## History

Established in 1976, Werribee Park Golf Club was formed in the south precinct along with some of Werribee's best tourist attractions. This challenging 18-hole course includes some breathtaking views of the Werribee River and the Red Cliffs. It also boasts a great layout that will challenge your golfing game.

The open design of the course is counter pointed with strategic plantings of trees. The course is blessed with free draining alluvial soils which allow golf to be played throughout the year, even in the wettest winter when most surrounding courses are closed.

After a day on the greens, you can enjoy a lovely meal or drink at the clubhouse which features views of the You Yangs, Werribee River and the Bellarine Peninsula.

## Developing the Course Layout

"As is always the case, the clubhouse location must be chosen first. Here it was clear that anywhere along the ridge line would be fine, but in its present location, it would be perfect. The advantages of river overview and proximity to the road sealed the siting.

In regard to the effect of the arrangement of the holes, the clubhouse location meant that it would not be possible to get both nines starting and finishing on the same level as the clubhouse.

This led to hole 1 on the top, holes 9 and 10 on the flat but close to the clubhouse, hole 17 progressing up a modest slope with hole 18 on the top returning to the clubhouse.

While various hole arrangements were considered, the best in my view was the one that exists today. The only arguable shortcoming is that hole 18 is short, purists favouring a tough finishing hole. It is easy to argue that its location on the edge of the cliff face adds more than adequate interest to the hole.

All the green surfaces at Werribee Park were influenced by the Royal Melbourne models. Greens were sized around 550 square meters with relatively large but shallow sand traps. Many years later it greatly pained me to see several sand traps greatly deepened. Why? Because there is only one type of shot that can be played from them. Shallow traps present options - potentially confusing to the golfer."



Remember to always capture any photos or take video footage of anything funny or unusual that you see out on the golf course that you think might be worth sharing with the group. Thanks to all of the folks who joined the tipping comp, hopefully next year we get a few more members involved. Although it was good to see the usual tipping winners dethroned this year it would still have been nice to share the prize pool amongst a few other people.


Congratulations to Newell Richards who became the $15^{\text {th }}$ Sunday Leave Pass member to rack up his $100^{\text {th }}$ round with the social club. Newell started his career at Kingston Links golf course in September 2013 and after a score of 144 off the stick including 3x Newell's in the first 7 holes, ( 82 for 9 holes) we thought we would never see him again let alone contemplate the idea that he would still be around to accrue 100 rounds some 9 years later. Newell quickly integrated himself into the club, by nearly breaking the club record for the most shots on a single hole on his very first attempt.

Here is how his first round was reported in the monthly blurb.
Newcomer Newell Richards nearly claimed a scalp of his own when he caught a flyer out of the bunker on the Par 3, $7^{\text {th }}$ hole. Newell nearly decapitated Greg Breasley who had grown impatient and tried to finish putting out the hole because Newell had already accumulated 15 shots and was still in the sand digging for China.

Although he missed the club record score of 19 shots on a single hole which is currently held by Jamie Brunton, Newell's score of 17 on a 142 -meter par 3 warrants a mention. Newell's hole included a lost ball in the lake, then a chip into the bunker, a chip across the green and into another bunker, a chip back across the green into the bunker he had originally started in, then 2 more duffs in the bunker, then a shot across the green back into the bunker again, 2 more shots in that bunker before his ball rolled back over the green into the first bunker. It then took five more shots in the same pot before his ball finally came out hard and fast narrowly missing Greg Breastey's head and there is little doubt the ball would have finished back in the bunker on the other side of the green had it not wrapped itself around the golf flag Big Ball Breasley was holding at the time. Incredibly the ball dropped onto the green a foot from the hole. It was a lucky break for the newcomer and to his credit and as testimony to his character; he completed the hole without any animosity and he marked his card with a score of 17 with one putt.

To his credit Newell was able to successfully hit his drive through the banner on the first tee which is more than we can say for a few other centurions including; Chris Sfiligoj, Greg Breasley and Rick Turcinovic who all failed to hit the 3 meter by 3 meter construction when it was positioned less than a couple of meters in front of them. It should be noted however that it was quite difficult to find a few volunteers willing to hold on to the poles while newell was lining up to take his shot.

Newell has had a colourful Sunday Leave Pass Career, he averages still averages 107.8 shots per round, yet his handicap is 18.4 meaning he needs to shoot 90 each month to play to has handicap. Clearly all of those big scores in his early rounds are still having a big impact on the data. Having a "Newell" (a score of 10 or more) became part of the SLP vernacular when Rick Turcinovic was describing a bad hole while having a drink at the $19^{\text {th }}$ hole. Evidently double digits holes were so prevalent on Newell's score card that it seemed a natural way of identifying a bad hole. Newell is the Newellingest player in the social club history, he has a record total of 85 Newell's credited to his name. Although 64 of those Newell's were achieved in his first 5 seasons.

Newell has won twice as many Beer Wench titles as he has Monthly titles, although with a total 5 career wins there are only 8 other members who have notched up more wins than Newell has. Newell's best course is Centenary Park where he has won twice.

Newell's best holes are the short one hitters. He averages $12 \%$ GIR on par 3 holes against a career average of $8.9 \%$ across all holes. Also, 46 percent of his total birdies are on par 3 holes. Newell has won 12 NTP titles over his 100 appearances which has therefore given him 469 unsuccessful attempts to make a hole in one.

Newell was the first Sunday Leave Pass member to be drunk under the table by Stevie Powne on the golf trip, and it should be mentioned that to his credit he still managed to wake up the next morning and shoot the best score for the day.

## Werribee Park Golf Course Results

Although Werribee Park is a beautiful golf course and despite it being in great condition at a time when many other courses have been closed and deemed unplayable due to the recent heavy rains, it still destroyed the hopes and dreams of the majority of the field. Only 3 players broke their handicap on Sunday and beyond Todd, Greg, and Tom the scores quickly regressed. Todd Neilson finished the day at the top of the points distribution with a very impressive 90 off the stick (Nett 68). When you consider that the single figure handicappers SOS (shot 87) and Mick (94), Todd's score of 90 was a commendable effort and well and truly deserving of the 15 championship points.

Greg Parsons and Tom Kellythorn couldn't be separated as they both shared a 69. When two players are stuck together, it is necessary to work out which of the two guys got to take the top position by doing a count back which on this occasion went in the favour of Greg Parsons. Although only one point separated first and second place, it should be noted that Greg Parsons scorecard included 2 x Newell's, so he can probably count himself unfortunate that those big scores on the $4^{\text {th }}$ and $11^{\text {th }}$ holes ultimately cost him what could have otherwise been a very convincing victory. Greg can't be too disappointed however as he has already booked himself a ticket in the big dance playoff for the blue Jacket because he has previously won this year at Dorset, which coincidently he won with a score of Nett 69.

Interestingly, the 4 x times crowned Worst putter award winner, managed to have a good day with the putter when the majority of the field struggled to hit the ball in the hole. Greg only needed 34 putts to complete the 18 holes, which is nearly 5 strokes better than his career average with the putter and 3.5 strokes better than the average putts for the field during Sunday's event.


We think he may have gone the early crow; however, Greg has claimed that his putting yips are now behind him and after 4 years in a row ranked as the club's worst putter, he claims he is ready to hand the trophy back so it can be passed on to the next person. We will wait and see if the putting prowess is a permanent change or just a one-off miracle, but either way Greg will have his work cut out to retain the trophy because Jaxon Fitzpatrick is making a strong push to become the worst putter in the social club. Jaxon used the putter 45 times on Sunday which certainly did not help his position in the field. Jaxon had 9 turns at the flouro yellow monkey vest including 7x three putts and 2 x four putt greens. This year Jaxon has had 290 putts from 7x rounds. He has only had 2 months during the season where he has gone under 40 putts and is currently averaging 41.43 strokes with the flat stick. There is still plenty of golf to go yet, however with numbers like that we may just need to give a new name to the trophy engraver this year.

One player who will not need to worry about the title of worst putter is Glenn Douglas. Glenn was in a hurry to catch his flight out of Tullamarine to Bali, so he was very economical with the time he spent on the greens. Douggo completed his round with just 32 putts for the day. Unfortunately, his extraordinary putting performance didn't amount to success on the scoreboard or get Douggo to the airport any quicker. Douggo drew the short straw and was partnered up with Greg Parsons and Newell Richards who couldn't help but provide incessant chatter for the entire round. Douggo started the day patient and tolerating of the background jabbering, he even went as far at one stage as to apologize to the guys for being so inconsiderate as to try to hit while they were talking. However, in the end it was too much for him and his head exploded. While Jaxon might be getting the trophy for the Worst Putter, you might want to consider Glenn for the Angry-man award. Towards the end of the round there were clubs flying all over the place at the same rate as there were expletives and profanities being hurled. It was a good thing Douggo had to bail to get to Bali because he looked like he definitely needed a relaxing holiday to get over the experience of walking the fairways with Newell and Greg.

There would be a few guys who were also wishing they were leaving golf to have a holiday break. Rick Turcinovic was strongly considering full blown retirement after he shot a 69 off the stick on the front nine, his round included 2x Newell's. With Nett 94 for the day, he convincingly finished in the beer wenching position. As the chief fine master Rick fined himself $\$ 50$ for the 69 on
the first nine. Dawso and Jayden were quick to let Rick know that $\$ 50$ for a 69 was pretty good value. After coming last this month Rick will join the Beer Wench wall of shame, he will be obligated to wear the pink vest next month at the Ringwood round and of course he has booked himself a ticket into the playoffs at the end of year trip when we will be running the battle of the Beer wenches' tournament at Shepparton. Rick will be required to wear the Beer Wench vest next month or pay a $\$ 10$ fine if he doesn't attend the September round and then he will be earmarked to challenge the other 12 Beer Wenches in December to make sure he doesn't become crowned the Beer Wench of Wenches.

Thomas Cooper did a great job wearing the Pink Vest on Sunday and after making a 13 on the Par 5, eleventh hole including playing his $7^{\text {th }}$ shot off the tee it was starting to look like he might be a possible candidate to go back-to-back Beer Wench.

It wasn't the case however because when a crocodile popped it's head out of the water while Thomas was looking for any of the three golf balls he had just deposited in the Werribee River, he thought of Chubbs and then by channelling his inner Happy Gilmore, Thomas regrouped and found his Happy Place. Suddenly Thomas was outdriving Big Mick and Stu Coops, he bounced his golf ball through the bunker and onto the green to set up a 6 foot par putt on the $16^{\text {th }}$ hole, he stiffed his ball from a 30 meter pitch for a tap in par on the $17^{\text {th }}$ hole and then just like Happy Gilmore himself, Thomas holed a monster putt on the final hole to not only win the longest putt competition but also entrench himself inside the top 10 of the August points leader board.


Although Thomas didn't have to putt around and through a broken grandstand or negotiate a VW beetle parked in the middle of the green, he did sink a 1578 cm putt in front of an audience of 12 x obnoxious Sunday Leave Pass members and a restaurant full of hungry diners.

Thomas has convincingly taken the lead as the holder of the longest holed putt. His contribution on Sunday was nearly 10 meters longer than the previous record holder. Although there are plenty of rounds to go to try to beat Thomas' record, I am not sure how many golf courses have greens big enough that you can hit a 16 -meter putt.

We look forward to seeing who finishes up the season as the No\# 1 ranked player for the longest putt for the year.


This year we are trialling a new competition. The concept is called the longest holed putt. The first group get to place a marker on the green at the point where the ball was located when the ball was holed. The intention is then to see who manages to sink the longest putt on that hole, as the marker would move further and farther back and around the green as we drop in those $8^{\prime}$ and $10^{\prime}$ footers for par, bogey, double bogey or even a Newell.

This month the prize was won by Thomas Cooper who dropped in a massive birdie putt on the $18^{\text {th }}$ green. Thomas has joined the field for the final putt off which will be held at Shepparton.

Tom Kellythorn bookended his round with one putt greens. Tom drained a long putt on the first green for a par and he posted a single shot with the putter on the $18^{\text {th }}$ green, however in between those there were 16 consecutive 2 putts in a row. Although he didn't have to put on the yellow vest for the entire day, Tom will certainly be ruing the fact that if he had only holed any of those other putts between holes 2 and 17, he could have robbed his fellow boatperson of the monthly title.

Stu Coops also went his entire round without making a three putt, and even more importantly he went the full 18 holes without losing a golf ball. Miracles can happen!

Although Ben Nichol had a very tough day at Werribee, he finished his round with 111 and in $23^{\text {rd }}$ position, his day was not a total waste of time because Ben was one of only 2 players to make a Birdie on Sunday and what's more his Chip in for a 2 on the $15^{\text {th }}$ hole was on a 9 hole skins Jackpot hole, meaning Ben was the lucky recipient of 9 raffle tickets and elevated himself into $5^{\text {th }}$ place in the annual skins competition.

Although he didn't chip in for a Birdie, SOS managed to salvage a par on the $18^{\text {th }}$ hole after driving his golf ball down the cliff and on to the $16^{\text {th }}$ tee. Blindsided and playing by feel he somehow managed to hit an 8 iron high enough to cover the steep bank and miraculously the ball finished up landing on the green.

Jayden Orger also launched his ball over the ravine on the $18^{\text {th }}$ tee. Jayden's ball was even more errant than SOS' and when the ball was finally located it was in the bunker at the back of the $15^{\text {th }}$ green. Jayden casually flopped his ball out of the sand and then knocked a pitching wedge over the corner of the restaurant and onto the green. Most people don't even bother climbing down the hill to look for their golf balls, so for two of our members to be able to find it and hit it back on to the green is a work of artistry.


Peter (Mack) learnt the hard way that there is no such thing as a gimmie. Peter missed an easy tap in par putt on the $14^{\text {th }}$ green and then finished the hole with a 5 putt because he hit his ball away from the hole thinking the next putt was good. Mack was forced to continue out putting until the ball finally dropped to the bottom of the hole and what should have been a par turned out to be an 8 on the scorecard.

Mark Fitzy ran into trouble on the par 5 eleventh hole. After donating a ball into the crocodile infested Werribee River, Fitzy then went on to hit his ball into the greenside bunker. Once the ball was in the sand it was hard to get it out. It took Mark 3x attempts to get the ball over the lip and by the time he did so and then holed his putt he had accrued a Newell plus one (11) on the score card.

Fitzy shouldn't feel too bad about having three shots in the bunker on the $11^{\text {th }}$ hole, even big Mick got stuck in the sand and could not get his Titleist 2 out, the only difference being Mick was in the bunker for 2 shots on the 493 -meter hole after hitting a 320 meter drive down the middle of the fairway and then a 6 iron over the green and into the bunker. Instead of a possible eagle or an easy birdie, after multiple shots in the bunker it meant Mick finished the hole with a double bogey (7).


It was a tough day for Mick, and therefore he closed out his round at the back of the field. With 94 off the stick and playing off a handicap of 8 he wasn't too far away from being handed the beer wench vest.

Once Thomas found his happy place, Mick was struggling to keep up with the long drives from Thomas Cooper and the big brickie couldn't work out his levels on the putting surface either. Mick usually averages 34 putts per round but on Sunday at Werribee Park he was left wearing the yellow vest and closed out his day with 37 putts against his name. It was also another birdie free round for Mick, which is very unusual, so it didn't come as a surprise to find out after the game that Mick was carrying a significant injury. Evidently Mick crushed his finger between a pellet of bricks against a wall at work and he was struggling to hold the golf club properly let alone try and hit a golf ball with it.

Stevie Powne got his golf ball crushed up against the wall of the bunker. The poor Blue Smurf had no hope of extricating his ball when it plugged in the sand right up against the lip on the second hole. Despite nearly swinging himself off of his feet, the ball hit the lip and then bounced back at him and stayed in the trap, Steve only just managed to keep his footing to stop himself from falling down into the bottom of the bunker after the ball.


In the end Steve was lucky to get out of the bunker and more importantly out of the $2^{\text {nd }}$ hole without making a Newell. His escapades in the bunker had taken quite a few shots but when all things were completed, Steve was able to sign himself in for a score of 9 for the hole.

Golf is a tough game, and the reality is that at some point in your round you are going to make some mistakes. According to the experts, the difference between a good golfer and an average golfer is that a good golfer ensures they don't compound mistakes on top of one another when they happen, whereas a poor golfer gets themselves in trouble and then on the shots that immediately follow, they manage to get themselves into more trouble than they were in after the first error. It is for this reason why most of us at some stage in the round manage to have a disastrous blow out hole which ultimately can cost you the monthly title, (Greg Parsons) or result in your name being entered into the Sunday Leave Pass Newell tally "wall of shame". This month there were a total of ten names added to the ever-growing data base. Thomas Cooper had the biggest Newell for the day (13) and Rick and Greg Parsons had the most Newell's on their score cards, both boys reaching double figures twice.

Whilst on his Western Australian junket tour, by missing last month at Devil Bend and then a poor showing this month, SOS has relinquished an almost unassailable lead. There are now 6 players within a monthly title of reaching the top of the ladder. Tom Kellythorn has moved within just 6 points of SOS and Wayne, Stu, Dawso and Gerard are still within reach of taking home the championship trophy.

With a win at Werribee Park Todd Neilson claimed his $3{ }^{\text {rd }}$ Sunday Leave Pass Career title. 90 was his equal best score for the year although his last effort was at Spring Park a par 66 course, so realistically he played 6 strokes better in August than he did for the same score at Spring Park. Greg Parsons had his best putt score for the year and the reward for hitting the ball in the hole more regularly was a $2^{\text {nd }}$ place finish. One can only imagine what score Greg could have had, if he didn't get stuck in the bunker a couple of times which ultimately resulted in him featuring in the Newell tally on a couple of the par 5 holes. Tom Kellythorn enjoyed the 7-minute travel time from home to the golf course, he was a lot fresher when he arrived at the first tee because normally, he has racked up a good hour in the car before he arrives ready to play. The reward for not being tired was an error free round of golf. Tom finished in equal $2^{\text {nd }}$ place but third on a count back.

Simon Galloway started off rough but came home flying. Simon's round was a game of 2 halves. 62 strokes on the front nine was looking pretty ominous and Simon was getting nervous about finishing in last place, however something clicked after the turn (perhaps he found his happy place) and Simon improved by 14 strokes on the back nine which enabled him to produce a score sufficient to feature in the top 5 . Stu Coops rounded out the top 5 positions. However when you consider that Werribee was Stu's $6^{\text {th }}$ round of golf for the week, based on the level of practice he had accrued, he should have been in blistering form. So, a score of 89 was a little disappointing.

For those players not familiar with the scoring process, listed below is the format we use in Sunday Leave Pass competitions.
Once all of the players are ranked then the Seasons Championship points are allocated according to the position in the field.
The player in $1^{\text {st }}$ place gets 15 points, $2^{\text {nd }}$ place 14 points, $3^{\text {rd }}$ place 13 points, etc. etc. Any player who completes the round however finishes ranked outside the top 14 and is placed between $15^{\text {th }}$ spot to BeerWench then they are all allocated 1 championship point for attending.

For the benefit of the newcomers or the uneducated we thought it would be a good opportunity to go through the player ranking s and point scoring system again.

Sunday Leave Pass competitions are run using Stroke so you need to count every shot that you play and you need to finish every hole. Each player's Nett total score is then calculated by deducting the players handicap from the Gross score. If a player doesn't have an official Sunday Leave Pass handicap, then a temporary played to handicap is allocated on the day using the Callaway handicapping system.

Once the players Nett score is calculated they are ranked from lowest score (Monthly title winner) to highest score. (BeerWench) Where more than one player has the same Nett Score then the place allocations are decided based on a countback system

The player with the most points at the end of the year is crowned the Points champion irrespective of how many rounds a person has played. If one person plays 13 rounds for the year and the person in $2^{\text {nd }}$ place has only played 10 rounds but is close to the same score then that is bad luck to the person in $2^{\text {nd }}$ place. All players are invited to play the entire fixture. We reward participation rather than perfection and performance so if you play more often you will end up with more points.

Werribee Park statistics included, $2 x$ Birdies and 49x pars, 169 bogeys, but the scary part of the round was the fact there were more than 230 double bogies or worse; including 10 Newell's (Score of 10 or more). As a group we had 940 putts at an average of 37.6 putts each. Unfortunately, that means we had 55 more putts than last month, and we averaged 2 extra putts each player. There were only 61 one putts, and Ben Nichol was the only player to chip in for a noner. The lightning quick downhill putts were responsible for 95 exchanges with the three-putt monkey vest. The fine jar was topped up with $\$ 12$ worth of fines for 4 putting or worse including a five-putt green by Mack.
"SKINS" are distributed to those players good enough to win a hole outright. If more than 1 player got the lowest score on a hole it is Jackpotted until an outright winner occurs. Just a reminder that for every round you play you are automatically awarded a raffle ticket to go towards the end of year raffle, then extra tickets are issued if you wear the official club shirt. Plus, the monthly winner has the option of exchanging the number of balls owed to Raffle tickets for the end of year prize draw as can be any nearest to pin or long drive or other ball prizes.

Skins were hard to come by this month, probably because there were not many birdies or good holes racked up by anyone in the field. Ben Nichol was rewarded for his birdie on the $15^{\text {th }}$ hole with a nine-hole skins jackpot. Jake Schmidt won skins on the $2^{\text {nd }}$ hole and then again on the $5^{\text {th }}$ hole. It was a good haul for Jake, and it proved that making a par on a hole where you get 2 shots with your handicap can be a great advantage. Greg Parson won a skin for his par on the $6^{\text {th }}$ hole and the remaining three skins on offer were claimed by Thomas Cooper who won a two skins Jackpot for his par on the $17^{\text {th }}$ hole and then another skin for birdying the $18^{\text {th }}$ hole.

Steve Powne ticked off a couple of new names from his Champion of Champions hitlist... Although to provide a wee bit of entertainment and hilarity at the bar because he also tried to hit the Newcomer Peter MacArthur up for a free drink even though Mack didn't play a game in season 2021. Consequently, Steve was forced to buy Peter a drink instead. Peter thinks the social club policies are fantastic and he relished the opportunity to enjoy his free drink. For the rest of the afternoon, Simon Galloway, Jake Schmidt, and Jayden Orger were all standing around the smurf in his Blue Jacket hoping they were going to be the next person he tried to tap on the shoulder.


For those who have forgotten about the powers bestowed on the Blue Jacket here is a reminder of how it works.
As the Champion of Champions Steve will be able to ask any Sunday Leave Pass member to buy him a drink, it is limited to only receiving one drink per member (beer or soft) over the entire year and it can only be done so if he is wearing the Champion of Champion jacket at the time. This of course does not include new members who did not play at least one or more rounds in season 2021, but not exclusive to those who attended the golf trip. So, if he manages himself correctly, he should be looking at up to 42 free beers or soft drinks over the next 12 months. Now, that is a prize worth aspiring for.

The other condition is that Steve must be the one who consumes the drink, he cannot use his power to buy beverages for anyone else. There is also a catch where, if Steve asks someone who has previously shouted him a drink, then he must immediately buy them a drink instead. Steve can also kick in the balance of $\$ 2$ per shout to upgrade his beer to bourbons if he prefers to.

Remember that Steve must be wearing the jacket, He must continue to wear the jacket while he is drinking. If it is too hot to wear the Champion of Champions jacket that is OK, just choose not to wear it and then you are not eligible for a free drink. All purchased drinks are to be opened so they cannot be taken home for future consumption or to give to dinner guests or visitors. A traveller for the drive home is OK so long as it is opened, and Steve is the one who drinks it.

Remember: In order, to qualify as the Champion of Champions a member just needs to win a monthly title. All of the winners from the monthly championships who are attending the golf trip will then play off for the title based on total accumulated stableford points from 9x Randomly selected holes. The Winner is the person with the most points over those 9 nominated holes, and in the event of a tie then a Countback to determine the winner applies.

NOTE: The Winner of the December title is also eligible to win the competition however they only get to count their scores by using only 8 Randomly selected holes.

For the newcomers, we have included a brief description of how the countback system works.
When more than one player has the same Nett Score (such as in the example below from Werribee Park then the place allocations are decided based on a countback system.
The count back system is formulated as the following. *Total number of stableford points scored on the back nine holes.
*In the event that both players have the same stableford score on the back nine it then reverts to the number of stableford points scored on the eighteenth hole. If this is the same then it goes to the $17^{\text {th }}$ hole, sixteenth hole, fifteenth hole until a player has a better hole and therefore has a higher stableford score than the other.

In order to win the Season Championship trophy, you need to play regularly and consistently to about your handicap or better, and it is the handicapper's responsibility to make sure that this doesn't happen. After every round, the scores are assessed and then the handicaps are adjusted according to your performance. As was the case last year we have adjusted the handicap formula to take into consideration the difficulty of each golf course, using the course slope index.

What we have done is simply aligned the Sunday Leave Pass handicapping process with the one used by golf link and by all golf clubs around the globe using the world handicapping system. Although your SLP handicap is unofficial and therefore it cannot be used to formally enter organized golf competitions and tournaments, it still should be an accurate reflection of your golfing prowess and a measure of what your GA (golf Australia) handicap would be if you subscribed the $\$ 150$ per year to get an official handicap.

Your playing handicap will fluctuate around your documented handicap index. When you play an easy course such as Ringwood or Dorset then you will actually play off a lower handicap than you normally would. On the other days when we invite you to play a harder course such as Eagle Ridge, Devils Bend, Werribee Park or Cape Schanck we will add a few extra shots to your arsenal just to give you more hope of avoiding total anxiety and depression.

The handicapper was very busy this month, 9 players received a handicap trim adjustment. Some of those losing almost a full shot. Greg Parsons, Tom K and Todd copped the biggest hits. Having played 5 rounds with the social club, Jake Schmidt has been switched across to the slope handicap system. Jake will find the first few weeks tough as his handicap is originally based on his best rounds. Jayden Orger has been switched to a temporary club handicap for the next couple of rounds before he too will convert to the Slope system after 5 completed rounds. Jayden's starting handicap is 26.0 whereas Jakes handicap index was cut from 26.3 to 23.2.

The strokes taken off Westy, Greg, Jake, Simon, Steve P, Stu, Thomas, and Todd have been given back to the most deserving. Ben Nichol will find his handicap 0.9 strokes higher at Dorset than it was at Werribee Park. Douggo, SOS, Tom and Jaxon received 0.3 of a stroke, Fitzy was boosted by 0.2 and Wayne and Rick also were allocated almost a half a stroke more to their handicap index.

Peter MacArthur has one round left using the Callaway handicapping system before he will be switched across to an official Sunday Leave Pass handicap for two rounds using the original AGU handicapping system before he will then be given a formal handicap Index using the Slope handicap system once 5 full rounds are completed with the social club.

Even if a player has an official golf link, as a matter of consistency we still use the Callaway system to calculate a daily handicap.


After 3 rounds they will be allocated a temporary handicap using the old AGU handicapping formula and then after 5 rounds they are elevated onto the official Slope handicapping system which was use thereafter for all club competitions.

Sometimes the Callaway handicapping system has proved itself to be very favorable to new members. Whenever we take on a golf course like Devils Bend or Eynesbury and the field struggle to play to their handicaps the Callaway golfers end up featuring
at the top of the points distribution. This was not quite the case this weekend although both Jayden and Peter McArthur finished inside the top 15 points rankings. Often a round on a low scoring course like Centenary Park or Dorset or Ringwood it can be difficult for a Callaway handicapped member to pick up too many points.

For those people interested in the mechanics of the handicapping system it can be best explained as the following.

How to calculate a GA Handicap

## To calculate a player's GA Handicap:

- you must firstly identify the player's most recent 20 scores,
- you then determine the 'Played To' value for each of these scores,
- you average the best 8 'Played To' values,
- and finally you multiply this average by 0.93 . The resultant figure (to one decimal place) is the player's GA Handicap.
* If a player's handicap record contains a lesser number than 20 scores, the number of scores used to calculate the player's handicap is as listed in the table below.
* There is no requirement for a player's most recent 20 scores to have been returned within a specific timeframe. For example, the most recent 20 scores may span a period of three years or they may span a period of three months.
* Once a player's handicap record contains 20 scores, the next score they return will result in the oldest of the existing 20 scores being removed (to be replaced by the new score).

Full Technical Procedure for Calculating a GA Handicap STEP 1 - Use the table below to determine the number of scores to be included in the GA Handicap calculation:

Number of Scores in Player's Handicap Record
Scores to be Used in the Calculation

| 5 to 6 | Best/Lowest 1 |
| :--- | :--- |
| 7 or 8 | Best/Lowest 2 |
| 9 or 10 | Best/Lowest 3 |

| 11 or 12 | Best/Lowest 4 |
| 13 or 14 | Best/Lowest 5 |
| 15 or 16 | Best/Lowest 6 |
| 17 or 18 | Best/Lowest 7 |
| 19 or 20 | Best/Lowest 8 |

Note: When the handicap record contains more than 20 scores, the GA Handicap calculation uses the best 8 of the player's most recent 20 scores.
