# Morack Golf Course Results November 

After handing over the monthly title last month by losing on a countback, Shane Cumming was taking no prisoners at Morack. With the Tony MacIsaac Cinderella story behind him and barely a bad memory and old news, Shane set about his quest to be the best. Cider ripped apart the Morack course hitting his second round in a row in the 70's. The Blue $\mathrm{m} \& \mathrm{~m}$ doppelganger finished the day with a score of Nett 68 and he was 2 strokes ahead of the rest of the field. Shane is racing up the club rankings as he continues to stamp his authority on the big players. After his Morack round, Cider is now officially a single figure handicap player, his handicap has been slashed down to 9.9 making him the 3rd best active member in the golf club. Only Big Mick Harper and the regressing Gerard MacIsaac have lower handicaps and he clearly has both of them in his sights. Shanno is also chasing the crown as the power hitter of the social club. It is worth noting that he has claimed four longest drive titles over the past 12 months, whereas Big Mick has only been able to amass three crowns over the same period.


Very few others were able to hold together a decent score at the deceptively difficult Morack Golf Course. Stu Coops and Mal Griffiths both thought they were travelling OK as they arrived at the $9^{\text {th }}$ tee, having only hit the ball 38 times. 9 minutes later Mal was devastated to find out that his 1 putt for a score of 13 had left him making the turn with a score of 51 on the card. Stu Coops was playing his fifth shot on the tee and then three putted the green for a Newell on the short temporary par four ninth hole. Stu's first drive was returned to him by a lady who found it while walking with her baby in a pram on the opposite side of Morack Road and his second drive would have been even further out of bounds in some-ones back yard or on their roof.

Stu must have managed to hit at least one ball straight on Sunday because his name actually appeared on the longest drive marker on the $15^{\text {th }}$ hole. There was the one recurring question which everyone with a sense of humor had to ask, "which hole was he
actually trying to play at the time?" Newell Richards was elated to have the opportunity to write his name on the Longest drive marker after he smashed his ball 52 meters past Barry Hemsleys claim to the title, however his drive didn't last too long because Stu was able to knock his ball even further. In fact, the marker was pushed forward 124 meters from Barry's original claim to where Stu's ball landed, we know because Barry made us measure both drives just to make sure his ball was not further.

The one big issue about Morack was that if you missed the fairway you were most likely to be in trouble. Of the 10 Newell's recorded for the day most of them could be attributed to being stumped or on a rooted lie.

Cliffy had a healthy score going until he blew up his card by hitting a Newell on the $15^{\text {th }}$ hole. Cliff went hard on the tee box and was chasing the longest drive crown, unfortunately however the extra effort pushed his ball into the bushes and it was all mixed up and backwards from then.


Cliff found himself resting up against a tree with his only option being a reversed golf club with a left-handed swing. Cliff is an avid watcher of golf and he had seen this shot perfected on TV, so he thought it would be a good idea to give it a try. The outcome was not quite so good and definitely not as he had planned. Although he moved the ball a little, it still finished dead behind a tree and required yet another creative shot to get the ball back onto the fairway.


Tony Grasso found himself staring down the barrel of a very difficult lie when his second shot into the $11^{\text {th }}$ hole ran through the back of the green. Tony tried to work out a way to get his ball closer to the flag stick. Unfortunately, in this instance neither the hand wedge nor the foot-wedge were viable options from where the ball was located, so he had to be more innovative and use the tools at his disposal.

Interestingly Stu Coops was able to find and then extract his ball out from the middle of these bushes on the very same hole. Stu was in this photo however it is not actually a competition this week.


Tough lies, ten Newell's for the day, and an average score of Nett 80 proves how difficult the conditions were. The last hole played to a scoring average of over 6.5 strokes per player, so it was a tough walk back to the car park. Only Shane Cumming was able to master the 18th hole and he did so with finesse, Shane rolled in his second birdie for the day on the last hole capping off the perfect day with a 2 skin jackpot. David Burns also got a birdie on the eighteenth hole, however his was of the feathered kind. Burnsie knocked his ball into the poor bird who was minding its own business resting on a tree branch. Luckily it wasn't killed, the bird took off one way and Burnsie's ball went the other way, rolling out of bounds. He then hit another shot into the tree's
which once again ricocheted over the boundary fence and unfortunately for Dave his dream of having a Newell free round went out the window. Considering he had two 5 putt greens on the front nine ( 25 putts total) it was amazing to think Burnsie still ranked inside the top 15 scores. He was powerful and accurate with the driver, Birdied the par $316^{\text {th }}$ hole and was showing the form which has earned him the reputation as the golf trip specialist. I will certainly be putting my hand up to partner with him for the Sunday Ambrose competition.

Putting was the most important part of the round, some were very good at it. Mal, Shane, Todd and Newell all had only 31 putts for the 18 holes and close behind were Supercoach, Tom Kellythorn and Leigh who all minimized their use with the flat stick, with a significant number of one putt greens. On the otherhand, Burnsie had a shocker. He had 43 putts at Morack, yet this performance was still better than Rick Turcinovic who averaged 2.5 putts per hole ( 45 putts over 18 holes) including a 5 putt, six three putts and a 4-putt green. Needless to say, both of these boys were left wearing the flouro-yellow three putt monkey vest for most of the morning and at the end of play also.

The fine jar had it's highest return this year with more than $\$ 150$ being donated to go towards beers and BBQ for the golf trip. It wasn't just the four and 5 putt greens, there were also plenty of fines for thrown clubs, including El Presidente. It seems being partnered up with the Supercoach for 2 months in a row was all too much for SOS to handle. Steve O'Sullivan imploded and then exploded, he shot 96 off the stick, Nett 85 and was caught throwing his golf club on three separate occasions.

The Supercoach only threw his club once on Sunday, however the trajectory was more impressive than all others combined. After three putting the $12^{\text {th }}$ hole he then duffed his tee shot into the par 3 thirteenth. This was all too much to handle and he launched his 5 iron 80 meters down the fairway. It should be noted his throw was twice the distance that his ball had travelled. The club came within cm of exploding onto the cart path, evenstill the club was no longer usable as the shaft had a sudden off set kink to the left.

Barry Hemsley has had a recent run of good form. This month he only just missed another top 10 finish and he can attribute this to the penalty he received for committing the ultimate sin of playing the wrong ball, otherwise known as a "Slinky". It is hard to believe that Barry could have made this mistake especially since we did an entire education piece on this exact issue in last months blurb. We have included the same content information just so everyone gets the opportunity to learn from Barry's mistake.


What Is a 'Wrong Ball,' and What's the Penalty for Playing One?
You and your buddy tee off on a hole and both hit into the rough. You reach the golf balls first and play your stroke. But when your buddy checks out the other ball, he discovers some bad news: You accidentally hit his golf ball. You played the wrong ball. Whoops.
What's the penalty? First, let's define "wrong ball."

## 'Wrong Ball' Definition in the Rules of Golf

So what, exactly, is a wrong ball in golf? This is the official definition of the term as it appears in The Rules of Golf, written and maintained by the USGA and R\&A:

## A "wrong ball" is any ball other than the player's:

So, basically, before you play any stroke, make sure the ball you are about to hit is yours! Duh! This is why the Rules of Golf also state that it is every golfer's obligation to write or draw onto the golf balls they are using some kind of identifying mark. That way if you and your buddy (or fellowcompetitor or opponent) are using the same make and model of golf ball, you'll be able to tell them apart.
Still, mistakes do sometimes happen. Maybe your ball is in a spot that makes seeing the identification mark you put on it difficult; maybe you're just rushed and assuming a ball is yours.

If this occurs during a round then according to the rules of golf a two-stroke penalty is issued in stroke play.

The player whose ball was incorrectly played by a competitor or partner should drop a ball as close to the original spot as can be determined.
Steve O'Sullivan was lucky he had identifying markings on his golf ball because while playing his second shot into the $12^{\text {th }}$ hole, his ball ended up sitting on the green while the group in front were putting. SOS smashed his 3 wood up the par $512^{\text {th }}$ hole and his ball finished on the green while the guys in front were still lining up to putt. SOS did apologize for hitting up on the group, however the Karma gods were out to get him, because he not only missed his eagle putt but he also missed a tap in birdie and ended up walking off the green with a three putt Par.


It has been over 12 months since we had our last eagle, so the eagles nest jackpot is growing steadily. Although there have been many opportunities missed this year the prize still remains unclaimed and is currently sitting at 25 golf balls.

For the benefit of the newcomers or the uneducated we thought it would be a good opportunity to go through the player rankings and point scoring system again.

Once all of the players are ranked then the Seasons Championship points are allocated according to the position in the field. The player in $1^{\text {st }}$ place gets 15 points, $2^{\text {nd }}$ place 14 points, $3^{\text {rd }}$ place 13 points, etc. etc. Any player who completes the round however finishes ranked outside the top 14 and is placed between $15^{\text {th }}$ spot to BeerWench then they are all allocated 1 championship point for attending. The player with the most points at the end of the year is crowned the Points champion irrespective of how many rounds a person has played. If one person plays 13 rounds for the year and the person in $2^{\text {nd }}$ place has only played 10 rounds but is close to the same score, then that is bad luck to the person in $2^{\text {nd }}$ place. All players are invited to play the entire fixture. We reward participation rather than perfection and performance so if you play more often you will end up with more points.

Sunday Leave Pass competitions are run using Stroke, so you need to count every shot that you play, and you need to finish every hole. Each players Nett total score is then calculated by deducting the players handicap from the Gross score. If a player doesn't have an official Sunday Leave Pass handicap, then a temporary played to handicap is allocated on the day using the Callaway handicapping system.

## Reminder

The ball must be clearly on the CUT surface of the green or fairway to win NTP or longest drive. If it is not on the fairway it doesn't count.

All of our members are now on official handicaps.
For those people interested in the mechanics of the handicapping system it can be best explained as the following.

How to calculate a GA Handicap
To calculate a player's GA Handicap:

- you must firstly identify the player's most recent 20 scores,
- you then determine the 'Played To' value for each of these scores,
- you average the best 8 'Played To' values,
- and finally you multiply this average by 0.93 . The resultant figure (to one decimal place) is the player's GA Handicap.
* If a player's handicap record contains a lesser number than 20 scores, the number of scores used to calculate the player's handicap is as listed in the table below.
* There is no requirement for a player's most recent 20 scores to have been returned within a specific timeframe. For example, the most recent 20 scores may span a period of three years or they may span a period of three months.
* Once a player's handicap record contains 20 scores, the next score they return will result in the oldest of the existing 20 scores being removed (to be replaced by the new score).

Full Technical Procedure for Calculating a GA Handicap

STEP 1 - Use the table below to determine the number of scores to be included in the GA Handicap calculation:
Number of Scores in Player's Handicap Scores to be Used in the
Record Calculation

| 5 to 6 | Best/Lowest 1 |
| :---: | :---: |
| 7 or 8 | Best/Lowest 2 |
| 9 or 10 | Best/Lowest 3 |
| 11 or 12 | Best/Lowest 4 |
| 13 or 14 | Best/Lowest 5 |
| 15 or 16 | Best/Lowest 6 |
| 17 or 18 | Best/Lowest 7 |
| 19 or 20 | Best/Lowest 8 |

Note: When the handicap record contains more than 20 scores, the GA Handicap calculation uses the best 8 of the player's most recent 20 scores.
