Congratulations to Stu Coops who won the month of April with his score of 29 putts, it was the other 78 strokes that we won't bother taking into consideration. It wasn't hard to work out why it was that Stu was able to win the putting competition yet finished ranked in last place in the stroke event.

When you look at Stu's score card you understand where the day went wrong. Over the 18 holes Stu accumulated a total of 10 penalty strokes. His worst hole was a thirteen (Newell plus 3) which was a genuine tale to tell. So bad was the situation on the third hole that Stu actually had to write a scoring map on the bottom of his card just to calculate his final score on the short par 4, hole.



It was a promising start to the day, when Stu arrived on the third tee having parred the first two holes, things were looking positive for back to back monthly titles. For those who have never played the Dorset Golf course the 3rd hole is a short par 4 hole with a green located in a position which can be hit with a good drive over the lake. Ever the conservative player, that is exactly what Stu set about trying to achieve. The pace of play for the golf had been very slow so there was already a total of three groups queued up waiting on the hole before Stu even struck his tee shot. In front of a curious audience Stu duffed his tee shot along the ground and his ball disappeared into the front of the chasm in front of the tee. His provisional ball did not go very much better and it too dribbled into the grasslands on the banks of the lake.

A quick search in the bull rushes and the long grass beside the lake and surprise, surprise, Stu miraculously managed to find two golf balls which he quickly claimed to be his original ball and the provisional ball. After such a lucky escape you would have expected a smart golfer to take the relief of an unplayable lie and then limp home for an easy bogey. Not the case for Stu however, he decided to play the ball from out of the hazard and push for the miracle birdie or at least a creative par save. The problem was not in the plan, but in the execution. Playing a shot with the ball 2.5 feet below your stance, standing on a rock on a river bank, while dodging duck reeds takes a lot of skill and good fortune. Unfortunately, both of those essentials were missing on this occasion and the consequence was that Stu blocked his ball straight into the lake.

So, the situation escalated dramatically when his 2nd stroke had been hit in the lake. Add a penalty stroke to the score and Stu you are now playing your 4th shot. Back off or go hard? That is the question. Yep you guessed it, the 4th shot was flushed straight into an overhanging tree branch and ricocheted into the lake, hence adding an extra penalty stroke to the score. 4 plus a penalty means Stu is now playing his 6th shot and still doesn't even have the ball in play yet. As you can imagine, the audience absolutely loved it when Stu's next shot fell heartbreakingly short of the bank across the other side of the lake and disappeared to the bottom of the pond as fish food. Well if you add a penalty Stroke to your 6th shot then you have hit seven and will be addressing the ball ready to play shot 8. Most players would go sideways at this point and at least get the ball onto the playing surface however not our illustrious leader who had decided he was committed and was going to keep hitting balls at the green until he tasted success. Unfortunately for the scorecard, success didn't come with stroke 8 either because it went skimming for 150 meters across the top of the waters surface before joining the previous 4 balls at the muddy depths of the much-feared Dorset Bermuda triangle. So, with the next penalty added to the score Stu was now addressing what would become his 10th stroke which finally missed all the trees, made it over the lake and found a green patch of turf where it was safe and easy to chip from. The rest of the hole was pretty academic, a chip to 2 meters, then the next chapter was a good solid putt straight at the middle of the hole however it horseshoed around the cup and end up stopping behind the hole leaving him an easy tap in for a final score of 13 otherwise known as a Newell plus 3 and eliminating any chance of winning the monthly title.

Things didn't get any better from there, with the very next tee shot, Stu donated another golf ball into the Dorset Bermuda Triangle, then bounced his third shot against the safety boundary fences along the walking path, otherwise it would have ended up in the driving school, if that wasn't enough pain for the day he then chipped his ball across the green, it rolled over the cart path

and came to rest in a rocky garden bed, leaving him no other option other than to add yet another penalty stroke to his score and take an unplayable lie. 6 penalties in 2 holes and 20 added to the score card and by the end of the fourth hole Stu had all but locked down the beer wench position. Stu also was also forced to be playing 5 off the tee on the 12th hole when he hooked two consecutive drives out of bounds and then on the 13th hole his two drives fell outside the imaginary out of bounds markers meaning once again he was five from the tee and playing his 6th Stroke from a drive which on any other golf course in Australia would have been in play and in a position to have a genuine chance at hitting the green for two from 158 meters out and making

an eagle opportunity. Not so at Dorset and another 9 was added onto the scorecard.





Brendan MacIsaac was the only player who could have possibly saved Stu and competed for the last position title, especially given that Brendan started his April monthly campaign with (scores of 10 or more) Newell's on the first two holes.

However, as the day went on Brendan actually got better and better, in fact he had a brilliant finish to his round, playing an A-grade quality style of golf, going just one over for the last 4 holes.

Brendan birdied the 15th hole after hitting a monstrously long drive and he then played a flag seeking bomb from 113 meters out hitting it to within 3 inches of making an eagle two.

Brendan's ball was so close to the flag stick that not even he could have missed it even though he had had 44 putts for the day.

Brendan then went on to make a double bogie on the hardest hole on the golf course, took a casual bogey on the 17th hole and then closed out his round with another birdie on the 18th hole. All in all, it was a very successful outing for Brendan as he managed to take home the lions share of the prizes on offer in the daily skin's competition. With a seven-hole Jackpot claimed on the 15th hole with his birdie and then another skin on the 18th hole Brendan secured himself 8 skins and some very healthy raffle ticket entries into the end of year prize raffle.

The one area where Brendan had the most difficulty for the day was with his driving. Having said that, he hardly missed a fairway all day, he was just a lot less accurate when it came to be driving up the ramps into the back of Leighs Ute at the end of the day.



Since Geoff Cooper invested in the pope mobile, it seems as though the flood gates have opened, Brendan Mac is crashing around in his flaming red speed machine, and now this month Ronnie Parsons appeared with his own gun metal grey low rider sports buggy. Although Ron hasn't been driving the buggy around for quite as long as Brendan has, it certainly seems as though he has already mastered his skills in the reload into the car, Ronnie literally drove straight off the 18th green into the car park, opened the rear tailgate and drove up into the boot of his FWD wagon and disappeared inside.

His drive landed right at the base of a tree trunk leaving him no easy way to hit his ball in a forward direction. As would be expected the Canadian boatperson put his hand up for a handout, he tried to request a free drop, first claiming that the tree was under two club lengths tall, then when that didn't work he pulled out a rib eye fillet from his golf bag and placed it on the fork of the tree and tried to say that it was therefore a steaked tree, then when that didn't work either he had the audacity to accuse passing golfers of moving his ball into the said position.



The day was filled with plenty of ups and downs. Over the field of 29 players we scored an impressive 14 birdies and 120 pars. On the other side of the ledger, even though he didn't play golf on Sunday due to family commitments, Newell still turned up on the score card seven times. Ronnie Parsons rolled in a par with his putter from off the green, his ball finding the bottom of the cup from 60 feet away.

Warren Perrett was the only other player to have a gobbler, he chipped his ball in for a bogey which was very fortuitous especially since his drive had been chunked straight in to the creek in front of the tee box.

Many other players went close to having a zero Putt hole. Steve O'Sullivan nearly holed out with his third shot on the par 5 first hole to only just miss the eagles nest prize. Brendan MacIsaac played a bomb into the difficult pin position on the 15th, therefore giving himself a tap in putt on a green where most golfers were happy to walk away with a three-putt green.

Steve Powne should have hit the flagstick and he would have most likely seen his ball drop down into the bottom of the hole, when he played a brilliant approach shot onto the 2nd hole. Unfortunately for Steve he missed the flag stick because his good mate Mark Fitzy had already decided to take the flag out of the hole and putt before Steve had even played his shot. Fitzy was too busy celebrating holing his 10meter snaking par putt to be concerned with what was happening with the Blue Smurf's golf.

Steve also had a near miss on the 4th hole, however on this occasion it wasn't the flag, he missed the golf ball with his 3 wood entirely. It was nice to get a \$2 donation from Stevie for his air swing, but he still beat me off the stick on both nines.

Some powerful hitting was on display by Big Mick, however just the same as Fitzy, Mick had no concern for those around him. Mick smashed a bomb of a drive down the 7th hole, the main issue being that poor Jaxon Fitzpatrick was still in range. Micks ball crashed into Jaxon's leg leaving him with a bruise the size of a golf ball on his shin and the poor kid had to limp his way around the rest of the golf course. At the time of being hit by Micks drive, Jaxon was undeterred by the incident and he played a brilliant long bunker shot with his very next shot hitting the ball to within a meter of the hole from 30 meters away. That's the toughest shot in the game of golf, especially when you have to play it standing on one leg.



The Fitzy family were not able to stay around for a drink after the game because Mark had to take Jaxon to the hospital for scans to see if anything was broken or damaged. They did however take half of the ice out of our Esky in order to make up an ice pack for his leg, leaving us with warm beers.

Despite the injury, the only thing that kept Jaxon standing up for the remainder of the day was the golf tee that he was given by Andrew Clarke.

Jaxon loved spanking the tail of his plastic molded naked doll golf tee, the only problem with this was, that sometimes the group had to spend 10 minutes searching for the lost tee because Jaxon refused to move on without it. There were some genuinely good scores for the day, Big Mick dropped his handicap down to 7 after shooting a very impressive 76 off the stick, Steve O'Sullivan broke the 80-barrier with a round built by a very tidy score of 37 on the front nine holes. Andrew Clarke continued his dominance on the shorter open courses. He shot 80 off the stick and found himself in a podium finish position.

Despite being knocked back a free drop, Todd Neilson still managed to post a career best score. 84 off the stick sets a new benchmark for Todd who finished in 2nd place and lost a full stroke off his handicap in the process. Incredibly the days winner was Mark Fitzpatrick who scored 86 for a Nett score of 65, yet Mark on a day when most golfers lost shots off their handicaps, saw his handicap go out by 0.3 strokes rather than come in. Fitzy, obviously must like the Dorset golf course because his career best score was achieved at Dorset in April 2008 when he posted a score of 81. The April 2019 victory gives Fitzy his 4th Sunday Leave Pass title from 64 rounds played. Who knows Mark might be the next player to be awarded the Champion of Champions jacket, which was finally pulled out of the closet by Ronnie Parsons and he was therefore able to enjoy a couple of free beers for his 2018 achievement.

It will be interesting to see how Fitzy goes next month if he decides to play at Devils Bend because this year the demise of the previous monthly winners has been significant. Wayne James won in January at Gardiners Run and since then he has finished in 12th, 24th and 25th position. Brendan Mac and Stu Coops both went from the penthouse to the \$h!7hou\$e. Brendan won in February and then was left to wear the beer wench vest in April after coming last in March. Stu Coops followed up his victory in March by coming last in April, so we will all be looking forward to seeing him dressed in Pink at Devils Bend. It appears at this stage as though there is a curse on the monthly winner's title, so Fitzy may well be in for troubled times ahead.

Newcomer Jason Mladenis showed himself to be a very accomplished player, Jason hit 84 off the stick and at one stage he had his name on three of the nearest to pin markers. Leigh MacIsaac enjoyed the shorter wider golf course and he also posted a very impressive 84 off the stick.

It is worth noting that the winning score last month (Nett 73) at Centenary park would not have featured in the top 15 rankings at Dorset. This says something about how exceptionally well everybody must have played this month, and it was done in quite difficult damp conditions.

For those players not familiar with the scoring process, listed below is the format we use in Sunday Leave Pass competitions.

Once all of the players are ranked then the Seasons Championship points are allocated according to the position in the field.

The player in 1st place gets 15 points, 2nd place 14 points, 3rd place 13 points, etc etc. Any player who completes the round however finishes ranked outside the top 14 and is placed between 15th spot to BeerWench then they are all allocated 1 championship point for attending.

For the benefit of the newcomers or the uneducated we thought it would be a good opportunity to go through the player rankings and point scoring system again.

Sunday Leave Pass competitions are run using Stroke, so you need to count every shot that you play, and you need to finish every hole. Each players Nett total score is then calculated by deducting the players handicap from the Gross score. If a player doesn't have an official Sunday Leave Pass handicap, then a temporary played to handicap is allocated on the day using the Callaway handicapping system.

Once the players Nett score is calculated they are ranked from lowest score to highest score. (BeerWench) Where more than one player has the same Nett Score (such as in the example below from Gardiners Run last year then the place allocations are decided based on a countback system.

The count back system is formulated as the following.

*Total number of stableford points scored on the back nine holes.

*In the event that both players have the same stableford score on the back nine it then reverts to the number of stableford points scored on the eighteenth hole. If this is the same then it goes to the 17th hole, sixteenth hole, fifteenth hole until a player has a better hole and therefore has a higher stableford score than the other.

In this instance both Mick and Supercoach had Nett 66 after their handicaps was deducted from the Gross Scores. So, we go back to a countback.

In this example Mick wins because the higher place finish. Mick had 18 points on the back nine compared to Fil who could only conjure up a disappointing 17 stableford points on the back nine and was therefore relegated down a place. SOS also had a score of Nett 66 but that composed of only 15 points on the back nine, so he finished behind the Supercoach.

If in the event that the countback then identifies that both players have had the same stableford points score on the back nine then we go back to the individual holes starting from the 18th hole and compare results until a player had a standout result. In the example shown on the right from both Rick and Barry had 18 Stableford points. Since Barry had a bogey for 2 points whereas poor Rick only had a score of 6 for 1 points on the 18th hole therefore Barry wins the countback and Rick is relegated back to a lower place ranking. If both scores are equal then we go back to the 17th hole, then the 16th, etc etc.

PLEASE NOTE THAT THE COUNT BACK IS ON HOLES 10-18 irrespective of whether it is a two tee start, a normal hit off from the first hole or as in the case of Warburton we hit off the 10th hole and the 1st hole. It is always the 10th to 18th holes and if one person starts on the 10th hole and the other hits off the first hole then it still remains exactly the same formula.

The player with the most points at the end of the year is crowned the Points champion irrespective of how many rounds a person has played. If one person plays 13 rounds for the year and the person in 2nd place has only played 10 rounds but is close to the same score, then that is bad luck to the person in 2nd place. All players are invited to play the entire fixture. We reward participation rather than perfection and performance so if you play more often you will end up with more points.



As a new member of the Social Club the Callaway Handicapping system is used to give the player a daily played to handicap for the first couple of rounds. Once they have played 3 rounds, they are given a temporary club handicap using the original AGU handicapping system. After 5 rounds they are then switched across to the current slope handicapping system.



This system is used for determining fair allowances for social golf events that attract novices or occasional golfers. A player's Callaway handicap is determined after each round by deducting from his/her 18 hole gross score the scores of the worst individual holes during the first 16 holes of the round.

In the computation of handicaps under this system:

- -No hole may be scored at more than twice its par,
- half strokes count as a whole.
- the 17th and 18th holes are never deducted,

For example if a player scores 99 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (3 worst holes) +1

If a player scores 82 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (worst + ½ the 2nd worst hole) -1

If a player scores 120 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (five worst holes) +2

Jason Mladenis and Jaxon were both playing off the Callaway handicapping system. Jason's score of 84 resulted in his handicap being formulated as the sum of his worst hole plus ½ of his second worst hole plus an adjustment score of one. This resultantly gave Jason a handicap Callaway Handicap of 11

Jaxon on the other hand was allocated a handicap of 28. Based on the sum total of his worst 3 holes plus an adjustment value of 2. After 3 rounds they will then be allocated a temporary handicap using the old AGU handicapping formula and then after 5 rounds they are elevated onto the official Slope handicapping system which was use thereafter for all club competitions.

Jason might find life nasty when he starts his official handicap as he could find like many a player before him that an extraordinarily good round in the early days will see him playing off a very challenging handicap. Warren Perrett is still paying the price for his blinder at Dorset last year, his 82 has been haunting him ever since and the funny thing is that this months round was a flagged round which brought has handicap back down again even further, just after he was getting it up to a comfortable level.

For those people interested in the mechanics of the handicapping system it can be best explained as the following.

How to calculate a GA Handicap

To calculate a player's GA Handicap:

- you must firstly identify the player's most recent 20 scores,
- you then determine the 'Played To' value for each of these scores,
- you average the best 8 'Played To' values,
- and finally you multiply this average by 0.93. The resultant figure (to one decimal place) is the player's GA Handicap.

- * If a player's handicap record contains a lesser number than 20 scores, the number of scores used to calculate the player's handicap is as listed in the table below.
- * There is no requirement for a player's most recent 20 scores to have been returned within a specific timeframe. For example, the most recent 20 scores may span a period of three years or they may span a period of three months.
- * Once a player's handicap record contains 20 scores, the next score they return will result in the oldest of the existing 20 scores being removed (to be replaced by the new score).

Full Technical Procedure for Calculating a GA Handicap

STEP 1 – Use the table below to determine the number of scores to be included in the GA Handicap calculation:

Number of Scores in Player's Handicap Scores to be Used in the Record 5 to 6 7 or 8 Best/Lowest 1 Best/Lowest 2

7 or 8 Best/Lowest 2
9 or 10 Best/Lowest 3
11 or 12 Best/Lowest 4
13 or 14 Best/Lowest 5
15 or 16 Best/Lowest 6
17 or 18 Best/Lowest 7
19 or 20 Best/Lowest 8

Note: When the handicap record contains more than 20 scores, the GA Handicap calculation uses the best 8 of the player's most recent 20 scores.

Take Warren Perrett for Instance. He has now played 8 rounds with the club and his Best round was 13 over par and his next best round once again at Dorset is 27 over par or better described as a combined score differential of 40. When this value is divided by 2 and is then multiplied by 0.93 his official handicap is 18.6 which was rounded to 19.0. If he had actually played 20 rounds and the scores listed above were his best 6 scores, then his handicap would actually be 33.25. or rounded back to 33.3.

The more rounds a member plays the more reflective the handicap becomes of their skill level. Once a player has played 20 or more rounds each month the 20th round is dropped off and replaced with a new score. This is the point where a score inside the top 8 might drop off and be replaced by a higher score meaning the handicap goes up even though the player carded a decent performance.

The handicapper was savage this month as a collective group a total of 13 strokes came off the handicaps, the biggest recipients being Warren Perrett who lost 3.7 strokes, Todd Neilson lost a full stroke, Andrew Clarke lost 0.7 and a large number of players were sliced between 0.3 and 0.5 Strokes. Interestingly Mark Fitzpatrick actually went out instead of coming in, this must have meant that he had an exceptionally good round drop out of his 20 rounds and it was replaced by his score of 86 which was not as good a round as the one that dropped off. Happy days for Fitzy. For the record the round which dropped off as the 20th round just happened to be score of 84 which was played at where else but Dorset.
