The Fedex Cup Season started on the golf trip 2022 and runs through until the last home and away game held in November 2023. The player with the most accumulated points at the end of the year is crowned the Fedex Cup champion.

FedEx Points are allocated to every player based on their finishing position for each round and there is a higher weighted value to finishing near the top.

There are 3 majors held each season and performing well on those competitions earns more points

It has been hard to write up about the Warburton round, because I wasn't there for most of it. Any hopes and dreams of a good round went out the window about 10pm on Saturday night. Unfortunately, the Warby round always coincides with a good mates birthday, so each year I plan to go over for a few drinks at his house and then get picked up in the morning because it is on the way through. This weekend it was his $50^{\text {th }}$ birthday and therefore things got a wee bit out of hand. What started as a few quiet beers turned into let's drink the entire cocktail list.


At 4am when my drinking buddy had deteriorated and gone beyond the ability to get us home to the designated Sunday collection point, there was a panicked cluster of text messages to Newell and Thomas to rearrange a new plan. Even in a drunken foggy haze I knew that I needed to arrange some clothing and golf gear because all of my stuff was left at the Supercoaches house where I wasn't going to be.

Luckily the Newell \& Thomas are light sleepers and they were able to bring my spare golf gear or else I would have been playing the Warby round in board shorts, red crocs and a Hawaiian shirt.

Although I made it to the first tee I was not in the greatest condition, after converting a birdie putt into a double bogie and then three putting the $2^{\text {nd }}$ green for a six there was little chance of the round going anywhere but downhill. When you use your entire allocated handicap strokes inside the first 6 holes then the odds of a strong place ranking have somewhat diminished.

At least I got to the course which is more than we can say for the supercoach. He started off as a bundle of enthusiasm and energy, then mid party he switched into the angry-man then finally descended into a comatose wreck incapable of finding his way back home.


Interestingly despite the poor golfing display I still managed to avoid finishing in beer wench position. It is hard to believe really especially when you see the where the ball was coming out of the club from. The funny thing about marking you ball so it is identifiable is if you hit the ball on the markings it leaves an impression on the club.

Some of my early swings on Sunday were lucky to hit the ball at all.


Newell Richards hadn't been on the drinks however he certainly plaid like he had been. Although he started his morning with a birdie, his round went down hill faster than Rick Turcinovic in a golf cart driving straight down the $18^{\text {th }}$ hole. Newell 3 putted the $11^{\text {th }}$ and $12^{\text {th }}$ greens, and then decided to put in a bid to reclaim the title as the player with the most career Newell's (score of 10 or more) by racking up double digits on the $14^{\text {th }}$ and $18^{\text {th }}$ holes.


Newell had the biggest Newell for the day (13) on the long par 5 hole although he made it look even further by hitting his tee shot 4 fairways across.

By the time he finished the hole he had not only hit a wider drive than even Stu coops could manage but he had also lost a golf ball in the rough, hit a ball out of bounds and three putted the green for a gross return of a Newell plus three.

The $18^{\text {th }}$ hole didn't go much better for Newell either. When he holed his putt and marked double figures on his scorecard for the second time in just 9 holes his playing partners were quick to understand how the term a "Newell" came to have his name attached to it.

When it came to handing out fines after the golf, it was starting to look as though Newell was making a pitch to have every indiscretion named after him. Newell tipped in his maximum $\$ 10$, fine and then proceeded to put his hand up for every finable offence. From our understanding Newell's $\$ 10$ fine was the culmination of the following actions:

Not hitting passed the ladies tees, having an air-swing, hitting across more than two fairways, a shank, a four putt, throwing a club, and even finishing with the three putt monkey vest. There is no wonder why he finished up as the worst ranked player for the day, and he did all that sober.

Just about the only offence Newell did not commit was putting from on the green to off the green. That particular feat was achieved by SOS when he over cooked a putt from above the hole on the Par $3,5^{\text {th }}$ hole.

Although the Warburton greens are only very small, they can be lightning quick, because the putting surface is a clover like grass it is perfectly flat and doesn't offer any resistance to slow the ball down. Often the golf ball would roll off the green and finish just off on the fringe of the green, giving a player a short free hit with the flat stick that doesn't count as a putt. Consequently, the putting statistics appear very good this month because there were lots of one putt greens from shots which normally would have stopped on the putting surface.

Having said that Tom Thurecht proved that if you hit the ball high enough then even on the fastest and slopiest green on the course you can still get the ball to stop.

The 6th Green at Warburton is one of the toughest greens on the course. Players hit into it from a an elevated fairway standing with the front feet lower than the back foot. It is a recipe for a skinny or bladed shot that shoots out hard and out the back. To make matters worse the green also runs from front to back so even a well struck approach usually runs across the putting surface.

Over the years it has not been unusual to see a player putt from on the green to off the green and there have been times when a ball hit up the green has rolled back to where it was initially struck from.

Tom Thurecht was having his first outing at the Warburton course and he proved that the greens aren't as hard to play as others make them sound. Tom found that if the ball high enough and straight enough it was still possible to hit the greens. On the 4th hole he flushed an iron straight at the flag stick it stopped, propped reversed and set him up for a very makeable uphill birdie putt. Which he comfortably sunk.

On the 6th green there was no back spin, however there was never any fear of the ball rolling off the green as a perfectly struck 52 degree wedge soared into the sky and the came to land like an elephant in a mud putt.


There were 5 chip-ins from off the green, both Adam and Stu Cooper used the flat stick from off the green to minimize their putting numbers. Graeme Foster had an exceptional day as he chipped in twice from off the green which was a great way of eliminating the effects of his five three putt greens. Jayden Orger also had a noner, his came on the $13^{\text {th }}$ green which was a tough pin position, and this shot salvaged a par from an otherwise difficult position to be hitting from.

Zac Harford used the putter just 12 times on the front nine, he had a streak of 6 one putts in a row. Sadly, Zac fell apart on the back nine and he even 3 putted the 18th green to finish his debut wearing the flouro yellow vest. Mick Harper kept his round alive with some spectacular scramble saves. While the driver and irons weren't going too well for him, the flat stick pulled him out of trouble time and time again. Mick had the least putts for the day, and with just 28 against his name he helped keep the clubs putting stats down.

1011 putts at an average of 33.17 putts per player is a very good return and proof that the small size of the greens certainly helps. Ronnie parsons was the only player to have 40 putts although given he was playing with only one functioning hand, he can probably be forgiven for letting the rest of the team down.

Poor Ron came into the round with an injury, his right arm was pretty much in a cast after he had a slight incident on the golf course last week. Evidently Ron has taken up having practice rounds at Pakenham on Wednesday mornings with Greg but unfortunately last week their round escalated into a bit of family violence. Depending on which story you would prefer to believe, Greg either accidentally or deliberately flushed a 7 iron into Ronnie from about 70 meters behind him. Depending on whether you believe Greg is chasing a life insurance payout or not, it was either a good shot or a bad one. Ronnie was lucky he didn't catch the ball in the skull as it literally hit his hand which he was holding up directly behind his right ear. Had it not been there to protect his head there was a good chance the ball would have killed him.

Rather than seek first aid, the first thing Greg thought to do was send a message out to his mates telling them all about it.


Given his hand-i-cap Ronnie did well to even complete his round, what's more he performed better than a couple of other guys in the field who did not have a valid excuse for a poor performance. Despite his injury and not even being able to hold the club properly, Ronnie managed to hit all of his drives past the ladies tees, which is more than we can say for some other able bodied members.

Greg Parson opened up the fine jar account with a \$5 donation on the very first hole after his tee shot finished in the garden bed some 9 meters short of the minimum required distance. Dawso and Stu Coops also dipped into their pockets to boost the beer and bangers fund when they too failed to get their golf balls moving in a forward direction.

The tee markers played much further back than we are used to seeing them at Warburton however there is still no excuse for failing to be able to hit the ball at least 30 to 40 meters to get a drive past the red tees.

The $18^{\text {th }}$ hole at Warburton is one of the best looking golf holes you will ever come across, and given the hole drops 70 vertical meters from the tee box to the bottom of the valley it is a very simple prospect for hitting a powerful shot which soars into the air and hangs in the sky for what seems like an eternity. Given the fall of the land and the gradient it is possible to hit almost any club in the bag from a putter to a driver and the golf ball will still roll all the way down the hill.

## Etghteenth Hole. Our Best

One of the best finishing holes you will ever play, 450 metres, with tests of nerves all the way. The drive needs accuracy over length, the approach shot needs both. Try and keep your drive centre-left to avoid getting caught on the hill. Enjoy the views and trust that this is the hole you will remember most.


Stu Coops decided to hit a driver off the deck, a little stinger fairway finder was on the cards, but unfortunately he pulled it left into the trees along side the tee box and the next thing he knew he was playing his second shot from behind the squatters tees and $\$ 5$ poorer for his efforts.


While some players were struggling to get the ball going forward there were others who were sending it into orbit. The $14^{\text {th }}$ hole was the nominated long drive hole because it is a nice wide fairway and had a down hill gradient to help the ball roll on and gain some momentum. There were some huge drives launched down the picturesque par 5 hole but none went further than Steve Dawsons drive. Dawso creamed a high draw which landed in the speed zone and the just kept going. When the ball finally came to rest it was clearly the longest drive and at 330 meters it has the longest documented drive distance in SLP history, well since we started keeping these statistics anyway. Dawso was left with just a 8 iron into the green and made the most simple of birdies on the hole.


Tom Thurecht is only new to the club however he was inspired by his playing partner's game. Tom took Dawso's lead and shot the lights out on the back nine. It took Tom 50 strokes to navigate the back nine holes of Warburton, however after the turn he stepped it up a gear or two. Tom improved his game by 14 shots, making 5 pars and a birdie to go with just 3 bogies. Tom had a personal best nine hole score of 36 and he can probably count himself unlucky because with a GA handicap of 18 he would have finished with 39 stableford points, however under the Callaway handicapping system that we use for all newcomers he was savaged and only finished the day with Nett 76 after being given a Callaway handicap of 10. Tom copped it badly because his worst hole was the 18th hole which must always be used but not deducted to avoid players tanking and his other 16 holes were very consistent, so his worst score was a 6 which meant there was little room for his handicap to go.

Zac on the other hand got the benefit of some terrible holes which blew out his handicap to 26 . Zac fell on the good side of the numbers and managed to place inside the top 10 which is a rare feat for players under the Callaway handicapping system unless the entire field have had a shocker.

As a new member of the Social Club the Callaway Handicapping system is used to give the player a daily played to handicap for the first couple of rounds. Once they have played 3 rounds, they are given a temporary club handicap using the original AGU handicapping system. After 5 rounds they are then switched across to the current slope handicapping system.

Even if a player has an official golf link, as a matter of consistency we still use the Callaway system to calculate a daily handicap.



After 3 rounds they will be allocated a temporary handicap using the old AGU handicapping formula and then after 5 rounds they are elevated onto the official Slope handicapping system which was use thereafter for all club competitions.

Sometimes the Callaway handicapping system has proved itself to be very favorable to new members. Whenever we take on a golf course like Devils Bend or Eynesbury and the field struggle to play to their handicaps the Callaway golfers end up featuring at the top of the points distribution. Whereas often a round on a low scoring course like Centenary Park or Dorset it can be difficult for a Callaway handicapped member to pick up too many points.

After the January round in response to some blistering scores the handicapper got busy taking strokes off everybody and anybody. It seems he might have got a wee bit aggressive and slash happy because this month he has reversed many of those strokes and in some cases given back even more than was taken in the first instance.

Only Brent Douglas, Peter Alphabet, and Peter McArthur were cut back shots. Macca was the hardest hit, he lost another 1.1 strokes as he handicap rockets down towards single figures.

Colin Ewart is making a pitch towards being the highest handicapped player as he loaded up nearly a full shot on his handicap taking him out to 31.5 narrowing the gap on Rick who was only given 0.1 strokes this month. Greg Parsons received one of the biggest handicap corrections, his handicap was loaded up by 0.7 strokes and that new handicap 28.2 will be his baseline for how will his new golf clubs go and whether they improve his game going forward.

It has been a while since Dale Robinson graced us with his presence and the handicapper has identified that look of practice is showing in his normally consistent game. Dale will start the Centenary Park round in March whith 3/4 of a shot more than he had this month.

As a new member of the Social Club the Callaway Handicapping system is used to give the player a daily played to handicap for the first couple of rounds. Once they have played 3 rounds, they are given a temporary club handicap using the original AGU handicapping system. After 5 rounds they are then switched across to the current slope handicapping system.

Even if a player has an official golf link, as a matter of consistency we still use the Callaway system to calculate a daily handicap.
For those people interested in the mechanics of the handicapping system it can be best explained as the following.

## How to calculate a GA Handicap

To calculate a player's GA Handicap:

- you must firstly identify the player's most recent 20 scores,
- you then determine the 'Played To' value for each of these scores,
- you average the best 8 'Played To' values,
- and finally you multiply this average by 0.93. The resultant figure (to one decimal place) is the player's GA Handicap.
* If a player's handicap record contains a lesser number than 20 scores, the number of scores used to calculate the player's handicap is as listed in the table below.
* There is no requirement for a player's most recent 20 scores to have been returned within a specific timeframe. For example, the most recent 20 scores may span a period of three years or they may span a period of three months.
* Once a player's handicap record contains 20 scores, the next score they return will result in the oldest of the existing 20 scores being removed (to be replaced by the new score).

Full Technical Procedure for Calculating a GA Handicap STEP 1 - Use the table below to determine the number of scores to be included in the GA Handicap calculation:

Note: When the handicap record contains more than 20 scores, the GA Handicap calculation uses the best 8 of the player's most recent 20 scores.

The reason Douggo's handicap went out was because his 20th round (Yarrambat) was a flagged round which dropped off and it was therefore replaced by his new 8th best round which was at Centenary Park but it was nearly 2 shots worse score.
A score of 18.5246 was replaced by 20.8158 meaning his handicap goes out.
Next month a flag round isn't dropping off which means Douggo's handicap will definitely not go out however his handicap could possibly come in so long as a has a score of better than 20.8158.


Let us hope that Glenn shows up next month because he was a No Show, he claims he had family commitments that he couldn't get out of although there is a lot of suspicion that he was just staying away to avoid having to wear the Beer Wench vest.
In Glenn Douglas's absence Colin Ewart was a good sport and picked up the responsibility of wearing the beer wench vest. Douggo will be donating a $\$ 10$ fine for failing to fulfill his obligation however under the rules of the club the next person in line who is in attendance must wear the vest. The way Colin played on Sunday he certainly represented the Beer Wench vest well. He nearly hit Todd Neilson twice with errant shots and his air swing on the $18^{\text {th }}$ hole was a sight to be seen.

On the $17^{\text {th }}$ hole Colin had hit his ball down into the scrub alongside the fairway. When he found his ball he was left with the difficult situation of a side angle stance with his feet nearly 40 cm higher than the golf ball. It was a precarious position and Todd Neilson was not comfortable to be in close proximity to Colin playing the shot especially since just four holes before Colin had accidentally hit a ball into him.

Barry Hemsley was not sure why Todd was turning up almost side saddling him in the golf cart, Colin was too close and Todd was nervous. There was no telling where Colins next shot might end up, however I don't think anyone other than Todd could have predicted that he would hit the ball flush into the golf cart, it just missed Todd, bounced off the wind shield and bounced out the other side nearly taking Barry's arm out in the process. The ball came to rest in the fairway back behind where Colin had played his previous shot from and how it didn't shatter the windscreen or hit someone is anyone's guess.

Jake Schmidt had some rebound action on the 9th hole. He knocked his ball straight into the creek running across the fairway, however instead of disappearing into the water the ball ricocheted off a rock and bounced 40 meters into the air before coming to rest up near the front edge of the green.

Zac and Rick did not quite have the same fortune when it came to hitting their golf balls into the creek. On the 6th hole both boys were playing 5 off the tee. The 6th tee box was very intimidating as the marker had been set up right at the back, recessed into a cutting in the bush. A wooden barrier fence made the drive all the more stressful because a skinny hook would result in the ball bouncing straight back at your head.

Ricks first drive missed the fence and even the fairway by 45 degrees. He hit a shank straight across the 5th green. Zac took a similar line however he had more smash factor on the ball and it disappeared over the 5th tee and bounced into the back yard of a local residence. In both cases the reload was an over correction and the boys pulled their third shots left and deep into the creek never to be seen again. There is nothing more daunting that standing on the tee with 4 shots on the card and still not having a ball in play. Although both boys managed to get the ball moving forward with their 5th shots the damage was already done. Zac scrambled his way down the hole to salvage a 9 , whereas Rick went on to post his 91 st career Newell (score of 10 or more) and a big one at that.


As spectacular as the scenery is and as pretty as the creek may be, there is no joy in looking for an errant shot hit along the river bank. Greg Parson hit his tee shot on the 5th hole across the 6th fairway and into the marked hazard. After a long search he was unable to find his Srixon 3 with the initials GP written on them although he did find 7 other balls in the general vicinity and amazingly they were all Srixons, just not his one.

The trees at Warburton are no more forgiving than the creek areas. Some of the trees that grow through the course are hundreds of years old and if you get stuck behind them there is no escape route to the green. The pines and gums around the course dispel the age old myth that trees are $90 \%$ air. When it comes to playing golf at Warby they are clearly $100 \%$ wood.

If you are Stu Coops and you have already used up your entire handicap strokes after just 6 holes then the trees no longer pose as an issue.

While everyone else was playing a conservative line on the 17th tee Stu was chasing the prospect of driving the green by trying to launch his tee shot over the corner.

The 18th hole was even more aggressive with a hybrid from 220 meters out chasing a window in the forest landscape.


Warburton has been a challenging course over the years and it had accounted for 143 of the 1644 Newells the SLP crew have accrued over the years. Perhaps the knowledge helped our members because at the end of the round there was only 56 Newell's scored for the day and 66 percent of those had been made by the two most prolific Newell scorer's in the club. Newell had a 13 (Newell plus 3) on the 14th hole and then reached double figures again on the last hole of the day.

Rick Turcinovic took a dozen strokes to complete the 6th hole and then he met his Nemesis hole a couple of holes later. Rick was flagged as having 8 Newells from 11 attempts on the 8th hole, so the odds were pretty solid that he would post a big number on the hole again. Rick had a strategy and he thought if he played all of his shots down the 7th fairway then it would count as a Newell on the 8th hole however when he knocked his putt in the hole he was disappointed to hear that the score would still be recorded for posterity as another Newell on the 8th hole.

For those players not familiar with the scoring process, listed below is the format we use in Sunday Leave Pass competitions.
Once all of the players are ranked then the Seasons Championship points are allocated according to the position in the field.
The player in $1^{\text {st }}$ place gets 15 points, $2^{\text {nd }}$ place 14 points, $3^{\text {rd }}$ place 13 points, etc. etc. Any player who completes the round however finishes ranked outside the top 14 and is placed between $15^{\text {th }}$ spot to BeerWench then they are all allocated 1 championship point for attending.

For the benefit of the newcomers or the uneducated we thought it would be a good opportunity to go through the player rankings and point scoring system again.

Sunday Leave Pass competitions are run using Stroke so you need to count every shot that you play and you need to finish every hole. Each player's Nett total score is then calculated by deducting the players handicap from the Gross score. If a player doesn't have an official Sunday Leave Pass handicap, then a temporary played to handicap is allocated on the day using the Callaway handicapping system.

Once the players Nett score is calculated they are ranked from lowest score (Monthly title winner) to highest score. (BeerWench) Where more than one player has the same Nett Score then the place allocations are decided based on a countback system.

The countback is calculated using the total No\# of stableford points scored on the back nine holes. In the event that both players had the same score over the 18 holes then the count back

This month it was Peter Mac Arthur who stepped up to the plate and played out of his skin. Pete is only a few rounds into his Sunday Leave Pass career however he is already proving himself a force to be reckoned with. Pete is sneaky long off the tee and his iron play is very solid. The difference between this month and his previous efforts was Peter's putting. The small greens and Warbuton worked in his favor, for the first time ever Pete went 18 holes without a three putt green. He finished the round using the flat stick only 29 times, and with a Nett score of 68 he was two shots clear of the pack and could sign off for his first career title.

Todd Neilson has a good record at Warburton, he has never had a Newell at Warby, we are still trying to work out whether this is because the course suits his game style and he plays it well or because he only has 9 fingers and therefore he can not count to 10 .

For the newcomers, we have included a brief description of how the countback system works.
When more than one player has the same Nett Score (such as in the example below from Gardiners Run then the place allocations are decided based on a countback system.

The count back system is formulated as the following. *Total number of stableford points scored on the back nine holes.
*In the event that both players have the same stableford score on the back nine it then reverts to the number of stableford points scored on the eighteenth hole. If this is the same then it goes to the $17^{\text {th }}$ hole, 16 th hole, 15 th hole etc. until a player has a better hole and therefore a higher stableford score than the other.

The table blow shows examples of the countback system in action as it occurred at Warburton.

Although all Sunday Leave Pass rounds are scored as stroke events, we use the stableford scoring system to run a skins competition across the entire field.
"SKINS" are distributed to those players good enough to win a hole outright. If more than 1 player got the lowest score on a hole it is Jackpotted until an outright winner occurs.

Just a reminder that for every round you play you are automatically awarded a raffle ticket to go towards the end of year raffle, then extra tickets are issued if you wear the official club shirt. Plus, the monthly winner has the option of exchanging the number of balls owed to Raffle tickets for the end of year prize draw as can be any nearest to pin or long drive or other ball prizes.

It is a rare site to see Stu Coopers name on the NTP markers especially twice in the same round. Stu could have put an exclamation point against a very challenging day had he only been able to sink either of his 8 foot birdie putts on the par 3 holes.

Thomas is no stranger to the NTP holes, he has almost racked up as many NTP titles as his dad despite only playing 200 games less during his career. ## 2022 Champion of Champions



Winner of the blue Jacket and all of its powers for 2023.

For those who have forgotten about the powers bestowed on the Blue Jacket; here is a reminder of how it works.

As the Champion of Champions a player is able to ask any Sunday Leave Pass member to buy him a drink, it is limited to only receiving one drink per member (beer or soft) over the entire year and it can only be done so, if he is wearing the Champion of Champion jacket at the time. This of course does not include new members who did not play at least one or more rounds in season 2022, but not exclusive to those who attended the golf trip. So, if he manages himself correctly, he should be looking at up to 51 free beers or soft drinks over the next 12 months. Now, that is a prize worth aspiring for.

The other condition is that the player must be the one who consumes the drink, he cannot use his power to buy beverages for anyone else. There is also a catch where, if the wearer of the blue jacket asks someone who has previously shouted him a drink, then he must immediately buy them a drink instead. The Champion of champions can also kick in the balance of $\$ 2$ per shout to upgrade his beer to bourbons if he prefers to.

Remember that the Champ must be wearing the jacket, He must continue to wear the jacket while he is drinking. If it is too hot to wear the Champion of Champions jacket, that is OK, just choose not to wear it and then you are not eligible for a free drink. All purchased drinks are to be opened so they cannot be taken home for future consumption or to give to dinner guests or visitors. A traveller for the drive home is also OK , so long as it is opened, and the jacket wearer is the one who drinks it.

Remember: In order, to qualify as the Champion of Champions a member just needs to win a monthly title. All of the winners from the monthly championships who are attending the golf trip will then play off for the title based on total accumulated stableford points from 9x Randomly selected holes. The Winner is the person with the most points over those 9 nominated holes, and in the event of a tie then a Countback to determine the winner applies.

NOTE: The Winner of the December title is also eligible to win the competition however they only get to count their scores by using only 8 Randomly selected holes.
