Congratulations to Chris Sfiligoj who becomes the 13th Sunday Leave Pass player to join the 100-round club. Chris Joined Sunday Leave Pass in May 2007 with a score of 117 at Centenary Park. His first hole on the par 5 was an 11 and since then he has racked up another 32 Career "Newell's" score of 10 or more.) Chris has reported a total 10385 strokes. Although he is a solid putter averaging less than 36 putts per round Chris found his match at Morack golf Course in July 2015 when he had a career worst round with the flatstick using it a soul destroying 44 times. Unfortunately, the day didn't pan out too well for him and he also

posted a career worst score of 125 strokes. Interestingly the Morack round in July 15 was still not one of his 5 Beer Wench titles. Statistically it seems Bayviews is least favourite golf course. He has won 2 Beer wench titles at Bayviews and averages over 40 putts per visit on those tricky Rosebud greens.

Chris has proved he can putt effectively when it counts, he went 18 holes at Morack for a career best 27 putts and he is quite adept at holing putts for birdies when the opportunities arise. Of his 191 pars from 100 rounds, Chris has made 79 of those on the short par 3 holes. This is a significant percentage especially compared to his Par 5 yield which only attributes 25 pars, although admittedly he did chip in for an Eagle on the Par 5 tenth hole at Gardiners Run last year. Disregarding his eagle from the other 1799 holes Chris has gone under par 20 times, 5x birdies on the Par 3 holes, 4x on the Par 5's and the other 11 times it was on the two shot holes. Chris has managed to out muscle the big hitters a couple of times; he won the Longest Drive at Warburton in 2008 and again at Dorset in 2009. When it comes to hitting the ball close to the Pin, Chris has taken home prize balls on 15 separate occasions. Ringwood golf course has netted the best return for NTP wins with 3 separate titles although he has never been able to repeat the shot as he has never claimed multiple NTP on the same hole.

Chris won the golf trip at Murray Downs in 2012 and his best year with the club was 2008 when he took home both the Champion of Champions jacket and the Skins Champion trophy. Chris is most famous for hitting 5 balls in a row into the dam on the 12th hole at Devils Bend and getting his golf cart stuck on the walking bridge at Commercial Golf Club during the Albury golf trip.

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There must be a reason that Warburton polls so highly in the SLP voting when it comes to choosing the next years courses. Every year Warby comes up in the top 3 chosen courses. Maybe it is the price (cheap round), maybe it is the spectacular scenery, maybe it is the BBQ and the long day away from the family, or maybe it is so popular because Warby always delivers on entertainment. Warburton golf course with its steep hills, short but sloping fairways and small fast greens will always give a golfer a few highlights and deliver enough excitement and confidence to raise the heartbeat before it delivers the punishing blow and a major low light.

Golf could always have been called "If Only" because that phrase is synonymous with golfing conversations worldwide. When it comes to debriefing a round after Warburton the coined term "If Only" usually links back to the score on the 8th and or the 18th hole which usually results in a player's round totally coming unstuck and a potentially winning position being squandered. Sunday was no different. Thomas Cooper walked to the edge of the elevated 18th tee looking down on the wide-open fairway and the opportunity to post a career best round and possibly win his first SLP career title. 88 strokes in the bank with just one hole left to play. There was a genuine chance to shoot 95 off the stick even with a triple bogie. "If Only" he didn't hit his driver, "If Only" the ball didn't snap hook into the houses beside the golf course, "If Only" the driving range at the bottom of the fairway was not out of bounds, "If Only" he didn't hit his next shot into the water, "If Only" he didn't 3 putt the last green, "If Only he had of made a bogey instead of a Newell plus 2 (12) on the last hole.

For the newcomers to the social club, as a matter of reference, just in case you have come from another planet or are new to golf and therefore never have heard the term "A Newell," we will enlighten you. According to the Macquarie Dictionary a new word "A Newell" was introduced into the worlds golfing lexicon in 2019, The phrase was nominated in the people's choice top 20 New words for the year and was defined as "A golf score of 10 or more shots on a single hole."

"If Only" Newell hadn't made double figure scores 83x times then the term "Newell" would not exist.

Barry used the new Titleist T-Series Irons like he was playing off a handicap in the Newell's. (10 or more but less than 20.) It's hard to imagine Barry considered giving up or on-selling his raffle prize because he didn't think he could do the clubs justice.

Barry has featured in the high end of the points run down ever since he won the new clubs in the raffle.

"If Only" Steve Dawson went on the golf trip, then Barry Hemsley wouldn't have the new clubs and be playing like a champion.

Even still Barry would be right in saying "If Only" especially since he came very close to winning at Warburton, "If Only" he didn't have a Newell plus two (12) on the par 5 eighth hole.

While Barry was brandishing his brilliance around the golf course, a couple of his playing partners were saying to each other "If Only" Barry and Newell would shut up for a minute and play golf instead of analyzing and debriefing after every shot. Peter (Greek) Alphabet and Rick (Yugo/Croatian) Alphabet were left distraught and exhausted after listening to Newell and Barry come up with different outcomes "If Only" this had happened. "If Only" that had happened. "If Only" I had done this. "If Only" I had done that.

Amazingly the analysis and discussions didn't even end after the car pulled out of the golf course car park. The entire 1-and-a-half-hour journey back to Forest Hill covered a stroke by stroke debrief of the day's events. Only Andrew Clarke was spared the monotony of the conversation by doing what Andre Clarke does best.



Rick the fine master was quick to identify \$10 worth of fines for each of his playing partners although he was clearly thinking "If Only" there wasn't a \$10 max I could plenty more out of these guys. Having shared a cart with Rick (Yugo/Croatian) Alphabet for more than 4 hours, Peter (Greek) Alphabet was amazed at the depth and range of profanities and expletives Rick has in his vocabulary. Evidently Peter even learnt some new Greek swear words that he had not heard of previously. Most of Rick's obscenities were directed towards Barry and Newell's slow play. As he described it so eloquently in the bar, Barry would have 4 practice swings, then address the ball, then a fly would land on his nose so he would step away, shoo the fly away then start his pre address routine again, four more practice swings, step forward, shake the left foot, shake the right foot, bend the knees, bob up and down 3 times, wiggle the bum, lift the hands up, push the hands down again, tighten the bum cheeks, breathe in, hold the breath, wiggle the ears, five false starts taking the club back a little further each time, then finally swing at the ball only to have it travel 4 meters past the ladies tees.

"If Only" it was just Barry that Rick (Yugo/Croatian) Alphabet and Peter (Greek) Alphabet had to deal with, however Santa's little helper was just as slow and frustrating. According to the Alphabet brothers Newell would spend five minutes discussing wind direction, then spend 2 minutes and three different observation points to work out the angle of the stance, then before every shot Highway would need to get down on his hands and knees to measure the direction the grass was growing and only then would he go to his buggy to pull out the rangefinder to get an accurate reading of the distance to the flag and every tree and obstacle between him and the green. A couple of changes between clubs before finally swinging at the ball was enough to get the blood boiling especially since he did 101 times and came within just a few strokes of going back-to-back beer wench.

"If Only" Fitzy had of played a few shots better than he did, then Newell would have come last for the second month in a row.

I am starting to think Newell might one day admit that his preferred pronoun is "Beer Wench" he seems to take the role a wee bit too serious and from what I can see he enjoys it a too much. Living next door to the January Beer wench, I didn't expect to see him wearing the pink vest while out doing the daily chores or walking the dog, and I was especially surprised yet pleased when he knocked on the door offering to do the clothes washing.



Newell had the Pink Vest and the three-putt monkey vests, cleaned, fabric softened, fragranced and ready for use at Warburton. "If Only" we were able to use them. Since COVID-19 happened in 2020 the yellow vests have been in quarantine and we need to decide as a group whether we think it is worth reintroducing them as part of the club activities. It was always a great visual, to look across the fairways and see who was three putting the greens and it was fun to see different members wearing the vests, and according to the fine master it was certainly a lot easier to collect the fines for the three-putt monkey at the end of the round.

"If Only" we were doing the yellow vests then Newell would have been bathing himself in his own washing powder fragrance because he managed to have a 3-putt, a 4-putt and even a 5-putt green. Evidently the 5 putts should have been even more putts than what was documented on the scorecard because according to the witness' who were privy to the event said for the last 2 putts the ball was actually still moving when Newell played the next shot. "If Only" he had played out the hole properly then he may have broken the club record for the most putts on a green, which coincidently is held by Newell himself anyway (9 putts) on the 15th Green at Ringwood.

"If Only" Newell had putted on every green like he did on the 14th hole which was the nominated Longest holed putt" competition. On the 14th hole Highway drained a birdie putt from 463cm away which was good enough to win the prize for the day. Stu Cooper was left disappointed and was heard saying "If Only" we hadn't changed the rules to say that a holed putt the ball would have to have been hit from on the putting surface. Stu followed in the footsteps of Jaxon Fitz last week and managed to putt into the hole from off the green however the 792cm shot didn't count. To make matters worse it was not a putt from off the green for a birdie but rather it was marked on the score card as a 7 for 0putts.

Interestingly, as a collective group we set a new social club record of 9 chip ins for the day. This eclipsed the previous record of 5 shots holed from off the green. The Warburton greens are always very tricky to put on, and clearly there were plenty of guys who get the memo and therefor opted instead to chip in rather than try to put on the greens. 9 chip ins during a round is an incredible total, perhaps it was slightly biased by the fact that the greens at Warburton are fast and sloping but very small. The ball often rolls off the green and finishes just off on the fringe giving the golfer a good look at making a short putt up the hill at the hole from the fringe grass.

Clarkey knocked a putt from off the green to lock away a par on the 6th hole, Jamie Brunton avoided having to negotiate the most difficult green on the golf course by chipping in for a par on the par 3 fifth hole. Dawson had no difficulty in negotiating the steep tier on the 11th hole because his 3rd shot landed just at the back of the green which open up the chance to score a zero-putt par from the fringe grass. Steve Powne saved his round when things went astray on the par 3 third hole. The hole was playing at just under 140 meters and Steve hadn't even hit the green after 4 swats at the golf ball. When his 5th shot dropped into the bottom of the cup, it was a lucky outcome, it stemmed the bleeding and set him up for what eventuated to be a fantastic round of golf.

Shane Cumming only had 82 shots for the day and of those he only used the putter 29 times, although he did use it unofficially from off the green to make a par on the first hole. Chris Sfiligoj read out of the same playbook as Steve Dawson, although Chris was standing on the opposite side of the club (being left-handed) he still managed to play the hole exactly the same way Dawso did and he finished the 11th hole with a zero putt par. Stu Coops counterbalanced a 4 putt and a 3-putt with two none putts for the day. As well as his save on the 14th hole, Stu chipped in for a birdie on the Par 3 -9th hole taking his career birdies tally on the short holes to 11 birdies from 957 holes which works out to just over a birdie every 100 par 3 holes played. Todd Neilson chipped in for a par from 30 meters off the green on the 7th hole, much to the disappointment of his mate Duan who had played a drive to the same distance from the hole but he walked off the green saying "If Only" I had chipped in instead of Todd I would have got an eagle but instead after taking 4 shots from 30 meters, I get stuck with a 5 on the score card.

Putting is the best way to improve your scores. Jaxon had 44 putts, the most for the day. "If Only" he had 7 less putts he would have featured in the points run down instead of coming in 27th place. The guys who putted well, as a rule finished higher in the points run down. Mick, SOS, Gerard, and Cider all had 31 putts or less and they all were in the top 10 rankings. Chris Westhead is the exception to the rule. He finished in 3rd place despite racking up 40 putts for the morning. "If Only" he had putted to 2 putts per green or better, he would have been a real chance at knocking off his first Career title.

Steve Powne (the blue smurf) has won his third monthly title from his last 8 starts, taking his career tally to 6 wins. We are starting to wonder whether there might be some leather wedge activity going on because between Stevie Powne and Burnsie over the last three months they have won every monthly title (Steve Dec & Feb) (Burnsie Jan) and on each occasion they have been partnered together. "If Only" we were taking leather wedge nominations this early in the season then these two boys would be my first and second vote.

Each year the Leather Wedge award is given to the player who is best able to manipulate the rules of golf to help to improve their scorecard.

Actions such as kicking the ball out of the bushes with your foot when nobody looking. Not counting a short-missed putt because you were only mucking around. Dropping another ball where yours was lost without taking the relevant penalties and creative accounting (just not counting all of your shots.) These are just some of the many different ways that someone can earn a nomination for the title of Leather Wedge winner.

Although it was such a great day for Stevie Powne, it still had its challenging moments. The groups in the field behind the last year's Champion of Champions was delayed by 25 minutes when Steve parked his golf buggy in the middle of the 8th fairway while he walked up and down the course looking for his lost mobile phone. Eventually the phone was found in his left rear pocket instead of his front right pocket and it turned out it had never been lost in the first place.

"If Only" Steve used his mobile device for GPS course tracking directions he might have had an even better score than what he actually had. Evidently, he not only lost his phone on the 8th hole but he also lost his bearings. Steve drove from the 8th tee to the 7th fairway, then played his next shot from the 7th fairway onto what he thought was the perfect approach to the green. His ball

landed only 15 feet from the flag for what he thought had set himself up for an eagle putt. "If Only" Steve had of realized that he had hit his ball onto the 6th green instead of the 8th green where he was meant to be going.

Although Dawso managed to correctly hit towards all 18 greens, it wasn't quite the same when it came to hitting the right ball. "If Only" Dawso had checked the markings on his TaylorMade golf ball before he hit it on the 16th fairway, he would have noticed that his powerful drive must have either taken the identifying markings off the cover of his ball or he was about to play someone else's ball. Dawso usually has the letters SD written in large bold print on his ball, so he can easily identify it from other similar balls around the course, yet when he crossed onto Jamie's fairway, he failed to notice that there were two balls in the same proximity. Dawso completed the hole using a ball with Red Texta markings and the initials JB and left his ball with black permanent marker stains with the letters SD back in the middle of the fairway. It was only when Jamie chased him down on the next hole did Dawso even realize or admit that he was up for a penalty 2 strokes and a fine because he had played the incorrect golf ball.

There was no way Todd Neilson was going to accidentally play the wrong golf ball because the golf ball he was using on Sunday was a trophy earned and the markings on the ball are a memento of a special event and have significant sentimental value to him and his good friend Tom.



I am not sure if Duan Robinson also works with Tom or if he went on the buck's party as well, but "If Only" he did then I am all but certain he would have a whole box of these personalized golf balls. If he socializes with the fairer sex the way he plays golf then he would be sure to get lucky wherever he goes. Duan hit golf balls into trees on the 10th, 11th, 2nd, 4th, 6th and 8th holes and every single time they ricocheted back out of the woods and came to rest in the middle of the fairway. I have never known anyone to get lucky as often as he does. "If Only" the rest of us had even half the luck that Duan got then our scores would have been so much better.

At least Duan was a big contributor to the fine jar because although the end result was his ball sitting in the middle of the fairway, he was still accountable for the shanks he hit to get the ball heading into the trees in the first instance. Duan called his first bad shot a Shank and learned very quickly that it is better and less expensive if you call a wayward shot "a miss hit" rather than a "shank."

Greg Parsons has been around a long time and therefore knows the ropes, he was never going to call his first drive since October 2021 a shank. The ball took off sideways off the hozzle of his club, it rolled along the ground and sent the guys standing on the 3rd tee diving for cover, but Greg was never going to call his shot a shank. Greg is always keen to keep his fines to a minimum so calling a shank on your self is just not on his repertoire. "If Only" there wasn't also a mandatory \$5 fine for not driving past the ladies tees then he would have got away with avoiding the fine on the 10th hole. For the record Greg's second shot still didn't go far enough to get past the ladies tees either, although he did find his swing and played some pretty solid golf in the middle of his round. "If Only" he could putt instead of missing tap ins from 1 foot away. 40 putts over 18 holes was arguably a good return for the 2021 worst putter, however it still significantly impacted his score and place rankings.

Greg had a dose of the Duan's on the 14th hole when he hooked his ball destined straight towards the out of bounds in the adjoining paddocks. Well in theory that is where the ball should have finished, "If Only" it hadn't bounced off the star picket of the post and wire fence running along the golf course boundary and rolled miraculously back into the middle of the fairway. It wasn't his best drive for the day but at least it gave him a chance to score on the hole.

Greg saved his best drive for the longest drive competition hole, he smoked his driver 263, meters straight down the middle of the 8th fairway, for much of the walk it looked like he was going to claim the longest drive prize. "If Only" Cam Douglas hadn't been playing, "If Only" Cam's ball had stopped 5x meters shorter than it had rolled, then Greg would have claimed his 3rd Longest Drive prize. Unfortunately for GP it wasn't to be and he then spent the next 8 strokes thinking "If Only" I had laid up instead of going for the green, "If Only" the tree was not blocking his stance. "If Only" I hadn't wasted my best drive for the day with a score of 9.

Mick Harper wasted his opportunity to shoot a very low score, the big fella only made 8 pars and a birdie on a short playing golf course and he copped a \$2 fine when he shanked his ball into the creek on the par 3 third hole. His ball speared off left into the creek, bounced off a rock rebounding 4-stories high before disappearing into the ferny creek never to be seen again.

Overall, it was a long and tough day for most of the field, other than the outliers, Steve Powne at the Top and Mark Fitzy at the bottom the scores were pretty evenly spread. Many of the place rankings were determined based on a countback, which was a bit harsh on the guys who started their round playing on the back nine. Stu Coops had a 51 on the back nine and came home with a score of 39. Unfortunately for Stu his countback score was the 51 so he was quickly relegated to the bottom of the rankings.

For the newcomers, we have included a brief description of how the countback system works.

When more than one player has the same Nett Score (such as in the example below from Warburton then the place allocations are decided based on a countback system.

The count back system is formulated as the following. *Total number of stableford points scored on the back nine holes.

*In the event that both players have the same stableford score on the back nine it then reverts to the number of stableford points scored on the eighteenth hole. If this is the same then it goes to the 17th hole, sixteenth hole, fifteenth hole until a player has a better hole and therefore has a higher stableford score than the other.

In this instance both Rick and Mick had Nett 71 after their handicap was deducted from the Gross Scores. So, we go back to a countback.

In this example Rick wins because he had 17 points on the back nine compared to Mick who could only conjure up a disappointing 15 stableford points on the back nine and was therefore relegated down a place.

If in the event that the countback then identifies that both players have had the same stableford points score on the back nine then we go back to the individual holes starting from the 18th hole and compare results until a player had a standout result. In the example shown on the right both Cider and Westy finished their rounds equal with Nett 72. Then on the back nine holes each also had 17 Stableford points. On the 18th both guys also equalled with a 3-pointer hole so the scores on the 17th holes are then taken into consideration. On the 17th hole Cider scored a bogie for 2 stableford points whereas Westy struggled on the difficult dog leg hole. Westy finished with a triple bogie which once his handicap was deducted was only good for 1 stableford point. Consequently, Shane wins the countback and Westy is relegated back to a lower place ranking although he still beat another 4 guys on the same Nett score. If both scores are equal then we go back to the 17th hole, then the 16th, etc etc.

PLEASE NOTE THAT THE COUNT BACK IS ON HOLES 10-18 irrespective of whether it is a two-tee start, a normal hit off from the first hole or as in the case of Warburton we hit off both the 1st and 10th holes. It is always the 10th to 18th holes and if one person starts on the 10th hole and the other hits off the first hole then it still remains exactly the same formula.

Even with 9 chip ins from the field of 29 players there was only a fist full of birdies for the day, Only Stu's chip in on the 9th was a dodgy Birdie whereas all of the others were genuine green in regulation and sink the putt achievements. The first hole yielded a couple of sub-par scores. Stevie Powne and Peter Alphabet both made 3's on the first. The blue smurf's birdie being all the more exciting because it was his first hole for the day. Peter Alphabet had 9 holes to warm up before he took on the silo and the dog leg par 4. Big Micks long hitting enabled him to cut the corner, over the creek on the 6th hole so he pretty much drove the green on the 370meter 6th hole, so his Birdie was a simple chip close and a tap in putt. He pretty much didn't even raise a sweat.

Gerard MacIsaac built his round through holes 10 to 12. Gerard's score card was very impressive shooting two under par over the four-hole stretch including 3 threes in a row.

Greg Parsons, Todd Neilson, and Jaxon Fitzpatrick also had 3x threes in a row on their score cards. "If Only those threes weren't written down in the putting column. Greg spence had the longest run of threes for the day, he won the three-putt monkey vest and kept it by 3 putting every green between the 6th and 10th greens. That is 5x 3 putts in a row.

Gerard and Steve Powne were the only players to make multiple birdies, and SOS and Newell both birdied the 14th hole. SOS hit his ball closer to the flag than Highway did because Newell had to work his ball into the hole from 463cm away. As a result, Newell won the lonest holed putt competition and robbed SOS of the 2-hole skins jackpot in the process.

Warburton statistics included, 9x Birdies and 91x pars, 177 bogeys, 143 double bogies or worse including 8 Newell's (Score of 10 or more).

For the second month in a row one player has been the happy recipient of a large skins Jackpot. This month Steve Powne claimed 7 skins, six of them on the one hole and Thomas Cooper also claimed a 4-hole jackpot. Greg Spence managed to win a few hole jackpots once he finally managed to get his putter working, and Greg Parsons knocked a nine iron to a couple of feet on the 17th hole, which gave him a nervous tap in which won him a skin. Ronnie Parsons was a lot more confident with his par on the 12th hole, the reward for a good drive and a couple of putts was an extra raffle ticket courtesy of the skins in the 2022 raffle draw.

"SKINS" are distributed to those players good enough to win a hole outright. If more than 1 player got the lowest score on a hole it is Jackpotted until an outright winner occurs.

For every skin, a player wins during the season is converted to an extra raffle ticket to go into the end of year prize draw.

Just a reminder that for every round you play you are automatically awarded a raffle ticket to go towards the end of year raffle, then extra tickets are issued if you wear the official club shirt

Plus, the monthly winner has the option of exchanging the number of balls owed to Raffle tickets for the end of year prize draw as can be any nearest to pin or long drive or other ball prizes.

This year we are trialling a new competition, we ran it for the first time at Gardiners Run and again in February at Warburton. The concept is called the longest holed putt. The first group get to place a marker on the green at the point where the ball was located when the ball was holed. The intention is then to see who manages to sink the longest putt on that hole, as the marker would move further and farther back and around the green as we drop in those 8' and 10' footers for par, bogey, double bogey or even a Newell.

Winners of Longest holed Putt Jan (Jaxon Fitzpatrick) 1700cm. (putted from off the green) rule changed since. Feb (Newell Richards) 463cm

The putting average per player blew out by more than 2 strokes compared to Gardiners Run. There were 112 one putts on those small fast greens however it was counteracted with 95 three putts 4x four putts and one green where Newell used the putters at least five times but potentially a lot more than even that. At Warburton the average putts per player was 35.17 compared to only 33.69 in January. Jaxon (44putts), and Greg Spence (42putts) did very little to help the averages. Westy, Jake Schmidt, Greg Parsons and Cam Douglas all wore the front face off their putters racking up 40 putts or more during their rounds.

Any time when a golfer uses the putter less than 30 times is getting close to the elite level. On Sunday Shane Cumming, Steve Dawson, Gerard MacIsaac, Stu Coops and Jamie Brunton achieved this feat, with Jamie being the best putter with just 28 putts against his name. To put it in perspective, the current PGA No# 1 ranked putter in 2021 -22 season is Colin Morikawa who averages 29.664 putts per round.

Although he failed to go under the 30-putt barrier, SOS did manage to post 4 one putt greens in a row. That is when you know your putter is running hot.

In order to win the Season Championship trophy, you need to play regularly and consistently to about your handicap or better, and it is the handicapper's responsibility to make sure that this doesn't happen. After every round, the scores are assessed and then the handicaps are adjusted according to your performance. As was the case last year we have adjusted the handicap formula to take into consideration the difficulty of each golf course, using the course slope index.

What we have done is simply aligned the Sunday Leave Pass handicapping process with the one used by golf link and by all golf clubs around the globe using the world handicapping system. Although your SLP handicap is unofficial and therefore it cannot be used to formally enter organized golf competitions and tournaments, it still should be an accurate reflection of your golfing prowess and a measure of what your GA (golf Australia) handicap would be if you subscribed the \$150 per year to get an official handicap.

Your playing handicap will fluctuate around your documented handicap index. When you play an easy course such as Ringwood or Dorset then you will actually play off a lower handicap than you normally would. On the other days when we invite you to play a harder course such as Eagle Ridge, Devils Bend, Werribee Park or Cape Schanck we will add a few extra shots to your arsenal just to give you more hope of avoiding total anxiety and depression. As you will see from the chart listed below, the handicapper got busy to work this month and after all of the impressive scores at Warburton a large proportion of the field copped a notable handicap reduction. 12 handicaps came in and only Clarkey, Jaxon and Wayne James were allocated an outward movement.



As a new member of the Social Club the Callaway Handicapping system is used to give the player a daily played to handicap for the first couple of rounds. Once they have played 3 rounds, they are given a temporary club handicap using the original AGU handicapping system. After 5 rounds they are then switched across to the current slope handicapping system.



This system is used for determining fair allowances for social golf events that attract novices or occasional golfers. A player's Callaway handicap is determined after each round by deducting from his/her 18-hole gross score the scores of the worst individual holes during the first 16 holes of the round.

In the computation of handicaps under this system:

- -No hole may be scored at more than twice its par.
- half strokes count as a whole,
- the 17th and 18th holes are never deducted,

For example, if a player scores 99 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (3 worst holes) +1

If a player scores 82 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (worst + ½ the 2nd worst hole) -1

If a player scores 120 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (five worst holes) +2

After 3 rounds they will be allocated a temporary handicap using the old AGU handicapping formula and then after 5 rounds they are elevated onto the official Slope handicapping system which was use thereafter for all club competitions.

Sometimes the Callaway handicapping system has proved itself to be very favorable to new members. Whenever we take on a golf course like Devils Bend or Eynesbury and the field struggle to play to their handicaps the Callaway golfers end up featuring at the top of the points distribution. Greg Spence, it seems must have attended the Supercoaches seminar on Callaway handicap manipulation because Greg exploited the system to perfection. He finished the day in tenth place with a Solid Nett score of 73. Greg had a double par and a quadruple bogie on the two par 5 holes and his next two worst holes were also double pars. This meant he pretty much maxed out his handicap and elevated him well and truly up the leaderboard.

Interestingly, Duan Robinson also recorded the same gross score (107) however because his worst holes were not as bad as Greg's his handicap was 5 shots less meaning his Nett Score was not as desirable.

For those people interested in the mechanics of the handicapping system it can be best explained as the following.

How to calculate a GA Handicap

To calculate a player's GA Handicap:

- you must firstly identify the player's most recent 20 scores,
- you then determine the 'Played To' value for each of these scores,
- you average the best 8 'Played To' values,

19 or 20

- and finally you multiply this average by 0.93. The resultant figure (to one decimal place) is the player's GA Handicap.
- * If a player's handicap record contains a lesser number than 20 scores, the number of scores used to calculate the player's handicap is as listed in the table below.
- * There is no requirement for a player's most recent 20 scores to have been returned within a specific timeframe. For example, the most recent 20 scores may span a period of three years or they may span a period of three months.
- * Once a player's handicap record contains 20 scores, the next score they return will result in the oldest of the existing 20 scores being removed (to be replaced by the new score).

Full Technical Procedure for Calculating a GA HandicapSTEP 1 – Use the table below to determine the number of scores to be included in the GA Handicap calculation:

Stevie Powne the 2021 Champion of champion has made a very slow start to cashing in on his free drinks list. This time last year the Blue Jacket wearer had cashed in over 15 freebies, whereas Steve so far has only managed to tap one member on the shoulder. Evidently the Blue Smurf thought it was too hot to wear the Jacket on Sunday so he was not entitled to utilize his Champion of Champions powers while it was not on. Personally, I would have thought it is hot which means I am thirsty so get me another drink please.

For those who have forgotten about the powers bestowed on the Blue Jacket here is a reminder of how it works.

As the Champion of Champions Steve will be able to ask any Sunday Leave Pass member to buy him a drink, it is limited to only receiving one drink per member (beer or soft) over the entire year and it can only be done so only if he is wearing the Champion of Champion jacket at the time. This of course does not include new members who did not play at least one or more rounds in season 2021 but not exclusive to those who attended the golf trip. So, if he manages himself correctly, he should be looking at up to 42 free beers or soft drinks over the next 12 months. Now that is a prize worth aspiring for.

The other condition is that the Blue Smurf must be the one who consumes the drink, he cannot use his power to buy beverages for anyone else. There is also a catch where, if Steve asks someone who has previously shouted him a drink, then he must immediately buy them a drink instead. Not that there is much chance of that happening as he has a spreadsheet set up and running.

Steve can also kick in the balance of \$2 per shout to upgrade his beer to bourbons if he prefers to.

Remember that Steve must be wearing the jacket, He must continue to wear the jacket while he is drinking. If it is too hot to wear the Champion of Champions jacket that is OK, just choose not to wear it and then you are not eligible for a free drink. All purchased drinks are to be opened so they can not be taken home for future consumption or to give to dinner guests or visitors. A traveller for the drive is OK so long as it is opened, and Steve is the one who drinks it.

Remember: In order, to qualify as the Champion of Champions a member just needs to win a monthly title. All of the winners from the monthly championships who are attending the golf trip will then play off for the title based on total accumulated stableford points from 9x Randomly selected holes. The Winner is the person with the most points over those 9 nominated holes, and in the event of a tie then a Countback to determine the winner applies.

NOTE: The Winner of the December title is also eligible to win the competition however they only get to count their scores by using only 8 Randomly selected holes.

For those players not familiar with the scoring process, listed below is the format we use in Sunday Leave Pass competitions.

Once all of the players are ranked then the Seasons Championship points are allocated according to the position in the field.

The player in 1st place gets 15 points, 2nd place 14 points, 3rd place 13 points, etc. etc. Any player who completes the round however finishes ranked outside the top 14 and is placed between 15th spot to BeerWench then they are all allocated 1 championship point for attending.

For the benefit of the newcomers or the uneducated we thought it would be a good opportunity to go through the player rankings and point scoring system again.

Sunday Leave Pass competitions are run using Stroke so you need to count every shot that you play and you need to finish every hole. Each player's Nett total score is then calculated by deducting the players handicap from the Gross score. If a player doesn't have an official Sunday Leave Pass handicap, then a temporary played to handicap is allocated on the day using the Callaway handicapping system.

Once the players Nett score is calculated they are ranked from lowest score (Monthly title winner) to highest score. (BeerWench) Where more than one player has the same Nett Score then the place allocations are decided based on a countback system.

The player with the most points at the end of the year is crowned the Points champion irrespective of how many rounds a person has played. If one person plays 13 rounds for the year and the person in 2nd place has only played 10 rounds but is close to the same score then that is bad luck to the person in 2nd place. All players are invited to play the entire fixture. We reward participation rather than perfection and performance so if you play more often you will end up with more points.
