Spring Park Golf Course Results

June

For a short little course at just over 2000 meters, Spring Park proved itself to be a bit more of a challenge than was expected. From 27 starters only 3 players managed to shoot par or better. From the outset it was obvious that it was going to be a tough day for all concerned. The narrow first fairway proved too hot to handle with only half a dozen players managing to get anything that would be considered a half decent shot away.

After Damien Vanterpool smashed a perfect 5 iron down the middle of the fairway the golf standard got really ugly really quickly. Dale Robinson drove the green, the only problem being that he drove his ball onto the ninth green which was only 40 meters from the first tee, and it was behind a safety fence and protected by tall trees.

Brendan Seagrave didn't even get past the safety fence, well technically he did, however it should be said that he hit his drive as a grubber of a tee shot which smashed into the fence and then it was questionable whether he actually got past the ladies tees.

Wayne James followed suit soon after and his ball only managed to roll past the squatters tees because his ball after hitting the fence rolled onto the cart path and it trickled down hill just enough to pass the red markers.

Brendan MacIsaac hit a ground burner that smashed into the retaining wall of the garden bed in front of him and then his ball ricocheted at a 90 degree angle sending Col Ewart and Big Ball Breasley diving for cover despite them feeling safe sheltering under the BBQ pergola.

Todd Neilson, Newell, Tom and Gerard hit their balls into the wilderness their balls ended up in terrain so thick and buried in fallen branches and bushes that it is where elephants go to die.

Douggo allowed 65 degrees too much angle to cater for his slice and his first drive ended up landing at the back of the practice nets. It was decided he was so far away from the fairway that not even Stu Coops could have hit a ball that far off target.

Stu Coops is anxiously awaiting the visit from some unfortunate car driver who will be making an insurance claim for a broken windscreen or golf ball sized dint in the bonnet of their car this week.

Leigh MacIsaac after so many good rounds came back with an earth shattering crash, Leigh found the bunkers protecting the greens particularly challenging and after shooting a par-less font nine he was talking about retiring. Last month's Beer wench racked up a NEWELL+3 (13) on the second hole, and he achieved this feat without losing a ball and despite being less than 50 meters from the front edge of the green for 2.

Highway did manage to pick up the majority of those shots over the next 10 holes and he recovered well enough to beat Mick, Gerard, Geoff and a few others to avoid going back to back Beer Wench.

High way did manage to have a few **High Lights**, for the first time ever he was able to get his name temporarily on a NTP hole before being knocked off by Cliff Rowe who finished the day with three out of four of the NTP prizes. Newell also picked up 7x raffle tickets for the end of year prize raffle draw after winning a few skins holes and he made a momentous birdie on the seventh hole under very trying conditions.

Evidently Newell had accidentally left his phone on, either that or he had turned it on mid round to post a message on face-book and twitter letting his 8 followers know that he had just knocked his ball onto the green on a par 3. While the phone active he received a brief text message from his mum advising him to call home as his dad had just been rushed to hospital. And besides Geoff was already feeling poor having copped a \$185 speeding fine on the way to golf and had dropped another couple of hundred dollars by the fact that he had lost his GPS device out on the course somewhere, so he figured another \$2-00 would hurt him.

Newell managed to console his mum, sent a message for his dad not to turn the light out until after he gets to speak with him in person after the golf had finished and then quickly hung up and rolled in a 12' foot birdie putt. We are not sure yet if the birdie was a "Chubb's" style parting gift from the old man to Newell but certainly the screams of joy reached the heavens as Newell celebrated with unreserved excitement. (From what we have heard Newell's old man is OK after surgery and is due to make a full recovery, but we will give Newell the honor of keeping the birdie anyway.)

Ian Mutimar also may have an appointment scheduled with the surgeon. Mutes only finished 4 holes before his attempt to dig the biggest divot went astray and he damaged something in his shoulder making it impossible for him to continue the round.

In spite of the injury Mutes still failed to win the biggest Divot competition. That title went to Brendan MacIsaac who took a swipe at the ball which displaced nearly a cubic meter of soil. So deep and long was Brendan's divot that Grumpy called the SES search and rescue squad to try to find the dirt as he figured Stu would actually want his golf course back. Spring Park is now playing as an 8 Hole course while excavation work is being done to repair Brendan's damage.

SOS just caressed his ball onto the green to 15 feet, knocked in the birdie and then smiled and said F#@K you.



Tony Mac got intimate with the trees on the 9th hole. Tony was left standing on one side of the trunk while the ball, his hands and the club were on the other side of the tree. Amazingly, despite not being able to see where it was, Tony was able to extricate his ball and witnesses say that even with the significant handicap from the precarious position it was probably the best and only decent shot that he played all day. So good was the outcome of Tony's shot that he is contemplating playing all of his shots with his eyes closed.

Who knows if he plays 18 holes with his eyes shut he might manage to claim that illusive victory. Tony is quickly approaching his Hundredth round with the Sunday Leave Pass and we are wondering if he is going to do so without a win under his belt.

In cricketing terms that would certainly give new meaning to the term "making his Maiden century."

While Tony and Brendan MacIsaac both posted a credit worthy round it was Brother Gerard who came close to the tail end of the field. Gerard had a shocker and only just managed to keep his nose in front of the Beer wenching position which Brendan had previously earmarked himself to be a contender for. As you can see from his confirmation status email to Stu, Brendan thought he was going to find the day tough, however he never looked like having to put on the beer wench vest and he excelled in the difficult conditions and even posted a career best score of 108.

As a new member of the Social Club the Callaway Handicapping system is used to give the player a daily played to handicap for the first couple of rounds. Once they have played 3 rounds they are given a temporary club handicap using the original AGU handicapping system. After 5 rounds they are then switched across to the current slope handicapping system.

Congratulations to Damien and Wayne who both completed the third game with the Sunday Leave Pass social Club. Both gents will embark on a handicap of 25 and having played with them both, this is a very generous offering and these boys may be very difficult to beat off this handicap.

This system is used for determining fair allowances for social golf events that attract novices or occasional golfers. A player's Callaway handicap is determined after each round by deducting from his/her 18 hole gross score the scores of the worst individual holes during the first 16 holes of the round.

In the computation of handicaps under this system:

- No hole may be scored at more than twice its par,
- half strokes count as a whole,
- the 17th and 18th holes are never deducted,

For example if a player scores 99 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (3 worst holes) +1

If a player scores 82 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (worst + ½ the 2nd worst hole) -1

If a player scores 120 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (five worst holes) +2

After 3 rounds they will be allocated a temporary handicap using the old AGU handicapping formula and then after 5 rounds they are elevated onto the official Slope handicapping system which was use thereafter for all club competitions.




