WERRIBEE PARK GOLF CLUB


What a lovely, picturesque golf course and one with just enough bite to make your golfing experience a challenge. As we pegged it up on the first tee, I couldn't help but feel sad to think that this round might just be the last time we get to play at Werribee Park. It has been voted out of the 2024 Sunday Leave Pass fixture and once a golf course drops off the radar it is usually very hard to get it voted back in again. As I tapped in my putt on the 18th green, after four and a half hours walking the course taking in the amazing vista's around the Werribee river banks I had tears in my eyes, not because I was going to miss one of my favourite SLP courses rather it was due to the fact that I had produced yet another shocking golf round and wasted another opportunity to claim a ticket for the battle of the champion of champions trophy and the blue jacket.


This collection of images have been put together, not only to show how spectacular the Werribee golf course is but it also a chronological road map which could be used to demonstrate all of the different places I managed to hit my golf ball into trouble.

Mick Harpers GPS road map to the golf course was a lot more wayward than his golf ball tracker once he finally arrived at Werribee. Evidently Mick missed the turn off on the Westgate Freeway which takes you towards Geelong and the next thing he knew Mick was heading past the Mt Derrimut golf course and heading off towards Eyensbury.

Mick wasn't the only person to get lost driving to the course. Thomas, SOS and Co. took a turn off early and found themselves cruising through the backstreets of Hoppers crossing, they stopped to ask a car for directions but that proved to be know help because the car they flagged down was Greg P and Chris Sfiligoj who had made exactly the same mistake and also taken the wrong exit off the freeway.

Both Chris and Greg Parsons were lucky to be playing golf at Werribee Park at all, each having his own tale of misfortune and a reason why they nearly missed their call up to the tee.

Chris' story started on Saturday when he decided that he needed to hit a few balls at the driving range to clear a few of the cobwebs that have formed due to his lack of participation. Chris has only graced us with his presence, twice this season, so his golf clubs have been gathering dust in the garage. When he went out to collect his lonely, bent metal sticks Chris discovered they were not in their usual spot. It took Greg four days to arrive home after he left for golf on Monday morning however he still only managed to complete 6 holes before he was bundled up into an ambulance and shipped off to the hospital emergency department to be treated for a mystery medical ailment. Initially what was thought could have been a possible heart attack turned out to be a few wayward gall and or kidney stones. Having been witness to Greg's condition I must admit I was pretty concerned for him at the time, especially when he told me his wife had just got back from her solo adventure holiday in Bali and that she had cooked him a special dinner on her first night home. After what has been some pretty difficult conditions over the Winter months, the Werribee course put on an absolute ripper of a day. There was barely a breath of wind, the longer the day went on the more the sun continued to shine, and the fairways and greens were firm and hard and fast more reflective of summer conditions rather than the end of the wet season. Barry Hemsley nearly dislocated his thumb trying to push a tee into the ground on the first tee.

Although the scores were not spectacular they were certainly better than we have seen for the last few months. Jamie Brunton took full advantage of the round being played on his wife's home turf. Jamie has become what we would call an occasional member because most of his spare time is dedicated to being the perfect father and husband. This month he was able to summon up the courage to ask for a leave pass given the golf course was only 5 minutes away from the outlaws house. When Jamie suggested a family visit which included a 5 hour leave pass for him to play golf, it was awarded with little challenge from the fun police. The reward was 15 championship points and Jamie's fifth Sunday Leave Pass career title. Interestingly Jamie's first ever title was won at Werribee Park in 2004 which makes him the first player to win multiple titles at the Werribee golf course.

Nett 70 was the best score by 2 strokes, although it should be noted that Brad McMahon had a triple bogey on the 18th hole to close out what was otherwise a faultless round ( 79, Nett 72 ). Were it not for a lost ball and his only three putt for the day, Brad would have had the chocolates pretty much sewn up. It was a count back between Brad, Dawso and Mick to determine 2nd through 4th place.
Two shots back was a collection of golfers who finished the day with Nett 74 . It was a 5 way countback which panned out in the order of (5th) Jayden Orger(6th) Steve Powne (7th) Thomas Cooper(8th) Shane Cumming (9th) Rick Turcinovic. Chris Westhead had nearly as many strokes on the front nine, as Brad McMahon had for his entire 18. Westy had nowhere to go after he shot 71 before the turn. Even though he played a solid back nine ( 56 strokes) the damage was already done and Westy will be accepting the responsibility of wearing the pink vest during the Ringwood round.

As a collective group, our scoring average improved by nearly 5 strokes per player when compared to the round at Devil Bend. The fact that would had Big Mick shooting 81 and Brad breaking the magical 80 barrier probably helped manipulate the numbers in our favour, however it was certainly a marked improvement nonetheless.

Even the Newell count was way down on the norm, there were only five members who racked up double figures on a hole, and interestingly there were the same number of Birdies as there were Newell's. (Score of 10 or more.) at Werribee Park.

To give you some perspective on how much of a struggle it was for Westy on the front nine, he only had one Newell which came on the nineth hole, so even with that (11) on the scorecard he still racked up 60 shots across the other 8 holes.

Tony Mac signed off for an 10 on the 11th hole and Brent Douglas saw his round come totally unstuck when he found himself playing 5 off the tee on the par 4 fourteenth hole. Up until that point it was looking like Brent was on a tear and was a genuine candidate for yet another monthly crown.

It was great to have Burnsie turn up for a cameo appearance, he was good for the biggest Newell for the day. He found himself trapped in a bunker on the 15th hole and was just a bout ready to pack up and go home when he couldn't get his ball out. 13 strokes was the final outcome. It was a great spectacle and 5 minutes of entertainment for all of the diners who were sitting up in the restaurant watching his struggles on the magnificent par 3 hole. They certainly got their moneys worth while watching him in action.

Greg Parsons was the only other golfer to make a Newell at Werribee Park, he managed to rack up 10 or more shots (11) on the par 516th hole. It wasn't the first time he has scored double digits in this hole and it probably it will not be the last time either. So long as we vote it back onto the SLP fixture.

The last 3 months have seen some very ordinary golf scores getting submitted to the handicapper. This month there were a few better scores delivered and the handicapper was quick to slash a few shots off those players who performed respectably however he was still remiss to offer much generosity to those players who found the going tough. Ronnie Parsons was the only player who saw his handicap go out. The majority of our members remained handicap neutral indicating there was no impact on the top 8 flag rounds. Jamie Brunton was justifiably culled 0.8 strokes, interestingly Rick was docked the most, his handicap came in from 33.0 to 32.0 just in time for the better weather and the Ringwood round. Cider, Dawso and Thomas came in nearly half a stroke and Big Mick and Stevie Powne were docked 0.3 strokes before they next peg the ball up.

In the handicapping process, when there is often a bad score is submitted there is often a good score dropping off at the end of a golfers 20 round cluster. When a flag round (top 8 scores) is dropped it is automatically replaced by the next best score in the players handicap profile. This is what usually leads to the players handicap going outwards. As below you can see the changes to Jamie H/cap.

As a new member of the Social Club the Callaway Handicapping system is used to give the player a daily played to handicap for the first couple of rounds. Once they have played 3 rounds, they are given a temporary club handicap using the original AGU handicapping system. After 5 rounds they are then switched across to the current slope handicapping system.

For those people interested in the mechanics of the handicapping system it can be best explained as the following.

## How to calculate a GA Handicap

To calculate a player's GA Handicap:

- you must firstly identify the player's most recent 20 scores,
- you then determine the 'Played To' value for each of these scores,
- you average the best 8 'Played To' values,
- and finally you multiply this average by 0.93. The resultant figure (to one decimal place) is the player's GA Handicap.
* If a player's handicap record contains a lesser number than 20 scores, the number of scores used to calculate the player's handicap is as listed in the table below.
* There is no requirement for a player's most recent $\mathbf{2 0}$ scores to have been returned within a specific timeframe. For example, the most recent 20 scores may span a period of three years or they may span a period of three months.
* Once a player's handicap record contains 20 scores, the next score they return will result in the oldest of the existing 20 scores being removed (to be replaced by the new score).

For those players not familiar with the scoring process, listed below is the format we use in Sunday Leave Pass competitions.
Once all of the players are ranked then the Seasons Championship points are allocated according to the position in the field.
The player in $1^{\text {st }}$ place gets 15 points, $2^{\text {nd }}$ place 14 points, $3^{\text {rd }}$ place 13 points, etc. etc. Any player who completes the round however finishes ranked outside the top 14 and is placed between $15^{\text {th }}$ spot to BeerWench then they are all allocated 1 championship point for attending.

Sunday Leave Pass competitions are run using Stroke so you need to count every shot that you play and you need to finish every hole. Each player's Nett total score is then calculated by deducting the players handicap from the Gross score. If a player doesn't have an official Sunday Leave Pass handicap, then a temporary played to handicap is allocated on the day using the Callaway handicapping system.

Once the players Nett score is calculated they are ranked from lowest score (Monthly title winner) to highest score. (BeerWench) Where more than one player has the same Nett Score then the place allocations are decided based on a countback system. The countback is calculated using the total No\# of stableford points scored on the back nine holes. In the event that both players had the same score over the 18 holes then the count back.

## A brief description of how the countback system works.

When more than one player has the same Nett Score (such as in the example below from Werribee Park) then the place allocations are decided based on a countback system.

The count back system is formulated as the following. *Total number of stableford points scored on the back nine holes.
*In the event that both players have the same stableford score on the back nine it then reverts to the number of stableford points scored on the eighteenth hole. If this is the same then it goes to the $17^{\text {th }}$ hole, 16 th hole, 15 th hole etc. until a player has a better hole and therefore a higher stableford score than the other.

The table blow shows examples of the countback system in action as it occurred at Devil Bend to determine place rankings.

Although all Sunday Leave Pass rounds are scored as stroke events, we use the stableford scoring system to run a skins competition across the entire field.

Steve Dawson was the most successful collector of skins this month. Dawso chipped in for a birdie on the 5th hole to claim a three skins haul and then when he rolled his ball in for a par on the last hole of the day he was rewarded with another 3 skin jackpot because not one other player was able to extract three stableford points on the short par 4 hole.

Shane Cumming also had two dips into the skins jar. He collected a couple of raffle tickets for his 3 point par on the 2 nd hole which was probably fair and justified considering he had created the jackpot when he had a three pointer on the first hole too. Shane then claimed a three skin jackpot for a par on the 8th green.

Thomas Cooper claimed skins on back to back holes including his Birdie from his NTP on the 15th green. Steve Powne fell 150 meters short of the longest drive prize on the 10th hole, however he was still able to get on the green and win a couple of raffle tickets for his skins. Greg Parsons was very chuffed to square away a couple of skins especially since it was done with a birdie on the 12th hole.
"SKINS" are distributed to those players good enough to win a hole outright. If more than 1 player got the lowest score on a hole it is Jackpotted until an outright winner occurs.

Just a reminder that for every round you play you are automatically awarded a raffle ticket to go towards the end of year raffle, then extra tickets are issued if you wear the official club shirt. Plus, the monthly winner has the option of exchanging the number of balls owed to Raffle tickets for the end of year prize draw as can be any nearest to pin or long drive or other ball prizes.

The best way to win skins is to convert your GIR hits into birdies and pars. The biggest cardinal sin on the golf course is to play two great shots and set your self up for a good chance at a birdie and then blow it by making a three putt.

This is otherwise known in the golfing lexicon as a "Birdogie."
According to the dictionary of golf, a "Birdogie" is defined as a player ability to convert a makeable birdie attempt into a bogie by way of 3 putting the green.

Evidently there was something about the 11th green that didn't ring true. The green was terrible compared to the others on the golf course and the bumpy surface had a dire influence on the players putting. 7 out of the 25 Birdogies happened on the 11th green. The 11th hole had the second highest putts average for the course at 2.33 putts per player the only green to played more difficult was the 17th green which was almost unplayable. There is little surprise to see there was 3 Birdogies achieved on the 17th especially when the average putts per player was out to 2.57 .

The biggest culprits when it came to blowing birdie opportunities was Peter MacArthur and Stu Coops. Pete accounted for 20 percent of the total Birdogie score, Stu contributed more than $15 \%$ of the total and his round included three successive Birdogies. Stu three putted the 9th, 10th and 11th greens for bogey, there was no wonder he spent almost the entire day in the yellow vest.

The birdie count was very low this month, Thomas Cooper and Brad McMahon put on a good show for the diners in the club house restaurant overlooking the 15th green by holing out for a 2 on the signature hole.

Mick Harper and Douggo both scored a birdie on the Par 5, sixteenth hole. Stu Coops should have joined them when his eagle putt just missed the hole, but Stu missed the return putt and failed to register a birdie for the day. Greg Parsons was very restrained when he made a birdie on the 12th hole, in the past he has been known to rip his shirt off and do laps of the green but not on this occasion. Dawso was the only player to chip in for Birdie from off the green, there is something special about holing out from off the green especially when it results in writing a birdie onto the score card.

We keep track of the birdies made each month and they are recorded for posterity on the website, Birdies - Sunday Leave Pass

While there is no better feeling than chipping in, there is no worse feeling than swinging at the ball and failing to make contact with it. Barry Hemsley had that sinking feeling twice. Poor Bazza copped double fines for having multiple air-swings, to make things even worse he had them in succession. Barry found himself facing a difficult lie, hard up next to the trunk of a tree, he had no stance and an impeded backswing. He was left with no alternative other than to take a penalty for an unplayable lie or to try to manufacture an unconventional golf shot.


Naturally Barry opted for the latter and set himself the task of trying to play a reversed club, back handed stroke. It is an easy enough shot in theory and having seen a video on Youtube showing how to play it, Bazz was quietly confident that he would be saving himself a penalty while gaining some valuable yardage back into the fairway, plus he would look like a hero in front of his playing partners.

After his first whiff there was no turning back, Barry was committed to the plan and the air-swing just made him all the more determined to play the perfect escape shot. Take 2 was no more successful and suddenly Barry was 2 shots added to the score card and the ball was still in exactly the same precarious position. Luckily with the next attempt he managed to move the ball just enough for him to be able to stand and address the ball normally.

To his credit Barry called the air-swings against himself when it came to filling in his scorecard and then he owned up to them again when the fine master was dong his rounds. In hindsight the one shot penalty for the unplayable lie might well have been a better option.

It is quite apparent that many of our members are still confused by the rules when it comes to penalties for lost balls, hazards and OOB. It has been a while since we did a tutorial on the rules of golf however it is important to try to make sure we are all playing under the same terms, especially since one incorrectly taken penalty stroke could make the difference between a player coming first or falling down the leaderboard.

## In order to create consistency with everyone's scoring methods, it is worth mentioning how penalty shots are to be awarded for a lost ball.

1. If a ball is hit out of bounds and there is no doubt that it has definitely finished OOB. (then the player should hit another ball from where the last one was struck and the player incurs a 1 stroke penalty) This means the player counts the stroke that went out of bounds, plus a $1 x$ shot penalty plus the stroke to put the next ball into play from the same spot the first one was hit. eg) 3 x off the tee or hitting your $4^{\text {mi }}$ shot from the fairway.
2. If a ball is hit close to the area marked as "Out Of Bounds" or hit into thick rough and there is doubt whether the ball is "Out Of Bounds" or you are unsure if you will be able to find the ball, then a player should have another shot from the same location where the last ball was hit, calling it a "provisional ball." This ball does not come into play, unless the first ball is later deemed to be lost or OOB. (the provisional ball can be played as many timos as nocessary up to the point whore the ball original ball is thought to have finishod up.) the playor may then search for the first ball for upto 5 mins, before dociding whether it has been lost. If the original ball is found and is deomed to still be in play, the player must use that ball regardless of where \& lies on the course. Once the original ball is found the provisional ball may no longer be used. If the ball is OOB or lost and the provisional ball is used, all strokes playod with the original ball aro counted, plus the playor incurs a 1 xshot penalky for the lost ball plus all subsequent strokes with second ball are then counted as per normal.
3. If the ball is hit into a hazard such as a lake, creek or any other hazard area (usually identified by red stakes). The ball may be dropped with in $2 x$ club lengths of the hazard along the line of entry and the player incurs a 1 x stroke penalty. eg) 1 x shot which was hit into the hazard, 1 x shot penally and the next shot is being played from behind or beside the hazard.
4. If the ball is hit into the rough or another part of the course that is not considered a hazard or OOB and the ball is unable to be found, and the player did not hit a "provisional ball". The player must either:
A) go back to where the ball was last played from and take a 1 x shot penally. or
B) they must drop a new ball where the ball was thought to be located and take a $2 x$ shot penalty. Eg) If the player lost their ball after their drive then they have the choice of either running back to the tee too play their $3^{\text {ma }}$ shot or they can choose to drop the ball approximately where the ball has been lost and will be hitting their $4^{4 n}$ shot from there.
Hopefully this helps everyone understand the expectations of what you should do when it comes to adding penalties. It would be nice to know everyone is doing the same thing.

Sometimes taking the appropriate penalty can still result in a decent score, in essence one bad shot does not or should not necessarily need to destroy your entire round. Take Gerard Maclsaac's score on the 11th hole for example. Gerard was doing Gerard things and having a pretty tidy round until he came to the 11th tee. Having been out muscled by Graeme Foster on the 10th fairway in the Longest Drive competition Gerard had a point to prove. He swung outside himself on the long par 5 hole and as a result hooked his ball out to the right and towards the river.

Once he realized after a 3 minute search, he couldn't find his ball it was determined the ball must have gone OOB giving him the option of either going back to the tee to play his third shot or else drop a ball in the known vicinity of where the ball had been lost and he would be playing his 4th shot. Gerard elected to take the 2 stroke penalty (stroke plus distance) and played his ball from along the boundary fence. Rather than drop his bundle and sulk for the rest of the day, Gerard absolutely creamed his three wood which sent his new and improved golf ball flying onto the green and it came to rest only 10 feet from the flag. He rolled in the putt on the supposedly challenging green and walked off with a Par with a lost ball.

It could have been a huge day for Mick Harper, he was looking like going really, really low. He missed a couple of gimmie birdies on the 1st and 2 nd holes and continued to coast around the course hitting, fairways, greens and rolling in pars, that was until he stood up to the tee on the 15th tee. The 15th hole at Werribee Park is the signature hole on the course, it is the shortest par 3 on the course but is perfectly framed amongst the steep ravines of the Werribee Park valley. The par 3 is ranked as the easiest hole on the golf course so there was an air of expectation that Mick would be claiming a NTP prize and capturing the illusive birdie which had been evading him despite having 9 attempts to make one. Micks ball striking had been elite so as he swung his 9 iron the group looked forward expecting to watch it come to rest within close proximity to the flag stick. No one expected for a second that he was going to hit a hozzle rocket which speared off into the long grass on the slope of the steep bank. Given that no one was watching his ball there was not a single playing partner who could assist Mick in gauging a bearing on where he his shank had landed. After a thorough search through terrain so steep and inaccessible that even a Nubian Ibex mountain goat would be hesitant to tread, the ball was finally located but deemed unplayable. Mick took a drop, bladed his next shot through the back of the green, duffed a chip, barely hitting the putting surface before two putting for a double par, triple bogey six.

The 15th hole at Werribee Park has only ever been played worse than that, once and that was by Burnsie who managed to rack up 13 strokes on Sunday. I would go through the sordid story shot by shot and blow by blow but I have a word count limit and I need to try to keep the blurb under 30 pages. So instead let us just say Burnsie played the hole like $\$ \#!7$.

As all good golfers do Mick was able to bounce back immediately. He Birdied the next hole and went on to post the second best gross score for the day. Burnsie on the other hand backed up his Newell plus 3 (13) with a nine on the next hole and things didn't get much better from there. To his credit Burnsie never threw a golf club which is more than we can say of a few other boys who are likely candidates for nominations for the 2023 Angry man award. Peter (Macca) MacArthur had a similar dilemma to Mick Harper in that not one of his playing partners watched where his golf ball had gone. Peter was all worked up on the 15th tee after Brent Douglas had deliberately lost Macca's golf ball (we will get to that story shortly). As he swing fast and furious Pete lost control of the handle and his grip and the club released from his hands. Thomas Cooper was standing 90 degrees from the tee box when the Silver whirly bird went sailing over his head sending him ducking for cover. Luckily Thomas is only 8 foot tall because if he was more than 10 foot high he would have been decapitated. As Thomas picked himself up from the grass Macca said to him, "did you see where my ball went? To which Thomas replied "I have no idea I was too busy watching your club."

Thomas wasn't the first person Macca tried to kill on Sunday. On the previous hole (the 14th) he had bounced a ball over the shoulder of poor Brent Douglas who was already having a mental breakdown. Brent was starting to hold up play on the dogleg par 4 because he was using his allotted time ( 3 minutes to look for his golf ball) Peter had been standing on the tee for nine minutes as he waited for Brent to spend 3 minutes looking for his drive, then another 3 minutes to look for his provisional ball, before restarting the clock to do a thorough search of the same area looking for his provisional, provisional ball. The only golf ball he was able to find was his 3rd drive which saw him playing his approach to the green as 5 off the tee, hitting six. When that crisply struck 7 iron bounced off an overhanging tree branch and ricocheted 20 meters behind him, you can image just how much anger was pent up inside of him. It was probably not the smartest idea for Macca to tee off while Brent was playing his 7th shot, while within his landing zone, especially when the ball landed less than two meters behind him, while he was in the process of his back swing. Maccas ball literally bounced directly over Brents head and rolled passed him by about 20 meters. Had the steam been coming out of his ears before the ball had nearly killed him, it probably would have melted the polyurethane covering. As Brent walked passed Maccas golf ball he pulled his 3 iron out and smashed the ball back towards him on the tee box. Unfortunately, such was his lack of golfing ability at that point that he hit a massive slice and he lost yet another golf ball into the surrounds of the Werribee River. Brent eventually went on to hole a four meter putt to give him a hole score of 10 with one putt.

Remember to hit within your limits, if you think the group in front is in range you should wait until it is safe. It is one thing to claim the long drive but not at the risk of injuring or killing a mate.

Winners are grinners, and this months other Novelty Prizes were claimed by the following players, Longest Putt Graeme Foster ( $\mathbf{2 7 5 c m}$ ) (Raffle Ticket)


This year we have decided to try to keep a record of the winning distances for the longest drive competition, we might even incorporate a few extra trophies and a long drive play off on the golf trip just to spice things up a bit. Steve Dawson is currently holding the longest long drive and at 330 meters so it might just take something special to knock him off.

We will need someone in the group to measure the longest drive distance back to the tee and write it on the marker along with the persons name. In this day and age there is always someone in each group who has either a watch with distance measuring capacity or a rangefinder to calculate the distance of a drive.


Steve O'Sullivan looked like he was in for a blinder after securing the NTP second shot with a brilliant approach to 3 feet and then again when he claimed NTP on the 8th green. Evidently lots of things went right for him on the day, but not quite enough to feature at the pointy end of the leader board, he missed both Birdie putts but did secure the pars. SOS only had 4 pars for the day which is a very low return for him.

Graeme Foster proved himself to be a big hitter, he was unchallenged in the longest drive competition and he even managed to hole the longest putt for the day. Raw power was no issue for Foss, it was the finesse of hitting the ball onto the green that he was lacking. Too many times he would knock his tee shot to within wedging distance from the green, only to then take 3 shots to get the ball the last remaining 60 meters.

The good news is that he is in the running to compete in the playoffs on the golf trip for both putting and driving. A good day out.

Listed below in the graphic is how the Callaway handicap was worked out for Brad McMahon who finished in 2nd place.



Even if a player has an official golf link, as a matter of consistency we still use the Callaway system to calculate a daily handicap. For the record if Brad had of been playing off of his GA Handicap he would have been playing off 8 .

Full Technical Procedure for Calculating a GA Handicap STEP 1 - Use the table below to determine the number of scores to be included in the GA Handicap calculation:

## Number of Scores in Player's Handicap Record

Note: When the handicap record contains more than 20 scores, the GA Handicap calculation uses the best 8 of the player's most recent 20 scores.

The more rounds a golfer players the more accurately the handicap reflects their average scores. Once 20 rounds have been achieved the slope handicap modelling is operating at optimal efficiency.

The current spread of handicaps with the Social club are as follows: 6 percent of our members are classed as single figure golfers 44.5 percent of SLP golfers have a handicap between 10 and 19.9 40 percent of our golfers have a handicap between 20 and 29.9

## 2022 Champion of Champions



Winner of the blue Jacket and all of its powers for 2023.

For those who have forgotten about the powers bestowed on the Blue Jacket; here is a reminder of how it works.
As the Champion of Champions a player is able to ask any Sunday Leave Pass member to buy him a drink, it is limited to only receiving one drink per member (beer or soft) over the entire year and it can only be done so, if he is wearing the Champion of Champion jacket at the time. This of course does not include new members who did not play at least one or more rounds in season 2022, but not exclusive to those who attended the golf trip. So, if he manages himself correctly, he should be looking at up to 51 free beers or soft drinks over the next 12 months. Now, that is a prize worth aspiring for.

The other condition is that the player must be the one who consumes the drink, he cannot use his power to buy beverages for anyone else. There is also a catch where, if the wearer of the blue jacket asks someone who has previously shouted him a drink, then he must immediately buy them a drink instead. The Champion of champions can also kick in the balance of $\$ 2$ per shout to upgrade his beer to bourbons if he prefers to.

Remember that the Champ must be wearing the jacket, He must continue to wear the jacket while he is drinking. If it is too hot to wear the Champion of Champions jacket, that is OK, just choose not to wear it and then you are not eligible for a free drink. All purchased drinks are to be opened so they cannot be taken home for future consumption or to give to dinner guests or visitors. A traveller for the drive home is also OK, so long as it is opened, and the jacket wearer is the one who drinks it.

Remember: In order, to qualify as the Champion of Champions a member just needs to win a monthly title. All of the winners from the monthly championships who are attending the golf trip will then play off for the title based on total accumulated stableford points from 9x Randomly selected holes. The Winner is the person with the most points over those 9 nominated holes, and in the event of a tie then a Countback to determine the winner applies.

NOTE: The Winner of the December title is also eligible to win the competition however they only get to count their scores by using only 8 Randomly selected holes.
