SUNDAY LEAVE PASS 2018

Never in Sunday Leave Pass history has a round gone so pair shaped so quickly as did Jamie Brunton's at Spring Park on Sunday. Brunto was full of confidence having won the monthly title on the golf trip last year, he was crowned the Champion of Champions at the end of 2017 and then his last jaunt at Warburton was also very successful with him finishing in 2nd place to Brendan Seagrave by only 1 stroke in spite of carding a quadruple bogie on the 18th hole. Jamie has been grooming his game with regular lessons (not quite Newell Richards regular but the occasional lesson anyway) with the club Professional at his home course Green Acres Golf Club. Leading into Spring Park Jamie's game was in a pretty good space. That was until the first shot at Spring Park which he shanked into the timber dumping grounds between the first and second fairways. As soon as he hit the ball into the trees Stu said to him that he had better hit another one cos it was in terrain where elephants go to die. The look on Jamie's face as he turned the corner and saw the inevitable reality that he would be lucky to find his way back out again let alone his golf ball was priceless. The usual unflappable Jamie was furious, and his game turned to crap before he had even begun. Jamie swore revenge against the trees that had cost him a penalty shot and by the end of the first hole he had dinted or bruised at least 7 of them. After taking a couple of shots to get his ball out of a bunker and a few more chips and putts Brunto's first hole ended with an eventful Newell (Score of 10 or more) plus three or five. Jamie is not the only player in SLP history to fall victim to have a horror start at Spring Park. The short first hole at Spring Park has brought plenty of golfers back to reality. A couple of years ago SOS bounced from bunker to bunker continuously until he finally finished the hole with a 11 after playing the front nine just 1 over par and who could ever forget Big Ball Breasley's effort to equal Geoff Coopers record for the highest score on a single hole. Greg actually scored a 24 on the 300 meter par 4 first hole at Spring Park in 2017.




The first hole shouldn't really be that much of a challenge. All it takes is a straight drive, a short to mid iron approach shot into the green and a putt or two. Wayne James got the day off to a start by kicking the frost off the grass for the rest of us and he followed this simple plan to achieve success. Wayne parred the first hole and continued in the same vain as he coasted around the golf course to finish with an impressive 84 off the stick, Nett 69, which earnt him enough points to move 6 points clear on the points season championship order of merit. The lead group were in the ideal position advantageous to succeed because when they arrived at each green there was just a few putting break lines in the frost where balls from previous golfers before them had been hit. This made reading the greens a simple task and meant they were able to motor around the course, they finished 45 minutes ahead of the second group.

The challenge you can have when you hit off further down the field is that you end up having to deal with everyone else's mess. Poor Jamie Brunton, who was having a tough day of it as it was, soon discovered this when he landed in the green side bunker on the tenth hole. It was embarrassing to see that one of our golf members had been in the bunker walking around and had walked out again without raking the sand after they finished. Jamie's ball landed in the middle of the footprints making his bunker shot all of the more difficult than it needed to be.



Unfortunately, Jamie took a couple of extra shots to extract his ball from the compacted sand and he justifiably blames the moron who didn't rake the bunker for his demise on the hole. The only good news for Jamie was that even with a score of eight on the hole with three shots in the bunker he had still improved his score by 5 shots or more compared to his first effort.

Spring Park management and Victoria Police forensics department will be analyzing the tread pattern of the footprints and once the perpetrator has been identified then that player will be kicking in a \$10 note into the fine jar. So be warned we will be checking every SLP members golf shoes next month, so if your sole pattern looks like this it might be wise to invest in a new pair of shoes.



It is worth noting the importance of golf course maintenance. We all play enough golf to understand that we need to be raking the bunkers, replacing (sanding) divots and repairing the pitch marks on the greens. It was very obvious on Sunday that our group is failing in many of these areas especially the pitch marks and by the time we were on the second nine it was embarrassing and frustrating to see how many players were not performing this simple task. Barry asked for his \$10 fine accrual to be waivered because he figure he had repaired at least 100 divots out of the greens and at price of 10 cents per pitch mark that was the cost of his fines covered.

It was fantastic to have Rob Underwood make the journey down from Red Cliff for the Spring Park round, after reading last months blurb about Tom Kellythorn racking up the miles from Point Cook to Mt Martha, Undies thought it was appropriate for him to commit the trip back to Melbourne to play a round of golf with us. Admittedly, based on his track record this is probably the only way and time Rob will ever be able to lay claim to the longest drive but it was definitely great to have his chirpy laughter amongst the social group. Undies proved that the first hole can be beaten, and he achieved this feat through mastery with the wedge. Rob holed his pitch shot on the first hole and followed it up on the second with a tap in putt on the second hole when he chipped within 6 inches of back to back zero putts.

As a means to avoid the pitch mark crater pock marked greens many players opted to avoid having to putt at all, Newell, Barry, Undies, B Mac and Ronnie all had Gobblers. Ronnie had so much fun the first time that he rammed his ball into the hole on the Par three 3rd hole that he repeated the feat again on the 16th hole for a noteworthy achievement of 2x none putters in the one round.



It was a great day for Ron, his new knee appears to have been just what the golf pro ordered. Ron posted a career best score. 88 off the stick. Nett 62 was the best score for the day and this rewarded Ron with his sixth Sunday Leave Pass monthly title by a convincing four strokes.


Rumor has it that Ron has been working with his golf pro at Pakenham golf club and his orthopedic surgeon to tailor a plan to improve his golfing prowess during the golden years of his retirement. Evidently the recent knee surgery has worked wonders for his golf however this is allegedly only stage 1 of a multifaceted model to biomechanically rebuild his body to become the ultimate golfing specimen.



At one stage Barry Hemsley was thinking that he might need to see Ron's orthopedic surgeon to get his entire legs shortened. Poor Barry managed to position himself into some very difficult stances. When he just missed hitting his ball in the lake with his drive on the fourth hole Barry was forced to either take a stance from the lake bed or have a swing at the ball playing left handed. Incredibly he managed to hit his ball across the lake and back into the fairway which was a vast improvement on many of the other unimpeded shots that he played out on the course during the duration of the day.



On the seventh hole Barry once again managed to set himself up with another difficult stance from the edge of the water. The seventh hole was not a happy hunting ground for Bazza because on both occasions that he played the hole he actually had a score of 8 on what is reputed as the easiest hole on the Spring Park layout. On the first time around the course Barry Bladed his ball into the lake, and then on the second time around his ball skimmed around the outskirts of the lake and come to rest in a position calling for a miraculous, (Phil Mickelson style) hands forward of the feet flop shot or a left-handed swing. Barry opted for the hands swing which resulted firstly with an air-swing which buried the ball further into the rough and then on his second attempt he pulled the ball straight into the middle of the lake.



It was a tough day for Barry as a whole. The battle between him and Spring Park was a significant victory in favor of the golf course. There were a few flashes of potential and a couple of good shots dispersed amongst a procession of misery and character building moments.

Barry was however pleased to announce that he had had a perfect success record and told all who cared to listen that he was 9 out of nine for getting out of the bunkers with the first shot. This was definitely a great effort compared to some other golfers who required multiple attempts to extricate the ball from the sand, however why he was in the bunker nine times makes you question whether he might have been doing something badly in the first place to get in the hazard so many times.

According to Barry the strength of his game, and the one thing he can do very well and without thinking about it, is his putting. Admittedly Barry did putt pretty consistently and as a rule he was always leaving his first putt very close to the hole.

His only blemish was on the 15th hole when, only seconds after telling his partners how good at putting that he was Barry missed a 2 footer to earn the responsibility of wearing the 3 Putt Monkey vest and the consequence was that he had to wear it all of the way home to the club house and copped a \$2 fine for being the 3 putt monkey.

Rob underwood only had one 2 putt green on the entire front nine, after chipping in on the first hole and making a tap in one putt on the second hole he suddenly lost his ability to hit the ball near the hole, He three putted the holes 3 through 5, sank a short tap in on the sixth hole then three putted the seventh and racked up a fine for a four-putt green on the 8th hole.

Interestingly in spite the poor form with the flat stick, Undies was still not the worst putter for the day. Brendan MacIsaac had a shocker with the putter and wasted shots aplenty as he ultimately putted his way out of another top 10 placing. Brendan finished the round having knocked the ball around 44 times with the putter on a golf course where the average putts per player was only 34 strokes per golfer.

Even with the putter working against him Brendan still managed to avoid the beer wench vest for the third month in succession. Having posted 3x Newell's (score of 10 or more) on the front nine Jamie Brunton knew that with 66 on the front nine he was in poll-position for Beer-wenching duties. Jamie actually made a detour and crossed over two fairways to visit Brendan Mac just to inquire on how Brendan was tracking. Obviously, Jamie was looking for some blue sky on what was, a very challenging dark day for him. At the end of the round the title of Beer Wench was never in doubt, Brendan Mac actually beat Jamie off the stick and with an 11 stroke handicap buffer Jamie was always destined to be dressed in pink for being the worst golfer on the day.

Jamie managed to hit almost every tree on the Spring Park Golf Course and believe me when I say there are a lot of them. Although 122 strokes was not his worst ever score with the Social Club (he shot 132 at Rosebud in June 2006) it was a devastating experience for Jamie and he will not be in a great hurry to take on the Spring Park Course again any time soon. The fairways felt too narrow and the trees appeared to continually jump out at Jamie's ball and impede a well struck shot. The worst incident was on the Par 3 seventh hole when Jamie tried to hit his ball back into the playing area after he shanked his tee shot out in to the scrub on the right-hand side of the lake. Amazingly when Brunto found his ball he discovered that he had a clear line back towards the green. He hit a perfect nine iron over the lake and the ball looked to be destined to land on the green or at worst the greenside bunker. Unfortunately, there was a solitary over hanging branch which the golf ball hit flush. The Taylormade 04 golf ball bounced backwards off the tree branch and landed in the middle of the lake. Jamie took his penalty and dropped a new one. When he pitched the ball back towards the flagstick, the only thing he did not take into consideration was that the branch that he had just knocked his ball into was still obstructing a 15 cm diameter area of his flight path. Amazingly, and much to the amusement of his playing partners the ball once again hit the middle of the small branch, bounced off the cart path and rolled slow backwards down the embankment into the bottom of the lake. Jamie's third attempt still hit the leaves on the same tree and was repelled back towards him although on this occasion even though the ball rolled backwards towards the lake it managed to stop 30cm short of suffering the same fate as the previous two golf balls.

Perhaps Jamie needs to invest in some of the mystical magical golf balls that Stu Cooper was playing with on Sunday. While Jamie's balls were finding any possible way to get lost, Stu's golf ball on the other hand mysteriously reappeared after being

blasted into another postcode outside the course boundary and onto Springvale Road. Jamie and the Supercoach have prenominated Stu as the 2018 sure-thing Leather Wedge candidate after they watched him smash a ball over the out of bounds fence onto Springvale Road and then to see and hear Stu only 2 minutes later claim to have found the same golf ball with the same markings not only inside the golf course perimeter but in a position to hit the ball at the green (or so he claims anyway). Fil was also pretty keen to let it be known that he was not the only one who accrued a \$5-00 fine for failing to drive past the squatters tees. The only difference between Stu's and Marks efforts was that Stu's ball did actually get passed the tees and then ricocheted back behind them whereas Marks drive never got to the red tees in the first place.

Fil was in a utopian flow state, he parred 4 of the first five holes on Sunday and his only blemish was a bogie on the third hole after he left a 2 meter putt short by a revolution and a half. To put it into context, while the world was crumbling in around Jamie, Stu and Barry, Fil couldn't do a thing wrong. Nothing brings more pain to an already frustrating day as when you have Mark Sfiligoj telling you how good he is. It's no coincidence that all three of his playing partners on Sunday finished within the bottom 5 place rankings for the day whereas Fil finished in 3rd place. Mark shot 38 off the stick for the front nine and he looked to have the day won, except that he got over confident and choked on a pile of his own verbal diarrhea.

Barry should have been dealt a \$5-00 fine for not getting past the ladies tees when he duffed his drive on the Par 3 fifth hole. However the only saving grace for Bazza was that the ladies tees were located behind the mens tees otherwise his 1 meter drive with the hybrid club would have been a certainty to not get passed the red markers.

Brendan MacIsaac went one better, we are still not quite sure how he actually did it however according to his son Leigh who was a witness at the time, Brendan managed to top the ball directly into the ground and it bounced back up and hit himself in the stomach.

Special thanks to Gerard and the boys in the first group who managed to utilize the 45 minutes they finished ahead of the rest of the field to cook the BBQ for us. It was nice to have all of the food prepped and ready for us as we finished and another special thanks goes to Barry for supplying the Jeff Horn fight on the small screen TV. Who would have ever imagined that 24 blokes could all gather around a mobile phone to watch an Aussie school teacher go head to head with an American power punching machine.

Although it was great to watch the boxing in full color, the greatest highlight in full color for the day was watching Andrew Clarke skulk back into the car park wearing the bright fluorescent three putt monkey vest. In spite of his totally unconventional

putting technique and his regular ability to three putt Andrew had never finished the 18th hole with the yellow vest on his shoulders in his previous 43 rounds of golf with the Sunday Leave Pass Social club. Andrew had been quite vocal about his ability to avoid the vest so it came as a welcome relief for everyone to finally see him silenced after 3 putting the 17th hole and being left to carry it all of the way home.

It is often very difficult to silence Andrew especially after a good round, Clarkey is just about as loud and self-promoting around the esky as the supercoach is. The only way to shut him up that we know of is the same technique which a parent uses with a

troublesome new born baby. Put him in the car and the movement will rock him into silence and put him to sleep.

For the benefit of the newcomers or the uneducated we thought it would be a good opportunity to go through the player rankings and point scoring system again.

Once all of the players are ranked then the Seasons Championship points are allocated according to the position in the field. The player in 1st place gets 15 points, 2nd place 14 points, 3rd place 13 points, etc. etc. Any player who completes the round however finishes ranked outside the top 14 and is placed between 15th spot to BeerWench then they are all allocated 1 championship point for attending.

The player with the most points at the end of the year is crowned the Points champion irrespective of how many rounds a person has played. If one person plays 13 rounds for the year and the person in 2nd place has only played 10 rounds but is close to the same score, then that is bad luck to the person in 2nd place. All players are invited to play the entire fixture. We reward participation rather than perfection and performance so if you play more often you will end up with more points.

Sunday Leave Pass competitions are run using Stroke, so you need to count every shot that you play, and you need to finish every hole. Each players Nett total score is then calculated by deducting the players handicap from the Gross score. If a player doesn't have an official Sunday Leave Pass handicap, then a temporary played to handicap is allocated on the day using the Callaway handicapping system.

On a what can only be describes as a short yet very difficult golf course Spring Park conceded a large collection of smaller skins jackpot wins. There were 92 pars achieved for the day at an average of 3.8 pars per golfer yet the course only conceded the one birdie for the day and that was to Shane Cumming who birdied the 10th hole to win himself a couple of skins. The biggest Jackpot was Newell Richards who won 4 skins with a Par on the 5th hole and Ronnie Parsons who won 3 skins with consecutive pars on the 13th and 14th holes.

There was very little adjustment to the handicaps this month. Cam Ross copped a good whack as he moved from the temporary handicap to the official slope handicap. Cams official handicap starts at 23.2 compared to the handicap of 25.4 which he has been playing off previously.

Newell Richards has moved into a new handicap level and he will be starting his round at Beacon Hills playing off 24.0. Newell has dropped 11 shots in less than 2 years so credit must be given to the golf pro, Darren Rowland at Ringwood who has achieved some incredible results with highway in such a short space of time. Ronnie Parson will be stripped of a full stroke for next month, as he has come in from 26.8 to 25.8.

Interestingly the only two golfers to have an outward adjustment to the handicap were Gerard and Tony MacIsaac who probably played their best rounds for the year. Gerard shot 78 off the stick yet he goes out 0.1 strokes and Bambi was also given an extra 0.1 strokes as the handicapper shows some sympathy and generosity to Tony for such a close finish.

Some may ask how Tony could finish in 2nd place yet have his handicap go out. The reason is that his 20th round which was one of his top 8 scored dropped off (29 over par at Yarrambat) and it was replaced with his new score (30 over par at Spring Park) which leads to a slightly outward adjustment.

BOLD GREEN NUMBERS- refer to players whose handicap has come in


BOLD BLACK NUMBERS- refer to players whose handicap has remained unchanged

As a new member of the Social Club the Callaway Handicapping system is used to give the player a daily played to handicap for the first couple of rounds. Once they have played 3 rounds they are given a temporary club handicap using the original AGU handicapping system. After 5 rounds they are then switched across to the current slope handicapping system.



For example, if a player scores 99 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (3 worst holes) +1

If a player scores 82 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (worst + ½ the 2nd worst hole) -1

If a player scores 120 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (five worst holes) +2

For those people interested in the mechanics of the handicapping system it can be best explained as the following.

How to calculate a GA Handicap

To calculate a player's GA Handicap:

- you must firstly identify the player's most recent 20 scores,
- you then determine the 'Played To' value for each of these scores,
- you average the best 8 'Played To' values,
- and finally you multiply this average by 0.93. The resultant figure (to one decimal place) is the player's **GA Handicap.**
- * If a player's handicap record contains a lesser number than 20 scores, the number of scores used to calculate the player's handicap is as listed in the table below.
- * There is no requirement for a player's most recent 20 scores to have been returned within a specific timeframe. For example, the most recent 20 scores may span a period of three years or they may span a period of three months.
- * Once a player's handicap record contains 20 scores, the next score they return will result in the oldest of the existing 20 scores being removed (to be replaced by the new score).

Full Technical Procedure for Calculating a GA Handicap

STEP 1 – Use the table below to determine the number of scores to be included in the GA Handicap calculation:

Number of Scores in Player's Handicap Scores to be Used in the Record Calculation 5 to 6 Best/Lowest 1 7 or 8 Best/Lowest 2 9 or 10 Best/Lowest 3

11 or 12 Best/Lowest 4 13 or 14 Best/Lowest 5 15 or 16 Best/Lowest 6

17 or 18 Best/Lowest 7 19 or 20 Best/Lowest 8

Note: When the handicap record contains more than 20 scores, the GA Handicap calculation uses the best 8 of the player's most recent 20 scores.
