



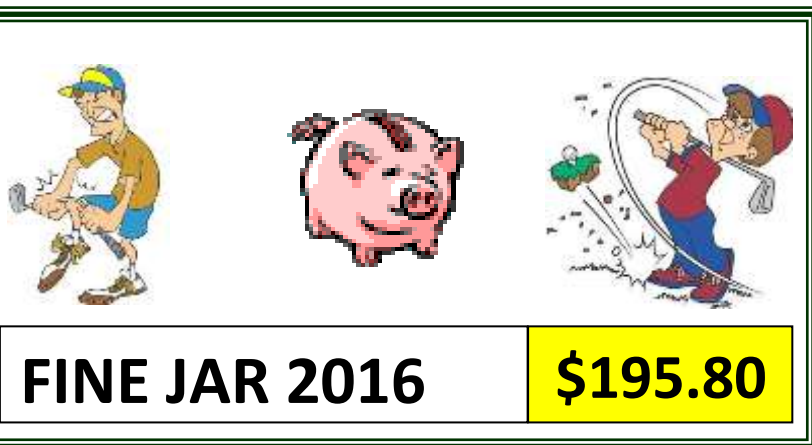

Speaking of fines, Once again this year we are going to be enforcing a penalty for late payment of golf fees. The payment for each month is due no later than the Thursday the week final numbers are due.

There is no excuse for late payment since everyone receives at least a minimum of two reminder emails and a text message prior to the due date. Players who fail to meet the deadline will be charged a late payment levy of **\$5-00** on top of the original golf fee's. Anyone who finds it too difficult to make the EFT transfer on time is welcome to make a larger transfer and keep some money in credit for when they fail to make the payments on time.

Warburton Golf Course Results

February

Warburton continues to be a happy hunting ground for Tony MacIsaac. As he closes in on his 100th round Tony is still yet to win a monthly title, however once again he had a very good place finish on the much loved mountain goat track. If Tony is ever to win a season title it will most likely be at Warburton, especially since he has scored his best ever round at Warby. (95 in 2009) to finish in 2nd place on a count back. In 2010 he also ran 2nd losing by just one shot and it should be noted that statistically Tony averages ranking at 5.72 at Warburton compared to his career average place finish of 11.43. So to put it in a nutshell Tony is twice as good a golfer at Warburton as he is at any other golf course. It was only an errant 3 putt which kept him away from his illusive victory. Tragically he finished with Nett 67 just one shot behind the leader and third overall for the day on a countback.

Traditionally Warburton has gotten the better of the field and it has produced some big scores over the years. The golf course has broken many hearts and that doesn't just mean Paul Blizzard and Greg Breasley who can both attribute their heart attacks to the Warburton Golf course because on each instance it happened the week after walking hilly the Warburton fairways so if you have a pain in the chest this week call the ambo's straight away. There have been some disastrous rounds at Warby and the 18th hole has been accountable for more Newell's (score of 10 or more) than any other hole in Sunday Leave Pass history. This was not the case in 2016 and Tony wasn't the only player to shine this month, under what can only be described as perfect conditions there was some very good golf played across the entire field.

The course was torn apart by the boys in blue as it was taken for 85 pars and 14 birdies. Certainly a totally different result to what we achieved at Yerring Meadows. Consequently the handicapper has been very savage to almost the entire field of 27 players. A total of 7.1 strokes were taken off regular Sunday Leave Pass slope handicaps and the generosity within the Callaway handicap system which was shown in January was wound back to the tune of negative 103.1 strokes. The outcome of this was that the newbies such as Cliff (Callaway 11 from Callaway 23), Ian (Callaway 19 from Callaway 35), Todd (Callaway 14 from Callaway 34), Tom (Callaway 31 from Callaway 46) and Bevan (Callaway 17 from Callaway 29), were so severely butchered that they struggled to compete against the rest of the field. Interestingly Brendan MacIsaac who's handicap was stripped back 22 shots as he moved from the Callaway scoring system to an official Sunday Leave Pass handicap still managed to avoid going back to back Beer Wench.

We were half expecting to see the beer wench vest either remaining on Brendan's shoulders or else getting passed from Brendan to Newell as they were both in the same golf cart, however it wasn't to be the case.

Brendan was lucky enough not to escape the humiliation of having to wear the coveted vest as it was lost in transit after the January round. Since we didn't get a chance to see Brendan in the vest on Sunday we have photo shopped a picture of what we think it would have looked like on him although we are hoping that it won't be too far down the track before he qualifies for the role again soon.

To their credit both Newell and Brendan were able to post a slightly better score than Greg Parsons who I can promise will have the privilege of donning the Beer Wench vest at Dorset after playing what can only be described as a crappy round broken up with a couple of flashes of brilliance.

A caveat has been put on the blurb this month and we have been asked not to mention Greg Breasley in the write up. This is a great disappointment as it means we are unable to tell you about some of the many great stories that came out of Greg's walk around the park chasing the little white ball. Had we been allowed to do so, we would have told you how on the very first hole Greg hit the perfect drive around the dog leg corner and his ball finished just 30 meters from the green. It's such a shame really because it would have glorified Greg especially when he chipped his ball onto the green and set up a relatively easy birdie putt.

I guess the reason the caveat was putt on the document was because Greg didn't want anyone to hear how once he landed on the green he then proceeded to putt his ball at the wrong hole. It would have been hilarious to explain to our readers how Greg mistakenly aimed and hit his birdie putt at hole which had recently been filled in and capped by the greens keepers and that it was in the completely opposite direction to where the real playable hole was located. Understandably like cardinal Pell such information is trying to be kept quiet for fear of loss of reputation especially in this instance when Greg tried to argue with his playing partners that he hadn't hit the ball to the wrong hole, as he might sound like a fool to those newcomers who have just joined the club especially when they read how he walked up to tap his ball into the covered over hole and then said "Oh S#!t you are right that is not the right one."

Had we been allowed to, this month's newsletter would have been filled with great content, for example we might have mentioned a shanked ball that Greg Breasley played straight into the golf cart parked beside the tee. In truth we would have probably edited that section out for fear of reprisal and the Golf course hearing about it and the social club being forced to pay for the repairs to



the damage to the cart, although how they didn't notice the 3cm dimple patterned dint on the side quarter panel when the cart was returned is beyond belief.

Since we can't mention Greg Breasley in the results write up we are unable to mention the incident on the 15th hole when he parked his 3 wheeler golf buggy facing the downslope of a hill without putting the brake on while he tried to find a golf ball that had been hit up in the tree but never came down.

From what I remember in science class, according Newton's laws of physics when then force of gravity is greater than the level of resistance it results in momentum. It would have been a great tale to tell everyone how Greg's trolley disappeared down the 15th hole and accelerated as it ran across the 16th fairway before luckily it started to bank to the right and did a long sweeping hook turn and came to rest halfway down the 17th hole some 150 meters from where Greg looked on in a state of horror. Had the buggy not made a turn up the hill and come to rest (showing a serious need for a wheel alignment), it most likely would have continued rolling until it hit the bottom of the 18th fairway.

Thankfully the gag clause only prevents us from mentioning Greg Breasley, so we are still able to highlight other noteworthy accomplishments from Sundays round at Warburton. We have freedom to write about, people like Geoff Cooper, Todd Neilson and Adam who all managed to have 3 putts after hitting their balls onto the green on a Par 3 to be in position to win the NTP title.

As embarrassing as it is to 3 putt for bogie, it is not half as tragic as walking off with the three putt monkey vest after scoring a par. Stu Coops hit his drive on to the green on the par four tenth hole, he lagged the eagle putt, missed his birdie and was forced to make a testy downhill right to left breaker to sneak in for a 3 putt par. Stu is still trying to work out if it was the three putts on the 10th hole or the 2 footer on the last hole that cost him first place since he actually finished in 4th spot for the day on a count back although had he made his gimmie putt on the 18th he would have actually ended up winning the monthly title.

Stu also drove the 15th Green, but was playing the 16th hole at the time, and was so rude that he played his next shot while the next group was still trying to putt out. As you all are aware there was a fine created to bleed out Stu's bank account. There is a \$2 fine for hitting your ball across two fairways, and there is not a month goes by that Stu doesn't dig into his pocket to pay out for this offence at least once per round. At Warburton a new record may have been broken however as Stu launched into a longest drive attempt that went horribly astray. Admittedly Stu's drive was probably the furthest from the tee but he managed to hit it from the 8th tee to beyond the 17th tee.



As is often the case Stu managed to play some very unusual shots from some Very extraordinary places but he usually escaped unharmed on the scorecard.

Mick Harper hit a bomb on the 6th hole. The big fella is yet to win a longest drive in Season 2016, however he did manage to get some really good airtime out of his ball. Micks drive on the sixth Hole travelled nearly 300 meters. It went 125 meters forward, 75 meters left on to the next fairway and 100 meters straight up into the air. His ball came down with such a thump that it registered as a small earth tremor reading by the Hans Ligthardt the local Warburton seismologist. Micks ball left such a big hole in the middle of the fairway that Greg Breasley nearly started to putt towards it. (Whoops I wasn't meant to mention Greg, so please disregard the last comment.)

Gerard MacIsaac says he was surprised his longest drive attempt survived the field of 27 players, especially since he posted his shot early in the day as he was one of the first groups onto the course, his drive was a left handers slice that crashed through the leaves as it flew down the tree line. According to Gerard the trees took at least 75 meters off the drive distance so he was pleased to take the prize at the end of the day, especially knowing that the big hitters, Douggo, Big Ball Breasley and Mick were playing all in groups behind him.

Gerard was also very quick to accept the nearest to pin prize on the 15th hole despite failing to even hit his ball onto the green. Evidently Adam Cooper could not find his name on the marker so he wrote his name on a blank naming plate on the NTP marker. In doing so he accidentally knocked out Gerard's name out as well and because the last group failed to notice Adams handwritten name they mistakenly credited the title to Gerard instead. I would watch out if I was you Gerard as Adam will be waiting in the carpark at Dorset to claim his ball back, especially since you are such a regular prize winner anyway.

The nearest to pin shots were pro championship worthy, the furthest NTP marker would have been within 2 meters of the flag, Phil Plane hit a flag seeking missile into the ninth hole, Grumpy hit inside an already noteworthy shot into the third, Adam Cooper (alias Gerard MacIsaac) was inside a meter after his tee shot and outside 2 meters from the cup after 2 strokes. Greg Parson made the easiest of two putt pars from 18 inches on the 6th hole. How he could have possibly missed the first putt is beyond comprehension but he was only too happy to accept the two very uncommon occurrences for him on the same day. Pars and NTP prizes in Greg's golfing career have been a very rare event so he was smiling from ear to ear despite carding 111 (Nett 84) and finishing in Beer wench position. So unusual was it that Greg had hit the green that when there was some confusion because two different names were sticking out of the NTP marker and the choice was either Greg Parsons and Glenn Douglas the playing group deducted that the shot must have been played by Glenn. The irony was that Glen hadn't even played the hole yet so he was a bit surprised to walk onto the green to see that he had been credited with NTP before he had even hit the shot.

Todd Neilson somehow managed to win the NTP prize on the 12th hole after missing the green by 25 meters to the left. Whereas his partners had gone straight at the flag and were rewarded (penalized) with the ball rolling down the slope of the green and finishing down the gully in the rough, Todd's ball miraculously finished only meters from the hole. Nobody could work out if the ball ricocheted off a tee, bounced off a rock or if the ball was controlled by a remote control in Todd's pocket, but even he was walking around in the scrub for 5 minutes before his ball was identified in the most unexpected of places. Fortunately he got his just reward and he three putted for bogie.

Perhaps Todd's accent is not of Canadian origin but more from the land of the leprechauns. Todd seemed to have the luck of Irish. His balls lipped in sideways on the first three greens, his ball defied the laws of gravity as it bounced and rolled up hill, ricocheted off trees, and completed all manner of other miraculous feats. The most incredible of putts was Todd's 3rd putt on the 13th hole. While staring down the barrel of a four putt fine if he missed a six footer Todd hit his ball past the hole missing the cup by at least an inch. His ball stopped then propped, then reversed, broke right and caught the lip before disappearing into the bottom of the cup.



We are yet to prove whether the ball was pushed back down the hill by the natural forces of gravity, triggered by a bee coming to rest on the ball, or whether the small earth tremor caused by Micks skied drive coming back down from orbit was the reason for the ball rolling backwards but whatever the reason there is no way on earth it should have done what it did.

Todd finished his round in absolute brilliant form; he parred four of the last five holes and showed that he is going to be a force to reckon with as the season goes on. Based on what we saw on Sunday, Todd has been given the nickname Todd the tank engine because it is pretty obvious he is holding back his skills just so he gets himself a healthy generous handicap to start off playing on.

Greg Parsons hit his best and worst shots one after the other, discounting the NTP shot to 18 inches, because that was credited to Douggo. Greg's tee shot on the 18th hole barely moved at all. Greg only just knicked the ball and it trickled off the tee peg and finished hiding in its shadows. So close to the tee was his ball that he had to ask a ruling from his playing partners as to whether he was allowed to move the tee or whether he should call it as an unplayable lie given the peg was interfering with his next shot.

The angry pills came out when he was reminded of the \$5 fine payable for failing to hit past the ladies tees. (An incredible accomplishment given that you can literally putt your ball off the 18th tee and still get to the bottom of the hill) Greg launched into a driver off the deck and smashed it so far and hard that he cleared the valley 110 vertical meters below and his ball disappeared into the lake which sits 285 meters from the tee box, something that not even the big hitters Mick, Gerard, Douggo and Big Ball Breasley couldn't do even with the assistance of a tee under the ball.

Shane Cumming (alias Cider) actually threw his ball into the lake on the 18th hole, but that was from the back of the green at the end of his round after botching up a very makeable birdie and converting it into a four putt score of six and having to wear the three putt monkey vest into the bar.

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This system is used for determining fair allowances for social golf events that attract novices or occasional golfers. A player's Callaway handicap is determined after each round by deducting from his/her 18 hole gross score the scores of the worst individual holes during the first 16 holes of the round.

In the computation of handicaps under this system:

- No hole may be scored at more than twice its par,
- half strokes count as a whole,
- the 17th and 18th holes are never deducted,

For example if a player scores 99 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (3 worst holes) +1

If a player scores 82 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (worst + ½ the 2nd worst hole) -1

If a player scores 120 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (five worst holes) +2

After 3 rounds they will be allocated a temporary handicap using the old AGU handicapping formula and then after 5 rounds they are elevated onto the official Slope handicapping system which was use thereafter for all club competitions.

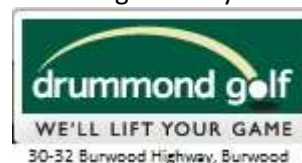
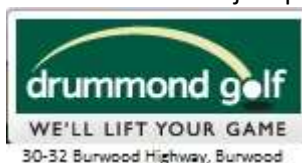
