## Spring Park Golf Course Results June



SUNDAY LEAVE PASS 2019
It is amazing the difference a month can make. After what can only be described as a shemozzle at Devils Bend, Spring Park has delivered in Spades. The short flat layout of Spring Park was better suited to the Sunday Leave Pass Social Club prowess and style of play and the proof was in the scoring.

At Devils Bend the average Gross score per player was 105.44 compared to Spring Park where the scores dropped down to an average of 93.14 strokes per head. At Devils Bend not a single player broke their handicap whereas this month 7 players shot a Nett score of par or better. At Spring Park, the average Nett Score was 6.76 Strokes over par, compared to Devils Bend where the average player finished 12.06 strokes behind an even par round. So why the significant difference? Comparing the scores summary of the two rounds and the picture is pretty clear. It was all in the Pars. There were almost an extra 100 pars scored at Spring Park at an average of 2.77 extra pars per player.

Interestingly the number of Newell's (score of 10 or more) went up, and the highest Newell which was actually a Geoff (a double Newell (score of 20 or more) was achieved by Brendan MacIsaac who had a blow out in the bunker on the $16^{\text {th }}$ hole.
So, who were the big improvers, I'm sure you didn't ask however we are going to tell you anyway, because without an abundance of photographs this month we are struggling for content? Below is a list of all of the players who attended both the May and June rounds and their corresponding scores. Interestingly each of the 26 players who played both courses improved their scores this month.

As a collective group there was a total of 307 strokes fewer at Spring Park at an average improvement of 12.19 strokes per player over the 26 players. Tony Grasso improved by the most taking almost $25 \%$ less hits this month although the Supercaoach alleges that he just didn't count as many of them this time. Either way an improvement of 25 strokes was an impressive effort and good enough to improve his way into first place.

Interestingly these numbers could have been even a whole lot better too, were it not for a few incidents when players had a slight difficulty getting out of the bunkers. Steve O'Sullivan for instance started his day with the perfect drive. His ball finished just 20 meters short of the green in the middle of the fairway. Unfortunately, his next shot dropped short of the green and landed in the greenside bunker. Oh dear!!!!! What should have been an easy par quickly deteriorated into a very lucky Newell plus 2. (A Score of 10 or more plus an extra 2 shots (12.) SOS swatted at the ball 7 times in the bunker before smashing it out sideways in a flash of frustration. Interestingly SOS caught the ball clean out of the bunker with his angry swing and his ball took off into the forest between the first and ninth holes. Fortunately, the ball caught a lucky break and it rebounded off a fallen tree stump or else it would have been a certain lost ball and he would then have been still stuck playing in the bunker with an extra two strokes to his name.

After the disastrous first hole SOS then played the rest of the golf course 3 over par except for another blemish on the $17^{\text {th }}$ hole when funnily enough he got bogged in another bunker. I could talk about all of those 11 strokes in blow by blow detail however I would hate to haunt the El Presidente' who will be having nightmares about the 23 strokes he amassed in just two holes which ultimately cost him the monthly title. To put things in perspective SOS had 40 stableford points over 16 holes so even a bogey on one or both of those holes would have had him in the brilliant once in a lifetime golf score range.

SOS wasn't the only player to audition for an excavator's apprenticeship. Greg Parsons had 6 holes in the one bunker, the Supercoach dug a hole so deep in the bunker on the $10^{\text {th }}$ hole that no one could here him talking for 5 minutes while he accrued his only Newell for the round. Brendan MacIsaac finished his day with more sand in his shoes than a Saharan nomad. Brendan had 3x Newell's for the day and each was a tale of woe at the bottom of the deep faced Spring Parkian bunkers.

Brendan's biggest disaster was on the par $3,16^{\text {th }}$ hole when his tee shot found the greenside bunker and then some time later his putt rolled into the hole for a final score of 17 over par, 20. Otherwise known as a Geoff. In between, the beginning and end there were lots of swear words, a cubic meter of sand shifted and more disappointing swings than the Queensland Labor Party electoral regions. It took Brendan 16 tries to get his ball out of the bunker and that was all that was required for his day to be go from average to the worst. With the first Geoff (score of 20 or more) posted for the 2019 season Brendan was relegated back into last place and he has therefore cemented his third ticket in the battle of the beer wenches challenge at the golf trip at Howlong.

Brendan did have a valid excuse for not having the strength to swing the club hard enough through the sand to extract his ball out of the trap. He was forced to play his shots one handed because 4 x holes earlier he had been smashed in the arm by an errant Steve O'Sullivan 8 iron.

Despite being coached by Mick Harper on numerous occasions, about the etiquette of golf Brendan, had been continuously parking his motorized golf cart at the front of the putting greens and therefore holding up the group behind as they were repeatedly forced to wait for Brendan to walk back into the line of play to collect his cart before driving the long way to the next teeing area. SOS had had enough by the $13^{\text {th }}$ hole and he decided to fire a warning shot and give Brendan the hurry up. The only issue was that SOS's warning shot was a little bit too close, in fact it was so close that after 4 x strained paniced calls of FORE!!!!!! The El Presidente's golf ball hit Brendan flush on the forearm on the fly. The bruising was perfectly rounded, and you could even see the dimples of the golf ball imprinted into Brendan's skin. If he wasn't already hurting from his bad back, buggered kneecaps and dislocating shoulders and rib cage, the swollen forearm was the final straw.


Brendan's beloved loyal son tried to seek out some revenge for his father, by hitting his golf ball at some unsuspecting random people. Leigh launched two successive golf balls straight into the local nursing home from the $15^{\text {th }}$ tee. Evidently one of the balls did actually hit one of the dementia patient residents who was out in the gardens at the Applewood aged care center. However, Leigh was quite lucky because when the resident came to speak to management about the incident, by the time they had arrived at the golf course to complain they had forgotten what they were actually there for so they simply asked for directions on how to get home again. Although there was no lawsuit or liability claim against Leigh he did have to mark a Newell plus 1 on his scorecard.

Steve Powne nearly caused a traffic pile up on Springvale Road when he waved good-bye to his lucky ball on the $14^{\text {th }}$ hole. Steve had only just finished singing the praise of his favorite golf ball after he had a holed out his fourth shot with a seven iron for a par from 150 meters out from the $13^{\text {th }}$ green. The very next hole demanded an identical shot, as he stood on the tee Steve was 150 meters out and once again with the 7 iron in his hand. To repeat the same shot again would mean a hole in one, and Stevo the par 3 specialist was brimming with confidence. Sadly, it wasn't the case, Steve had used all of his luck or skills on the previous hole and he pushed the ball straight over the fence and into oncoming traffic on the busy Springvale Road.

For your own personal protection, it is highly recommended that you cover yourself with Public Liability insurance cover and protect yourself against a possible civil lawsuit just in case you ever do accidentally hit or injure someone while on the golf course. Your green fees do not indemnify you from the liability for damages you cause while chasing the little white ball around the paddock. To put it into perspective a few years back a casual social golfer in Queensland was successfully sued for damages to the value of $\$ 2.6$ million dollars after his golf ball severely injured another player. The easiest way to get insurance is to get an official handicap which includes your insurance cover from an affiliated accredited organisation.

One player who was right on target was Phil Plane, he decided that after 16 holes he had had enough putts for the afternoon, so he put the putter in the rack and never used it for the last two holes. There was no way Phil was going to be getting the three-putt monkey vest as he made gobblers ( 0 putt greens on the $17^{\text {th }}$ and $18^{\text {th }}$ Holes). Gobblers were a plenty on Sunday. Mick Harper opened his account on the very first hole with a holed chip-in from off the green. Jason Mladenis chipped in for a birdie on the second hole and Gerard MacIsaac scrambled a par from no man's land by playing the perfect chip on the fourth hole.

The small greens at Spring Park still proved to be difficult, although some players relished in the conditions whereas others found the greens treacherous and spent most of the day swapping in and out of the three-putt monkey vest. It was obvious how Stuart Cooper spends his days while working at Spring Park Golf Course. When you run 2 mini golf courses and Spring Park Golf Course you would be expected to be a good putter, well history says this is not usually the case however on Sunday Stu was deadly with the flat stick. Stu Coops made the turn having only putted 14 times and incredibly on his back nine he only had 11 putts for a total of 25 for the day. Seven one putts and 2 two putts in 9 holes is an exceptional day with the flat stick.

There were many players who had three putt free rounds. Todd Neilson, Stu, Cam D, Brent Douglas, Steve Powne, Tom K and Mick Harper all had perfect putting scores and never gave up the option of wearing the flouro yellow vest. On the other extreme there were many players who struggled to get the ball into the hole. One can only wonder how good Jason Mladenis' score could have been had he not had $5 x$ three putts for the day, Rick Turcinovic had a rare 4 putt free round however with $33 \%$ of his greens being three putted he did little to help his place rankings and probably putted himself out of a first place finish. Matt Robinson had a couple of three putts and was also asked to kick in a fine for having a four putt on the $15^{\text {th }}$ hole which also cost him his second Newell (score of 10 or more) for the day. With 40 putts including 4 three putts and 3 four putts Colin Ewart must have been very close to the Worst on green award. Carl Schwarz was not much better he had 4 three putts and 2 four putts, although he was better than Newell who donated $\$ 6$ into the fine jar for his $3 x$ four putted greens. Although Tony Mac avoided having a four putt, he was left holding the yellow vest after his $5^{\text {th }}$ three putted green for the afternoon.

It should be noted that if you found the greens at Spring Park hard to negotiate then you need to be prepared for a world of pain next round at Bayviews Golf Course where the greens are almost twice as fast and they are also almost magical in that the ball will break against the laws of gravity. Remember the golden rule at Baviews, "the ball will always roll towards the water."

Congratulations to Jason Mladenis who is racing up the eclectic stroke rankings, Jason had three birdies on Sunday including back to back birdies on the $12^{\text {th }}$ and $13^{\text {th }}$ holes. That is some pretty hot golf.

Speaking of hot golf, it was great to have the company of Jason from the House of Golf -Ringwood who are our official major Club Sponsor. Jason Daly joined us for a round on Sunday and he showed the advantage of playing with the best possible equipment the marketplace has available. Jason was like an English darts world champion when it came to hitting into the par 3 holes. He hit 7 out of 8 of the par 3 holes in regulation and most of is putts for birdie were inside three meters of the flagstick. Jason had 10 pars and a birdie for the day and with a score of 75 off the stick, he had the lowest gross score for the day and was allocated a Callaway handicap of 4. Putting let Jason down, if that is within the realms of possibility when you shoot 75 off the stick. Not only does Jason contribute to the Sunday Leave Pass social club in a form of a very generous sponsorship deal however he was also kind enough to donate a few bucks for his 4 putt and he was also very close to wearing the three putt monkey vest home at the end of the $18^{\text {th }}$ hole.

Well done to Slinky who also kicked into to the financial status of the golf club this month. Before the round Stu Coops generously donated the use of his golf cart and then the social club then put up for grabs 6 beers as part of a cart hire package. It was decided that the highest bidder would receive 18 holes cart hire valued at $\$ 30$ and a six pack of cold frothies valued at (\$18) in an auction for the cart package. Slinky kept his hand up for the entire auction and finally bought the prize for $\$ 20$. This was a commendable effort especially since he doesn't even drink beer. Slinky won a few friends by sharing the liquid gold with a few different golfers around the golf course but enjoyed the relaxation of driving around the 18 holes in relative comfort. Great effort Slinky.

Don't forget to be at the course before your allocated tee time, we are debating whether we actually put out the groups in advance because too many people are arriving late and therefore stuffing up the groups or holding back the tee off times. SOS was in shock when he arrived at Highways house to collect him and take him to golf early on Sunday morning only to be met at the door by the Buddhist monk still in his dressing gown. It appears Highway got his times a little wrong.


Ronnie Parsons also rolled in late, his group were actually putting on the first green as Ronnie arrived at the first tee. The only excuse we would have forgiven Ronnie for would have been if he had turned back half way to Spring Park in order to go back home because he had forgotten the Champion of Champions jacket however sadly that wasn't even the case because Ron actually forgot the jacket as well. This is the third of 6 months Ronnie has left a few more free beers unclaimed.

Anthony Emmerson otherwise formerly known as Egga was also late to the tee. Or was he early, we are not quite sure which way to call it, because for some reason Anthony was planning has day around a 12:09 hit off instead of a 9:12 tee time. I think Egga might be given the nickname Egga Timer although you wouldn't want to cook your dinner based on what time he is likely to turn up. Once he was finally out on the golf course Anthony proved he could play golf. He was very good on the par 3 holes making a $50 \%$ par ratio which is a very impressive effort. There were a few bad holes however we are not sure whether these weren't a deliberate ploy under the guidance of his mate Cam who also has demonstrated a very consistent pattern of score manipulation under the Callaway handicapping system.

Remember for the first three rounds the newbies play off a Callaway Handicap.


This system is used for determining fair allowances for social golf events that attract novices or occasional golfers. A player's Callaway handicap is determined after each round by deducting from his/her 18-hole gross score the scores of the worst individual holes during the first 16 holes of the round.

In the computation of handicaps under this system:
-No hole may be scored at more than twice its par,

- half strokes count as a whole,
- the 17th and 18th holes are never deducted,

For example, if a player scores 99 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their ( 3 worst holes) +1

If a player scores 82 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their ( 1 x worst $+1 / 2$ the $2^{\text {nd }}$ worst hole) -1

If a player scores 120 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (five worst holes) +2

These handicaps are then taken off the players gross score for 18 holes to give a Nett score and therefore a place ranking just the same as we do with all members with an official Sunday Leave Pass handicap.

Congratulations to our June winner. Tony Grasso had a very successful outing, not only did he have the lowest Nett score for the day, but he also convincingly posted the longest drive prize as well. Tom Kellythorn is making a late surge towards the top of the points leaderboard. He finished in $2^{\text {nd }}$ place and collected 14 championship points which brings him to within 10 points of the current leader. Local knowledge and the home ground advantage certainly helped Stu Coops who recorded his career best round. It has only taken him 179 rounds to finally break the 80 barrier although given the course is a par 66 it certainly isn't as great of an achievement as it sounds. Even with some terrible putting performances Rick Turcinovic and Barry Hemsley both scored career defining rounds, Rick equaled his career best score 96 and Barry also beat his previous lowest round record. If only they hadn't wasted so many shots on the green, they could have easily finished in higher rankings than $4^{\text {th }}$ and $5^{\text {th }}$ respectively.

For those players not familiar with the scoring process, listed below is the format we use in Sunday Leave Pass competitions.
Once all of the players are ranked then the Seasons Championship points are allocated according to the position in the field.
The player in $1^{\text {st }}$ place gets 15 points, $2^{\text {nd }}$ place 14 points, $3^{\text {rd }}$ place 13 points, etc etc. Any player who completes the round however finishes ranked outside the top 14 and is placed between $15^{\text {th }}$ spot to BeerWench then they are all allocated 1 championship point for attending.

For the benefit of the newcomers or the uneducated we thought it would be a good opportunity to go through the player rankings and point scoring system again.

Sunday Leave Pass competitions are run using Stroke, so you need to count every shot that you play, and you need to finish every hole. Each players Nett total score is then calculated by deducting the players handicap from the Gross score. If a player doesn't have an official Sunday Leave Pass handicap, then a temporary played to handicap is allocated on the day using the Callaway handicapping system.

Once the players Nett score is calculated they are ranked from lowest score to highest score. (BeerWench) Where more than one player has the same Nett Score (such as in the example below the place allocations are decided based on a countback system.

The count back system is formulated as the following.
*Total number of stableford points scored on the back nine holes.
*In the event that both players have the same stableford score on the back nine it then reverts to the number of stableford points scored on the eighteenth hole. If this is the same then it goes to the $17^{\text {th }}$ hole, sixteenth hole, fifteenth hole until a player has a better hole and therefore has a higher stableford score than the other.

As a new member of the Social Club the Callaway Handicapping system is used to give the player a daily played to handicap for the first couple of rounds. Once they have played 3 rounds, they are given a temporary club handicap using the original AGU handicapping system. After 5 rounds they are then switched across to the current slope handicapping system.

For those people interested in the mechanics of the handicapping system it can be best explained as the following.

How to calculate a GA Handicap
To calculate a player's GA Handicap:

- you must firstly identify the player's most recent 20 scores,
- you then determine the 'Played To' value for each of these scores,
- you average the best 8 'Played To' values,
- and finally you multiply this average by $\mathbf{0 . 9 3}$. The resultant figure (to one decimal place) is the player's GA Handicap.
* If a player's handicap record contains a lesser number than 20 scores, the number of scores used to calculate the player's handicap is as listed in the table below.
* There is no requirement for a player's most recent 20 scores to have been returned within a specific timeframe. For example, the most recent 20 scores may span a period of three years or they may span a period of three months.
* Once a player's handicap record contains 20 scores, the next score they return will result in the oldest of the existing 20 scores being removed (to be replaced by the new score).

Full Technical Procedure for Calculating a GA Handicap

STEP 1 - Use the table below to determine the number of scores to be included in the GA Handicap calculation:

Note: When the handicap record contains more than 20 scores, the GA Handicap calculation uses the best 8 of the player's most recent 20 scores.


Take Warren Perrett for Instance. He has now played 8 rounds with the club and his Best round was 13 over par and his next best round once again at Dorset is 27 over par or better described as a combined score differential of 40 . When this value is divided by 2 and is then multiplied by 0.93 his official handicap is 18.6 which was rounded to 19.0 . If he had actually played 20 rounds and the scores listed above were his best 6 scores, then his handicap would actually be 33.25. or rounded back to 33.3 .

The more rounds a member plays the more reflective the handicap becomes of their skill level. Once a player has played 20 or more rounds each month the $20^{\text {th }}$ round is dropped off and replaced with a new score. This is the point where a score inside the top 8 might drop off and be replaced by a higher score meaning the handicap goes up even though the player carded a decent performance.

The handicapper was in a little more slash happy this month. The handicapping scissors were taken to Barry \& Rick 0.7 strokes, Dale 0.4 strokes, Stu Coops was wiped of 1.2, Tony Grasso's victory cost him 1.1 and Tom and T Mac copped a little shave and Wayne James also dropped half of a full shot. At the other end of the spectrum Cam Ross, Cliff Rowe and Phil Plane were loaded up with almost a full extra shot for next month at Bayviews, and for some strange reason the current points championship leader was allocated a bonus 0.4 strokes as if he needs any help. Newell, Slinky and Douggo were given a little incentive bonus and Gerard MacIsaac has plummeted out to his highest ever Sunday Leave Pass Handicap after playing on Single figures for the last 140 rounds suddenly he has dropped out to an 11 handicap where he is sure to be dangerous.

[^0]:    In this instance from Dorset both Mick and Supercoach had Nett 66 after their handicap was deducted from the Gross Scores. So, we go back to a countback.

    In this example Mick wins and gets the higher place finish. Mick had 18 points on the back nine compared to Fil who could only conjure up 17 stableford points on the back nine and was therefore relegated down a place.

    If in the event that the countback then identifies that both players have had the same stableford points score on the back nine then we go back to the individual holes starting from the $18^{\text {th }}$ hole and compare results until a player had a standout result. In the example shown on the right from both Rick and Barry at Dorset, each of them had 18 Stableford points. Since Barry had a bogey for 2 points whereas poor Rick only had a score of 6 for 1 points on the $18^{\text {th }}$ hole therefore Barry wins the countback and Rick is relegated back to a lower place ranking. If both scores are equal then we go back to the $17^{\text {th }}$ hole, then the $16^{\text {th }}$, etc etc.

    PLEASE NOTE THAT THE COUNT BACK IS ON HOLES $10-18$ irrespective of whether it is a two-tee start, a normal hit off from the first hole or as in the case of Warburton or Devils Bend where we hit off the $10^{\text {th }}$ hole and the $1^{\text {st }}$ hole. It is always the $10^{\text {th }}$ to $18^{\text {th }}$ holes and if one person starts on the $10^{\text {th }}$ hole and the other hits off the first hole then it still remains exactly the same formula.
