# Devil Bend Course Results May 



SUNDAY LEAVE PASS 2020


What a fantastic day it was at Devils Bend for everything bar the result. Once the weatherman forecasted a massive cold front hitting Melbourne on Sunday one could be forgiven for expecting rain and inclement weather. Especially with the strong winds that ran across Victoria on Saturday afternoon, it was certainly looking as though we would be facing yet another horror round at Devils Bend. Col Ewart described it well when he said, "he prepared for everything and got nothing." Shanno (Cider) ran for the doona covers when the weather forecast was made out to be bad and he was a last-minute withdrawal from golf spruiking a sudden bout of gastro, we call "liar, liar Shane", truth is you were just shitting yourself.

As it happened, the storms never arrived, all 9 x groups were able to complete the entire 18 holes unscathed and even the late afternoon post-round zoom debrief and drinks at 3 pm was completed without anybody getting rained upon, although Col Ewart did succumb to localized internet blackouts which saw him lose the unlosable. With a three-shot lead with 2 holes to play Col socially distanced himself out of the game and was forced to forfeit the round at Royal St George. Col was even par after 7 holes on WGT golf when his internet dropped out and consequently this opened up the door for Newell who went on to win the match on the last hole with a score of plus 6 .

It was a rare day to have such brilliant weather at Devils Bend, to have blue skies and calm conditions on the brink of Winter was a real treat. 34 players made the journey down the Peninsula link to play the first full 18 hole round post Covid-19. The results for the day were a mixed bag. Some players had stand out good scores and some others where absolute shockers. As is usually the case, the course played tough and the Nett average was quite high. ( 80.5 strokes Nett) The average gross score was 104.29 strokes per player, although these numbers were heavily skewed by horror rounds by the Supercoach and Cam Ross who submitted scores 20 shots beyond their normal capabilities.

Unfortunately, despite shooting the lowest gross score for the day (84 off the stick) it was not enough for Stu Coops to secure himself a ticket in to the 2020 battle of the Champions of Champions play off. The day was dominated by the Cooper family but disappointingly for Stu it was his brother who got to take home the chocolates. Adam was relentless and he posted a blemish free round. With a score of 93 (Nett 67) Adam was able to take home the bragging rights and also the 15 Championship points which come with a monthly title. Adam was unlucky not to win the NTP on the $11^{\text {th }}$ hole when he stuffed his tee shot next to the flag, it was just unfortunate that Mick had been there first and was a couple of centimeters closer. Adams great shot to inside 1 meter of a
hole in one did yield a birdie to go with his 2 pars however it was still not good enough to earn him any skins as the hole jackpotted. Interestingly Mick had only just knocked off SOS for NTP on the $11^{\text {th }}$ hole so it seems the big guns were shooting darts.

Stu Coops looked as though he was in rare form, other than a blemish on the second hole his golf was very consistent. 7 pars and 10 bogies was the formula to complete the day with a score of Nett 68 . Although Stu navigated the course with just 30 putts for the day there were so many shots wasted with the putter which ultimately cost him the seat at the top of the winners podium. He got on the bogey train on the back nine and had good looks at Par on almost every hole but he just stayed on the same journey home.

I would hate to disperse rumours or question the integrity of the final playing group however it does seem a little bit suspicious that the top rankings all came from the same grouping. Coincidently Ben Nichols who played in the final grouping with Stu and Adam also had a good round and he finished with a score of Nett 75 meaning Ben landed himself in $5^{\text {th }}$ position. Ben had a great day with the golf clubs and he showed the white-hot form from 2019 has not yet left him. Ben was the winningest golfer last season, he played so brilliantly that he almost took out the annual points title in spite of playing only half as many rounds as the rest of the field.

Ben had two $x$ birdie 2's for the day and averaged less than par on the shorter holes. He was playing inspired golf on the par 3 holes so he is currently investigating the prospect of joining a par 3 course or a pitch and putt as this seems to be his sweet spot. On the $3^{\text {rd }}$ hole Ben's entire group landed on the green, in fact three of the four shots were hit inside the Nearest to pin marker. It was disappointing to see Rick Turcinovic getting knocked out of contention however with three balls in a row inside his marker it was never meant to be.


Tim Emmerson was fortunate enough to claim the NTP prize on the $3^{\text {rd }}$ hole however he was not able to convert the putt to make a birdie. Tim had a losing battle with his putter and was never able to work out the speed of the Devil Bend greens. Tim started the day with a three putt, finished the day with a three putt, and were it allowed to be worn under the current COVID-19 restrictions he would have spent almost the entire day carrying the three putt monkey vest on his shoulders.

The NTP shots on Sunday were very good, every hole was nice and tight on the flagstick location and on occasion a brilliant shot was left unrewarded because either someone was already closer or else someone knocked off a tee shot which most months would have got the NTP prize uncontested. The proof in the shot making was the fact that the course conceded 7 birdies and 75 pars this month.

The longest drive competition was a lot less competitive. Jaxon Fitzpatrick knocked a solid entry down the middle of the fairway and then sat back and watched all of the power hitters as they faultered behind him. The $5^{\text {th }}$ hole was an interesting long drive hole because there is a significant water carry to contend with or else a dog leg and the sloping fairway which feeds back towards the water which made hitting the fairway a challenge. Jax was very strategic and he actually hid his drive in a valley within the dogleg of the fairway. His drive was tucked in close to the lake and strategically the marker was obscured in a blind spot from the tee so golfers could not even see the marker. This led to many golfers taking a too tight a line and this resulted in many balls getting hit into the water or rolling out into the rough.

Adam Cooper could have capped off the perfect day by also winning the longest drive because he had the length covered and he could fairly argue he had the accuracy too, it was just unfortunate for him that the groundskeeper had decided to cut the fairway into the dogleg well in from where the normal playing lines would usually play. Adams golf ball rolled out along the fairway past

Jaxon's marker then followed the contours of the land down and into the rough. Stu Coops had a fair crack at the long drive prize too, he carried the lake convincingly however his ball held up a meter or so before the short cut stuff.


While some guys were smashing long bombs down the fairway, there were the usual candidates who struggled to move the ball off the tee at all. The longest distance the supercoach could get out of a club was when he launched it in the air after throwing his club after a bad shot. Mark Sfiligoj capped out his $\$ 10$ fines before he got to the $8^{\text {th }}$ hole. Considering he parred two of the first 3 holes it looked as though he was on for a blinder, but soon enough it proved not to be the case, in fact it proved he was blind or suffering from some form of sight impairment.

There has always been an old wives tale which claimed that if you played with your manhood too much and too often when you are going through puberty that there is the strong chance you will go blind. Fil is the undisputable evidence to confirm this myth to be true. Supercoach has been a wanker all of his life and now it is clearly obvious that his eyesight has deteriorated so much that he struggles to see the ball when it is on the tee peg in front of his feet. Marks poor eyesight results in too many mishits, airswings and shots where the ball doesn't make it passed the ladies tees. It happened 5 times on Sunday. So at $\$ 5$ per fine he got out of $\$ 15$ worth of fines not to mention the 26 times he was caught throwing his club.


A good start went pair shaped for Fil, it took him 14 shots to play the first 3 holes and 100 strokes to play the next 15 . With a Nett Score of 96 Fil was a clear Beer Wench title winner and he has therefore reserved himself an entry into the battle of the Beer Wenches on the golf trip at Barham. Fil might attribute his final out come to a bit of bad luck and a few bad lies but the truth of the matter is everything revolves around him and the fact he is just bad at golf.


## Hole 7

Blue

- Par: 4
- Distance: 356 m



Unfortunately for the Supercoach, the pro's tips were not accurate enough and when it came to him playing the par 3 eighth hole he thought he was trying to hit his tee shot nearest to the path in front of the tee box instead of nearest to the pin.


To be fair Mark was not the only player who was fined for not hitting his tee shot passed the ladies markers. The fine jar will be topped up by a few players who struggled to launch out of the tee box.

Brendan MacIsaac hit three balls in a row straight into the water on his way to a score of 12 on the Par five fifth hole.

Barry Hemsley had an interesting one, where he was playing four shots off the tee. Barry played his first shot which looked to have gone into the hazard, so he called on a provisional ball. Barry's provisional ball was the second shortest shot that he played for the day. Barry completely missed his provisional ball so he was then playing 4 off the tee. Luckily for Barry he did manage to find the first drive so the provisional never came into play and even better for Barry he then went on to complete the hole with a bogey 5 which was a vast improvement from sitting 4 with out advancing the Srixon 2 anywhere.

As a matter of trivia, we made mention that Barry's airs-wing was the second shortest shot that he played for the day. How can you hit a ball less than not hitting it? I hear you ask. Well Barry drilled one of his shots 30 meters behind himself after the trusty 3 iron ricocheted into a tree in front of him.

All things considered it was a pretty good day for Barry. Taking out of the equation his 9 on the first hole and his Newell (Score of 10 or more) on the second hole, his end result of Nett 78 was a big fightback considering he had 19 shots on the first two holes. The highlight of the day if not his Sunday Leave Pass career was when Barry knocked his hybrid onto the Par 5 fifth hole to notch up a Par 5 green in regulation statistic. That takes his SLP career tally to two GIR's on a par 5 hole. Driver, hybrid, hybrid. 3 putt was still a happy result.

Running in a close second for the highlights real was a chip in from 40 meters off the green to claim an unlikely bogey. Barry was stuck behind one of the huge bunkers looking up to an elevated green, and miraculously he was able to lob the ball up and over the bunkers onto the putting surface where the ball trickled in to the bottom of the cup. This was most likely shot of the tournament, on a day when there were some brilliant shots played. His playing partners had him pegged for a Newell from the position his ball had finished in.

Mal Griffiths was complaining about the bunkers for the first 17 holes however once he managed to splash his ball out of the sand and into the hole on the eighteenth green he finally stopped his complaining.

It was great to see Mal make a last minute booking, Mal wasn't sure if he should be playing golf due to the current regulations of social distancing and staying 1.5 meters away. It was only once it was explained to Mal that the rule only applies to standing 1.5 meters from other golfers and not standing 1.5 meters from his golf ball that he was able to relax and focus on his normal golfing techniques.


SOS made the observation that Mal stands as far away from the ball before he hits his driver as the Supercoach stands away from it after he has hit it.


The deep sandy bunkers proved a challenge for many golfers, Mal Griffiths racked up additional shots every-time he landed in the bunker because he found it near on impossible to extricate his ball with the first try. Even big Mick wasted a few soring opportunities when he missed the green and landed himself in the beach and then cocked up his attempt to flop the ball out the sand. Col and Newell were very stiff when they dropped their balls in the sand. The boys balls finished knocking together and landed next to each other on the $11^{\text {th }}$ hole.


As hard as it was to get a happy ending when you found your balls stranded in the sand, there has never been a bigger cock up in the bunker than the one Geoff Cooper had while playing the $15^{\text {th }}$ hole at Devils Bend on the 21 May 2017. Sometimes it is good to dig back into the archives to reminisce on classic moments and since we played at Devils Bend this month and the date was so close we thought we would relive the moment when Geoff broke the record for the highest score on a hole when he got stuck in a bunker and he couldn't get out.


Geoff Cooper has written his way into Sunday Leave Pass history and added a new word into the SLP jargon in the process. Prior to hitting off on the first tee Geoff had a feeling things weren't quite write. Given that the first group of players were 30 minutes late hitting off the first tee and with the prospect of the sun disappearing before the golf had finished, Geoff was actively lobbying and campaigning for a rule to be created so that players could pick the ball up after 10 shots so as to speed up the flow of play. This was a great theory and it would have helped Tony and Newell by a couple of strokes however in practice it is not a feasible option because we actually record the number of putts, track greens in regulation, putting statistics etc. etc. so it is vitally important that we finish every hole in its entirety. If we picked up our balls when things got just a little bit tough it would be at the detriment of the club archives and how else could we have the Sunday Leave Pass club records like Jamie Brunton's score of 18 at Albert Park in July 2004 to beat.

Unfortunately or fortunately depending on the way he looks at it, Jamie will no longer hold the record of the highest score on a single golf hole, the record has stood for nearly 13 years although a few guys have gone close to knocking him off. Chris Sfiligoj fell only 2 shots short when he dumped five balls in a row into the dam on the $12^{\text {th }}$ hole at Devils Bend last year. Newell nearly debuted and beat the record on his maiden round when he got trapped in a back and forward loop between the bunkers on the $7^{\text {th }}$ hole at Kingston links in 2014. Had his 16th shot a bladed wedge not hit the flag pole, wrapped itself in the flag and then dropped within 12 inches of the cup, Newell may still have been playing the hole today.

Geoff was the player who finally managed to surpass Jamie's longstanding record. Geoff was sitting greenside for only 3 strokes on the long par 4 fifteenth hole. He actually had a brilliant round going and was already preparing his victory speech after averaging just 6 shots per hole for the round thus far.

The say you shouldn't count your chickens until after you have got past Colonel Sanders' house, but unfortunately on this occasion Geoff had started counting. As a result he not only lost all of his chickens, but he scrambled his eggs and got the turkey baster rammed up his temperature valve for good measure. Poor Geoff who has been bragging for the last 2 months about his new found competence in the sand after a getting specialist bunker lesson with the RACV Golf Club golf professional was forced to give 19 demonstrations of his new technique. Geoff hit his ball in the sand when his 4th stroke caught the lip of the bunker. After what seemed like a lifetime later he finally 2 x putted, closing the hole with a
score of 24. Barry, Newell and Tony MacIsaac all generously grabbed a rake each in order to help Geoff to rake the bunker, but even still they finished in the dark 25 minutes after the group in front of them and only after half of the field had already packed up, had their drinks paid their fines and gone home. The committee have already convened and passed a motion for any score of 20 or more to be changed in the Sunday Leave Pass lexicon from a double Newell to a "Geoffrey".

Geoff had a score of 80 on the back 9, forty nine of those hits coming in the last four holes ( 33 over par- his handicap is 29). It's no wonder he was so parochial about capping the scores at 10 .

Even the lies on the fairway were tough at times, with Melbourne having more rain in the first 5 months than we had in the 12 months of 2019 it was not uncommon to find a ball plugged in the middle of the fairway.


Shaun Klepp found his ball worse than plugged, his ball was totally submerged in the lake but in true Sunday Leave spirit he tried to play his ball out of the water. It was a great shot too, he successfully managed to splash his ball out of the water only to have it hit the hazard marker in front of him and then rolled back into the water. It was a tough day for Shaun, he featured several times on the Newell register and with his score of 118 he was only a couple shots shy of finishing with the highest gross score and very close to Beer Wench.

Shaun was not the only player to post multiple Newell's (Score of 10 or more) Cameron Ross also racked up a couple of 10's and these guys were just part of a collective group of the 11 players who reached double figures on a hole. Interestingly despite his abysmal performance, the Supercoach never documented a Newell on his score card however he came very close on numerous occasions. When he signed off his numbers after completing the last hole, he had recorded a total of 4 x eights and 2 x nines marked onto his score card.

Col Ewart recorded a 10 on a par 3 hole. Considering the $13^{\text {th }}$ hole has no water hazards or out of bounds markers his demise must have been at the mercy of the bunker at the front of the green.

Jamie Brunton started his round with the perfect first hole, his birdie on the long Par 5 hole was the building block for a solid day on the golf course. Jamie's birdie was complimented with a further 3 pars, so it was little wonder he finished the afternoon in $4^{\text {th }}$ place with his score of Nett 75.

It is unusual to see a high proportion of 2's marked on the scorecards, it was quite amazing to know that 4 out of the 7 birdies carded at Devils Bend were achieved on the par 3 holes. Mal Griffiths birdied the par 5, $10^{\text {th }}$ hole and Egg was the only player out of the field of 34 players to make a 3 on a par 4 hole. Egg achieved this feat on the nineth hole.

The count back system is formulated as the following.
*Total number of stableford points scored on the back nine holes.
*In the event that both players have the same stableford score on the back nine it then reverts to the number of stableford points scored on the eighteenth hole. If this is the same then it goes to the $17^{\text {th }}$ hole, sixteenth hole, fifteenth hole until a player has a better hole and therefore has a higher stableford score than the other.

To qualify as the Champion of Champions title a member needs to win a monthly title. All of the winners from monthly championships who are attending the golf trip will then play off for the title based on total accumulated stableford points from 9 x Randomly selected holes. The Winner is the person with the most points over those holes, in the event of a tie a Countback applies.
NOTE: The Winner of the December title is eligible to win however they only get to count scores and use only 8 Randomly selected holes.

Points are hard to come by this season, with fields of players in excess of 30 players each month so far, it is a big ask to finish inside the top 14 to get multiple points. Every missed putt, each lost ball or duffed chip has a huge impact on the final place rankings and the count back system can be influential on how the day pans out for you. The scores on the back nine are very important as they are regularly the determinant of the end results because when more than one player finishes with the same Nett score then the places are calculated based on the total number of stableford points scored on the back nine and then narrowed even finer down to individual hole scores starting from the $18^{\text {th }}$ hole and working back.

This year, your playing handicap will fluctuate around your documented handicap index. When you play an easy course such as Ringwood or Dorset then you will actually play off a lower handicap than you normally would. On the other days when we invite you to play a harder course such as Eynesbury, we will add a few extra shots to your arsenal just to give you more hope of avoiding total anxiety and depression.

As the Spring Park round was only a nine-hole event we did not adjust any players handicaps. This was not the case for Devils Bend and those players who scored well suffered the wrath of the handicapper. Adam Cooper and Leigh MacIsaac lost 1.3 strokes, Stu lost 0.8 and both Ben and Brendan both got a little snip off their playing handicap before they take on Bayviews next month.
Interestingly, despite Jamie finishing in $4^{\text {th }}$ spot his handicap still went out. Cam D, Cam Ross, Jaxon, Newell, Peter, Phil, Rick, Ron and Wayne were all gifted a little extra help with their handicaps and just because we can do it and because we love the complaining we decided to leave the Beer Wenches handicap unchanged. If we are lucky he will go back to back.

As a new member of the Social Club the Callaway Handicapping system is used to give the player a daily played to handicap for the first couple of rounds. Once they have played 3 rounds, they are given a temporary club handicap using the original AGU handicapping system. After 5 rounds they are then switched across to the current slope handicapping system.

This system is used for determining fair allowances for social golf events that attract novices or occasional golfers. A player's Callaway handicap is determined after each round by deducting from his/her 18-hole gross score the scores of the worst individual holes during the first 16 holes of the round.

In the computation of handicaps under this system:

No hole may be scored at more than twice its par

- half strokes count as a whole,
- the 17th and 18th holes are never deducted,

For example, if a player scores 99 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their ( 3 worst holes) +1
If a player scores 82 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their ( worst $+1 / 2$ the $2^{\text {nd }}$ worst hole) -1
If a player scores 120 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (five worst holes) +2
After 3 rounds they will be allocated a temporary handicap using the old AGU handicapping formula and then after 5 rounds they are elevated onto the official Slope handicapping system which was use thereafter for all club competitions.

For those people interested in the mechanics of the handicapping system it can be best explained as the following.

How to calculate a GA Handicap

To calculate a player's GA Handicap:

- you must firstly identify the player's most recent 20 scores,
- you then determine the 'Played To' value for each of these scores,
- you average the best 8 'Played To' values,
- and finally you multiply this average by 0.93 . The resultant figure (to one decimal place) is the player's GA Handicap.
* If a player's handicap record contains a lesser number than 20 scores, the number of scores used to calculate the player's handicap is as listed in the table below.
* There is no requirement for a player's most recent 20 scores to have been returned within a specific timeframe. For example, the most recent 20 scores may span a period of three years or they may span a period of three months.
* Once a player's handicap record contains 20 scores, the next score they return will result in the oldest of the existing 20 scores being removed (to be replaced by the new score).

Full Technical Procedure for Calculating a GA Handicap
STEP 1 - Use the table below to determine the number of scores to be included in the GA Handicap calculation:

## Number of Scores in Player's Handicap Scores to be Used in the Record Calculation

| 5 to 6 | Best/Lowest 1 |
| :--- | :--- |
| 7 or 8 | Best/Lowest 2 |
| 9 or 10 | Best/Lowest 3 |

| 15 or 16 | Best/Lowest 6 |
| 17 or 18 | Best/Lowest 7 |
| 19 or 20 | Best/Lowest 8 |

Note: When the handicap record contains more than 20 scores, the GA Handicap calculation uses the best 8 of the player's most recent 20 scores.

The player with the most points at the end of the year is crowned the Points champion irrespective of how many rounds a person has played. If one person plays 13 rounds for the year and the person in $2^{\text {nd }}$ place has only played 10 rounds but is close to the same score then that is bad luck to the person in $2^{\text {nd }}$ place. All players are invited to play the entire fixture. We reward participation rather than perfection and performance so if you play more often you will end up with more points.

The Top end of the leaderboard is really starting to tighten up. SOS (El Presidente') has jumped up to the top of the pecking order and Ronnie and Stu are both just a couple of points behind. Dale, Egg, Mick and Heathy McLeod are all comfortably placed, sitting just one good round from catching the leaders, so with 6 months yet to play out there is still lots of movement yet to happen.
