## CENTENARY PARK GOLF COURSE - FRANKSTON'S HOME OF PUBLIC GOLF

Centenary Park Golf Course is located on McClelland Drive, Frankston. The course was established on the current site in the mid-1970's and has developed into one of the most popular public courses in metropolitan Melbourne. Situated only 1 hour from Melbourne at the start of the picturesque Mornington Peninsula, Centenary Park is one of Melbourne's best public access golf courses. The 18hole course features an interesting and challenging layout, offering golfers something different at each hole. At $6,197 \mathrm{~m}$ this par 71 course is one of the longest public course in Melbourne. Add to this some exciting water features, Centenary Park offers a quality golfing experience.

It was a golden start to the day on Sunday. The early start was made all the more easy by the glorious sunrise and the spectacular conditions for golf. There was hardly a breath of wind for the entire day and once the sun made it up into the sky the temperature and conditions were perfect.


The only let down was the Centenary Park greens, which clearly had not seen a mower in the last 3 weeks. The furry putting surface combined with the early morning dew made putting a real challenge. It seemed it didn't matter how hard you tried to hit a put it would always fall short. There is a wise man's saying, " $\mathbf{1 0 0 \%}$ of short putts don't go in." The result of falling short was that the three putt monkey vests got passed around the groups very regularly. In fact, Chris Sfiligoj and Andrew Clark were the only players to go through all 18 holes without making a 3 -putt green.

Rick Turcinovic spent the most time dressed in yellow, he 3 putted $33 \%$ of the holes. Greg Parsons and Westy both had 53 putt greens and Greg added to his contribution with a four putt on the par 3 second hole.

Stu Coops 4 putted the $7^{\text {th }}$ green and turned a makeable birdie chance into a double bogie as he struggled to come to terms with the challenges of putting on the bumpy, duck pooh covered greens.

As a collective group we racked up 73 different 3 putts, plus five players (Stu, Rick, Duan, Stevie P. and Greg Parsons) all were gold coin donors to the fine jar after being caught having a 4-putt green.

Admittedly there were more 1-putts than three putts but that was probably boosted by the many times our chips and approaches missed the green giving the golfer a free hit to get it reasonably close to the hole. There was a total of 111 one putts at Centenary Park, and it should be noted that Westy was the only player to chip in from off the green for a zero putt. The best putter was Jake Schmidt with 31- taps with the flat stick. Although he was in good company because there was Jake and 5 others (SOS, Cider, Mick, Tom and Ben Nichol) who all made their first putt on every $3^{\text {rd }}$ hole they played. Glen Douglas finished his round economically by making 3 one putts in a row from holes 16 to 18 .

The putting got better as the day warmed up and the dew started to burn off or the footprints on the green blended into each other and started to create a more consistent playing surface.


Tom Kellythorn always knew the exact distance he needed to hit the ball, so it was more execution than knowledge which impacted his game. According to his playing partners, Tom would spend 5 minutes standing over his golf buggy sighting his range-finder readings, before he even contemplated selecting a club or playing a shot. Partnering up with Tom was very frustrating for Chris and the Supercoach, who are fast players and they could not get their head around why Tom would need to stand at the tee box on a par 5 hole and for some unknown reason he would need to work out how far it was to the greenside bunker and the flag, only to go back to his buggy and select driver and then hit the ball 180 -meters, 290-meters short of the target he had been honing in on. Tom not only uses his range finder for judging distances to targets he can't even hit the ball too, but also for shots that he can pace out with his feet. Tom would take a measurement to the nearest centimetre on a 10 -foot chip, and he would even take a sighter through the range finder while he was putting on the greens.


Chris Westhead is more of a feel player, he didn't bother with modern technology or devices, he simply walks up to the ball and whacks it, chases it down the fairway and whacks it again. Westy's method seems to work just as well as Tom continuously stealing minutes at a time of everyone else's day, and one could argue Westy's formula is better since he got his distance absolutely perfect on the 3rd hole, where he chipped in from off the fairway.

The exact Distance to the green or the flag had no benefit to Jake Schmidt when he found his ball in the depths of trouble on the $14^{\text {th }}$ hole. Jake found the most gnarly section of long grass on the course and was left with no stance or possible option to hit his ball in any direction.

Spot the golf ball competition.


Ever the optimist Jake still wanted to try to play his ball rather than take an unplayable lie penalty, however luckily his good mate Dawso talked him into the benefits of accepting the one stroke penalty as opposed to multiple shots and possible air swings which would have inevitably resulted in blowing his good round and increased the likelihood of making a Newell on the hole.

For the newcomers to the social club, as a matter of reference, "A Newell," is a golfing term defined as "A score of 10 or more shots on a single hole."

This month there was 6 new names to add to the "Newell wall of shame." Thomas Cooper had the daily double and was credited as having the most Newell's for the round as well as the biggest score of 13 (Newell plus three) on the $7^{\text {th }}$ hole. Both Thomas and Duan Robinson started their day off badly with a Newell on the very first hole. Barry Hemsley squandered a championship winning position when he racked up a Newell on the $12^{\text {th }}$ hole. Rick and Chris Westhead had their big number holes on the way back to the clubhouse, Rick reached double figures on the $15^{\text {th }}$ hole and Westy lost a few balls while hacking his way along the $17^{\mathrm{th}}$.

Newell's - Sunday Leave Pass

A Newell is usually built around a few penalty shots or lost balls. With a few new players joining the club this year and many old members who still don't know the rules properly we thought it was time to remind everyone the rules for scoring when it comes to a lost ball.


The only variation on the stroke event to normal club competition is that in the event when a ball is deemed lost, rather than walk back to the tee to play another shot or be disqualified by DNF, the player can take a penalty of stroke plus distance and drop the ball in the area where the ball was last seen or at the location where it was thought to be lost. (For example after a lost tee shot the player will drop a ball where the ball was deemed lost and they will be hitting their 4 th shot from there.)

This rule often leads to a great deal of confusion within the Sunday Leave Pass Social club, so it might be an opportune time to clarify our expected format for when you lose your ball or hit it out of bounds but don't have the energy to walk all of the way back to the tee or back to where you played your shot from. As a matter of consistency we will refer back to the policy we created to combat this regular situation. The R\&A rules of golf relating to a lost ball is Rule 27-1 "stroke plus distance penalty for a lost ball." Meaning you should count the stroke you played, add a one shot penalty and play your next shot from the same spot you hit from.

In 2019 the rules commity created the option to drop where the ball should be, inorder to save time and allow you to play your next shot from where the ball went out of bounds or where you think the ball was lost but you need to actually add two (2) penalty strokes to your score not just one. The reason it is a two shot penalty is because you are counting the distance that you have gained by moving forward as an extra shot.

An example of this would be Ben Nichol on the $18^{\text {th }}$ hole on Sunday. Ben hit his ball out to the right of the green but after a 3 minute search of the area his ball was still no where to be seen. Because his balll was lost, Ben had the option of either running back to the tee to play another ball (his third shot- under stroke plus distance) or to play the ball from where the ball was thought to be lost. Under the stroke plus distance rule he was therefore playing his fourth shot from where he dropped the ball.

There is a significant difference between taking a one shot penalty and taking the required stroke plus distance penalty.

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If you are in doubt whether the ball will be inbounds or if it is likely to be found, then it is usually best practice to play a provisional ball from the same spot you last played a shot from before going forward to search for your ball. You can play your provisional ball as many times as is necessary to get it to where the first ball is thought to be located, the score on the provisional ball only comes in to play once it is confirmed that the first ball is definitely lost.


According to his playing partner, Cider made the best bogey, Barry had ever seen. Shane blocked his drive straight right into the forest and boundary fence on the left-hand side of the $14^{\text {th }}$ hole. He therefore elected to play a provisional ball from the tee, which was an over correction which saw his tee shot, snap hook and disappear over the crest landing somewhere out on the $15^{\text {th }}$ fairway. Once it was decided Shane's first ball was M.I.A. he was forced to call the provisional ball live and in play. Shane's line of sight and the path of the ball was impeded by an impenetrable wall of trees in front of him, however the unflappable, jolly blue $\mathrm{m} \& \mathrm{~m}$ proceeded to play what was later declared to be the "shot of the day." Cider hit a 90-degree turning slice along the $15^{\text {th }}$ fairway which navigated its way through and around the trees and miraculously, somehow managed to land on the green, giving him a tap in, one putt bogie with a lost ball.

Chris Sfiligoj tried a similar shot to Cider's on the Par $512^{\text {th }}$ hole, although he ended up with a totally different outcome. The good brothers' golf ball crashed into the tree in front of him and ricocheted back into his umbrella and then deflected across the path and into the rough on the other side of the fairway.


Interestingly, despite bouncing off two solid objects, the golf ball still travelled further than Chris's drive on the par 4, $5^{\text {th }}$ hole where he barely managed to get the ball past the red markers.

On a hole that was predetermined as the nearest to pin on the second shot, there was little chance of Chris winning the prize. After Tom had spent 5 minutes zooming in with his range finder, he was able to remind Chris that he still had 255 meters to go to with his second shot after his drive came to rest.


It was a rare occasion for the longest drive competition, because it was Stu Coops who managed to hit a drive straight enough to remain on the fairway. In retrospect, it was probably one of the only fairways he hit for the entire day, so it was lucky the front group had selected the $16^{\text {th }}$ hole as the long drive hole. Unfortunately, Stu was not able to capitalize on the good drive, although he knocked his next shot onto the green, he three putted for bogey to go one over on the back nine. It was the start of the end for Stu, once Mick suggested Stu was going to beat him off the stick, things went pair shaped very quickly. With a quadruple bogie on the $17^{\text {th }}$ hole and a bogey on the last, Stu went from $1^{\text {st }}$ place to $10^{\text {th }}$ place by dropping 6 strokes in three holes. Over the same stretch of holes Mick played to even par including a spectacular birdie on the $18^{\text {th }}$ hole in front of an audience of 15 blue shirts with cans in hand.

The $18^{\text {th }}$ hole was not Mick's only birdie, he also rolled in a sub-par result on the $11^{\text {th }}$ hole. With a couple of birdies again this month he is starting to mount his attempt to reclaim the Eclectic Stroke Championship trophy. Mick has a bit of competition against him this year as SOS is having a breakout season and featuring in the Birdie Crew wall of honour almost every month with his name making multiple appearances.

SOS birdied both the $7^{\text {th }}$ and $9^{\text {th }}$ holes, his birdie putt on the $9^{\text {th }}$ hole was also the longest holed putt on the nominated hole. At 588 cm he was rewarded with the prize for the putting competition and has the claim of the longest holed putt for the year (excluding Jaxon's at Gardiners Run- who's was from 17 meters off the green.)

Shane Cumming also managed to cash in with his prize winning nearest to pin $2^{\text {nd }}$ shot. On the $5^{\text {th }}$ hole Cider hit his approach closer than all before and after him and the victory was all the more sweeter knowing he made the birdie on what was otherwise a tough day for the normally consistent left hander.

Wayne James and Stu Coops duped each other out of some skins when they both birdied the $10^{\text {th }}$ hole. Clarkey took only 4 shots to finish the longest hole on the Centenary Park layout. His birdie on the $12^{\text {th }}$ hole netted him a skin, although he was unlucky because despite Mick Harper making a birdie on it, Simon Galloway had robbed the Skins bank on the $11^{\text {th }}$ hole taking home the biggest jackpot which had grown to 8 skins.

Although he didn't win the NTP prize, Greg Parsons managed to one up Brent Douglas who hit the ball closest to the flag, because Greg holed his putt for a rare Sunday Leave pass birdie two. Brent Douglas actually won 2 of the NTP titles, unfortunately however, he was unable to convert any of his good work into birdies. Brent did very well on the one-shot holes, he hit 3 out of the 5 par 3 holes which is a very commendable effort.

## Reminder <br> The ball must be clearly on the CUT surface of the green or fairway to win NTP or longest drive. If it is not on the fairway it doesn't count.

Each player won 1 ball each.

Centenary Park statistics included, $9 x$ Birdies and 100x pars, 191 bogeys, 115 double bogies or worse including 6 Newell's (Score of 10 or more).
"SKINS" are distributed to those players good enough to win a hole outright. If more than 1 player got the lowest score on a hole it is Jackpotted until an outright winner occurs.

For every skin, a player wins during the season is converted to an extra raffle ticket to go into the end of year prize draw.
Just a reminder that for every round you play you are automatically awarded a raffle ticket to go towards the end of year raffle, then extra tickets are issued if you wear the official club shirt'

Plus, the monthly winner has the option of exchanging the number of balls owed to Raffle tickets for the end of year prize draw as can be any nearest to pin or long drive or other ball prizes.

For the third month in a row one player has been the happy recipient of a large skins Jackpot. This month Simon Galloway claimed 8 skins on his first round with the social club, Simon made a par on the $12^{\text {th }}$ hole which was a better nett result than Mick Harpers birdie on the same hole. Rick Turcinovic started his round like a man possessed, he parred the first and third holes which saw him rewarded with an extra 3 skins raffle tickets in the bank. The only other skins were handed out to Clarkey and Greg Parsons for their birdies on holes 12 and 13. Mick Harper could count himself unlucky not to win a skin or the entire jackpot when he knocked his tee shot close and drained the putt on the $18^{\text {th }}$ green.

This year we are trialling a new competition, we ran it for the first time at Gardiners Run and again in February at Warburton. The concept is called the longest holed putt. The first group get to place a marker on the green at the point where the ball was located when the ball was holed. The intention is then to see who manages to sink the longest putt on that hole, as the marker would move further and farther back and around the green as we drop in those $8^{\prime}$ and $10^{\prime}$ footers for par, bogey, double bogey or even a Newell.

Congratulations to SOS who knocked off Highway for the longest holed putt for the round and in fact SOS has moved to No\# 1 ranked player the longest putt for the year.

Newell seemed unperturbed by his relegation down the leader-board, in fact he seems to have a much more laid back attitude towards all things, we are not sure if his change in personality is related back to his BYO Hippy Ale, or whether the stash bag he keeps in his "Vanborghini" is a better quality mix than he usually chews on.


Whatever the cause, it is great to see Newell so happy, although he can be seen to be acting a little colourful at times.


It seems Newell was not the only person who was having trouble getting dressed and keeping his clothes in order. Evidently the 2021 Champion of Champions got a bit overzealous on Sunday and drank more alcohol than he can handle ( 5 beers). Obviously, Stevie had too much for his little body to cope with and the repercussions was that he lost consciousness and his Champion of Champions jacket. Jamie Brunton was lucky enough to find the jacket in the back seat of his car where the blue smurf had passed out and now Jamie is claiming that since he is in possession of the jacket, he is therefore entitled to all of the powers bestowed upon the jacket holder.


For those who have forgotten about the powers bestowed on the Blue Jacket here is a reminder of how it works.

As the Champion of Champions Steve Jamie will be able to ask any Sunday Leave Pass member to buy him a drink, it is limited to only receiving one drink per member (beer or soft) over the entire year and it can only be done so if he is wearing the Champion of Champion jacket at the time. This of course does not include new members who did not play at least one or more rounds in season 2021, but not exclusive to those who attended the golf trip. So, if he manages himself correctly, he should be looking at up to 42 free beers or soft drinks over the next 12 months. Now, that is a prize worth aspiring for.

The other condition is that the Blue Smmaf Jamie must be the one who consumes the drink, he cannot use his power to buy beverages for anyone else. There is also a catch where, if Steve Jamie asks someone who has previously shouted him a drink, then he must immediately buy them a drink instead.

Steve Jamie can also kick in the balance of \$2 per shout to upgrade his beer to bourbons if he prefers to.

Remember that Steve Jamie must be wearing the jacket, He must continue to wear the jacket while he is drinking. If it is too hot to wear the Champion of Champions jacket that is OK, just choose not to wear it and then you are not eligible for a free drink. All purchased drinks are to be opened so they cannot be taken home for future consumption or to give to dinner guests or visitors. A traveller for the drive home is OK so long as it is opened, and Steve Jamie is the one who drinks it.

It will be interesting to see who turns up wearing the blue jacket next month. Jamie did have it for a full 12 months a few years ago, although his level of collects over the duration was probably the equivalent of what Steve has done in 3 rounds.


Remember: In order, to qualify as the Champion of Champions a member just needs to win a monthly title. All of the winners from the monthly championships who are attending the golf trip will then play off for the title based on total accumulated stableford points from 9x Randomly selected holes. The Winner is the person with the most points over those 9 nominated holes, and in the event of a tie then a Countback to determine the winner applies.

NOTE: The Winner of the December title is also eligible to win the competition however they only get to count their scores by using only 8 Randomly selected holes.

For those players not familiar with the scoring process, listed below is the format we use in Sunday Leave Pass competitions. Once all of the players are ranked then the Seasons Championship points are allocated according to the position in the field. The player in $1^{\text {st }}$ place gets 15 points, $2^{\text {nd }}$ place 14 points, $3^{\text {rd }}$ place 13 points, etc. etc. Any player who completes the round however finishes ranked outside the top 14 and is placed between $15^{\text {th }}$ spot to BeerWench then they are all allocated 1 championship point for attending.

For the benefit of the newcomers or the uneducated we thought it would be a good opportunity to go through the player rankings and point scoring system again.

Sunday Leave Pass competitions are run using Stroke so you need to count every shot that you play and you need to finish every hole. Each player's Nett total score is then calculated by deducting the players handicap from the Gross score. If a player doesn't have an official Sunday Leave Pass handicap, then a temporary played to handicap is allocated on the day using the Callaway handicapping system.

Once the players Nett score is calculated they are ranked from lowest score (Monthly title winner) to highest score. (BeerWench) Where more than one player has the same Nett Score then the place allocations are decided based on a countback system.

The player with the most points at the end of the year is crowned the Points champion irrespective of how many rounds a person has played. If one person plays 13 rounds for the year and the person in $2^{\text {nd }}$ place has only played 10 rounds but is close to the
same score then that is bad luck to the person in $2^{\text {nd }}$ place. All players are invited to play the entire fixture. We reward participation rather than perfection and performance so if you play more often you will end up with more points.

For the newcomers, we have included a brief description of how the countback system works.
When more than one player has the same Nett Score (such as in the example below from Warburton then the place allocations are decided based on a countback system.

The count back system is formulated as the following. *Total number of stableford points scored on the back nine holes.
*In the event that both players have the same stableford score on the back nine it then reverts to the number of stableford points scored on the eighteenth hole. If this is the same then it goes to the $17^{\text {th }}$ hole, sixteenth hole, fifteenth hole until a player has a better hole and therefore has a higher stableford score than the other.

The table blow shows examples of the countback system as they occurred at Warburton last month.

In order to win the Season Championship trophy, you need to play regularly and consistently to about your handicap or better, and it is the handicapper's responsibility to make sure that this doesn't happen. After every round, the scores are assessed and then the handicaps are adjusted according to your performance. As was the case last year we have adjusted the handicap formula to take into consideration the difficulty of each golf course, using the course slope index.

What we have done is simply aligned the Sunday Leave Pass handicapping process with the one used by golf link and by all golf clubs around the globe using the world handicapping system. Although your SLP handicap is unofficial and therefore it cannot be used to formally enter organized golf competitions and tournaments, it still should be an accurate reflection of your golfing prowess and a measure of what your GA (golf Australia) handicap would be if you subscribed the $\$ 150$ per year to get an official handicap.

Your playing handicap will fluctuate around your documented handicap index. When you play an easy course such as Ringwood or Dorset then you will actually play off a lower handicap than you normally would. On the other days when we invite you to play a harder course such as Eagle Ridge, Devils Bend, Werribee Park or Cape Schanck we will add a few extra shots to your arsenal just to give you more hope of avoiding total anxiety and depression. As you will see from the chart listed below, the handicapper got busy to work this month and after all of the impressive scores at Centenary Park a large proportion of the field copped a notable handicap reduction. Especially when next month we are playing at Dorset which is reputedly one of the easiest and lowest scoring courses on the Sunday Leave Pass fixture.

## HANDICAPS

The changes to player's handicaps are as follows:

As a new member of the Social Club the Callaway Handicapping system is used to give the player a daily played to handicap for the first couple of rounds. Once they have played 3 rounds, they are given a temporary club handicap using the original AGU handicapping system. After 5 rounds they are then switched across to the current slope handicapping system.


After 3 rounds they will be allocated a temporary handicap using the old AGU handicapping formula and then after 5 rounds they are elevated onto the official Slope handicapping system which was use thereafter for all club competitions.

Sometimes the Callaway handicapping system has proved itself to be very favorable to new members. Whenever we take on a golf course like Devils Bend or Eynesbury and the field struggle to play to their handicaps the Callaway golfers end up featuring at the top of the points distribution. Whereas a round on a low scoring course like Centenary Park or Dorset can be difficult for a Callaway handicapped member to pick up too many points.

As you can see in the comparison below, a new members handicap will adjust according to their performance on the day. Last month Duan hit 107 off the stick and the Sum total of his worst 4 holes when adjusted gave him a handicap of 29. At Centenary Park Duan was much more consistent and his score of 98 mean has handicap was calculated taking into consideration his 3 worst holes. Those scores were a Newell and two 6's giving him a Callaway handicap of just 22.


For those people interested in the mechanics of the handicapping system it can be best explained as the following.

## How to calculate a GA Handicap

To calculate a player's GA Handicap:

- you must firstly identify the player's most recent 20 scores,
- you then determine the 'Played To' value for each of these scores,
- you average the best 8 'Played To' values,
- and finally you multiply this average by 0.93 . The resultant figure (to one decimal place) is the player's GA Handicap.
* If a player's handicap record contains a lesser number than 20 scores, the number of scores used to calculate the player's handicap is as listed in the table below.
* There is no requirement for a player's most recent 20 scores to have been returned within a specific timeframe. For example, the most recent 20 scores may span a period of three years or they may span a period of three months.
* Once a player's handicap record contains 20 scores, the next score they return will result in the oldest of the existing 20 scores being removed (to be replaced by the new score).

Full Technical Procedure for Calculating a GA Handicap STEP 1 - Use the table below to determine the number of scores to be included in the GA Handicap calculation:

Note: When the handicap record contains more than 20 scores, the GA Handicap calculation uses the best 8 of the player's most recent 20 scores.

Chris Westhead found himself at the wrong end of the player rankings, and his score of 113 Nett 84 was enough to see him in last place, although Anthony Emmerson could count himself lucky as the Pink Vest obligation was determined by a countback. Westy had 11 points on the back nine whereas Egg had 13 stableford points.

The odds of a social golfer scoring a hole in one is actually 12000 to 1 and since it took us more than 16 years and had over 20000 attempts before someone in the club was able to make a hole in one on a par 3 holes the chances of someone making another Ace seems to be near on impossible.
(In 1999, Golf Digest reported, "One insurance company puts a PGA Tour pro's chances at 1 in 3,756 and an amateurs at 1 in 12,750.") The Golf Digest study even breaking the odds down by quality of play:

- Professional Tour player making an ace: 3,000 to 1
- Low handicapper making an ace: 5,000 to 1
- Average player making an ace: 12,000 to 1

[^0]:    In this instance both Rick and Mick had Nett 71 after their handicap was deducted from the Gross Scores. So, we go back to a countback.

    In this example Rick wins because he had 17 points on the back nine compared to Mick who could only conjure up a disappointing 15 stableford points on the back nine and was therefore relegated down a place.

    If in the event that the countback, then identifies that both players have had the same stableford points score on the back nine then we go back to the individual holes starting from the $18^{\text {th }}$ hole and compare results until a player had a standout result. In the example shown on the right both Cider and Westy finished their rounds equal with Nett 72 . Then on the back nine holes each also had 17 Stableford points. On the $18^{\text {th }}$ both guys also equalled with a 3-pointer hole so the scores on the $17^{\text {th }}$ holes are then taken into consideration. On the 17th hole Cider scored a bogie for 2 stableford points whereas Westy struggled on the difficult dog leg hole. Westy finished with a triple bogie which once his handicap was deducted was only good for 1 stableford point. Consequently, Shane wins the countback and Westy is relegated back to a lower place ranking although he still beat another 4 guys on the same Nett score. If both scores are equal then we go back to the $17^{\text {th }}$ hole, then the $16^{\text {th }}$, etc etc.

    PLEASE NOTE THAT THE COUNT BACK IS ON HOLES 10-18 irrespective of whether it is a two-tee start, a normal hit off from the first hole or as in the case of Warburton we hit off both the1st and $10^{\text {th }}$ holes It is always the $10^{\text {th }}$ to $18^{\text {th }}$ holes and if one person starts on the $10^{\text {th }}$ hole and the other hits off the first hole
