Centenary Park Golf Course Results May

A Special thanks to Greg Parsons and Peter Hutson for cooking the BBQ for us all, apparently they were so keen to get the food prepared for us all that they literally ran around the course and finished 40 minutes ahead of the second group. WELL DONE BOYS.

The Centenary Park golf track is a great golf course and despite the heavy drenching Melbourne received over the weekend it remained in excellent condition with very little overlying water. Only a few of the bunkers were filled with water but even with them there was always an area in the sand you could drop the ball if you were unfortunate enough to hit your ball in the trap.

As is usually the case Centenary Park claimed a few victims and the longer par 4's and challenging elevated greens managed to deflate the aspirations of those slightly off their game and consequently some pretty big scores were posted on the day. One player who had no qualms about the course was Phil Plane who coasted around the course. Phil finished the afternoon with a brilliant round and was rewarded with May title with a score of Nett 71.

Phil was a deserved winner; he claimed his second career title from 45 starts with the Sunday Leave Pass Social Club when he won the day on a count back from the Tony Grasso senior. The highlight of the day was not the victory itself but the way he played the 5th hole to absolute perfection. Phil hit a strong drive around the corner of the par 4 dogleg, opening up the green for his second shot into the flag. He calculated the distance to be approximately 146 meters to the cup from where he was on the fairway. Before selecting which club to hit, Phil tested the wind speed and direction, assessed atmospheric pressure and took into consideration the turgidity of the grass due to the recent rain. He decided in the end to go with his 7 iron. He put a pure swing on the club as he caressed the ball off the fairway; it flew with precision towards the putting surface with only the slightest amount draw and a touch of back spin. From the moment he hit it, the shot was always going to be good. The ball tracked directly at the flag stick, it pitched at the front half of the green, skipped forward and then rolled slowly up towards the cup. The fast rolling greens allowed the ball to continue end over end, as it bee lined for the bottom of the cup. In the end the ball pulled up short by only two rotations. Never has there been a better shot or more convincing Eaglenest attempt that has gone unrewarded. Although Phil didn't get to take home the 30x golf ball prize pool for scoring an eagle, he did give himself a 2inch tap in birdie putt and the confidence to go on and win the monthly title. The other disappointment was the despite scoring 4x stableford points, his birdie did not yield him any skins, since Ron Parsons also made a birdie on the same hole.

Greg Parsons also stepped up and produced some excellent golf on the course that has never been a happy hunting ground for him. In previous visits to the Frankston course Greg has become famous for his escapades at Centenary Park. Some of his past exploits included reaching the Maximum fine limit (\$10) before completing the first hole, he also holds the record for the most strokes taken to hit past the ladies markers (four) and has scored more 10+'s on the first hole at Centenary Park than anyone else in the clubs history. So it was great to see him get a good game under his belt at last. Greg managed to get the monkey off his back when he completed the first hole with a solid bogey and he then scored consistently for 16 of the 18 holes. Only a couple of blow outs on the 7th and 15th holes cost him the opportunity to be up at the top of the leader board with Phil and Tony senior. The main highlights for Greg were his brilliant shot into the long (nearly 200meter) par 3, 8th hole to win his third career nearest to pin prize ball and he was also holding the longest drive title until the last group of the day came through. Not even Big Mick was able to get passed Greg's long drive, and it was only Gerard Maclsaac supported by a strong trailing breeze that robbed him of the longest drive prize when he hit the ball further than the mark set by GP. Greg scored his first top 10 finish Since August 2010, and his beloved Tigers had a win on the weekend so there was no wonder he had such a big smile on his face and he was happy to volunteer to undergo BBQ duty for the group.

Not so happy was Matty Maclsaac who appears to be taking over the reign of “Angryman” from recently retired Brendan Seagrave. Matt had a tough day at the office by his high standards and was pretty grumpy by the time he got into the club house. From all accounts our newest member and Matts mate Sam Creaton was pretty cranky too. Both boys were on the verge of club throwing and it was only the threat of a \$2-00 fine that stopped them from launching a club or 2 into orbit, so keep them both in mind when we are looking for nominations for the end of year awards.

This year we will be conducting the Players Choice voting awards for the end of season a bit differently from previous years. We will be taking nominations for players who are worthy candidates for each category and then we will run a ballot with all members voting for the top 5 nominees by allocating votes from 5-1points and the player with the highest tally obviously wins the title.

The players choice awards include: LEATHER WEDGE, ANGRYMAN, LEAST IMPROVED, MOST IMPROVED

The best way to avoid an Angryman nomination is to keep calm and avoid throwing a temper tantrum, and if you don't want the Leather wedge crown, make sure you count all of your shots, rounding down your score, forgetting to add the appropriate penalties and blatant cheating will be noticed by your peers & playing partners and even if they don't say anything you can just about guarantee that they will put your name into the nominations for the Leather Wedge Award. The best way to avoid being nominated as a Least Improved player is probably to play in the same group as Stu Coops since the demise in his golfing ability is so evident that it will overshadow anybody playing alongside him.

Geoff Cooper will be one player who will not to be scoring many Leather Wedge votes any time soon. Geoff proved that he is honest when he called a penalty on himself after he managed to hit his own buggy with his ball when no one else was watching. Evidently Geoff had a very good round going, he was running at 94% driving accuracy in fact that only fairway he missed for the entire day was on the first hole when he hit the ball straight down the guts, unfortunately because he is old and decrepit his ball fell short of the start of the fairway and therefore despite hitting a great, long (for his standards) straight drive it did not count as a fairway hit. Sadly Geoff's good round became unravelled on the long Par 4, 17th hole. He had played 3x nice shots and was lying just off the front edge for 3. Rather than chip the ball up to the green he thought it would be safer to putt his ball from on the fairway. Unfortunately Geoff failed to get the ball up onto the elevated green and his ball ran off the side and finished further from the putting surface than where he had been initially. Knowing the putter method wasn't feasible this time he opted instead to chip onto the green. Needless to say things didn't go to plan. His chip feel short and rolled back down the hill and bounced off his golf buggy wheel before had a chance to move it. To his Credit Geoff called a 2 shot penalty against himself, and then preceded to hit his next shot across the back of the green, he then skinned the return shot back down over the hill again and his ball finished where he had been before he started the implosion, but this time for 9 shots instead of three. Finally Geoff got the ball onto the green and posted a score of 12 (instead of what could have just as easily finished with a five or 6 at worst) with 9 of those shots coming from within 8 meters of the green.

It's definitely note a case of like father like son in the Cooper household. While Geoff may have been running at 100% accuracy from the tee his son was at the other extreme, Stu only managed to keep one ball on the correct fairway and even that was only because he miss hit the drive. The two Coopers, were polar opposites because Stu appeared to have the knack of hitting the ball back on to the green from all sorts of weird and wonderful parts of the Centenary Park layout and it was only his chipping and making plenty of up and downs that stopped him from posting the worst score for the day.

Big Mick harper was generous enough to show his playing group, that even the best of players can make a mistake. Mick was true to form, and played as any good single figure handicap golfer should. He put on a Powerful Driving display for Junior; he hit the ball perfectly all day and racked up a stack of pars and a birdie for good measure on

his way to the lowest score for the round. But the highlight for all in attendance was his 2nd shot, while pitching to the green on the 18th hole when the big fella hit a blatant shank off the hosel of the club and his ball flew at right angles finishing behind a bunker giving himself a near impossible shot to hit close to the flag. It was the worst/best shank in the social clubs 9 year history (and that is an achievement because there have been plenty of them). Remarkably Mick still managed to hit a flop shot over the pot and drop the putt to salvage a bogey. In doing so the Big Fella tied the hole with his playing partner who three putted after he landed his tee shot on the green and was holding the Nearest to Pin title at the time.

Although Tony Junior enjoyed the golfing display he bore witness too, he failed to enjoy the time he spent in the bunker on the 12th hole. Junior was through the back of the green for four shots but found himself stuck in a bunker. Six or 7 shots later, Tony emerged from the trap with more sand in his shoes and on his face and hair than there was left in the hole that he had been digging in. Its times like that (and we've all been through it) when you wonder why you bothered getting out of bed in the first place.

Ben Nichol must have wondered why he bothered to get out of bed, especially when he turned up at the golf course at 730am and suddenly discovered he was an hour and a half early for his scheduled hit off time. Rather than head to the practise nets and putting green for a warm up, Ben opted to stay in the comfort of his Lexus and listen to a few tunes on the radio.

As players arrived at the golf course there was much discussion and debate about the car that that was left running idling in the car park. It wasn't until 915am when we called Ben to remind him that he was running late, that we discovered that the car that had been left with the engine going belonged to Ben and he was actually in it, but he had fallen asleep in the car with the heater blazing and the engine still going. There were plenty of Birdies around, Phil, Ron, Big Mick and Ben x2, all went subpar at some stage during their rounds. The best Birdie experience however would have to have been either Rick or Greg Breasley's on the tenth hole. Rick stopped at the Proshop after nine holes to replenish his dwindling energy levels with a healthy salad roll. Tragically he only got half the energy hit that he was expecting to receive from the meal because while he was hitting off from the 10th tee a crow flew down and stole half of the roll that he had left sitting on his golf buggy seat.

Obviously, half a roll was not enough to satiate the hungry crow because it returned a little while later looking for some dessert. A quick search through the pocket of Greg Breasley's golf bag and it was rewarded with an unopened Mars Bar.
