It wasn't just the Sunday Leave Pass crew that found it a tough day out on the golf course. Colin Ewart collected almost a full compliment of golf equipment while driving around the golf course. Evidently, it seems he was following a player who had resigned to the fact that he would never be playing golf again and he was randomly dropping all of the non- functioning equipment wherever he had used it last. Incredibly, each item from the photograph below had been dumped unceremoniously at different parts around the golf course. This guy makes Rick Turcinovic look like the arch angel when it comes to being a contender for the angry man award.



It is hard to work out exactly where it all went wrong, Matt Robinson would be blaming the 14 golf balls he lost over the 18 holes, Tony Mac attributes his demise to getting stuck in one of the deep steep faced bunkers and taking 7 shots to get the ball out. Cam Douglas had little trouble in the bunkers however with 46 putts he caused a lot of damage to his place in the field. Cam had his career worst round with the Sunday Leave Pass Social Club and was pondering giving the game away until he found comfort in the misfortune of 27 other blokes who were crying into their beer bottles at the end of the round.

Barry Hemsley start off his round in great form however he fell apart after a while, and his game deteriorated as the afternoon grew long. Barry registered a Newell after landing on the green for 5. Barry's five putts earned him a session in the yellow vest which was fair and just considering he missed the last three putts on the 14th green from inside 2' feet.

Barry wasn't the only one to 5 putt. Brendan MacIsaac also had a disastrous 5 putt green and Andrew Clarke was forced to pay out a fine for putting from on the green to off the green.

Putting appeared to be one of the many challenges faced by the Sunday Leave Pass golfers. The average number of putts was over 37 per player. Phil Plane found the greens very difficult to negotiate. By the time he walked off the 17th hole Phil had already racked up 42 shots with the flat stick. It was at that point Phil decided he had had enough, so rather putt on the last hole he chipped his approach into the hole from 60 meters out for an easy score of 6.

Newell started his day in the perfect way, he chipped in for a 0 putt for par. Stu Coops made a noner on the third hole to make a par, which was a welcome relief considering he 3 putt almost every green he hit in regulation. Rick Turcinovic was the other player who had the skills to hit the ball into the hole from off the green for a zero-putt outcome.

At the other end of the spectrum were those who couldn't get the ball into the hole no matter how hard they tried. Cam Douglas and Phil Plane averaged a three putt or worse on every second hole. That is nine 3 putt greens.

Any time when the greens are difficult, the bunkers are deep and the waterways are discreetly tucked away into the key landing areas, the outcome is always going to be high golf scores. As a collective group we had a mind boggling 24x Newell's (Score of 10 or more) and of those there were some very big Newell's too.

Seven shots in the bunker was the building block to Tony Mac signing his scorecard with a Newell and a half (15). Brendan Mac also had a Newell and a half, as well as a straight Newell (10) and a Newell plus three (13) and a Newell plus four (14). It is hard to believe that even with those huge numbers Brendan was still able to stay out of the Beer Wenching position. That honor is bestowed to Matt Robinson who finished his round at Eynesbury with the highest Nett Score. Matt's round of 137 Nett 106 included an incredible 6 Newell's. To put things into perspective Matt shot 1 over par on the back nine (73) the only issue with that is the par is based on playing 18 holes not 9 holes.

Matt is now heading off for the next couple of months on a Contiki tour around Europe, so unfortunately, he will not be able to see him in the pink vest, however the fine jar will be boosted by \$5 for his failure to meet his obligation. Once the absentee fine is paid the onus on wearing the pink vest then gets passed on to the next highest score which in this case will be Brendan MacIsaac.



There was no shortage of golf balls lost during the rounds at Eynesbury, almost every player donated a ball or two into the lakes, creeks, ponds or amongst the thick rough. The only good thing about hitting your golf ball into these precarious spots was that you were most likely to find someone else's ball even if you could not find your own.

Dale Robinsons golf cart was filled to capacity as time after time he returned from a search with his pockets full of balls. Dale came to the conclusion that Callaway balls are not a good choice as it seemed as though they were the most common balls he found; therefore, they must be very easy to lose.

Stu Coops does not have quite the same intellectual mind as Dale does. Stu does not think logically. The proof of this is in the fact that on Sunday during the trip home, when the couple of cans he had knocked off while waiting for the remaining groups to finish had worked the way through the kidneys and into the bladder. Stu thought he would be able to hold on for the entire duration of the long 1 & 1/2 hour drive home rather than take relief behind a tree in the carpark before he left. By the time the bus had entered the Burnley Tunnel things were getting dire. If there was ever a time to not have an official club handicap, then Eynesbury was just the perfect occasion. Anthony Emmerson played off a very generous Callaway Handicap of 33 and the reward for him was a Steven Bradbury style monthly title victory. Egga had what he described as one of his worst rounds ever, yet once his handicap was formulated, he ended up winning with Nett 79 beating Tony Grasso on a countback.

Tony Grasso was one of only four players to shoot under 100 on the challenging Eynesbury layout, so he was unlucky to be robbed of the monthly crown by a Callaway bushranger. The good news is Egga has now played enough games to qualify for a temporary SLP handicap, so going forward he will have to work a bit harder to win his next title. SOS finished in third place with 91 off the stick. Steve Powne played a very consistent form of golf and was rewarded with a top 4 finish. Big Mick has extended his lead at the top of the points leaderboard, although 88 off the stick is a long way back from his previous round at Bayviews golf course it was still the lowest score for the day and was good enough to finish in 5th place.

Anthony Emmerson managed to accumulate some good points this month. With the majority of the playing group performing badly. The Callaway handicapping system managed to elevate him all of the way up the place rankings to 1st position. Egga has capitalized on the generous handicapping system and will now be given the challenge of playing to an official Sunday Leave Pass Club handicap.

For those that have never read this far down into the blurb and if you are suddenly interested in how all the new members under the Callaway handicap system keep beating you, list below is a brief summary of how the system works.

Remember for the first three rounds the newbies play off a Callaway Handicap.

This system is used for determining fair allowances for social golf events that attract novices or occasional golfers. A player's Callaway handicap is determined after each round by deducting from his/her 18-hole gross score the scores of the worst individual holes during the first 16 holes of the round.

In the computation of handicaps under this system:

- No hole may be scored at more than twice its par,
- half strokes count as a whole,
- the 17th and 18th holes are never deducted,

For example, if a player scores 99 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (3 worst holes) +1

If a player scores 82 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (1x worst + ½ the 2nd worst hole) -1

If a player scores 120 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (five worst holes) +2

These handicaps are then taken off the players gross score for 18 holes to give a Nett score and therefore a place ranking just the same as we do with all members with an official Sunday Leave Pass handicap.

For those players not familiar with the scoring process, listed below is the format we use in Sunday Leave Pass competitions.

Once all of the players are ranked then the Seasons Championship points are allocated according to the position in the field.

The player in 1st place gets 15 points, 2nd place 14 points, 3rd place 13 points, etc etc. Any player who completes the round however finishes ranked outside the top 14 and is placed between 15th spot to BeerWench then they are all allocated 1 championship point for attending.

For the benefit of the newcomers or the uneducated we thought it would be a good opportunity to go through the player rankings and point scoring system again.

Sunday Leave Pass competitions are run using Stroke, so you need to count every shot that you play, and you need to finish every hole. Each players Nett total score is then calculated by deducting the players handicap from the Gross score. If a player doesn't have an official Sunday Leave Pass handicap, then a temporary played to handicap is allocated on the day using the Callaway handicapping system.

Once the players Nett score is calculated they are ranked from lowest score to highest score. (BeerWench) Where more than one player has the same Nett Score (such as in the example below the place allocations are decided based on a countback system.

The count back system is formulated as the following. *Total number of stableford points scored on the back nine holes.

*In the event that both players have the same stableford score on the back nine it then reverts to the number of stableford points scored on the eighteenth hole. If this is the same then it goes to the 17th hole, sixteenth hole, fifteenth hole until a player has a better hole and therefore has a higher stableford score than the other.

In this instance from Dorset both Mick and Supercoach had Nett 66 after their handicap was deducted from the Gross Scores. So, we go back to a countback.

In this example Mick wins and gets the higher place finish. Mick had 18 points on the back nine compared to Fil who could only conjure up 17 stableford points on the back nine and was therefore relegated down a place.

If in the event that the countback then identifies that both players have had the same stableford points score on the back nine then we go back to the individual holes starting from the 18th hole and compare results until a player had a standout result. In the example shown on the right from both Rick and Barry at Dorset, each of them had 18 Stableford points. Since Barry had a bogey for 2 points whereas poor Rick only had a score of 6 for 1 points on the 18th hole therefore Barry wins the countback and Rick is relegated back to a lower place ranking. If both scores are equal then we go back to the 17th hole, then the 16th, etc etc.

PLEASE NOTE THAT THE COUNT BACK IS ON HOLES 10-18 irrespective of whether it is a two-tee start, a normal hit off from the first hole or as in the case of Warburton or Devils Bend where we hit off the 10th hole and the 1st hole. It is always the 10th to 18th holes and if one person starts on the 10th hole and the other hits off the first hole then it still remains exactly the same formula.

As a new member of the Social Club the Callaway Handicapping system is used to give the player a daily played to handicap for the first couple of rounds. Once they have played 3 rounds, they are given a temporary club handicap using the original AGU handicapping system. After 5 rounds they are then switched across to the current slope handicapping system.

For those people interested in the mechanics of the handicapping system it can be best explained as the following.

How to calculate a GA Handicap

To calculate a player's GA Handicap:

- you must firstly identify the player's most recent 20 scores,
- you then determine the 'Played To' value for each of these scores,
- you average the best 8 'Played To' values,
- and finally you multiply this average by 0.93. The resultant figure (to one decimal place) is the player's GA Handicap.

* If a player's handicap record contains a lesser number than 20 scores, the number of scores used to calculate the player's handicap is as listed in the table below.

* There is no requirement for a player's most recent 20 scores to have been returned within a specific timeframe. For example, the most recent 20 scores may span a period of three years or they may span a period of three months.

* Once a player's handicap record contains 20 scores, the next score they return will result in the oldest of the existing 20 scores being removed (to be replaced by the new score).

Full Technical Procedure for Calculating a GA Handicap

STEP 1 – Use the table below to determine the number of scores to be included in the GA Handicap calculation:

Take Warren Perrett for Instance. He has now played 8 rounds with the club and his Best round was 13 over par and his next best round once again at Dorset is 27 over par or better described as a combined score differential of 40. When this value is divided by 2 and is then multiplied by 0.93 his official handicap is 18.6 which was rounded to 19.0. If he had actually played 20 rounds and the scores listed above were his best 6 scores, then his handicap would actually be 33.25. or rounded back to 33.3.

The more rounds a member plays the more reflective the handicap becomes of their skill level. Once a player has played 20 or more rounds each month the 20th round is dropped off and replaced with a new score. This is the point where a score inside the top 8 might drop off and be replaced by a higher score meaning the handicap goes up even though the player carded a decent performance.
