go off and it is also topped up with any unclaimed NTP prizes. Shane Cumming will not need to be raiding the Eaglesnest anytime soon. Like so many other golfers on Sunday Shane hooked his golf ball into the rough on the left-hand side of the 17th fairway. After a quick search of the surrounds Shane was able to retrieve not only his own golf ball but also much to the amazement of Tony Grasso, Shane found a huge eclectic stockpile of extra balls to keep in his golf bag for another day.



Hitting the fairway was not always an easy task. There were strong winds to contend with and when you went astray some of the rough was very thick and looked like it hadn't been cut in weeks. Probably the main reason Shane was able to find a lot of balls while looking for his own, it was because there were plenty of other golfers who were losing them very regularly.



There are some times out on the golf course when you manage to find your ball when you wish you hadn't. Often it is better to play your provisional ball or take a penalty drop rather than try to extract your ball from an impossible position. The long rough and thick trees were responsible for many a round becoming unravelled. The 17th hole was especially brutal. The 17th hole played as the most difficult for the day, it played at 2.78 strokes over par. Interestingly when you compare the scores to par from our small collective group and then look at the actual hole rating index it is incredible how similar the holes difficulty matches up between the two. The four hardest holes according to the score card ranked exactly the same way when our scores were averaged out. As was the case with the two easiest holes on the course.

The difficult holes proved to be exactly that and consequently they were responsible for pretty much all of the Newell's scored for the day. A Newell is a score of 10 or more. On Sunday there were a total of 7x Newell's achieved. Thomas Cooper had a very tough end to his round which included 2 Newell's (score of 10 or more) he had a run of 28 strokes in 3 holes and 42 shots from his last 5 so there was no doubt he was a genuine contender for the beer wenching duties. Chris Westhead started his Sunday Leave Pass career with a Newell on his very first hole. Douggo had told him to play low key for his first few rounds however perhaps he took the advice a little too literally.

There were many other golfers who narrowly escaped making a Newell, Shane Cumming started his day with a 9 on the scorecard and he had blown his entire handicap allocation before he set foot onto the 4th tee. Tony Grasso butchered his way along the 6th fairway and was forced to hole a 20' foot putt to avoid adding his name to the Newell's scored hall of fame. Even Stu Coops was staring down the possibility of making a newell a couple of times when he hit a few of those famous errant drives which left him a couple of golf coins poorer by getting fined for hitting across two fairways and it was only luck that he was able to escape and avoid totally blowing his score out. Stu played the back nine 5 over par and 4 of those shots were amassed on the 17th hole where he made a quadruple bogey 8.

There is never a dull moment playing golf with Stu, his golfing is erratic and often entertaining. He sometimes uses parts of the golf course that even the grounds keeper did not know existed.






Stu entered this miracle shot as an applicant for SLP shot of the day. He had blocked his drive from the 7th tee out on to the 2nd fairway. After being forced to chip his ball backwards out of the scrub, he was certainly facing a potential Newell. Unfazed Stu took a guestimate of where the green should be, pulled out his trusty 9 iron, set up for a slice through a gap in the tree canopy,

then he closed his eyes and hit & hoped. Not only did the ball somehow mange to get through the gap in the trees (they are after all 90% air) but the ball landed at the front of the green where he was able to make an up and down for a double bogey (6).

Anthony Emmerson's spin back wedge for eagle was definitely also a very strong candidate for shot of the day, however there was no shot which could be classed in the same league as Cam Ross' effort on the 6th hole. Cam probably racked up first and 2nd place shots of the day in successive blows. His drive on the 6th hole was a low running hook which deflected of a rock, ricocheted off a small tree trunk and then bounced back towards the fairway but caught the foliage at the top of a gotcha tree. Shane Cumming was very quick to catch on and said to Cam I reckon the ball didn't come out of the branches. Tony Grasso concurred that he had not seen the ball drop either.



After a thorough search of the rough grass around the landing zone without any success, Cam's ball was finally located and as Cider and Tony Grass had predicted, the ball had actually gotten stuck in the tree.



It was a pretty amazing shot to manage to get a golf ball to get stuck 10 feet up in a tree but what happened next was absolutely mind blowing. As a student of the game, Cam was interested to find out what the rules of golf were when it came to a dilemma such as his. Cider explained to Cam what the different options available to him. As it was, Cam could either take an unplayable lie and incur a 1 stroke penalty and drop a ball within a couple of club lengths of the obstruction, (No nearer the pin or otherwise he could try to climb the tree and attempt to play it as it lies (without penalty). Without a second thought or further discussion, Cam

pulled out his trusty 3 wood and was playing an overhead slam shot. Not only did he dislodge the ball out of its nesting place, but he even gained 40 meters of distance and somehow the ball finished in the middle of the fairway. A true worthy winner of shot of the day.



Interestingly there are probably on 3 or 4 members of the Sunday Leave Pass social club who would have been tall enough to play the shot. For most of us the ball would have been well and truly out of reach. Luckily, there was only a golf ball and no birds nesting in the tree or else Cam may have taken them out with his giant overhanded backswing. Although it did not result in a birdie on the hole Cam did save himself a couple of shots and any way you look at it, it was definitely a miraculous recovery.

Birdies could be found out on the golf course. In total there were 8 birdies and an eagle marked down on the score cards. Of the birdies the largest number of them were scored on the NTP 2nd shot hole. So obviously there were plenty of golfers hitting the ball close enough to be vying for the NTP 2nd shot prize.

This year, we are tracking the number of Birdies and Newell's scored for the day. Soon we will have a chronological time stamp on the website listing all of these momentous occasions and a hall of fame for Birdies and Newells, similar to what we do for NTP and longest drive winners.

At centenary park it was the short par 4 holes which yielded the biggest return of birdies and the only sub-par score recorded on the par 5's was Anthony Emmerson and his highly acclaimed eagle 3. After seeing a couple of birdie 2's last month and Tom Kellythorns hole in one in January, there was no love from the par 3 holes. Obviously the NTP shots were not close enough to the hole as nobody was able to sink a putt for birdie on any of the one-shot holes around the golf course.

The results for Centenary Park were very closely spread however they were not quite as low as the last couple of rounds. There were less than 8 shots between first place and the multiple points cut off. The lowest Nett score (70) was shared between Stu Coops and Brent Douglas. Brent can count himself unlucky as he posted a very impressive 87 off the stick. This was his second-best career performance (He shot 85 at Morack to claim his first monthly title back in November 2019.) However, on this occasion Brent fell on the wrong side of the countback process and consequently he found himself relegated into 2nd place.

The count back system is formulated as the following. *Total number of stableford points scored on the back nine holes.

*In the event that both players have the same stableford score on the back nine it then reverts to the number of stableford points scored on the eighteenth hole. If this is the same then it goes to the 17th hole, sixteenth hole, fifteenth hole until a player has a better hole and therefore has a higher stableford score than the other.

The handicapper has taken to the scissors yet again. Anthony Emmerson has been identified as a serious threat to the competition so he was docked 1.4 strokes directly from his handicap. There is probably more to come, however we will deal with that next month after the Dorset round. A podium finish and a sub 90 handicap was the trigger for Brent Douglas' handicap to come down, and it did. 1 full stroke disappeared into thin air over night. Mark Fitzpatrick who finished in Beer wench position last month and received absolutely no sympathy was quickly audited after a solid round at Centenary Park. He lost 0.3 strokes. Newell Richards has tipped below a stroke a hole for the first time in his Sunday Leave Pass career. His handicap came in from 18.0 to 17.6 which means when he gets to play at Dorset next month, he will find himself trying to play to an adjusted handicap of about 15 or 16.

With a monthly title under his belt and a seat at the Champion of Champions playoff, Stu Coops was given a full stroke handicap haircut. Whether he can play to that level is a different matter but them's the breaks for winning. This month we tried a new handicapping method, the handicapper decided that everyone who's name started with a "T" received a little trim, consequently Tim, Tom, Tony, and Tony G, will all be playing from a lower handicap next time they play. How Tom Kellythorn is not yet handicapped to less than a stroke a hole is a conspiracy and requires a royal commission. We also reduced the supercoaches handicap from 16.2 to 6.2 this was done for no other reason than to give him the opportunity to complain. His handicap will still be 16.2 when he next plays but we will tell him it is 6.2 because he needs something to make his miserable life more dramatic.

Barry Hemsley, Cam Ross, and Jaxon were all gifted a little bit extra for next month. Dawso's handicap went out to 19.5 which is a big change. Almost a full stroke in one blow is a big outward movement so we are not sure what he promised the handicapper especially since Thomas Cooper only went out 0.1 strokes despite the fact that he came last and his played to score was 21 strokes worse than his actual handicap.



BOLD RED NUMBERS- refer to players whose handicap has gone out BOLD GREEN NUMBERS- refer to players whose handicap has come in BOLD BLACK NUMBERS- refer to players whose handicap has remained unchanged NON-BOLD NUMBERS- refer to players who didn't play this month, so handicap has not changed.

As a new member of the Social Club the Callaway Handicapping system is used to give the player a daily played to handicap for the first couple of rounds. Once they have played 3 rounds, they are given a temporary club handicap using the original AGU handicapping system. After 5 rounds they are then switched across to the current slope handicapping system.



This system is used for determining fair allowances for social golf events that attract novices or occasional golfers. A player's Callaway handicap is determined after each round by deducting from his/her 18-hole gross score the scores of the worst individual holes during the first 16 holes of the round.

In the computation of handicaps under this system:

- -No hole may be scored at more than twice its par,
- half strokes count as a whole,
- the 17th and 18th holes are never deducted,


For example, if a player scores 99 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (3 worst holes) +1

If a player scores 82 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (worst + ½ the 2nd worst hole) -1

If a player scores 120 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (five worst holes) +2

After 3 rounds they will be allocated a temporary handicap using the old AGU handicapping formula and then after 5 rounds they are elevated onto the official Slope handicapping system which was use thereafter for all club competitions.

Sometimes the Callaway handicapping system has proved itself to be very favorable to new members. Whenever we take on a golf course like Devils Bend or Eynesbury and the field struggle to play to their handicaps the Callaway golfers end up featuring at the top of the points distribution. Unfortunately, it was not the case for Chris Westhead who even with a 41-handicap found himself a long way down the leaderboard



For those people interested in the mechanics of the handicapping system it can be best explained as the following.

How to calculate a GA Handicap

To calculate a player's GA Handicap:

- you must firstly identify the player's most recent 20 scores,
- you then determine the 'Played To' value for each of these scores,
- you average the best 8 'Played To' values,
- and finally you multiply this average by 0.93. The resultant figure (to one decimal place) is the player's GA Handicap.
- * If a player's handicap record contains a lesser number than 20 scores, the number of scores used to calculate the player's handicap is as listed in the table below.

- * There is no requirement for a player's most recent 20 scores to have been returned within a specific timeframe. For example, the most recent 20 scores may span a period of three years or they may span a period of three months.
- * Once a player's handicap record contains 20 scores, the next score they return will result in the oldest of the existing 20 scores being removed (to be replaced by the new score).

Full Technical Procedure for Calculating a GA HandicapSTEP 1 – Use the table below to determine the number of scores to be included in the GA Handicap calculation:

Number of Scores in Player's Handicap Record Scores to be Used in the Calculation

Best/Lowest 1	5 to 6
Best/Lowest 2	7 or 8
Best/Lowest 3	9 or 10
Best/Lowest 4	11 or 12
Best/Lowest 5	13 or 14
Best/Lowest 6	15 or 16
Best/Lowest 7	17 or 18
Best/Lowest 8	19 or 20

Note: When the handicap record contains more than 20 scores, the GA Handicap calculation uses the best 8 of the player's most recent 20 scores.

I hope that helps to explain the handicapping system.

The Sunday Leave Pass handicapping process with the one used by golf link and by all golf clubs around the globe using the world handicapping system. Although your SLP handicap is unofficial and therefore it cannot be used to formally enter organized golf competitions and tournaments, it still should be an accurate reflection of your golfing prowess and a measure of what your GA (golf Australia) handicap would be if you subscribed the \$150 per year to get an official handicap.

Your playing handicap will fluctuate around your documented handicap index. When you play an easy course such as Ringwood or Dorset then you will actually play off a lower handicap than you normally would. On the other days when we invite you to play a harder course such as Rosebud Country Club, Devils Bend, Werribee Park or Barham we will add a few extra shots to your arsenal just to give you more hope of avoiding total anxiety and depression.

For those players not familiar with the scoring process, listed below is the format we use in Sunday Leave Pass competitions.

Once all of the players are ranked then the Seasons Championship points are allocated according to the position in the field.

The player in 1st place gets 15 points, 2nd place 14 points, 3rd place 13 points, etc. etc. Any player who completes the round however finishes ranked outside the top 14 and is placed between 15th spot to BeerWench then they are all allocated 1 championship point for attending.

For the benefit of the newcomers or the uneducated we thought it would be a good opportunity to go through the player rankings and point scoring system again.

Sunday Leave Pass competitions are run using Stroke so you need to count every shot that you play and you need to finish every hole. Each player's Nett total score is then calculated by deducting the players handicap from the Gross score. If a player doesn't have an official Sunday Leave Pass handicap then a temporary played to handicap is allocated on the day using the Callaway handicapping system.

Once the players Nett score is calculated they are ranked from lowest score to highest score. (BeerWench) Where more than one player has the same Nett Score (such as in the example below from Gardiners Run last year then the place allocations are decided based on a countback system.

The player with the most points at the end of the year is crowned the Points champion irrespective of how many rounds a person has played. If one person plays 13 rounds for the year and the person in 2nd place has only played 10 rounds but is close to the same score then that is bad luck to the person in 2nd place. All players are invited to play the entire fixture. We reward participation rather than perfection and performance so if you play more often you will end up with more points.

In order to win the Season Championship trophy, you need to play regularly and consistently to about your handicap or better, and it is the handicapper's responsibility to make sure that this doesn't happen. After every round, the scores are assessed and then the handicaps are adjusted according to your performance. As was the case last year we have adjusted the handicap formula to take into consideration the difficulty of each golf course, using the course slope index, so it will be remarkably interesting to see how the scores finish up.

Every monthly title winner also becomes eligible to play off for the champion of champions trophy. To qualify as the Champion of Champions a member just needs to win a monthly title. All of the winners from the monthly championships who are attending the golf trip will then play off for the title based on total accumulated stableford points from 9x Randomly selected holes. The Winner is the person with the most points over those 9 nominated holes, and in the event of a tie then a Countback to determine the winner applies.

NOTE: The Winner of the December title is also eligible to win the competition however they only get to count their scores by using only 8 Randomly selected holes.

It seems when it is free the beer tastes much better. The blue jacket even makes Carlton Draught taste palatable. Tony Grasso and Slinky were first to be called up at Centenary park as they are not as regular players as some of the others.

For those who have forgotten about the powers bestowed on the Blue Jacket here is a reminder of how it works.

As the Champion of Champions Newell will be able to ask any Sunday Leave Pass member to buy him a drink, it is limited to only receiving one drink per member (beer or soft) over the entire year and it can only be done so only if he is wearing the Champion of Champion jacket at the time. This of course does not include new members who did not play at least one or more rounds in season 2020 but not exclusive to those who attended the golf trip. So, if he manages himself correctly, he should be looking at up to 50 free beers or soft drinks over the next 12 months. Now that is a prize worth aspiring for.

The other condition is that Newell must be the one who consumes the drink, he cannot use his power to buy beverages for anyone else. The odds of a social golfer scoring a hole in one is actually 12000 to 1 and since it took us more than 16 years and had over 20000 attempts before someone in the club was able to make a hole in one on a par 3 holes the chances of someone making another Ace seems to be near on impossible.

(In 1999, *Golf Digest* reported, "One insurance company puts a PGA Tour pro's chances at 1 in 3,756 and an amateurs at 1 in 12,750.") The *Golf Digest* study even breaking the odds down by quality of play:

Professional Tour player making an ace: 3,000 to 1

Low handicapper making an ace: 5,000 to 1

Average player making an ace: 12,000 to 1
