That donation gets you four or five BBQ's during the year, drinks at social events and unlimited alcohol for 5 hours at the pub on the Saturday night of the golf trip.

This a call out reminder to all of those guys with short arms and deep pockets you need to remember this and contribute a bit of loose change to the fine jar.

What better way to start season 2020 than celebrating SOS's (El Presidente's) 100th round with the Sunday Leave Pass Social Club.



It was only fitting that a large crowd assembled on the first tee to watch him smoke his ball straight through his banner and into the middle of the rough never to be seen again. 100 rounds is quite an achievement. It takes nearly 10 years of fronting up once a month to be sledged, laughed at and demoralized in order to get to 100 rounds. SOS joined SLP in August 2010, nobody actually quite knows where he come from in the SLP family tree he just turned up one day and then he just kept coming back.

SOS claimed the first of his 7 monthly titles after just 4 rounds with the group when he took home the major prize on the golf trip at Thurgoona in 2010. Since then he has won rounds at Warburton and Rosebud South in 2011, Rosebud composite course in July 2013, Centenary Park in 2014, Spring Park in 2016 and his last victory was back in 2017 when he took home the chocolates at Werribee Park. Interestingly SOS had his best season in 2019 when he came 2nd in the points championship yet he never finished at the top of the points distribution. In his career stats SOS has counted 8806 strokes at an average score of 88.06. His best round so far is 71 at Spring Park Golf Course in 2016 and his worst round was 105 at Beacon Hills in 2011 where he raised his bat for a century scored. Interestingly SOS has only scored in excess of 100 strokes, three times from his 100 games and two of those were at Beacon Hills, so we look forward to seeing what happens in 2020 now that Beacon Hills has found its way back on to the fixture.

SOS becomes the first 100 round player to have never finished in Beer Wench position, incredibly no matter what his score is, he has always found a way to beat at least one person. This is quite an achievement and reflective of his consistency with the bent metal sticks. SOS has an GIR hit percentage greater than 25% and although he still hasn't had an eagle with the club, he has made 43 birdies and 539 pars plus he has made 7 Newell's (score of 10 or more) during his journey with the club.


SUNDAY LEAVE PASS 2020

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Gardiners Run has done it again. The Chirnside Park golf course put on what can only be described as “perfect conditions for a golfer to thrive”. The weather was spectacular on Sunday, the course was in pristine condition, fairways were great, greens were excellent and the ground-staff had even put the tee markers way forward and the flags in easy positions just to ensure we all enjoyed our experience on the day. I am not sure if it can be attributed to the study notes sent out on Thursday however it was a very rare occasion to see the fine master walk past 33 players without even getting a single collect of \$5 from anybody because there was no-one who failed to drive past the ladies tees. Luckily, Rick the fine master’s debut performance was not hamstrung by this slight blemish because he was still able to shake out over \$200 worth of fines for the numerous other indiscretions which happened over the day.

Notable mentions go to Peter Calyvopoulos who knocked his tee shot onto the Par 3 eleventh hole, and then wrote his name on the marker as NTP but still walked off the green with a 6 on the scorecard after making a disastrous 5 putt. Wayne James finished the day with a very impressive 84 off the stick however he only hit the ball 83 times because Wayne actually had an air-swing and was consequently required to kick a few gold coins into the fine jar for his effort.

The fine master himself donated the maximum \$10 for his misdemeanors on the golf course which included a couple of 4 putts, a couple of thrown clubs, a shank off the first tee and his most interesting contribution was when he copped a \$2 fine from putting from on the green to off the green. The most interesting thing with Ricks shot was that he actually opted to chip his ball with an iron rather than putt the ball even though it was already on the putting surface. Apparently, Rick found himself in a difficult position where he was required to negotiate a big bend in the green. There is no rule which stops you from playing a chip or pitch shot while your ball is on the green however there is an expectation that you manage to hit the ball closer to the flag. Unfortunately, this was not the case for Rick and he skulled the ball off the green and into a much more difficult position.

Luckily Rick maxed out his fine jar obligations because we have photographic evidence to show that he answered and was talking on his mobile phone while out on the golf course. Rick may argue that he was booking accommodation for the golf trip to Hawaii because with over \$200 in the jar from the first month there is a high chance that he will break the all-time record for end of year expenditure.



151 pars and 15 birdies at an average of 94.66 strokes, per players must be some sort of all-time record for the group of the size field we had this week. As a result of these impressive figures, it was very difficult to finish inside the points run down. The average Nett score was 73.90 whereas it normally sits closer to 78-80. Ronnie Parsons won the January title with a very impressive Nett score of 65. Anthony Emmerson has carried on his winning form with yet another top five finish and considering he was off with the driver at Gardiners Run, it will be interesting to see what happens when he gets his whole game together.

Phil Plane and Rick Turcinovic are both mounting individual campaigns on why they should be nominated as the most improved player in 2020. Phil finished with 13 points in 3rd place with 98 off the stick and Rick made 4th spot with an even century, however when you factor in his 2 four putts and a shank on the first hole, you start to wonder just how low he might possibly be able to shoot.

Mick Harper has continued his love affair with Gardiners Run. Mick shot the lowest score for the day. 79 off the stick with a crook back was a very good outcome. Mick hired a golf cart because he has been away at Yarrowonga for the last week with the missus and he returned home to Melbourne with what his physio diagnosed as “shaggers back.”



By the end of the round at Gardiner Run, Mick not only had “shaggers back” but he also had a love bite growing on his leg.

Evidently Douggo enjoyed the intimacy of sharing a cart with the big fella, so much that he thought it necessary to give Mick a lasting reminder of their quality time spent together.

It appears as though getting hit by a full fledged three wood is not a desirable outcome. Mick could hardly walk after he was nailed by Douggo’s golf ball however it didn’t impede his ability to score well.

Mick left the driver in the golf bag and this proved to be a successful tactic. He still hit the ball a very long way however the accuracy was better and the reward was 11 pars and a birdie.

The reward for Douggo for hitting the ball into Mick was a \$4 refund from the fine Jar.

The Supercoach was not playing on Sunday, because he and Steve Powne played a catch-up round during the week and therefore they were still able to submit a score. Like Mick, the Supercoach also walked away from his round with major bruising on his leg however in his case he was required to impart the bruising on himself. Mark hit his ball directly into a tree in front of him and it bounced back and smashed him in the kneecap.

Stu Coops turned up to the round at Gardiners Run already injured. Stu arrived sporting a sprained ankle after a game of beach cricket went pear shaped on Thursday. Interestingly, standing on one leg worked for Stu, since he carded a very respectable Nett 69 including 8 pars and 2 birdies. Stu had 3 good looks at the eagle's nest prize and his closest effort was within a foot of success on the short 6th hole which was also the NTP second shot competition. Despite using a cart which is a very rare thing to see Stu do, when he finished the 18 holes his left ankle was twice the size of the right one.



Brent Douglas was one of the few golfers who managed to finish the round of golf without ailment or injury, which is more than we can say for his 5 iron. It only took a couple of holes before Brent had decapitated the favorite iron in his golf bag. Brent claims it happened accidentally when he swung too close to a tree although the truth is more likely to be he that he is already a worthy candidate for the angry man award because our sources tell us that he wrapped his club around a branch in frustration after being given the three putt monkey vest.



Skins were hard to win this month, 151 pars and 15 birdies, lead to multiple jackpots and some good holes resulting in no reward. Rick holed out with a miracle shot on the par 3 third hole to claim a skin with a four pointer whereas almost an eagle and a simple tap in birdie for Peter Calyvopoulos on the 6th hole was to no avail. Fortunately for Peter the skins jackpotted for the next few holes so when he claimed 4 stableford point for a birdie on the 8th hole he was still able to claim his skin back plus a few extras.

Newell Richards was very unlucky and extremely disappointed to discover that his birdie on the 17th hole was left unrewarded when the skins were Jackpotted because another golfer couple of golfers also scored 4 stableford points on the same hole.

Even more disappointing for Newell was his finishing place in the field. Evidently, one bad shot out of a bunker brought his otherwise faultless round tumbling down the leaderboard. Newell was sitting pretty on the 13th hole. He had played 2 good shots and had had only just caught the green side bunker otherwise he would have been looking at a good chance to roll in a birdie or a par at worst. This was the sliding doors moment that changed the entire outcome of his round. Had he casually knocked the ball out and on to the green then Newell would have gone on to beat Ronnie Parsons and win the January title. Alas it was not to be the case, instead he bladed his ball out of the sand 60 meters out the back into the forest beside the 14th fairway, where he was forced to take an unplayable lie, he then knocked his ball all around the place and finished the hole 7 minutes later with an 11 on the scorecard.

For those who are new to the club you may not be aware that there is a special word for a score of 10 or more. It is called a “Newell” or in this case it was a Newell plus one (11). The term Newell originates from the fact that when he first started playing golf with us in 2013, Newell was reputed to score more 10’s than Nadia Comaneci did at the 1976 Montreal Olympic games. The fact that Newell has had achieved the record number of 78 Newell’s from 79 attendances is why the word has become so widespread a term in the golfing vernacular that it was even nominated as one of the candidates for the Macquarie Dictionary best new words in 2019.

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Newell was not the only golfer on Sunday to have a Newell, in fact there were 5 of them. Mark Sfiligoj opened up the 2020 year with a Newell plus one (11) on the very first hole played for the season. Tony MacIsaac also ran out of fingers to count his shots when he finally tapped his ball into the hole on the par 5 2nd hole. Steve Dawson was very quick to be initiated into the Sunday Leave Pass wall of shame by racking up a Newell on just his 2nd hole with the club. Slinky (John Mea) had the biggest Newell for the day. He racked up 13 strokes (Newell plus 3) on the 6th hole of which only 2 of them were putts so there was a lot of metal on plastic action as he butchered his way down the fairway.

For some time now, Newell has been actively campaigning to try to have the association of his name “Newell” withdrawn from the definition of a score of 10 or more. While he continues to write down Newell’s on his scorecard it would be unjustified to change the phrase. However, as a matter of fairness I hereby pledge that the club will make preliminary inquiries into the feasibility of potentially amending the definition of the word Newell if Dawso continues his current 100 percent strike rate for the next 78 rounds and therefore surpasses Newell’s achievement with 78 rounds averaging one per round.

The easiest way to rack up a Newell is to find yourself deep and buried in one of the steep faced bunkers at Gardiners Run, Poor Paul Marshall was left hollering after he found himself buried in the face of the bunker with his ball embedded in the heel print of someone's footmarks. It took Paul multiple shots to get his ball out from the tricky lie and he did unsuccessfully check to see if he could possibly get away with some Patrick Reed style excavating to help his cause.

When he finally managed to get his ball out of the bunker as a dejected and dispirited man, his playing partners thought it would be good to make him feel better about himself by showing him a video of another golfer who also found it difficult to get his ball out of the sand. Slinky was able to share a great moment with Tony Grasso when he knocked his tee shot to within just a few feet of the flag on the 3rd hole to claim the NTP prize. Unfortunately, the putter wasn't working for Tony and he missed the easy birdie, however he was able to make a two putt which was more than he could say for most of the other holes. On a day when the average putts was 33 per player, Tony had a stinker. He was the only person to have more than 40 putts, he finished the day with 41 putts including a total of nine x 3 putt greens.

There was little wonder why Tony was seen wearing the yellow vest for the majority of the day and we were all so pleased to see him in the car park at the end of the day to add his contribution into the fine jar balance for finishing in the three putt monkey position. Obviously, Tony is committed to avoid the prospect of being nominated for the players Choice Tight Wad award for two years in succession.



The one thing about catching up for a beer after a round of golf is you can always find a fellow player who has a story which is funnier or more depressing than your own experiences, and you always find someone who will make you feel good about yourself. So long as the beer is cold and no one is talking politics or climate change it is always a great day out. The conversation was so good on Sunday that even Clarkey was able to stay awake and upright.

Douggo was able to poll a few angry man nominations after he gave both Brent and Cam a roasting for not wearing their Sunday Leave Pass shirts. Like a good caring father Glenn decided to spend \$45 on each of his children for a well-considered Christmas present. He gave them both a new SLP shirt. So, you can imagine his dismay when both boys turned up missing their shirts and apparently Cam has actually lost his shirt even before it was removed out of the packaging. In order to win the Season Championship trophy, you need to play regularly and consistently to about your handicap or better, and it is the handicapper's responsibility to make sure that this doesn't happen. After every round the scores are assessed and then the handicaps are adjusted according to your performance. This season we have adjusted the handicap formula to take into consideration the difficulty of each golf course, using the course slope index, so it will be very interesting to see how the scores finish up.

What we have done is simply aligned the Sunday Leave Pass handicapping process with the one used by golf link and by all golf clubs around the globe. Although your SLP handicap is unofficial and therefore can not be used to formally enter organized golf competitions and tournaments, it still should be an accurate reflection of your golfing prowess and a measure of what your GA (golf Australia) handicap would be if you subscribed the \$150 per year to get an official handicap.

This year, your playing handicap will fluctuate around your documented handicap index. When you play an easy course such as Ringwood or Dorset then you will actually play off a lower handicap than you normally would. On the other days when we invite you to play a harder course such as Eynesbury we will add a few extra shots to your arsenal just to give you more hope of avoiding total anxiety and depression. As you will see from the chart listed below, the handicapper got busy to work this month after the impressive scores at Gardiners Run was that a large proportion of the field copped a notable handicap reduction.

HANDICAPS

The changes to player's handicaps are as follows:

BOLD RED NUMBERS- refer to players whose handicap has gone out **BOLD GREEN NUMBERS**- refer to players whose handicap has come in **BOLD BLACK NUMBERS**- refer to players whose handicap has remained unchanged **NON BOLD NUMBERS**- refer to players who didn't play this month, so handicap has not changed

As a new member of the Social Club the Callaway Handicapping system is used to give the player a daily played to handicap for the first couple of rounds. Once they have played 3 rounds, they are given a temporary club handicap using the original AGU handicapping system. After 5 rounds they are then switched across to the current slope handicapping system.

This system is used for determining fair allowances for social golf events that attract novices or occasional golfers. A player's Callaway handicap is determined after each round by deducting from his/her 18-hole gross score the scores of the worst individual holes during the first 16 holes of the round.

In the computation of handicaps under this system:

- No hole may be scored at more than twice its par,
- half strokes count as a whole,
- the 17th and 18th holes are never deducted,

For example, if a player scores 99 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (3 worst holes) +1

If a player scores 82 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (worst + ½ the 2nd worst hole) -1

If a player scores 120 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (five worst holes) +2

After 3 rounds they will be allocated a temporary handicap using the old AGU handicapping formula and then after 5 rounds they are elevated onto the official Slope handicapping system which was use thereafter for all club competitions.

Poor Heath Mcleod suffered from the Callaway handicapping system because his scores were very consistent across the 18 holes. Whereas his other mates used the system well by mixing good holes with bad holes and they all finished with a score of 75 Nett whereas Heathy came very close to adorning the pink vest in his very first outing with a Nett score of 81.

For those people interested in the mechanics of the handicapping system it can be best explained as the following.

How to calculate a GA Handicap

To calculate a player's GA Handicap:

- you must firstly identify the player's most recent 20 scores,
- you then determine the 'Played To' value for each of these scores,
- you average the best 8 'Played To' values,
- and finally you multiply this average by 0.93. The resultant figure (to one decimal place) is the player's GA Handicap.

* If a player's handicap record contains a lesser number than 20 scores, the number of scores used to calculate the player's handicap is as listed in the table below.

* There is no requirement for a player's most recent 20 scores to have been returned within a specific timeframe. For example, the most recent 20 scores may span a period of three years or they may span a period of three months.

* Once a player's handicap record contains 20 scores, the next score they return will result in the oldest of the existing 20 scores being removed (to be replaced by the new score).

Full Technical Procedure for Calculating a GA Handicap

STEP 1 – Use the table below to determine the number of scores to be included in the GA Handicap calculation:

Number of Scores in Player's Handicap Scores to be Used in the Record Calculation

5 to 6	Best/Lowest 1
7 or 8	Best/Lowest 2
9 or 10	Best/Lowest 3
11 or 12	Best/Lowest 4
13 or 14	Best/Lowest 5
15 or 16	Best/Lowest 6
17 or 18	Best/Lowest 7
19 or 20	Best/Lowest 8

Note: When the handicap record contains more than 20 scores, the GA Handicap calculation uses the best 8 of the player's most recent 20 scores.

As was mentioned earlier Birdies were a plenty on Sunday. 15 sub-par holes is a very respectable return from a field the size we had, although Rick is adamant that his Birdie 2 on the third hole from out of the bunker was by far the best hole for the day. Admittedly any chip in for a bird is a great result that we do agree, and a noner on the score card definitely helps the putting stats however is it justifiable as a very well-played hole? Well that is a question that is debatable.

Quite a few of the birdie featured on the 5th hole so there is no wonder the NTP second shot was allocated to this hole. Stu Coops made his birdie with a 1' foot tap in after lipping out for his eagle attempt. Over the course of the day there were plenty of other eagle opportunities for the day, although nobody was able to hole the putt it is still just a matter of time before the Eagles Nest jackpot goes off again. It is currently at 8 golf balls and it goes up one golf ball per month until it finally goes off. The maximum jackpot for the eagle's nest is capped at 30 golf balls and if more than 1 player has an eagle on the same day then the jackpot pool is simply split between the winners.

Hopefully the next eagle comes from a member getting a hole in one. We are now into our 16th season and still not one player has been skilled enough to make an ace.

The longest drive winner this month almost found himself wearing the pink vest. Cliffy Rowe only played one good shot for the entire day and as it happens of the 96 bad shots he played, his only good one was from off the tee on the 9th tee which just happened to be the designated longest drive hole. Cliff won the longest drive prize although there were plenty of excuse mongers after the round claiming they had hit the ball further than Cliff, however the only problem being they failed to keep their golf ball on the fairway, which is a very important part of winning the longest drive title. Big Mick Harper has won 33 longest drive titles during his SLP career however if he was able to count all of the times, he has driven passed the Long Drive marker but been in the rough then it would be more like 50 or 60 longest drive titles. Stu Cooper would be by far the most highly decorated long drive competitor where direction and accuracy not an underlying factor. Stu has only claimed 20 long drive crowns however from his 188 rounds with the social club he has probably knocked his ball beyond the winner of the long drive competition but in the rough or on another fairway at least 150 times during his SLP career.

Wayne James the 2019 Champion of champion was very straight hitting. Wayne hit up more members for a free drink in January than both Douggo and Tom Kellythorn did for their entire season while they both had the power of the Blue Jacket.

For those who have forgotten about the powers bestowed on the Blue Jacket here is a reminder of how it works.

As the Champion of Champions Wayne will be able to ask any Sunday Leave Pass member to buy him a drink, it is limited to only receiving one drink per member (beer or soft) over the entire year and it can only be done so only if he is wearing the Champion of Champion jacket at the time. This of course is excluding new members that didn't play in season 2019 but not exclusive to those who attended the golf trip. So, if he manages himself correctly he should be looking at up to 50 free beers or soft drinks over the next 12 months. Now that is a prize worth aspiring for.

The other condition is that Wayne must be the one who consumes the drink, he cannot use his power to buy beverages for anyone else. The only catch is also that if Wayne asks someone who has previously shouted him a drink then he must buy them a drink instead. Not that there is much chance of that happening as he has a spreadsheet set up and running.

Wayne can also kick in the balance of \$2 per shout to upgrade his beer to bourbons if he prefers to.

Remember that Wayne must be wearing the jacket, there was a couple of close calls when Wayne went to tap someone on the shoulder, but he wasn't wearing the jacket. He must continue to wear the jacket while he is drinking the jacket. If it is too hot to wear the Champion of Champions jacket that is OK, just choose not to wear it and then you aren't eligible for a free drink.

Congratulations to Ronnie Parsons who has already booked himself a ticket into the 2020 Champion of Champions play off. Ronnie was the holder of power of the Blue Jacket last year and he is obviously seeking it out again for next season. To qualify as the Champion of Champions a member needs to win a monthly title. All of the winners from monthly championships who are attending the golf trip will then play off for the title based on total accumulated stableford points from 9x Randomly selected holes. The Winner is the person with the most points over those holes, in the event of a tie a Countback applies.

NOTE: The Winner of the December title is eligible to win however they only get to count scores and use only 8 Randomly selected holes.

For those players not familiar with the scoring process, listed below is the format we use in Sunday Leave Pass competitions.

Once all of the players are ranked then the Seasons Championship points are allocated according to the position in the field.

The player in 1st place gets 15 points, 2nd place 14 points, 3rd place 13 points, etc. etc. Any player who completes the round however finishes ranked outside the top 14 and is placed between 15th spot to BeerWench then they are all allocated 1 championship point for attending.

For the benefit of the newcomers or the uneducated we thought it would be a good opportunity to go through the player rankings and point scoring system again.

Sunday Leave Pass competitions are run using Stroke so you need to count every shot that you play and you need to finish every hole. Each players Nett total score is then calculated by deducting the players handicap from the Gross score. If a player doesn't have an official Sunday Leave Pass handicap then a temporary played to handicap is allocated on the day using the Callaway handicapping system.

Once the players Nett score is calculated they are ranked from lowest score to highest score. (BeerWench) Where more than one player has the same Nett Score (such as in the example below from Gardiners Run last year then the place allocations are decided based on a countback system.

The count back system is formulated as the following.

*Total number of stableford points scored on the back nine holes.

*In the event that both players have the same stableford score on the back nine it then reverts to the number of stableford points scored on the eighteenth hole. If this is the same then it goes to the 17th hole, sixteenth hole, fifteenth hole until a player has a better hole and therefore has a higher stableford score than the other.

So we go back to a countback.</p> <p>In this example Wayne wins because he had 21 points on the back nine compared to Stu who could only conjure up a disappointing 19 stableford points on the back nine and was therefore relegated down a place.</p> <p>If in the event that the countback then identifies that both players have had the same stableford points score on the back nine then we go back to the individual holes starting from the 18th hole and compare results until a player had a standout result. In the example shown on the right both Phil Plane and Rick had 22 Stableford points. Phil had a par for 4 points whereas poor Rick only had a double bogie for 2 points on the 18th hole therefore Phil wins the countback and Rick is relegated back to a lower place ranking. If both scores are equal then we go back to the 17th hole, then the 16th, etc etc.</p> <p>PLEASE NOTE THAT THE COUNT BACK IS ON HOLES 10-18 irrespective of whether it is a two tee start, a normal hit off from the first hole or as in the case of Gardiners Run we hit off the 10th hole first. It is always the 10th to 18th holes and if one person starts on the 10th hole and the other hits off the first hole then it still remains exactly the same formula.</p>	Phil Plane	Rick Turcinovi
