Whether the fact that Stu had a sleep over at Greg Parsons' house the night before had anything to do with his fragile state and tardiness, is yet to be determined but given he was last seen running around the streets of Mornington at 300 am wearing next to nothing after losing the shirt off his back to the Sfiligoj brothers in a game of cards it is more than likely. Even if he was late to the tee, at least Stu made it to Devils Bend which is more than we can say for Chris and Mark who never managed to make an appearance at all on Sunday.


## Devil Bend Golf Course Results

Any sign of the Devil Bend cursed weather has been long forgotten. Although there were still some wet patches and soggy areas as a gentle reminder of mother nature's recent indiscretions, the golf course provided a perfect day. Most players finished their round in just a polo shirt. Which when you consider the conditions on Saturday, you could be forgiven for doubting the prospect of even getting to the round completed. Shane Cumming summed it up best when he said, "I have too many layers on, I would be more comfortable in just my shirt and the three-putt monkey vest." Evidently, some players found it comforting to have the radiant glow of the flouro yellow vest absorbing the sun's rays on their backs. Newell Richards wore it for the entire back nine, he only gave it up on the $9^{\text {th }}$ green (his last hole) when newcomer Peter McArthur three putted to finally get it off his shoulders.

Thomas Cooper won the three-putt monkey on his very first hole and he barely ever gave it up, despite playing with Greg Parson who racked up 40 strokes with the flat stick, Thomas still managed to wear the flouro yellow vest for most of his round including the entire back nine and then he was left wearing it all the way into the car park.

Simon Galloway started off his round strongly with a 1 putt on the first green and he had had just 6 putts in the first four holes. However, after the turn his putter got a little bit loose. Between the $12^{\text {th }}$ and the $16^{\text {th }}$ Holes, Simon managed to accumulate 16 putts in 5 holes and incredibly that stretch still included a chip in zero putt on the $14^{\text {th }}$. Simon's putt scores, went a 5 putt on the $12^{\text {th }}$ green, followed by 4-putt, 0 putt, 3-putt then another fine for a 4 putt on the $16^{\text {th }}$ green.

Even with such a disastrous collapse of form with the Putter, Simon still wasn't the worst putter for the day. Rick tried to claim the title with 42 putts, however even he was still four taps short of winning the acclaim. After a 7-hour drive down from Red Cliffs, Rob Underwood was determined to get his $\$ 55$ worth out of his game. Undies hit the ball 131 times at a cost of 41.9 cents per shot. When it came to using the putter, Rob used his more than anyone else did, 46 putts is definitely a lot of hits and it was also a career worst for Undies. Only Slinky (49putts and B Mac (50putts) have ever had worse than 46 putts and Brendan's score remains the social clubs record of 50 at Yering Meadows in January 2016.

Stu Coops (29) was the lowest putt score for the day. Despite only using the flat stick less than 30 times for the round he was still disappointed in the way he putted. Stu negotiated the large Devil Bend greens without recording a three putt, however that was mostly due to the fact that in 18 holes he never hit a single green in regulation. The putt score can give a false representation when the majority of your approach shots onto the green are being played from close proximity around the fringe of the greens. Stu gave up lots of easy scoring opportunities because he was rolling the ball to inside six feet and then two putting from what could and should have been hit to a tap in putting range.

Jaxon Fitzpatrick was very economical with the putter on the front nine. Putting has never been Jaxon's strongest point. He averages 39.53 putts per round (career avg) and has been averaging even worse than that in season 2022 (40.83) however something clicked on Sunday, and he completed the front 9 with five one putts giving him just ( 13 strokes with the flat stick for 9 holes.) Rick Turcinovic 4-putted from within a meter so it was surprising his putter made it back into the golf bag in one piece.

Steve Powne has a had a roller coaster season this year, with two monthly titles he is currently leading the FedEx points championship points leader board although he has also had some terrible finishes this year as well. Devil Bend was one of his lesser performances. Steve finished the day with Nett 88 and close to the Beer Wenching position. Steve was doing it tough right from the outset, and it got worse the more his round progressed. Steve turned into the Angry Smurf on the $14^{\text {th }}$ hole when he tried to blame poor Ronnie Parsons for his 5-putt on green claiming that Ron driving his motorised golf buggy while he was hitting his golf ball was the cause for his poor shots.

Tom Kellythorn has won the NTP $2^{\text {nd }}$ shot hole 2 months in a row and on each occasion, they have been kick in birdie putts, so when he was in the greenside bunker for two his playing partners were expecting a simple up and down or two putt bogie at worst. Toms bunker shot was more up than it was down. With a full swing he caught all ball and no sand, consequently the ball came up out of the bunker like a Mick Harper driver. It not only flew up over the green, but it continued its path over the proshop and club house, beyond the practice putting green, and onto the road before finally coming to rest alongside the $13^{\text {th }}$ fairway.


After a long-debated rules committee ruling it was decided that it was not safe for him to try to play his ball back over the proshop again, so he called the ball out of bounds, Tom then butchered his ball all around the $9^{\text {th }}$ green before finally signing for his only Newell for the day. Tom is still adamant he should have been able to take on the shot over the clubhouse and is claiming he would have won the round were it not for the dodgy ruling. The truth is he was only 4 shots shy of Cam Ross' score of Nett 71 so he may have a very valid argument.

Shane Cumming was a single figure golfer out of form. It took him 8 holes to make his first par for the day, and most of his lead up holes were double bogies. Shane finally made his par on the downhill 155 meter par 3 eighth hole. Shane didn't play the hole as conventionally as you might expect of an accomplished A grade golfer. To make his 3, Cider played the hole, Hybrid, 7 iron and then holed his third shot, using his wedge from off the side of the green. It was certainly a less common way of making a par however he may have lost confidence with the putter after three and four putting his previous three birdie opportunities.

Birdies were extremely hard to come by at Devil Bend. Only three players were able to go sub-par and two of those were on the NTP $2^{\text {nd }}$ shot hole. Tom Kellythorn almost holed out on the $17^{\text {th }}$ green with a wedge from 60 meters away. It was a brilliant golf shot which returned him the easiest of birdie putts and it easily knocked off the previously excellent shot played by Peter McArthur who had made his birdie and had prematurely pencilled himself in as the NTP second shot prize winner.

It was unusual not to see either Mick Harper or Gerard MacIsaac's names appear on the birdie crew list this month. The only MacIsaac who did get a mention was Leigh who made a very nice birdie with his Nearest to pin winning shot on the $3^{\text {rd }}$ hole.

Mick Harper had a dirty day by his standards, he was correct in announcing that he had had his worst ever round with the social club. Mick shot 96 off the stick and with a handicap of 7 was a strong candidate for a possible beer wench title, however he was given a reprieve because Undies, Fitzy and Thomas Cooper all played even worse than he did. It was a disappointing day for the big fella because he started the day knowing that any points, he scored would be eating into the deficit behind SOS who was a notable absence this month. Unfortunately for Mick the pressure got the better of him, he posted a 9 on the first hole of the day and his round never got back on track.

By the close of play on Sunday, Mick had been bundled out of his bridesmaid position on the points championship ladder as Wayne James, Gerard and Tom Kellythorn all collected enough points to demote him. This was a great outcome for SOS who has retained an 11-point buffer despite missing the round this month.

The top six players are now all grouping together as the points difference is getting close together and interestingly in the cluster are many of the A-Grade handicap golfers.

Gerard MacIsaac is having an incredible season this year, although he has only played in 5 of the rounds on offer in season 2022, he is averaging nearly 12 points each month.

At that sort of success conversion rate there is no chance of Gerard winning the wood and spoon trophy for the worst average place finish for the year. To put it in perspective Gerard is currently averaging 4.24th place whereas Phil Plane and Mark Fitzpatrick based on their Wood and Spoon score usually finish in the field at $17.86^{\text {th }}$

No Sunday Leave Pass round is complete without a Newell. Although, to his credit and despite calling his own performance a terrible round, Newell didn't have a Newell from his 102 strokes around Devil Bend. Even Rick Turcinovic kept all 18 holes under double figures however it should be mentioned that Rick did post $5 x$ holes ending with a nine, which can otherwise be called an "almost a Newell."

Thomas Cooper started his day with a Newell and his day got worse from there, by the time he dragged his sorry body back into the carpark he had clicked over 127 strokes, 38 putts, and $4 \times$ Newell's including the biggest Newell for the day. Thomas had a 14 on the $10^{\text {th }}$ hole. To make matters even worse, Thomas was fined $\$ 5$-oo for not hitting past the ladies markers on the $10^{\text {th }}$ hole when he tugged his drive straight into the garden beside the markers. It was only 14 shots later when Stu returned the Titleist tour soft No 2 golf ball to Thomas that, he suddenly found out that not only was his ball not lost, but it had also gone beyond the red markers and the ball had been found sitting in the rough alongside the $10^{\text {th }}$ fairway which meant he could have easily found it and played as it lies, sparing him the sufferance of the 14 strokes he ultimately recorded on his card.

Rob Underwood also had a big Newell, Undy's had a Newell plus 3 (13) on the $5^{\text {th }}$ hole. Perhaps he would score better if he started playing with two arms instead of one and trying to imitate and replicate Jack Newtons golf swing.


Jaxon Fitz also had issue navigating the $5^{\text {th }}$ fairway and although he didn't have a 13 like Rob, Jaxon did report a Newell on the challenging par 5 hole. Having experienced the feel of pink polyester on his skin Mark Fitzpatrick was doing everything within his powers to reclaim the beer wench vest. Unfortunately, he fell a couple of shots short of the total posted by Thomas Cooper and even his Newell plus 1 (11) on the $14^{\text {th }}$ hole it was still not enough to come in last place.

Ron Parsons came unstuck on the $10^{\text {th }}$ hole to join the Newell Wall of Shame. Chris Westhead managed to have a blowout when he hit a few balls in the wrong direction and the outcome was he posted his $7^{\text {th }}$ Newell for season 2022. Don't ask us how he did it, but Westy's tee shot on the $17^{\text {th }}$ hole actually managed to roll backwards. Evidently, he took a big wind up and literally swung underneath the ball, technically it was not an air swing because the ball clipped the top of the club, and it was knocked upwards into the air and then rolled backwards off the tee peg. Simon Galloway also fell short on the NTP second shot prize hole, although Simon managed to hit his ball in a forward direction it still took him 10 strokes to complete the 308 meter hole.


As mentioned previously, Tom Kellythorn cost himself the monthly title by launching a wedge 150 meters over the proshop and in doing so he racked up his $17^{\text {th }}$ career Newell and his second in 2022.

Making a Newell or four in the same round significantly increases a players chances off coming last in the points distribution tally. With 44 shots scored over 4 holes it was pretty clear Thomas Cooper was going to book himself a ticket in the battle of the Beer wenches' tournament at the golf trip in Shepparton. Thomas will be obligated to where the Beer Wench vest next month or pay a $\$ 10$ fine if he doesn't attend the August round and then he will be earmarked to challenge the other 12 Beer Wenches in December to make sure he doesn't become crowned the Beer Wench of Wenches.

Cam Ross played his first game in season 2022 and it was a particularly good one. Rumour has it, Cam has been practicing hard in his absence and with a bit of coaching he has gotten rid of the slice and his scores were reflective of the new and improved version of his golf swing. Cam was the only player to shoot below his handicap and he was therefore rewarded with his maiden Monthly title.

Glenn Douglas has also been an occasional golfer this year. He has missed more rounds than he has played, although he has clearly recovered from the foot injury he acquired while on the Bin Tangs in Kuta beach because Douggo posted a sub 90 round which gave him a score of Nett 72 and outright $2^{\text {nd }}$ position at Devils Bend. For those players not familiar with the scoring process, listed below is the format we use in Sunday Leave Pass competitions.
Once all of the players are ranked then the Seasons Championship points are allocated according to the position in the field.

The player in $1^{\text {st }}$ place gets 15 points, $2^{\text {nd }}$ place 14 points, $3^{\text {rd }}$ place 13 points, etc. etc. Any player who completes the round however finishes ranked outside the top 14 and is placed between $15^{\text {th }}$ spot to BeerWench then they are all allocated 1 championship point for attending.

For the benefit of the newcomers or the uneducated we thought it would be a good opportunity to go through the player rankings and point scoring system again.

Sunday Leave Pass competitions are run using Stroke so you need to count every shot that you play and you need to finish every hole. Each player's Nett total score is then calculated by deducting the players handicap from the Gross score. If a player doesn't have an official Sunday Leave Pass handicap, then a temporary played to handicap is allocated on the day using the Callaway handicapping system.

Once the players Nett score is calculated they are ranked from lowest score (Monthly title winner) to highest score. (BeerWench) Where more than one player has the same Nett Score then the place allocations are decided based on a countback system.

The player with the most points at the end of the year is crowned the Points champion irrespective of how many rounds a person has played. If one person plays 13 rounds for the year and the person in $2^{\text {nd }}$ place has only played 10 rounds but is close to the same score then that is bad luck to the person in $2^{\text {nd }}$ place. All players are invited to play the entire fixture. We reward participation rather than perfection and performance so if you play more often you will end up with more points.

Although Steve O'Sullivan still has a commanding position there has been lots of position shuffling from the players beneath him. To win the year SOS needs to remain a consistent points collector and therefor minimize the opportunity for the chasers to significantly bridge the gap. The pressure remains on the rest of the field to catch him which is going to require a couple of monthly titles and regular top 5 finishes for the remaining games this year.

Gerard would have been in the hunt for the points championship except that he has given up 3 rounds to his external pennant commitments. Wayne has returned to $2^{\text {nd }}$ place after this month, although last time he got there he dropped off very quickly.

Devil Bend statistics included, $3 x$ Birdies and $62 x$ pars, 142 bogeys, but the scary part of the round was the fact there were more 119 double bogies and 11 Newell's (Score of 10 or more). As a group we had 895 putts at an average of 35.8 putts each. There were 107 one putts and two chip ins, although there were still 84 exchanges with the three-putt monkey vest. The fine jar was topped up with $\$ 24$ worth of fines for 4 putting or worse including 2 x five putts.
"SKINS" are distributed to those players good enough to win a hole outright. If more than 1 player got the lowest score on a hole it is Jackpotted until an outright winner occurs. Just a reminder that for every round you play you are automatically awarded a raffle ticket to go towards the end of year raffle, then extra tickets are issued if you wear the official club shirt. Plus, the monthly winner has the option of exchanging the number of balls owed to Raffle tickets for the end of year prize draw as can be any nearest to pin or long drive or other ball prizes.

Skins were hard to come by this month, probably because there were not many birdies or good holes racked up by anyone in the field. Leigh MacIsaac was rewarded for his par on the $5^{\text {th }}$ hole with a five-hole skins jackpot. He would have been very pleased to get the skins especially since his birdie on the third hole went unrewarded. Jayden Orger made a great up and down from a difficult lie behind the bunker on the $7^{\text {th }}$ green. His 3 -meter par putt was good enough to see him score 4 -stableford points and win two of the 10 skins awarded for the afternoon. Simon Galloway was the only other play to take him a skins haul. It is not the first time Simon has collected a healthy skins Jackpot. Simon has claimed as many skins this season as the 2021 skins champion won for the entire season and there are still another five rounds to go.

This year we are trialling a new competition. The concept is called the longest holed putt. The first group get to place a marker on the green at the point where the ball was located when the ball was holed. The intention is then to see who manages to sink the longest putt on that hole, as the marker would move further and farther back and around the green as we drop in those $8^{\prime}$ and $10^{\prime}$ footers for par, bogey, double bogey or even a Newell.

This month the prize was won by Steve Dawson who dropped in the very last putt for the day on the $18^{\text {th }}$ green. To knock off Wayne James's previous marker of just under 2-meters, Dawso rolled the ball straight into the middle of the cup from over 4 meters away. It wasn't Steve's longest winning putt for the year, but it was a better representation than giving Wayne James another crack at the playoffs with what was a pretty ordinary putt. Dawso was already a contender for the end of year long putter play offs, so it just reduces the number of players in the field.

For those who have forgotten about the powers bestowed on the Blue Jacket here is a reminder of how it works.
As the Champion of Champions Steve will be able to ask any Sunday Leave Pass member to buy him a drink, it is limited to only receiving one drink per member (beer or soft) over the entire year and it can only be done so if he is wearing the Champion of Champion jacket at the time. This of course does not include new members who did not play at least one or more rounds in season 2021, but not exclusive to those who attended the golf trip. So, if he manages himself correctly, he should be looking at up to 42 free beers or soft drinks over the next 12 months. Now, that is a prize worth aspiring for.

The other condition is that Steve must be the one who consumes the drink, he cannot use his power to buy beverages for anyone else. There is also a catch where, if Steve asks someone who has previously shouted him a drink, then he must immediately buy them a drink instead. Steve can also kick in the balance of $\$ 2$ per shout to upgrade his beer to bourbons if he prefers to.

Remember that Steve must be wearing the jacket, He must continue to wear the jacket while he is drinking. If it is too hot to wear the Champion of Champions jacket that is OK, just choose not to wear it and then you are not eligible for a free drink. All purchased drinks are to be opened so they cannot be taken home for future consumption or to give to dinner guests or visitors. A traveller for the drive home is OK so long as it is opened, and Steve is the one who drinks it.

Remember: In order, to qualify as the Champion of Champions a member just needs to win a monthly title. All of the winners from the monthly championships who are attending the golf trip will then play off for the title based on total accumulated stableford points from 9x Randomly selected holes. The Winner is the person with the most points over those 9 nominated holes, and in the event of a tie then a Countback to determine the winner applies.

NOTE: The Winner of the December title is also eligible to win the competition however they only get to count their scores by using only 8 Randomly selected holes.

For the newcomers, we have included a brief description of how the countback system works.
When more than one player has the same Nett Score (such as in the example below from Spring Park then the place allocations are decided based on a countback system.

The count back system is formulated as the following. *Total number of stableford points scored on the back nine holes.
*In the event that both players have the same stableford score on the back nine it then reverts to the number of stableford points scored on the eighteenth hole. If this is the same then it goes to the $17^{\text {th }}$ hole, sixteenth hole, fifteenth hole until a player has a better hole and therefore has a higher stableford score than the other.

The table blow shows examples of the countback system as they occurred at Spring Park.

In order to win the Season Championship trophy, you need to play regularly and consistently to about your handicap or better, and it is the handicapper's responsibility to make sure that this doesn't happen. After every round, the scores are assessed and then the handicaps are adjusted according to your performance. As was the case last year we have adjusted the handicap formula to take into consideration the difficulty of each golf course, using the course slope index.

What we have done is simply aligned the Sunday Leave Pass handicapping process with the one used by golf link and by all golf clubs around the globe using the world handicapping system. Although your SLP handicap is unofficial and therefore it cannot be used to formally enter organized golf competitions and tournaments, it still should be an accurate reflection of your golfing prowess and a measure of what your GA (golf Australia) handicap would be if you subscribed the $\$ 150$ per year to get an official handicap.

Your playing handicap will fluctuate around your documented handicap index. When you play an easy course such as Ringwood or Dorset then you will actually play off a lower handicap than you normally would. On the other days when we invite you to play a harder course such as Eagle Ridge, Devils Bend, Werribee Park or Cape Schanck we will add a few extra shots to your arsenal just to give you more hope of avoiding total anxiety and depression.

The handicapper was very generous with everyone again this month. Only the winner Cam Ross, Glenn Douglas in $2^{\text {nd }}$ and Wayne James all on the podium positions were docked any shots off their handicaps. Came lost 0.7 , Douggo a $1 / 2$ shot and Wayne just a got a small shave of 0.1.

Most of the field saw no changes to their handicaps. Although there were a few touch ups which could be helpful to Westy, Fitzy, Mick, Dawso, and the Cooper family all getting a little bit of a supporting hand for next months round at Werribee Park

Jayden Orger has one round left using the Callaway handicapping system before he will be switched across to an official Sunday Leave Pass handicap for two rounds using the original AGU handicapping system before he will then be given a formal handicap Index using the Slope handicap system once 5 full rounds are completed with the social club.

As a new member of the Social Club the Callaway Handicapping system is used to give the player a daily played to handicap for the first couple of rounds. Once they have played 3 rounds, they are given a temporary club handicap using the original AGU handicapping system. After 5 rounds they are then switched across to the current slope handicapping system.

Even if a player has an official golf link, as a matter of consistency we still use the Callaway system to calculate a daily handicap.


This system is used for determining fair allowances for social golf events that attract novices or occasional golfers. A player's Callaway handicap is determined after each round by deducting from his/her 18 -hole gross score the scores of the worst individual holes during the first 16 holes of the round

In the computation of handicaps under this system:

No hole may be scored at more than twice its par
half strokes count as a whole,

- the 17th and 18th holes are never deducted,

For example, if a player scores 99 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their ( 3 worst holes) +1
If a player scores 82 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their ( worst $+1 / 2$ the $2^{\text {nd }}$ worst hole) -1
If a player scores 120 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (five worst holes) +2
After 3 rounds they will be allocated a temporary handicap using the old AGU handicapping formula and then after 5 rounds they are elevated onto the official Slope handicapping system which was use thereafter for all club competitions.

Sometimes the Callaway handicapping system has proved itself to be very favorable to new members. Whenever we take on a golf course like Devils Bend or Eynesbury and the field struggle to play to their handicaps the Callaway golfers end up featuring at the top of the points distribution. This was most certainly the case this weekend where both Jayden and Peter McArthur finished well inside the top 10 place rankings. Whereas often a round on a low scoring course like Centenary Park or Dorset it can be difficult for a Callaway handicapped member to pick up too many points.


Peter (Mack) had a very strong start to his Sunday Leave Pass career, he parred his first two holes with the Social Club, in fact he book ended his round by making pars on the first and second and then birdying the $17^{\text {th }}$ and parring the $18^{\text {th }}$ holes. That is a commendable start to his club stats.

Peter was looking like he was going to tear the Devil Bend golf course apart, well that was until the wheels fell off. (Literally) Peter was still only one over par after three holes when the front end of his golf buggy collapsed and fell apart on the path to the fourth hole. And that was the end of his round, evidently the challenge of nursing his buggy around the remainder of the course proved very difficult and Peter turned in some rotten sores for the rest of the round. He closed the front nine with Double Bogey, triple bogey, double, double, he did make a bogey on the par 3 eighth hole, but then another double bogey on the $9^{\text {th }}$ hole saw him finish at the turn with 13 over par 49 and that was not the numbers we were expecting to see from him.

It was good to see Peter get straight in the spirit of the social club; he finished his round wearing the three-putt monkey vest and could not wait to get to the fine jar to kick in his donations for his oncourse misdemeanors.

Peter was allocated a Callaway handicap of 19, although we have a sneaking suspicion that his handicap will be better suited down closer to the low teens than the high ones.

For those people interested in the mechanics of the handicapping system it can be best explained as the following.

How to calculate a GA Handicap

## To calculate a player's GA Handicap:

- you must firstly identify the player's most recent 20 scores,
- you then determine the 'Played To' value for each of these scores,
- you average the best 8 'Played To' values,
- and finally you multiply this average by 0.93 . The resultant figure (to one decimal place) is the player's GA Handicap.
* If a player's handicap record contains a lesser number than 20 scores, the number of scores used to calculate the player's handicap is as listed in the table below.
* There is no requirement for a player's most recent 20 scores to have been returned within a specific timeframe. For example, the most recent 20 scores may span a period of three years or they may span a period of three months.
* Once a player's handicap record contains 20 scores, the next score they return will result in the oldest of the existing 20 scores being removed (to be replaced by the new score).

Full Technical Procedure for Calculating a GA Handicap STEP 1 - Use the table below to determine the number of scores to be included in the GA Handicap calculation:

Note: When the handicap record contains more than 20 scores, the GA Handicap calculation uses the best 8 of the player's most recent 20 scores.


Sometimes the greatest handicap for golf is the golf course itself. Jayden Orger found this out the hard way when he discovered his golf ball had planted itself right up against a tree root. With the way the ball rested, it was impossible to try to hit the ball forward in the direction of the green and the risk of breaking his wrists or a golf club were a reality if he tried to swing at the ball. To put it bluntly he was pretty much rooted. In the end Jayden was just able to putt the golf ball out sideways by deflecting it off the tree root. He was than able to get out of the hole with a double bogey which wasn't too bad when you consider 10 others had double bogeys on the same hole without facing the same difficult predicament and Jayden actually posted a better result than Peter, Jaxon and Tony who had a 6 or 7 on the 155 -meter par 3 hole.

While Jayden used his putter to get out of trouble on the $13^{\text {th }}$ hole, Rick Turcinovic used his putter to get himself in to trouble on that same hole. Rick was just off the front edge of the green after his tee shot and because he was struggling with the chipper, he
thought it would be worth trying to putt from off the green instead. Unfortunately, as is often the case, the execution was not as good in practice, as the theory and Rick managed to putt his ball straight into the bunker. Anyone who was within a 12 km radius of Devils Bend would have been well and truly aware of how Rick's golf round was going. Every shank, air-swing and putt missed from less than 2-feet away were followed up with a bellowing roar of you "goat F\#*\$3r" which could be heard as it echoed around the rolling hills of Moorooduc.
