








Devil Bend Results September

If anyone goes around saying that Mount Martha is suffering from a drought then they've got a punch in the nose coming. We've played there 2x years in a row and on each occasion we have had to slosh our way around the course contending with the equivalent of Melbourne CBD's annual average rainfall dropping from the sky in the space of 5 hours. You know you're gonna get have a tough day ahead of you when you have to drive through submerged roadways on the way to the golf course, and you can assume you're destined to get wet feet when the paddocks on the local farms look like an endless lake with an island oasis and you can all but guarantee nasty weather when the clubs golf Pro turns up to work on a jet ski instead of a car which is exactly what happened on Sunday. I'm not sure whether it was the tears of misery by the saints from the heavens above after their heartbreaking defeat at the hands of the cats on Saturday but what ever it was the heavens opened and the entire field got a drenching.



Considering the extent and the severity of the rain, the course remained in incredibly good condition, other than the whitewater rapids spilling out from the above capacity dams and the occasional creek running across the fairways and greens, even still the putting surface and fairways were quite firm and remained true. If the rain was not enough of to contend with, the un-seasonal cold chill, which brought record snowfall on the Alps, combined with gale force winds, made the morning a physical and mental challenge.

Of the 15x die-hard golf fanatics who set about the challenge, all but 1x managed to drag themselves around the course to finish the 18 holes. Only Brendan Seagrave succumbed to the temptation of a warm heater, dry clothes and a hot beer. Brendan quit on the 14th hole after he lost the feeling in his fingers and toes and started to show 4 of the 5 symptoms of hypothermia. The final straw for Brendan was when he had to swim out under a fenced off area defined as GUR to retrieve has ball in order to take a free drop. The signage stipulated that he must play his drop from the nearest yellow stake which he could only find 50 meter's behind where his ball had landed. After seeking a ruling from the rules committee he was allowed to drop at the nearest point of relief from the GUR rather than have to walk back against the driving rain to hit from the drop zone. Unfortunately for Brendan he hit the ball 40 meters over the back of the green and his ball was then swept away by the raging currents from the runoff out from one of the green side bunkers. To make matters worse his playing partner told him, it's a pity you didn't play your shot from the drop zone where the sign said to, if you had of, then

it would have been a very good shot. That was enough for Brendan; he disappeared up to the car park, never to be seen again.

One thing Brendan could have done while he waited up in the car park for the bar to open was change Neil's flat tyre. Although the wheels may have fallen off Brendan's golf game, it was Neil who had the greatest problems. He arrived at the golf course with his car limping and leaning on a severe angle. Stu lost balls on the 1st, 4th, 5th, 7th, 10th and 15th holes so it was lucky he was carrying the extra's supply or he might have run out of golf balls during the game.

Greg Parsons built a very strong bond with his golf ball, his Titleist Pro V 1. After 117x shots following his embarrassingly poor first tee shot; when Greg finally rolled in his Putt on the 18th green he still had the ball that he started with. The two were inseparable, although they certainly had some adventures during the epic journey around Devil Bend. On the twelfth hole Greg topped his 5x wood, his ball plugged deep into the ground before bouncing up high into the air when an earthworm farted beneath the mud. Evidently Greg's ball bounced up over his head, and while he was walking away back to his bag the ball came down and hit him in the head. It was a dirty day for Tony all round. Young Matt also had an eventful day. He had several pars, won the nearest to pin and made a simple tap in Birdie on the 13th after nearly holing out for an ace. He also won the longest drive out distancing the ball bursting drives of Mike Harper. Matt's only demise was a few silly club selections and a few course management issues which lead to him posting a 14 on the tenth hole which ultimately cost him a top 10 finish on what could have otherwise been a very good day for him.

This years championship leader had a terrible start to the day, despite playing on his home course and having played several practice rounds in the days leading up to the game, Greg's game unraveled right from the start. He had 21x strokes in the first 2x holes and never recovered from it. Greg shot his worst round for the year. Perhaps he wasn't even trying though, because he was heard telling his wife Vanessa that it didn't matter how he went at golf for the rest of the season because nobody in the club is good enough to catch his points championship lead and mathematically it's nearly impossible to do.

Devils Bend lived up to its name and reputation. The golf was more about surviving and just getting to the end. None of the 14x players came close to playing to their handicap and the point's rankings were awarded to the best of the bad bunch. Big Mike Harper qualified with his official club handicap and was rewarded with a monthly title since he was the only player to finish with a Nett score in the high 70's. No eagle Putts this month but he did play some good holes and his Nett 78 provided him a deserved victory and 10 championship points.

Neil Phillips posted a score of 104 which was sufficient to position him into second place and Supercoach (Fil), Stu Coops and Gerard finished in 3rd, 4th and 5th place respectively each with 81 Nett, with a countback on the back nine determining the actual order they finished in.
