Churchill Park Golf Course Results

Well, the Cooper household is not a happy place this week. Once the results came out of the computer and it was discovered that Thomas had robbed his dad of his best chance to win a ticket to the battle of the Champion of Champions, things went down hill fast. Thomas scored Nett 69 and was grounded for two weeks after his 26 stableford points on the back nine holes, won on a count back and sealed the fate of his dad.

With back-to-back monthly titles, Thomas is making a late charge up the points leaderboard and has also elevated himself to be the 2nd highest ranked player in the Sunday Leave Pass Social Club world rankings. Thomas is just a couple of points behind Steve Powne who has held the No#1 position for the majority of 2022 off the back of his winning form late last year. Thomas should be congratulated for his back nine because he closed out the round with 4 over par (40) which for someone with a 26 handicap is an extraordinary performance. Thomas beat Mick Harper off the stick, so well-done Son, it was a Great effort, even if you did spoil my day and year in the process.

Hopefully the handicapper has managed to cut Thomas off at the kneecaps, because if he can go 3 monthly titles in a row, it would be a new club record.

Churchill Park was a new addition to the Sunday Leave Pass course fixture and hopefully it will get another run in the years to follow. Considering the rain and floods we have had in Melbourne over the last few weeks, the golf course was in incredibly good condition. The course offers plenty of opportunities to score and is relatively forgiving. Wide fairways and large greens are a positive feature of the course, and the result was that most players performed reasonably well. There were only five Newell's (Score of 10 or more) recorded from the entire field and of those 4x of them were made by the one person.

It was little wonder Tim Emmerson finished in the beer wenching position. Tim had 4x Newell's including three Newell's (score of 10 or more) on the par 5 holes. In fact, 37 of Tim's 122 strokes were accumulated on the longer holes. Cam Ross was the only

other player to reach double figures. Cam had the biggest Newell for the day, it took him 12 strokes to find his way up the par 4, 18th hole.

While Tim Emmerson was finding the Par 5 holes difficult to complete, there were many other guys who found them easy. Wayne, Stu, Macca, and Leigh, all made birdies on the long holes and of those a couple had a good look at making eagles. Leigh knocked his second shot onto the green and just missed rolling in his putt for an eagle on the 12th hole. Stu Coops nearly made an Albatross, also on the 12th hole when he hit his 4-iron straight at the flag stick. The ball bounced just right of the hole and rolled past by a cm or two and came to rest just behind the cup. Although he missed the makeable eagle, it turned out to be a two-putt birdie and the first of four birdies for Stu on the day.

Stu thought he had another chance to make an albatross when he drove the green on the first hole, Once again he was only a couple of meters from the pin, but unfortunately on this instance it was the wrong green, Stu had driven from the first tee on to the 4th green, he then knocked a hybrid back over the trees and his ball finished close enough for him to pull the putter out of the bag to try to make another attempt at putting for eagle. The eagles nest remained unclaimed, although Stu did go on to drop his birdie putt into the bottom of the cup.

Peter MacArthur (Macca) made the first hole look easy. He played three perfect shots, which meant he had very little stress when it came to tapping in his putt for birdie. Glenn Douglas was rewarded for his tweeter on the par 5 tenth hole. Douggo capitalized on the fact that the hole was designed by the architect to favour a left hander, the layout suited Douggo's eye and the result was a sub-par number on the scorecard and a 4x skins jackpot in the bank.

Wayne James could count himself unlucky, because his birdie num num was achieved on the same par 5 hole that both Stu and Leigh MacIsaac also had a birdie on. Mick Harper was the exception to the rule because he made his Birdie on a par 4 hole. Mick almost holed his second shot with his 9-iron into the par 4, thirteenth hole. It was an easy tap in for the big fella and the bonus was a couple of skins to be converted to raffle tickets for the end of year prize draw.

There is only one thing better than making a short birdie putt and that is holing a shot from off the green, even if it is for a par or bogey, a noner is still a real energy booster. Some weeks we don't have any chip-ins and then other rounds there are heaps of them. Churchill Park was one of those months where they were in an abundance.

Steve O'Sullivan helped his putting statistics by having two holes where he did not need to pull out the new Scotty Cameron. SOS chipped in for par on the 2nd hole and then again on the Par 3 eleventh hole, He was looking like he was in trouble until his wedge flew over the bunker, onto the green and into the bottom of the cup for a par. Unfortunately, all the good work was squandered on the 8th green when SOS fell foul of the two tiered green, he left his ball on the bottom section of the putting surface and it took 5 strokes to get his ball into the hole.

Tom Kellythorn is famous for his ability to perform small miracles and history says he has the skills to hit his ball into the hole from anywhere. Tom's name appears on the chip in wall of fame so regularly that we almost leave his name permanently on a template knowing he will score a zero putt somewhere in his round. Sunday was no different. Tom rolled a 7 iron onto the green, it hit the base of the flagstick and then dropped into the bottom of the cup for a lucky bogey 4 on the par 3 third hole. Had the ball not hit the flag stick, it would most likely have rolled all the way off the green and back into the bunker.

Barry Hemsley chipped his ball into the hole from 35 meters out, it was a sweetly struck sand wedge which flew high into the air, landed softly like butterfly legs on a flower and then rolled gently towards the pin. Barry has been a regular feature at the pointy end of the leaderboard ever since he added a new set of Titleist irons to his golf bag and this month was no different.

Bogey golf is easy. By Barry Hemsley

There were a number of lowlights in the first group of the 1st on Sunday morning, but the highlights for the round were definitely a couple of 'noners' to salvage bogey. Tom Kellythorn shanked his first drive of the day into the trees and ended up carding an 8 to start the day and put him under pressure right from the start. After three-putting the tricky second hole for a double bogey 6 Tom was really feeling the pressure. Barry Hemsley has played this course a few times and was full of local knowledge he wouldn't stop sharing and he loudly proclaimed that the best tactic on the uphill par 3 3rd was to go long and left as the only bunker on the hole was on the right. Tom heeded this advice and smacked an iron long and hard finishing a few metres past the hole on the higher left-hand side, unfortunately he belted his chip and ended up way off the other side of the green with a tricky uphill chip to get back onto the green. As luck would have it, he managed to totally duff his next chip in the wet grass, and it only travelled a metre or two, so he still had a bit of work to do. Mustering all of his fighting British Bulldog spirit he latched onto his third chip like Jos Buttler receiving a slow full toss as he hit it high and sweet landing it safely on the green where it locked onto the hole and rolled neatly in to secure his bogey 4 and negating the three putt from the hole before.

Barry Hemsley is a keen student of the game and is always willing to learn from observing the play of others and so it was that he also found a way to turn a potentially round-ruining hole into an acceptable one. After 12 holes Barry was feeling pretty happy with his driving so, he foolishly decided to let one rip on the 13th, but he got under it and hit it higher than the front row of a Willie Nelson concert so that it came down like a pitching wedge and disappeared into the thick grass near a drain where a family of ducks were resting. *(Potentially having a wake or memorial service for Daisy)* Despite not going very far it took three pairs of eyes to complete this round of 'spot the ball' as it had plugged deep in the mud and Barry had to use a pitch-repairer to extract it (see photo attached). Barry's second shot out of the grass was not clean and the ball bobbed across the fairway to the rough on the right-hand side such that he couldn't see the green. For his third shot Barry played it safe and hit his new 7 wood but got onto it and the ball came to rest in the tree line back on the left-hand side leaving a tricky shot out from under the overhanging branches to approach the green. Choosing his trusty 4 iron Barry hit a measured shot that perfectly skimmed the outer side of the first bunker and sent the ball rolling toward the green, however gravity had other ideas and the slope of the front apron took the ball from almost kissing the green into the bunker on the right. Lining up for his 5th hit from the wet sand Barry was wondering how much worse this hole could get when he delicately popped the ball up from the beach, onto the deck from where it dribbled into the hole to give him a respectable bogey 5.



If you are not chipping in, you want to be chipping close enough to make a one putt and that is exactly what a few guys were doing on Sunday. Stu Coops came within a heartbeat of winning a monthly title on the back of a strong putting performance. Stu came home with just 12 putts on his closing nine holes, and it could have been 11 were it not for his par putt on the 9th green stopping on the lip, just half a revolution short of the pin. It was literally the headwind that held the ball up and prevented it from dropping in and giving him a chance at securing a spot in the battle of the champion of champions.

Glenn Douglas was the best putter for the day, he was economical with the flat stick, only using it 28 times for the day and that included a three putt on the 11th green. 28-putts are a commendable performance especially when you compare it to the fact that Rick Turcinovic's score. Rick nearly wore out his putter by using it on 44 different occasions. Rick had a horror patch midway through his round where he had 19 putts in just 6 holes and that included two four putts between holes 5 and 7. On the same stretch of holes, Douggo had four 1 putts and a total of 8 strokes between holes 3 and 10, picking up 11 on poor Rick who looked like a genuine chance to be wearing the pink vest for 3 months in succession.

Douggo had a streak of 5 one putt greens in a row, as did Stu Coops. Ben Nichol was on track to do the same, although after four straight one putt greens he mucked up his attempt at the longest holed putt on the 18th green and consequently walked off with a devastating three-putt on the last hole of the day.

Cam Ross had 5 attempts to win the longest holed putt. He knocked his ball around and around the green giving himself the best opportunity to make a long putt. When the ball finally came to rest at the bottom of the cup it was holed from just inside the 367cm benchmark set by Rick Turcinovic, so he didn't win the prize and the process had led to 5 extra strokes being added to Cameron's scorecard.

Even Steve O'Sullivan managed to record a five-putt green. SOS fell victim to leaving his golf ball short on the two-tiered eighth green, this was a rooky error you would not expect to see from a single figure golfer such as SOS, and what followed from there was even more entertaining. It took El Presidente three attempts to hit the ball hard enough to get the putt up the hill to avoid it rolling back to him. After a total of 5 putts the new Scotty Cameron was not looking so new anymore and there were three nominations for the angry man award as Steve's playing partners saw a different side of the normally unflappable SOS.

The 8th green collected many victims. Even Mick Harper had a 4 putt after his chip from the side of the green failed to stay on the top tier.

Tim Emmerson has been away from Sunday Leave Pass competitions for quite some time. After the round Tim was presented with a prize ball, he was owed from winning NTP at Gardiners Run. Looking at Tim's scorecard it was clearly evident that he didn't take his golf clubs to QLD with him on his camping trip up North or if he did he still didn't get to play much because of the flooding. Tim posted four three putts in a row and recorded the most Newell's (Score of 10 or more) than any other player in the field. Tim closed the day with Nett 101 and as a result secured himself a spot in the battle of the beer wenches playoffs when they are played on the golf trip at Shepparton.



For those players not familiar with the scoring process, listed below is the format we use in Sunday Leave Pass competitions.

Once all of the players are ranked then the Seasons Championship points are allocated according to the position in the field.

The player in 1st place gets 15 points, 2nd place 14 points, 3rd place 13 points, etc. etc. Any player who completes the round however finishes ranked outside the top 14 and is placed between 15th spot to BeerWench then they are all allocated 1 championship point for attending.

For the benefit of the newcomers or the uneducated we thought it would be a good opportunity to go through the player rankings and point scoring system again.

Sunday Leave Pass competitions are run using Stroke so you need to count every shot that you play and you need to finish every hole. Each player's Nett total score is then calculated by deducting the players handicap from the Gross score. If a player doesn't have an official Sunday Leave Pass handicap, then a temporary played to handicap is allocated on the day using the Callaway handicapping system.

Once the players Nett score is calculated they are ranked from lowest score (Monthly title winner) to highest score. (BeerWench) Where more than one player has the same Nett Score then the place allocations are decided based on a countback system.

The player with the most points at the end of the year is crowned the Points champion irrespective of how many rounds a person has played. If one person plays 13 rounds for the year and the person in 2nd place has only played 10 rounds but is close to the

same score then that is bad luck to the person in 2nd place. All players are invited to play the entire fixture. We reward participation rather than perfection and performance so if you play more often you will end up with more points.

For the newcomers, we have included a brief description of how the countback system works.

When more than one player has the same Nett Score (such as in the example below from Churchill Park then the place allocations are decided based on a countback system.

The count back system is formulated as the following. *Total number of stableford points scored on the back nine holes.

*In the event that both players have the same stableford score on the back nine it then reverts to the number of stableford points scored on the eighteenth hole. If this is the same then it goes to the 17th hole, sixteenth hole, fifteenth hole until a player has a better hole and therefore has a higher stableford score than the other.

The table below shows examples of the countback system as they occurred at Churchill Park.

In order to win the Season Championship trophy, you need to play regularly and consistently to about your handicap or better, and it is the handicapper's responsibility to make sure that this doesn't happen. After every round, the scores are assessed and then the handicaps are adjusted according to your performance. As was the case last year we have adjusted the handicap formula to take into consideration the difficulty of each golf course, using the course slope index.

What we have done is simply aligned the Sunday Leave Pass handicapping process with the one used by golf link and by all golf clubs around the globe using the world handicapping system. Although your SLP handicap is unofficial and therefore it cannot be used to formally enter organized golf competitions and tournaments, it still should be an accurate reflection of your golfing prowess and a measure of what your GA (golf Australia) handicap would be if you subscribed the \$150 per year to get an official handicap.

Your playing handicap will fluctuate around your documented handicap index. When you play an easy course such as Ringwood or Dorset then you will actually play off a lower handicap than you normally would. On the other days when we invite you to play a harder course such as Eagle Ridge, Devils Bend, Werribee Park or Cape Schanck we will add a few extra shots to your arsenal just to give you more hope of avoiding total anxiety and depression.

The difference between this week's handicap and last months was in some instances up to 6 strokes.

The handicapper was very generous with many golfers this month. He gave out shots to the low markers and surprisingly he has even given Leigh MacIsaac more than a full stroke head start next month, despite Leigh putting on a show of power hitting at Churchill Park. Often the handicap is given a little boost but rarely do we see full shots dumped over the top of a player's handicap especially when they are as accomplished a player as Leigh MacIsaac is.

Barry Hemsley is mounting a case for most improved player in 2022. His handicap continues to drop month after month. Since winning the Titleist T300s in the raffle, nearly 4 strokes have come off his handicap index this season. Ben Nichol is just one good round from going back under a 20 handicap and Thomas Cooper likewise is dropping his handicap quicker than a Jack Ginnivan tackle. If there is one thing Stu Coops didn't need right now it is a lower handicap. Stu is yet to claim his spot in the playoffs for the Blue Jacket and given that Cape Schanck is a tough course and has not been a happy hunting ground for Stu, so, to lose 0.8 strokes next month is a devastating outcome.

The rest of the field remained unchanged

Peter MacArthur has completed his 3 rounds with the social club and will tick over to his official starting handicap. With a blistering 84 he significantly impacted his numbers which were initially looking overly generous. Macca will play 2 rounds on the initial AGU handicap before his handicap index using the slope handicapping system kicks into gear once 5 full rounds are completed with the social club.

As a new member of the Social Club the Callaway Handicapping system is used to give the player a daily played to handicap for the first couple of rounds. Once they have played 3 rounds, they are given a temporary club handicap using the original AGU handicapping system. After 5 rounds they are then switched across to the current slope handicapping system.

Even if a player has an official golf link, as a matter of consistency we still use the Callaway system to calculate a daily handicap.

This system is used for determining fair allowances for social golf events that attract novices or occasional golfers. A player's Callaway handicap is determined after each round by deducting from his/her 18-hole gross score the scores of the worst individual holes during the first 16 holes of the round.

In the computation of handicaps under this system:

- No hole may be scored at more than twice its par,
- half strokes count as a whole,
- the 17th and 18th holes are never deducted,

For example, if a player scores 99 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (3 worst holes) +1

If a player scores 82 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (worst + ½ the 2nd worst hole) -1

If a player scores 120 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (five worst holes) +2

After 3 rounds they will be allocated a temporary handicap using the old AGU handicapping formula and then after 5 rounds they are elevated onto the official Slope handicapping system which was use thereafter for all club competitions.

Sometimes the Callaway handicapping system has proved itself to be very favorable to new members. Whenever we take on a golf course like Devils Bend or Eynesbury and the field struggle to play to their handicaps the Callaway golfers end up featuring

at the top of the points distribution. Whereas often a round on a low scoring course like Centenary Park or Dorset it can be difficult for a Callaway handicapped member to pick up too many points.

For those people interested in the mechanics of the handicapping system it can be best explained as the following.

How to calculate a GA Handicap

To calculate a player's GA Handicap:

- you must firstly identify the player's most recent 20 scores,
- you then determine the 'Played To' value for each of these scores,
- you average the best 8 'Played To' values,
- and finally you multiply this average by 0.93. The resultant figure (to one decimal place) is the player's GA Handicap.

* If a player's handicap record contains a lesser number than 20 scores, the number of scores used to calculate the player's handicap is as listed in the table below.

* There is no requirement for a player's most recent 20 scores to have been returned within a specific timeframe. For example, the most recent 20 scores may span a period of three years or they may span a period of three months.

* Once a player's handicap record contains 20 scores, the next score they return will result in the oldest of the existing 20 scores being removed (to be replaced by the new score).

Full Technical Procedure for Calculating a GA Handicap STEP 1 – Use the table below to determine the number of scores to be included in the GA Handicap calculation:

Note: When the handicap record contains more than 20 scores, the GA Handicap calculation uses the best 8 of the player's most recent 20 scores.

The Blue Smurf was a NO SHOW again this month, so it looks as though he has retired the Champion of Champions vest claiming it is too complicated to operate. Stevie's last chance to tick off any more free drinks will be at Cape Schanck and then it will be returned ready to be handed over to the next Champion of Champions, unless Steve is good enough to win it again and be the first player to go back-to-back.

Now that he has booked himself a spot in the Champion of Champions play off perhaps Thomas Cooper will have better management skills of handling the powers of the Blue Jacket if he is lucky enough to be awarded it on the golf trip. He has made a

good start of it by eliminating the competition. The fewer people who are in the playoffs the better the odds are of him claiming the ultimate prize.

For those who have forgotten about the powers bestowed on the Blue Jacket; here is a reminder of how it works.

As the Champion of Champions Steve is able to ask any Sunday Leave Pass member to buy him a drink, it is limited to only receiving one drink per member (beer or soft) over the entire year and it can only be done so, if he is wearing the Champion of Champions jacket at the time. This of course does not include new members who did not play at least one or more rounds in season 2021, but not exclusive to those who attended the golf trip. So, if he manages himself correctly, he should be looking at up to 42 free beers or soft drinks over the next 12 months. Now, that is a prize worth aspiring for.

The other condition is that Steve must be the one who consumes the drink, he cannot use his power to buy beverages for anyone else. There is also a catch where, if Steve asks someone who has previously shouted him a drink, then he must immediately buy them a drink instead. **Steve can also kick in the balance of \$2 per shout to upgrade his beer to bourbons if he prefers to.**

Remember that Steve must be wearing the jacket, He must continue to wear the jacket while he is drinking. If it is too hot to wear the Champion of Champions jacket that is OK, just choose not to wear it and then you are not eligible for a free drink. All purchased drinks are to be opened so they cannot be taken home for future consumption or to give to dinner guests or visitors. A traveller for the drive home is OK so long as it is opened, and Steve is the one who drinks it.

Remember: In order, to qualify as the Champion of Champions a member just needs to win a monthly title. All of the winners from the monthly championships who are attending the golf trip will then play off for the title based on total accumulated stableford points from 9x Randomly selected holes. The Winner is the person with the most points over those 9 nominated holes, and in the event of a tie then a Countback to determine the winner applies.

NOTE: The Winner of the December title is also eligible to win the competition however they only get to count their scores by using only 8 Randomly selected holes.

“SKINS” are distributed to those players good enough to win a hole outright. If more than 1 player got the lowest score on a hole it is Jackpotted until an outright winner occurs.

Just a reminder that for every round you play you are automatically awarded a raffle ticket to go towards the end of year raffle, then extra tickets are issued if you wear the official club shirt. Plus, the monthly winner has the option of exchanging the number of balls owed to Raffle tickets for the end of year prize draw as can be any nearest to pin or long drive or other ball prizes.



This year we are trialling a new competition. The concept is called the longest holed putt. The first group get to place a marker on the green at the point where the ball was located when the ball was holed.
