

As we have been unable to recruit a new sponsor for the hole in one prize for the Social Club we have decided from now on, to manage the incentive prize differently. Since it took 17 years for us to get the last hole in one, we have decided to create a cash fund which will be paid out to the player who is lucky enough to claim the perfect shot. The jackpot builds up each month, as we will now withhold $\$ 1$ from the entry fees of each monthly participant and use that money to make up the prize pool. In February at the Warburton round, we had 30 players ( $\$ 30$ ) then 27 at Centenary Park ( $\$ 27$ ) and Dorset 30 players for $\$ 30$. This means we are currently holding $\$ 87$ in cash waiting for the next ACE.

Prize Pool goes up $\$ 1.00$ per player each month.

# Before everyone emails me to complain about their handicaps, I remind you that we are using the world handicap slope rating system and this means your handicap is adjusted according to the difficulty or ease of the golf course that you are playing on.

# Spring Park is rated as a neutral difficulty course, so with a slope rating 113 with a scratch rating of 64 it means that every player's handicap was adjusted downwards according to the slope formula: 

New Daily Handicap formula $=($ GA Handicap $x$ (Slope Rating $\div 113)+($ Scratch Rating minus Par)) x 0.93

## PLAYER HANDICAPS

PLEASE NOTE *Last year we changed the format of the handicapping system to adjust each player's handicap based on the difficulty of the golf courses we are playing by applying the slope rating of each golf course against the player's handicap. We ran this as a trial in 2019 and it was fully implemented during the 2020 season and it seemed to work well. This year we have fully transitioned which means the course scratch ratings are also factored into the golf handicapping process.

The difference is when you play a hard golf course like Eynesbury your handicap will be higher, and when you play an easy golf course like Ringwood or Dorset your handicap will be lower. The adjustments are based on the official handicapping system used by golf link and are designed to allow fairness and equality to golfers of all ability levels.

Instead of a handicap you have a Handicap index, which is the handicap expressed in a decimal (13.4, 5.2, 29.3, etc.). We have always used this process and we have simply used it as a club handicap by assuming that every golf course we played was equal and played as a neutral slope rating of 113. This year your index is used as a mathematical calculation of your playing ability on an average golf course (i.e., a course with a 113 Slope rating) then adjusted up or down according to the course rating which factors in the length and difficulty of the golf course to give you a variable daily handicap.

## Congratulations Stu Coops 200 SLP Rounds



This month Stu Coops racked up his $200^{\text {th }}$ Sunday Leave Pass round of golf. It was such a pity he was unable to produce the goods on his own home course, it seems that the nerves got the better of Stu, and despite going conservative for the first time in his life by hitting a layup 6 iron off the tee, he started his round with a shank and things didn't get much better from there. He went on to make a double bogey on the first hole and then a triple bogie on the second hole, so it was inevitable he was not going to be adding Spring Park Golf Course to his monthly title accomplishments.

In his 200 rounds there has never been a game when Stu has not had an adventure or two, and this month was no different, it was on the $6^{\text {th }}$ hole where Stu got wild. He played 12 shots and only one of those was from on the designated playing area.

Stu's Newell plus 2 (12). Included a pulled drive into the forest on the left of the fairway. A chip out of the scrub, which stayed inside the long grass. A full-fledged angry 3 wood which flew, long and right bouncing off the trees. This was followed by a 2 minute and 59 second search which fortunately or unfortunately (depending on how you look at it) resulted in him finding the ball deep in the deadlands where the ground-staff never bother to go. Any sensible golfer would have hit their $4^{\text {th }}$ stroke safely back into play and look to stem the bleeding. Not Stu, he crashed his ball into an over hanging branch sending the ball ricocheting out of bounds. It was a case of Deja vous, when shot 6 hit exactly the same branch, although rather than bounce OOB it at least came to rest along the fence-line but still in the deep long grass. Without any concern for the numbers on his scorecard, Stu hit his $7^{\text {th }}$ shot aimed straight at the putting surface again. He hit it solid enough to clear the undergrowth and the ball went crack and crash as it flew on to break a 2 inch branch off of one of the Tasmanian blue gum trees growing on the golf course. The branch landed on the fairway in 2 pieces, however Stu's replacement golf ball, like the first one he started playing the hole with, was yet to see the short mown surface. Shot 8 caught a flier out of the rough which sailed straight over the flagstick and disappeared over the back of the green. A failed flop shot out of the rough did finally manage to travel far enough for Stu to be able to play his $10^{\text {th }}$ shot from what was identifiable as the fringe collar of the $6^{\text {th }}$ fairway. Unfortunately, there were still 3 shots left in the tank, the chip shot and 2 putts later, Stu had successfully secured himself a spot on the Newell dishonour-board table for the month.

It is not the first time Stu has racked up a Newell and it most certainly will not be the last time either. Stu has been credited with 38 Newell's from the 3600 holes that he has played with the SLP social club. That is a strike rate of a Newell (score of 10 or more) once every 94.7 holes or otherwise worked out as a Newell every 5.3 rounds.
It is not surprising Stu manages to get himself some big numbers on the scorecard. When we were trying to find a good action photo for his bio the only ones we had in stock were his swings while trying to get out of trouble.



So, what has Stu achieved in his 200 rounds with Sunday Leave Pass. 18670 strokes, 889 pars, 112 birdies, 15 monthly titles, Beer wench 6 times. Stu has never managed to lockdown a SLP eagle, not through lack of trying or opportunities. Stu won the Season Points championship in 2004 and again in 2014. His greatest disappointment is never being able to have his name engraved on the Beer and Berrocca Shield, although he has been recognised as the biggest physical wreck on the golf trip for the past 17 years in a
row. Stu has also had the Bush Whacker trophy locked away in his pool room since its inception in 2019. Stu has also won the Eclectic Stroke award in 2009 with (65) and then again in 2015 with a score of 12 under par. (60) In 2014 season Stu was crowned the best putter, he had an impressive season averaging just 31.92 putts per round. Stu has featured strongly on the players choice nominations and was voted unanimously by his peers winning the least improved player in both 2009 and then again in 2011.


- Stu has won 23 longest drives from 208 attempts at bat. That is a long drive every $9^{\text {th }}$ 'nd he plays. Which coincides exactly with the number of fairways he hits per round. One every nine rounds.
- Stu has claimed 52 NTP titles over his 17-year SLP career but obviously not many of them were very close to the pin as he has only managed to sink $9 x$ birdie putts from the 929 par 3 holes he has played. 176 par 3 GIR for a return of nine birdies is not really a return worth writing home about.
- Stu has had a much better success rate on NTP second shots, from 22 events he has won the title 3 times which is a commendable $13 \%$ percent success rate against the field.
- Given he has played more rounds than any other member it is not surprising to hear that Stu is the most winningest golfer in the club. He has finished on top of the leaderboard 15 times. With 15 monthly titles he has claimed 5 more than Gerard and Mick who are joint $2^{\text {nd }}$ ranked for the most rounds won, although it should be noted that Ronnie Parsons is catching up very quickly. With his current form and with 9 wins already in the bank, by the time Ron reaches his $200^{\text {th }}$ round he could be well and truly in the 20 plus victories.

So that is enough about Stu Coops. Here is the all-important information from Sunday's golf at Spring Park.

## Spring Park - May

Last month it was Stevie Powne who blitzed the field, but any chance of that happening again was thrown out the window when Mick Harper confiscated his borrowed driver off of him. Without the Titleist 917D, Steve was unable to hit long straight drives which meant he wasn't hitting short irons into the green, so consequently he could not replicate the same quality play which he produced at Dorset in April. With Steve Playing like a normal person, it opened up the door for all of the other golfers to take the 15 championship points.

While most golfers stumbled at the first hurdle (some the first hole), there was one member who stood up to the task and claimed a convincing victory. Ron Parsons finished 3 strokes ahead of his nearest rival and incredibly despite its short length and reputation as an easy course, Ron was the only player from the field of 27 golfers to break his handicap and play better than par at Spring Park. Ronnie shot 86 off the stick which included 2 birdies and he also featured several times in the NTP challenge. Ronnie even knocked himself off for NTP on the $7^{\text {th }}$ hole on his second time around. Ron had played a great shot into the $7^{\text {th }}$ green and was already holding the claim to the NTP title, however he thought it best to play his next attempt even closer to ensure he was able to make the tap in birdie which he failed to do on the front nine. With 2 x twos on his score card and another 3 pars, Ron was very impressive, so there was little fear of him being challenged for the winners jacket. Especially since Ron was able to minimize his bad holes to having none with a score worse than an 8 .

We can not say the same for most of the other golfers on Sunday. Most of us successfully managed to ruin their rounds by having a major blowout hole or two. For several players, the difference between a high-ranking position and where they actually finished, came down to making a Newell.

Although he did not play on Sunday there was still plenty of Newell's floating around the golf course. There were 12 of them in fact. For those who may not be aware a what a Newell is, then we should explain the definition of a "Newell" as per the Macquarie Dictionary new word of the year inductee in 2019.


A Newell is defined in the Sunday Leave Pass lexicon as a score of 10 or more. Evidently it was so called because Newell has had 79 Newell's during his SLP career and most of those were achieved in his first two seasons. Casey Morrison is mounting a legitimate challenge to try to dethrone the great man of his title. Casey posted another $3 x$ Newell's this month to go with the five that he scored last month at Dorset. That's 8 Newell's in 2 rounds. At the current rate Casey will have 80 Newell's (score of 10 or more) before he reaches 25 rounds with the social club.

Thomas Cooper has previously found Spring Park to be a very-happy hunting ground for his golf. His best-ever round was played at Spring Park and then after playing so well at Dorset, he was one of the odds-on favourites to claim a monthly title this month. Unfortunately for Thomas the title he did win, was not the one he was after. Thomas claimed his second Beer wench ranking in just 3 months. Thomas had 3 Newell's (score of 10 or more) during his round including the biggest Newell for the day. Incredibly Thomas had 17 strokes on the par 3 fourteenth hole which puts him in the record books as being in the top 5 highest scores on a single hole in the SLP club history. According to his playing partners, Thomas still completed the hole with a smile on his face, perhaps knowing he was still 7 x strokes shy of his grand-fathers record, which was a 24 on the $14^{\text {th }}$ at Devils Bend was enough to ease the pain of the experience.

The $6^{\text {th }}$ hole at Spring Park was the most damaging hole on the day, it accounted for five Newell's. There is no wonder it is ranked as No\# 1 most difficult hole on the golf course. Never a day goes by when a golfer doesn't walk into the pro-shop and when they are asked how there game went they usually say "I played really well except. $\qquad$ $!"$ that is when the $6^{\text {th }}$ hole gets a mention.

The $6^{\text {th }}$ hole played 2.8 strokes over par during both circuits of the course, making it ranked the $1^{\text {st }}$ and $2^{\text {nd }}$ toughest hole on the golf course, interestingly the $9^{\text {th }}$ and the $3^{\text {rd }}$ holes played the easiest holes for the day. The $9^{\text {th }}$ hole averaging 0.88 shots over par and the $3^{\text {rd }}$ hole and $16^{\text {th }}$ holes also playing at less than a stroke over par. It is very unusual for us as a group to post scores where a hole average is less than a stroke over par, so this is a credit to everyone for playing so well on those holes. Basically, that means statistically we had more birdies and pars than we had bogies and double bogies. A rare thing for the social club.

As a collective group we recorded 78 pars and 12 birdies. Cam Douglas was the most impressive player, he had 6 par 3's out of 8 attempts, which is an incredible effort, and a better performance than even the A grade low markers, Mick and Shanno (cider) were able to achieve. 18 strokes on 6 holes set Cam up into a very strong position and there was no wonder he finished in second place. It was only a couple of blowout holes that held back Cam from finishing on top of the points distribution list. It seems the broken wrist and crook knees are long forgotten.

Brent Douglas continues his purple patch in 2021. It seems no matter what the handicapper does to try to slowdown Brents momentum he continues to post lower and better scores. In season 2021, Brent is averaging 87.5 strokes a round which is 7 strokes better than his long term SLP career average. Brent has rocketed up to $2^{\text {nd }}$ place in the annual points rankings and amazingly he is only 5 points behind the leader despite playing one game less for the season.

Cam Ross on the other hand is averaging a score of 109 strokes per round which is 4 shots worse than his career average. Although on Sunday, Cam didn't post a Newell on his score card he did have 4 x nines which had the handicapper wondering whether he hasn't cut off one of his fingers meaning he can no longer count to ten. When it came to counting his putts on the $4^{\text {th }}$ green, Cam must have been required to use his good hand, because he walked off the green with the yellow vest and an 8 on his score card after just missing his first putt for par. That's right folks, Cam turned a putt for a four into a quadruple bogey, with 5 putts in a row.

Having watched Cam struggle to sink his ball into the cup on the difficult fourth green, Todd Neilson made a concerted effort not to put himself in the same position. In fact, Todd successfully avoided having to putt on the green at all, because he was able to chip his ball in for a birdie "none putt" from about 40 meters out. Todd only wishes he had of played the shot with his second swing instead of his third stroke because it would have all but guaranteed him the NTP second shot prize and pegged back the

No\# of eagles deficit that he has with Tom Kellythorn by one. Nonetheless it was a great birdie, and he did manage to force a jackpot for the skins on the hole.

With such lightening quick greens and treacherous pin positions, it was a welcome relief to not have to pull the putter out of the golf bag. Thomas Cooper chipped in for a noner in the very first hole of the round and he only used the flat stick 6 times in the first five holes. Its hard to believe that with just 35 putts for the day Thomas could possibly have finished his walk with 127 strokes, especially since he is normally shooting 111 with somewhere in the vicinity of 43 putts.

Steve O'Sullivan was not able to post a contribution to the Nearest to pin competition on the $9^{\text {th }}$ hole because he missed the green completely, however he made up for it by chipping his second shot in for a birdie 2 . Glen Douglas missed the $16^{\text {th }}$ green with his sand wedge from 85 meters back while playing from the tee, he also missed the green with his sand wedge from 7 meters away inside the bunker. So, it was no surprise that for his next shot Douggo once again missed the green with his sand wedge from a chip shot from not further than 4 meters away from the fringe of the green. The only shock was to see Glenn pull the sand wedge for the $4^{\text {th }}$ time in a row and this time manage to hole the ball for a walk off bogey four, using the one club for the entire hole.

I am not sure what is worse using the wedge four times in a row or using the putter 5 times on one green. Phil Plane would most likely argue the latter especially since when he finally managed to push his ball into the bottom of the cup on the $3^{\text {rd }}$ green, he had already turned a relatively easy birdie putt into a triple bogey 6 .

Phil Plane was not the only person with the putting woes. Wayne James was required to cough up a $\$ 2$ fine for putting from on the green to off the green while negotiating a testy 10 ' foot downhill putt on the 2 nd green. Chris Westhead went the full 18 holes without making a one putt green. Barry Hemsley putted himself out of contention. Disregarding the 10 he made on the $17^{\text {th }}$ hole which that alone cost him his second SLP monthly title, Barry had the second highest putts tally for the day (42) which ultimately resulted him standing at the bottom step looking up at the victory podium rather on the top of it where he so easily could and should have been. Cam Ross accumulated the most taps with the flat stick, by the time he walked off the green after completing the $18^{\text {th }}$ hole he had just recorded his $6^{\text {th }}$ three putt green giving him a total of 43 putts for the round.

Given he had the luxury of working at the golf course, setting the preferred pin positions and considering he is running a mini golf putting facility it may have given Stu Coops the inside running and an unfair advantage. Stu topped the putts leaderboard ranking by going the full 18 holes without ever making a three putt. 7 one putts gave him a total of 29 putts for the day which was the saving grace for Stu. Were it not for the success with the putter, Stu would have suffered the humiliation of getting pantsed on his own golf course.

Thomas Cooper heard his dad was not travelling very well, so like all caring and considering children should do, he pulled on the handbrake and sacrificed his own round to ensure Stu wasn't going to finish in last place on his $200^{\text {th }}$ round for the Social Club. Thomas achieved that feat on the $14^{\text {th }}$ hole alone when he amassed a Newell plus 7 (17) on the par 3 hole. It has hard to recall every shot when there are so many of them however we have drawn a diagram so you get the picture.


So, what did Thomas ball look like after he finished belting it all over the park.


It can often be a tough life for a golf ball and the local flora and fauna on a golf course. Tony MacIsaac called the EPA to report environmental damage after Stu Coops knocked branches off every tree lining the fence-line on the $6^{\text {th }}$ hole. Evidently Stu did more damage to the trees in 10 minutes than the storm on Friday night was able to achieve in 6 hours.

Barry Hemsley gave his golf ball a very hard time too.


## Hey Stu,

I thought I'd share this image from Sunday that tells the story of what happened to my wayward drive on the 6th (or 15th as it was).

I cracked one that stayed low and left and it looked destined to disappear into the undergrowth when it smacked into this stump, straightened up and flew an extra 100 m down the middle of the fairway. It was probably my longest drive for the day.

A couple of 3 woods later I had my ball inches from the green (thus missing another GIR on a par 5) and walked off with a 6 .

Gotta love a lucky bounce!

For any newcomers, the reference to the greens in regulation is testimony to the fact that until last year Barry had played 153 par 5 holes and he still had not ever managed to hit one in the required 3 strokes to count as a GIR.

Barry was quite lucky to get such a good bounce it of the trees. It is more than we can say for Wayne James who could only count himself as stumped on the par 4 eleventh hole. Wayne's drive landed on the middle of the fairway but with his natural slice the ball took a big hop to the right. "Right". As in right into the base of the tree. Although he had a perfectly clear view of the green there was absolutely nothing Wayne could do but claim an unplayable lie and take a penalty stroke.


Tony MacIsaac hit the same tree twice while playing the $7^{\text {th }}$ hole. On his first attempt the ball hit the middle of the tree and rolled back towards him and came to rest only a couple of meters in front of the tee markers. On the return trip Tony hit the same tree almost in the same indentation, however on this occasion it bounced forward and landed only meters from the green. On both occasions Tony completed the hole with a 2-putt bogey, so it goes to show it is not the first shot, but rather it is the second shot that counts.


Col Ewart was a long way from hitting the tree on the $7^{\text {th }}$ hole. His drive not only fell short of the green, and Tony Mac's tree, in fact Cols tee shot fell short of the fairway which is a pretty hard thing to do on the 85-meter hole.

Colins golf ball trickled off the tee peg and came to rest in the lake directly in front of him. A total launch distance of 4.7 meters.

Unlike some other lunatics who would try to hit their ball out of the water, Colin opted to accept the fate of his golf ball and he took the required penalty, he dropped a new ball and got out of the situation without destroying his entire round score.

It was a smart move by Colin as he was able to consolidate his round and still managed to finish in the points distribution with an $11^{\text {th }}$ place ranking.

A marked improvement on Dorset where Col only avoided the pink vest by a couple of straight shots.

Steve Powne was not quite as spectacular as he was last month. Although there were some flashes of brilliance. it was intertwined between a bit of mediocrity. On the $11^{\text {th }}$ hole Steve found himself trying to play his ball from in the rough up along the safety fence. His Pinnacle 2 was sitting deep in the long grass and he had an impeded back swing. Steve is adamant he did not have an air-swing and he swears he hit the ball but there was definitely no movement from where we all sat. Further proof of his whiff at
the ball was the fact that his next shot was played out of exactly the same divot. There was no doubt that Steve got club on the ball for his next attempt, however given the Pinnacle 2 only moved 3 and a half meters forward it was still just as funny to watch. To his credit the Blue Smurf worked his magic with the next shot and he chipped his ball from 45 meters back and it landed in the middle of the green, bounced twice, checked with spin and then rolled up until it hit the pin and stopped for a tap in putt.


Tap in putts were the order of the day. When it came to the NTP competitions, most of the NTP markers were placed within 1 meter of the flagstick. This made them very hard to get inside and almost all of the prize winners were able to convert the good shot into a birdie. Mark Fitzpatrick, who's shot on the $3^{\text {rd }}$ green was probably the closest of all of the NTP winners was the only person to miss his birdie putt. Wayne James was able to hole a 20 meter birdie putt on the same green so it was hard to believe Fitzy could have missed his from 20 centimetres away.

As a collective group we were able to add 12 more birdies to the ever-growing birdie honour-board. Mick Harper, Stu Coops and Ronnie Parsons accounted for half of them, each posting two sub-par holes. Interestingly. 6 of the 12 birdies were made as twos on a par 3 hole and there were no birdies made on the par 5 . Normally those results would be the exact opposite, historically it is the longer holes which give up the birdies. Todd, Ben Nichol, Rick, SOS, Egg and Wayne were the other golfers who added a birdie to their Annual 18 hole Eclectic scorecard.

Congratulations to Ronnie Parsons who claimed his $9^{\text {th }}$ Sunday Leave Pass monthly title. Ron finished 3 strokes ahead of the runner up and his score of $\mathbf{8 6}$ off the stick saw him finish with a score of Nett 64. Cam Douglas was a mile ahead of the rest of the field. There was 6 strokes back from his score of Nett 67 . The field bunched up pretty close between $3^{\text {rd }}$ and $14^{\text {th }}$ place, with many of the rankings being decided by a countback.

The count back system is formulated as the following. *Total number of stableford points scored on the back nine holes.
*In the event that both players have the same stableford score on the back nine it then reverts to the number of stableford points scored on the eighteenth hole. If this is the same then it goes to the $17^{\text {th }}$ hole, sixteenth hole, fifteenth hole until a player has a better hole and therefore has a higher stableford score than the other.

In this instance both Brent and Dawso had Nett 73 after their handicap was deducted from the Gross Scores. So, we go back to a countback.

In this example brent ranks higher because he had 16 points compared to Dawso who choked on the back nine holes and could only conjure up 11 stableford points on the back nine and was therefore relegated down a place.

If in the event, that the countback then identifies that both players have had the same stableford points score on the back nine then we go back to the individual holes starting from the $18^{\text {th }}$ hole and compare results until a player had a standout result. In the example shown on the right both Tony MacIsaac and Steve Powne had Nett 74 and 12 Stableford points on the back nine. So, the countback then compares the scores on individual holes starting from the $18^{\text {th }}$ hole working backwards as required. In this situation the scores on holes 18 , were different. Tony scored 2 stableford points compared to Steve who only scored 1 stableford point. Consequently, Tony wins the countback and the Blue Smurf is relegated back to a lower place ranking. If both scores are equal on the $18^{\text {th }}$ hole, then we go back to the $17^{\text {th }}$ hole, then the $16^{\text {th }}$, etc etc.

PLEASE NOTE THAT THE COUNT BACK IS ON HOLES 10-18 irrespective of whether it is a two-tee start, a normal hit off from the first hole or as in the case of Gardiners Run where we hit off the $10^{\text {th }}$ hole first. It is always the $10^{\text {th }}$ to $18^{\text {th }}$ holes and if one person starts on the $10^{\text {th }}$ hole and the other hits off the first hole then it still remains exactly the same formula.

As a new member of the Social Club the Callaway Handicapping system is used to give the player a daily played to handicap for the first couple of rounds. Once they have played 3 rounds, they are given a temporary club handicap using the original AGU handicapping system. After 5 rounds they are then switched across to the current slope handicapping system.


[^0]After 3 rounds they will be allocated a temporary handicap using the old AGU handicapping formula and then after 5 rounds they are elevated onto the official Slope handicapping system which was use thereafter for all club competitions.

Sometimes the Callaway handicapping system has proved itself to be very favorable to new members. Whenever we take on a golf course like Devils Bend or Eynesbury and the field struggle to play to their handicaps the Callaway golfers end up featuring at the top of the points distribution. Unfortunately, it was not the case for Chris Westhead and Casey Morrison who even with a 40-handicap and 52-handicap they both found themself a long way down the leaderboard

For those people interested in the mechanics of the handicapping system it can be best explained as the following.

## How to calculate a GA Handicap

To calculate a player's GA Handicap:

- you must firstly identify the player's most recent 20 scores,
- you then determine the 'Played To' value for each of these scores,
- you average the best 8 'Played To' values,
- and finally you multiply this average by 0.93 . The resultant figure (to one decimal place) is the player's GA Handicap.
* If a player's handicap record contains a lesser number than 20 scores, the number of scores used to calculate the player's handicap is as listed in the table below.
* There is no requirement for a player's most recent 20 scores to have been returned within a specific timeframe.

For example, the most recent 20 scores may span a period of three years or they may span a period of three months.

* Once a player's handicap record contains 20 scores, the next score they return will result in the oldest of the existing 20 scores being removed (to be replaced by the new score).

Full Technical Procedure for Calculating a GA HandicapSTEP 1 - Use the table below to determine the number of scores to be included in the GA Handicap calculation:

## Number of Scores in Player's Handicap Record

# Scores to be Used in the Calculation 

| 5 to 6 | Best/Lowest 1 |

Note: When the handicap record contains more than 20 scores, the GA Handicap calculation uses the best 8 of the player's most recent 20 scores.

I hope that helps to explain the handicapping system.
The Sunday Leave Pass handicapping process with the one used by golf link and by all golf clubs around the globe using the world handicapping system. Although your SLP handicap is unofficial and therefore it cannot be used to formally enter organized golf competitions and tournaments, it still should be an accurate reflection of your golfing prowess and a measure of what your GA (golf Australia) handicap would be if you subscribed the $\$ 150$ per year to get an official handicap.

Your playing handicap will fluctuate around your documented handicap index. When you play an easy course such as Ringwood or Dorset then you will actually play off a lower handicap than you normally would. On the other days when we invite you to play a harder course such as Rosebud Country Club, Devils Bend, Werribee Park or Barham we will add a few extra shots to your arsenal just to give you more hope of avoiding total anxiety and depression.

For those players not familiar with the scoring process, listed below is the format we use in Sunday Leave Pass competitions. Once all of the players are ranked then the Seasons Championship points are allocated according to the position in the field. The player in $1^{\text {st }}$ place gets 15 points, $2^{\text {nd }}$ place 14 points, $3^{\text {rd }}$ place 13 points, etc. etc. Any player who completes the round however finishes ranked outside the top 14 and is placed between $15^{\text {th }}$ spot to BeerWench then they are all allocated 1 championship point for attending.
For the benefit of the newcomers or the uneducated we thought it would be a good opportunity to go through the player rankings and point scoring system again.

Sunday Leave Pass competitions are run using Stroke so you need to count every shot that you play and you need to finish every hole. Each player's Nett total score is then calculated by deducting the players handicap from the Gross score. If a player doesn't have an official Sunday Leave Pass handicap, then a temporary played to handicap is allocated on the day using the Callaway handicapping system.

Once the players Nett score is calculated they are ranked from lowest score to highest score. (BeerWench) Where more than one player has the same Nett Score (such as in the example below from Gardiners Run last year then the place allocations are decided based on a countback system.

The player with the most points at the end of the year is crowned the Points champion irrespective of how many rounds a person has played. If one person plays 13 rounds for the year and the person in $2^{\text {nd }}$ place has only played 10 rounds but is close to the
same score then that is bad luck to the person in $2^{\text {nd }}$ place. All players are invited to play the entire fixture. We reward participation rather than perfection and performance so if you play more often you will end up with more points.

In order to win the Season Championship trophy, you need to play regularly and consistently to about your handicap or better, and it is the handicapper's responsibility to make sure that this does not happen. After every round, the scores are assessed and then the handicaps are adjusted according to your performance. As was the case last year we have adjusted the handicap formula to take into consideration the difficulty of each golf course, using the course slope index, so it will be remarkably interesting to see how the scores finish up.

Every monthly title winner also becomes eligible to play off for the champion of champions trophy. To qualify as the Champion of Champions a member just needs to win a monthly title. All of the winners from the monthly championships who are attending the golf trip will then play off for the title based on total accumulated stableford points from 9x Randomly selected holes. The Winner is the person with the most points over those 9 nominated holes, and in the event of a tie then a Countback to determine the winner applies.

NOTE: The Winner of the December title is also eligible to win the competition however they only get to count their scores by using only 8 Randomly selected holes.

[^0]:    This system is used for determining fair allowances for social golf events that attract novices or occasional golfers. A player's Callaway handicap is determined after each round by deducting from his/her 18 -hole gross score the scores of the worst individual holes during the first 16 holes of the round.

    In the computation of handicaps under this system:
    -No hole may be scored at more than twice its par,
    half strokes count as a whole,
    the 17th and 18th holes are never deducted,
    For example, if a player scores 99 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their ( 3 worst holes) +1
    If a player scores 82 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their ( worst $+1 / 2$ the $2^{\text {nd }}$ worst hole) -1
    If a player scores 120 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (five worst holes) +2
