It is not very often a player enters a Newell on the scorecard and he still manages to win the monthly title. Usually a blowout of that magnitude is enough to open the door for other golfers. Not so this month. Incredibly Rick Turcinovic was able to recover from his 10 on the par 5 fourth hole and still finish one stroke better than his nearest rival. With 96 off the stick it was his equal career best score, having previously done it at Warburton in 2011. It was only fitting that Rick be crowned the September winner, especially since he played 16 strokes better than his SLP career average score. The Ringwood title gives Rick his 5th SLP crown and it breaks a long drought because it is his first victory in 5 years. Rick last won at Werribee Park in Aug 2018.

Phil Plane could count himself unlucky, because he too played 16 strokes better than his career statistics would have him predicted to score and his 93 off the stick was just one shot shy of equalling his PB. It would be a bitter pill to swallow knowing that his 3 putt on the 18th green not only cost him the \$2 fine for finishing in the yellow vest, but also it cost him a spot in the champion of champions play offs.

Stu Coops had the lowest gross score for the day. 78 off the stick was a competitive total however three Birdogies and a lost ball from the middle of the 10th fairway were the determining factors in him blowing probably his best chance at claiming a monthly crown and a shot at the blue jacket.

Jayden Orger was a steady performer yet again this month, he finished the Ringwood round very strongly closing with a birdie on the 17th hole and then a par on the challenging eighteenth hole giving him a total score of nett 71 (84 off the stick) which was a career best score for Jayden.

While some players were setting new records, there was plenty of others who found the goings at Ringwood, tough. Despite by classified as an easy golf course and the handicaps had been adjusted accordingly, there was a collection of golfers quivering in the corner of the car park just hoping to find a golfer who had struggled a bit more than they did. In a competition where each players handicap came in by an average 3 and a 1/2 strokes below their official handicap index there was no surprise to see many competitors coming back into the car park with scores that had blown out relative to par. Thomas Cooper was a mental wreck after his round, he went in to the Ringwood round as the defending champion and after parring the first two holes it was looking as though he was a prime candidate to go back to back. Unfortunately for Thomas the mental mind games which come with playing his cagey old man in a match play competition turned out to be his downfall. What Stu lacks in ability and flexibility he makes up for in experience and wisdom. Once the gamesmanship started Thomas did not have a hope, and his game became unravelled before he made it to the proshop.

Thomas racked a Newell on the par 3 eighth hole, which including playing his 7th shot from the tee. Internal out of bounds is always a bugbear on any golf course, and on this instance Thomas found it three times in a row. Thomas' second Newell was also built around losing multiple balls and hitting 5 off the tee when he launched 2 balls in succession straight over the safety fence and into the lake on the 17th hole. By the time he rolled a putt into the hole on the 2nd last green, he had accrued 12 strokes giving him equal billings on the biggest Newell scored for the day. Shane Cumming also made a 12 (Newell plus 2) on the par 5 thirteenth hole.

It was the longer holes on the course which did the major damage to the scorecards. The Par 5 fourth hole was the most punishing, there were 3x Newell's including Rick's. Dale Robinson reached double figures on that same hole, as did Fossey who even went higher than 10. With his handicap slashed down to 7 this month the last thing Graeme wanted to produce was an 11 on the scorecard.

Bo Cartwright was quick to get into the swing of social club activities, he learnt the definition of a Newell after scoring a double digit total on the par 5 sixth hole. Bo also 3 putted the 18th green so he was left with no alternative other than to wear the Flouro Yellow vest into the car park and pay his relevant fines for being the three putt monkey.

The handicapper got busy this month. Even before we hit off we found ourselves playing off a number we are not familiar with. Ringwood is deemed an easy course and this is why there was 3 to 5 strokes taken from your handicap before you struck the first blow. Ten golfers also had downward adjustments after the round. Rick was the most severely hit. He lost 1.2 strokes as punishment for winning the round. Had he not made a Newell on the 4th hole, then the damage to the handicap would have been all the more significant.

Phil Plane was hit with the slashing stick, he came in a full stroke and will find himself teeing it up at Churchill Park golf course with a handicap index of 26.9. Stu Coops and Andrew Clarke lost 0.7 strokes this month, and the No# 1 ranked golf in the club, will be challenged even more after another 0.6 strokes were removed from his still generous handicap. Greg has come down to 25.2 and is on a collision course to go down to his lowest ever handicap which was 23 when he won the seasons points championship.

As a rule, the handicapper likes to share the strokes around. For each person who is cut back on there is usually another who is getting some back. It was a matter of keeping it in the family, with the shots removed from Greg's handicap being allocated to Ronnie.

Graeme Foster will be pleased to know that at least his beer wench worthy performance earned him a 3.6 stroke adjustment to his handicap for when he is wearing the pink vest next month. Foss is one of those cases where a freakishly good round in his early scores is dominating his handicap anchor, and the more rounds he plays the more stable his handicap will become.

As a new member of the Social Club the Callaway Handicapping system is used to give the player a daily played to handicap for the first couple of rounds. Once they have played 3 rounds, they are given a temporary club handicap using the original AGU handicapping system. After 5 rounds they are then switched across to the current slope handicapping system.

For those people interested in the mechanics of the handicapping system it can be best explained as the following.

### How to calculate a GA Handicap

To calculate a player's GA Handicap:

- you must firstly identify the player's most recent 20 scores,
- you then determine the 'Played To' value for each of these scores,
- you average the best 8 'Played To' values,
- and finally you multiply this average by 0.93. The resultant figure (to one decimal place) is the player's GA Handicap.

\* If a player's handicap record contains a lesser number than 20 scores, the number of scores used to calculate the player's handicap is as listed in the table below.

\* There is no requirement for a player's most recent 20 scores to have been returned within a specific timeframe. For example, the most recent 20 scores may span a period of three years or they may span a period of three months.

\* Once a player's handicap record contains 20 scores, the next score they return will result in the oldest of the existing 20 scores being removed (to be replaced by the new score).

For those players not familiar with the scoring process, listed below is the format we use in Sunday Leave Pass competitions.

Once all of the players are ranked then the Seasons Championship points are allocated according to the position in the field.

The player in 1<sup>st</sup> place gets 15 points, 2<sup>nd</sup> place 14 points, 3<sup>rd</sup> place 13 points, etc. etc. Any player who completes the round however finishes ranked outside the top 14 and is placed between 15<sup>th</sup> spot to BeerWench then they are all allocated 1 championship point for attending.

Sunday Leave Pass competitions are run using Stroke so you need to count every shot that you play and you need to finish every hole. Each player's Nett total score is then calculated by deducting the players handicap from the Gross score. If a player doesn't have an official Sunday Leave Pass handicap, then a temporary played to handicap is allocated on the day using the Callaway handicapping system.

Once the players Nett score is calculated they are ranked from lowest score (Monthly title winner) to highest score. (BeerWench) Where more than one player has the same Nett Score then the place allocations are decided based on a countback system. The countback is calculated using the total No# of stableford points scored on the back nine holes. In the event that both players had the same score over the 18 holes then the count back.

### A brief description of how the countback system works.

When more than one player has the same Nett Score (such as in the example below from Ringwood then the place allocations are decided based on a countback system.

The count back system is formulated as the following. \*Total number of stableford points scored on the back nine holes.

\*In the event that both players have the same stableford score on the back nine it then reverts to the number of stableford points scored on the eighteenth hole. If this is the same then it goes to the 17<sup>th</sup> hole, 16th hole, 15th hole etc. until a player has a better hole and therefore a higher stableford score than the other.

The table below shows examples of the countback system in action as it occurred at Ringwood to determine place rankings.

Holes	10-18	In this instance both Andrew and Greg had Nett 73 after their handicap was deducted from the Gross Scores. So, we go back to a countback.			
Andrew	Greg	<p>In this example Greg wins because he scored 19 stableford points on the back nine Holes (10-18) and Andrew is relegated back a place because his back 9 holes only yielded 15 stableford points.</p> <p>If in the event that the countback, then identifies that both players have had the same stableford points score on the back nine then we go back to the individual holes starting from the 18<sup>th</sup> hole and compare results until a player had a standout result. In the example shown on the right from this month both Brad McMahon and Greg Parsons finished their rounds equal with Nett 73. Then on the back nine holes each also had 19 Stableford points. On the 18<sup>th</sup> Brad made a birdie for 4 stableford points compared to Greg's par which was only worth 3 stableford points. Consequently, Brad wins the countback and Greg is relegated back to a lower place and gets the lower points on offer.</p> <p>...PLEASE NOTE THAT THE COUNT BACK IS ON HOLES 10-18 irrespective of whether it is a two-tee start, a normal hit off from the first hole or as in the case of this month at Bayviews where, we hit off both the 1st and 10<sup>th</sup> holes. It is always the 10<sup>th</sup> to 18<sup>th</sup> holes and if one person starts on the 10<sup>th</sup> hole and the other hits off the first hole then it still remains exactly the same formula.</p>

Although all Sunday Leave Pass rounds are scored as stroke events, we use the stableford scoring system to run a skins competition across the entire field.

Phil Plane was the most successful collector of skins this month. Phil parred the hardest hole on the golf course which earned him 4 stableford points, a feat that no other golfer was capable of doing and therefore netted him a six hole skins jackpot. Chris Westhead chipped in for a birdie on the 7th hole. It is very rare to see a golfer scoring 5 stableford points so there was little chance of any other golfers creating a jackpot hole. Stu Coops made 3 birdies on the weekend although he was only able to convert one of them into skins. Stu rolled a putt from off the back of the green making him the first SLP member ever to claim a birdie on the 2nd hole.

Bo Cartwright started his SLP career with a few raffle tickets to go towards the end of year draw, he claimed his skins with a Par on the 4th hole. Rick Turcinovic drained a 40 foot putt for birdie on the 16th hole and the 5 stableford points was a total that no other golfer was able to score. When Jayden and Stu both birdied the 17th hole it created a jackpot skin which Brad McMahon was soon after able to claim when he birdie the 18th hole, with the longest holed putt.

"SKINS" are distributed to those players good enough to win a hole outright. If more than 1 player got the lowest score on a hole it is Jackpotted until an outright winner occurs.

Just a reminder that for every round you play you are automatically awarded a raffle ticket to go towards the end of year raffle, then extra tickets are issued if you wear the official club shirt. Plus, the monthly winner has the option of exchanging the number of balls owed to Raffle tickets for the end of year prize draw as can be any nearest to pin or long drive or other ball prizes.

LONGEST DRIVE






## Match play Stableford knockout competition.

As a new member of the Social Club the Callaway Handicapping system is used to give the player a daily played to handicap for the first couple of rounds. Once they have played 3 rounds, they are given a temporary club handicap using the original AGU handicapping system. After 5 rounds they are then switched across to the current slope handicapping system.

Listed below in the graphic is how the Callaway handicap was worked out for Brad McMahon who finished in 2nd place at Werribee park.

This system is used for determining fair allowances for social golf events that attract novices or occasional golfers. A player's Callaway handicap is determined after each round by deducting from his/her 18-hole gross score the scores of the worst individual holes during the first 16 holes of the round.

In the computation of handicaps under this system:

- No hole may be scored at more than twice its par,
- half strokes count as a whole,
- the 17th and 18th holes are never deducted,

For example, if a player scores 99 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (3 worst holes) +1

If a player scores 82 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their ( worst + ½ the 2<sup>nd</sup> worst hole) -1

If a player scores 120 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (five worst holes) +2

Even if a player has an official golf link, as a matter of consistency we still use the Callaway system to calculate a daily handicap. For the record if Brad had of been playing off of his GA Handicap he would have been playing off 8.

Full Technical Procedure for Calculating a GA Handicap STEP 1 – Use the table below to determine the number of scores to be included in the GA Handicap calculation:

Number of Scores in Player's Handicap Record	Scores to be Used in the Calculation
5 to 6	Best/Lowest 1
7 or 8	Best/Lowest 2
9 or 10	Best/Lowest 3
11 or 12	Best/Lowest 4
13 or 14	Best/Lowest 5
15 or 16	Best/Lowest 6
17 or 18	Best/Lowest 7
19 or 20	Best/Lowest 8

Note: When the handicap record contains more than 20 scores, the GA Handicap calculation uses the best 8 of the player's most recent 20 scores.

The more rounds a golfer plays the more accurately the handicap reflects their average scores. Once 20 rounds have been achieved the slope handicap modelling is operating at optimal efficiency.

The current spread of handicaps with the Social club are as follows:

- 6 percent of our members are classed as single figure golfers
- 44.5 percent of SLP golfers have a handicap between 10 and 19.9
- 40 percent of our golfers have a handicap between 20 and 29.9

## 2022 Champion of Champions



Winner of the blue Jacket and all of its powers for 2023.

For those who have forgotten about the powers bestowed on the Blue Jacket; here is a reminder of how it works.

As the Champion of Champions a player is able to ask any Sunday Leave Pass member to buy him a drink, it is limited to only receiving one drink per member (beer or soft) over the entire year and it can only be done so, if he is wearing the Champion of Champion jacket at the time. This of course does not include new members who did not play at least one or more rounds in season 2022, but not exclusive to those who attended the golf trip. So, if he manages himself correctly, he should be looking at up to 51 free beers or soft drinks over the next 12 months. Now, that is a prize worth aspiring for.

The other condition is that the player must be the one who consumes the drink, he cannot use his power to buy beverages for anyone else. There is also a catch where, if the wearer of the blue jacket asks someone who has previously shouted him a drink, then he must immediately buy them a drink instead. The Champion of champions can also kick in the balance of \$2 per shout to upgrade his beer to bourbons if he prefers to.

Remember that the Champ must be wearing the jacket, He must continue to wear the jacket while he is drinking. If it is too hot to wear the Champion of Champions jacket, that is OK, just choose not to wear it and then you are not eligible for a free drink. All purchased drinks are to be opened so they cannot be taken home for future consumption or to give to dinner guests or visitors. A traveller for the drive home is also OK, so long as it is opened, and the jacket wearer is the one who drinks it.

Remember: In order, to qualify as the Champion of Champions a member just needs to win a monthly title. All of the winners from the monthly championships who are attending the golf trip will then play off for the title based on total accumulated stableford points from 9x Randomly selected holes. The Winner is the person with the most points over those 9 nominated holes, and in the event of a tie then a Countback to determine the winner applies.

NOTE: The Winner of the December title is also eligible to win the competition however they only get to count their scores by using only 8 Randomly selected holes.





