# Before everyone emails me to complain about their handicaps, I remind you that we are using the world handicap slope rating system and this means your handicap is adjusted each month according to the difficulty or ease of the golf course that you are playing on.

# Believe it or not Yarra Bend is rated as one of the more easy golf courses for scratch golfers, and with a slope rating 116 with a scratch rating of 67 it means that most player's handicap was either neutral or adjusted downwards by 1 stroke from the handicap index according to the slope formula: 

New Daily Handicap formula $=($ GA Handicap $\times($ Slope Rating $\div 113)+($ Scratch Rating minus Par)) x 0.93

## PLAYER HANDICAPS

PLEASE NOTE *Last year we changed the format of the handicapping system to adjust each player's handicap based on the difficulty of the golf courses we are playing by applying the slope rating of each golf course against the player's handicap. We ran this as a trial in 2019 and it was fully implemented during the

2020 season, and it seemed to work well. This year we have fully transitioned which means the course scratch ratings are also factored into the golf handicapping process.

The difference is when you play a hard golf course like Eynesbury your handicap will be higher, and when you play an easy golf course like Ringwood or Dorset your handicap will be lower. The adjustments are based on the official handicapping system used by golf link and are designed to allow fairness and equality to golfers of all ability levels.

Instead of a handicap you have a Handicap index, which is the handicap expressed in a decimal (13.4, 5.2, 29.3, etc.). We have always used this process and we have simply used it as a club handicap by assuming that every golf course we played was equal and played as a neutral slope rating of 113. This year your index is used as a mathematical calculation of your playing ability on an average golf course (i.e., a course with a 113 Slope rating) then adjusted up or down according to the course rating which factors in the length and difficulty of the golf course to give you a variable daily handicap.

New Daily Handicap formula $=($ GA Handicap $\times($ Slope Rating $\div 113)+($ Scratch Rating minus Par $))$

## YARRA BEND GOLF COURSE

The par 70, 18-hole golf course has long been regarded as Melbourne's premier public-access course. Surrounded by the Yarra River, golfers take in botanic views on every hole, with the city skyline in view on most holes. With a layout that will challenge all levels of golfer and quality year-round course conditions, Yarra Bend Golf is a golfing experience not to be missed!

Built in 1936, Yarra Bend Golf Course is rich in heritage and widely recognised as one of Melbourne's premiere public golf destinations.

The original course design was heavily influenced by Vern Morcom, who is responsible for many of Australia's best layouts. Vern worked intimately with perhaps the greatest golf course architect of all, Alistair MacKenzie, who famously designed Augusta National and Australia's best golf course Royal Melbourne.

In recent years, expert design team Ogilvy Clayton Cocking Mead have restored the course layout and provided a strategic plan for exciting further course upgrades in the future.

Evidently the golf course impressed the majority, it checked many of the boxes and there is now a real push to get Yarra Bend voted back onto the Sunday Leave Pass annual fixture. Perfect weather conditions, spectacular views and only 20 minutes travel time for many of our members was enough to get the thumbs up from even the harshest of our golf course critics.


## Yarra Bend Golf Course Results- October

As pretty as the Yarra Bend golf course is and despite its short length on paper, it still has an ugly side to it. Yarra Bend proved that it is not an easy course to play. Obviously, the golf course architects were able to incorporate some challenges into the compact course layout, which still test even the most accomplished players. Incredibly, almost every golfer sang the praises of Yarra Bend Golf Course, yet only one player managed to play to his handicap and the average score for the group was 8 over par 78.

Mick Harper was looking like he was going to tear the golf course apart. Mick was even with the card after 8 holes, but then his game got unhinged on the ninth hole while trying to smack out a longest drive and he finished up making a quadruple bogie. (9). Evidently, while most others struggled, Mick relished the speed of the greens. He was able to roll in 3 birdies and 7 pars for the day and completed his 18 holes with only 31 putts, which even included a four putt on the $9^{\text {th }}$ green and a three putt on the $18^{\text {th }}$ hole. Despite his impressive performance with the putter, Mick still came very close to finishing his day wearing the flouro yellow, three-putt monkey vest. Were it not for Newell's putt on the last green finishing just $1-\mathrm{cm}$ short of the mouth of the cup, Mick would have been fined $\$ 2-00$ for finishing wearing the vest despite being the equal best player with the flat stick on the day.

Tom Kellythorn also had a good run on the greens. Tom played the front nine holes needing just 14 putts, but then after the turn, the putter went cold and he only made a single, one-putt on the back nine. Tom matched big Mick with the best putting score of 31 strokes on the lowest mown grass.

Most other players struggled with the greens; the average putt score was close to 38 shots for the round. Four players had in excess of 40 putts. Thomas Cooper had 8 three putts and a $\$ 2$ fine for a four putt, which was ultimately the difference between coming near last place (shooting 111) and having a serious crack at shooting under 100 strokes.

Greg Parsons was the worst of the worst with a wasteful 46 strokes at the mercy of the putter. Greg had 8 turns at wearing the yellow vest for 3 putting or worse. At one stage, Greg strung together a sequence of $2 x$ consecutive 4 -putt greens, followed up with another couple of 3 putts. Greg gave up 9 strokes to the field with his poor putting performance, he was ranked last in putting stats and his score with the flat stick was 15 strokes worse than the number one ranked player. That is certainly a lot of strokes to give away.

It was little wonder that Greg was looking for a bit of help. Obviously, the putting tips he got from Mick Harper on the practice green were not working, so Greg came looking for another way of reducing the putting score. Allegedly, Greg sought out the rules committee, mid-round and asked for a dodgy ruling. It seems, Greg likes to think that if a shot hits the flagstick which has been left in the hole, then it should be classed as "IN". The questionable practice came into concern when Greg's playing partner, hit a 12-meter put too hard and it bounced off the flag stick and finished about a foot from the hole. Chris Sfiligoj tried to argue that hitting the pin was close enough to be considered a holed putt, because if he had been allowed to touch the flag and take it out, then the ball may have gone into the hole. To make it perfectly clear, Chris wasn't asking for the next putt to be considered a Gimmee, (which also is a No, No) he was claiming the bounce off the flag to be close enough to be called "a holed putt".

If you are weighing up your options and looking for candidates for Leather Wedge award 2021. Keep these antics in mind.

At least they did not write the score on the card until after they asked for a ruling, however I think both Greg and Chris were disappointed when they were told that only a ball that goes into the hole is called sunk. Had the ruling been different it would have been a great outcome for Peter Alphabet, who, after being privy to the entire conversation, played his next shot with a pitching wedge down the third fairway. By some form of small miracle, his ball rolled onto the green and hit the flag flush in the middle of the pole and stopped just a meter or two from the cup to set up his third birdie putt in a row. With the flag still shaking from the force of the impact, Peter called back to Greg and said, "That shot hit the flag, so does that mean it is "in?" If it does, then I just made an eagle 2?"

Forty seconds later, Newell Richards rammed his putt up against the flag on the par 3 fourth hole. The ball sat on the edge but failed to drop into the hole.

Peter Alphabet it seemed had the luck of the gods following him, initially we thought he must have had a leprechaun sitting on his shoulder, because he managed to get lucky break after lucky break. Throughout his entire round of golf, Peters balls rolled through bunkers, bounced off trees back into the middle of the fairway and even skinnied pitching wedges destined for the Yarra River was stopped by the flagpole. It seemed as though Peter could not do a single thing wrong and if he did, then he somehow got away with it.

As it happens it wasn't a leprechaun looking over Peters shoulder, it was the "Tyche" the Greek goddess of good luck.
"Tyche" was the ancient Greek goddess of fortune, chance, providence and fate. She was usually honoured in a more favourable light as Eutychia, goddess of good fortune, luck, success and prosperity. Tyche was depicted with a variety of attributes--a rudder, ball, the infant Plutus (Wealth) and a cornucopia.


Evidently Pete spent his first Saturday night out, on "Freedom Day," with the family at the local Greek restaurant loading up on a cornucopia of Ouzo shots. Somehow, between the dinner and drinking session and the misty haze of the next days hangover, Peter had brought with him a Greek angel "Tyche" to watch out over him.

Peter's newfound good fortune was evident from his very first drive, when a pulled 1 wood bounced off a tree stump, ricocheted out of the rough and gave him a clear shot at the green with his next swing. Through his blurry hungover eyes, Peter then miss-hit the next stroke, yet it rolled end over end, along the ground until it finally came to rest, you guessed it on the green. Two dodgy shots and it resulted in an easy par written on the score card.

By the time the second hole was completed there was no doubt the way the day was going to play out. Two players launched wayward drives off the second tee and both shots travelled the exact same journey. Left to right, a loud scream of "Fore" to alert the innocent bystanders standing on the $9^{\text {th }}$ tee. A long walk through the trees and a few apologies later, both balls were found. One had a clear line of sight and uninhibited flight path to the green and the other was blocked and almost unplayable from the only tree standing between the tee and the green. Surely, we don't need to elaborate and say whose ball was whose. Peter caressed his ball onto the green for a casual 2 putt par, whereas Stu Coops bushwhacked his way towards the green, eventually finishing the hole with what turned out to be a round ending score of 9 , from exactly the same location.

While Peter got lucky time and time again, for every bit of good fortune, it seemed as though Stu got a cut of bad luck. It certainly appeared as though the celestial interference, both good and bad, were linked. For example, when Peter drove his ball down the left-hand side of the Par five $15^{\text {th }}$ hole, his ball was unaffected by gravity and his Srixon 4 was easy to find. Yet, when Stu took exactly the same line with his drive his ball bounced off the slope of the hill and was lost for ever in the long grassy hazard. Two identical shots, and the final outcome was Peter made a par whereas Stu was left to mark his card with an 8.

It was only once we looked into the Greek Goddess "Tyche" that we managed to find a link between Peter Alphabets run of good luck and the mirrored bad luck experienced by Stu Coops. Evidently, Stu was destined for failure and misfortune from the moment he joined Peter on the first tee, and here is the reason why:

In Greek and many other cultures there is a bad luck charm otherwise known as the "Evil Eye"

- Evil Eye The evil eye (Greek: $\mu$ átı, mati, Turkish: Nazar, "eye"; Hebrew: צָּיֶ הָרָע; Italian: malocchio; Arabic: , عين حسد , ayn; Persian: چشٌ cheshm) is a superstitious belief in curse, believed to be cast by a malevolent glare, usually given to a person when one is unaware. It dates back at least to Greek classical antiquity, 6th century BC where it appeared on Chalcidian drinking vessels, known as 'eye-cups', as a type of apotropaic magic.

Evidently Stu has been marking his golf ball with a cursed Greek symbol for years. As soon as Peter Alphabet saw Stu mark his Titleist 01 with the Evil Eye markings, Pete asked for his ball to be marked with a cross. In hindsight, now we understand why Pete insisted that Stu mark his ball using the same Texta, and why he chose the Greek cross as his marking of choice. Peter was channelling the energies of "Tyche" to put a counter spell against the Evil Eye curse on Stu.

This wasn't the only time Peter acted in his own best interest. Jamie was left high and dry on the $6^{\text {th }}$ hole when he and two of his playing partners hooked their golf balls into the trees. Poor Steve Dawson was left diving for cover when three balls in succession were launched from the tee with a loud call of "Fore!!". Dawso was in the danger zone because he was playing in the group behind, and it was not uncommon to have balls rattle around in the trees above his head. Once Jamie's playing group arrived at Dawso's battered and bruised body, they started the search for where the golf balls had finished up. While Cam Douglas, Jamie and Stu walked circles for 6 minutes searching for Jamie's ball, Peter Alphabet unashamedly ignored them and walked up the fairway to where his ball had deflected off the tree canopy and come to rest in the middle of the fairway. We are not sure whether

Jamie was angrier because he had lost his ball when it should have been easy to find in the light rough along the tree line or because his so-called good mate had not even bothered to help him to look for it.

After nearly getting hit by the balls on the $5^{\text {th }}$ hole, Dawso drove like a demon. It looked like he was seeking revenge for nearly killing him as he repeatedly rained golf balls on Jamie, Peter and the group in front. On the par 3, $8^{\text {th }}$ hole Dawso had his best chance to send the group diving for cover. He hit a sweeping hook which flew directly over the guys standing on the $9^{\text {th }}$ tee box, he called "Fore" however the ball was so long and wide that it missed his active target and instead his ball crashed into the golf bag of a poor unsuspecting stranger who was walking his buggy down the second fairway.

Golf can be a dangerous game; an errant drive can turn out to be harmful to others around the golf course. Because of the way the golf course interacts from hole to hole, the peace and tranquillity of the beautiful Yarra Bend layout was regularly interrupted by the holler of "Fore" as golf balls flew from one fairway to the next. While golfing, there is always the fear of hitting someone when you play a wayward shot, although the last thing on your mind while going through a golf swing is the possibility that you might actually manage to hit the golf ball into yourself.

It is not uncommon for the supercoach to hit his drive short distances. On Sunday he was fined the maximum limit of $\$ 10$ for twice failing to hit his driver past the ladies-tees and on several other occasions it was only gravity which enabled his ball to just get passed them.


With an average drive distance for the day of less than 50 meters it was a tough day for the self-proclaimed Supercoach, although his shortest shot for the day was a three iron which travelled 4 meters forwards, then four meters backwards and then came to rest 4 meters to the left of where he stood. It was Fil's second shot on the Par 5 ninth hole. As he stood over his ball, after a 12 meter drive he was staring down the remaining 432 meters left to get to the green. With open fairway to the left and clear paddock straight ahead as far as the eye could see, Fil addressed his golf ball. The only thing that could possibly go wrong was if he pulled the ball towards the trees to the right, however with his feet standing 30 cm above the ball that was near on impossible. Well impossible for everyone except for the out-of-form, Mark Sfiligoj. Fil came over the top of his golf ball with a closed face, and the ball squirted out to the right like a bullet. His Topflight 01 crashed into the trunk of a huge cyprus tree growing 4 meters to the right of where he stood. The ball rebounded back towards him at almost the same speed as it left the club. It was only Fil's lightning quick reflexes that enabled him to stick a hand out to deflect the ball and stop it from hitting himself in the head. Mark nearly decapitated himself which gave Fitzy no end of joy and entertainment, especially after Fil had started the day by telling Fitzy how crap he was, because Fitzy's first drive with his new golf club only managed to clear the squatters tees by a matter of meters.


Fitzy's son, Jaxon on the other hand was having no troubles hitting his drives long. He smoked one down the middle of the first fairway and hardly missed a drive for the entire day. The longest drive competition was almost a battle of the teenagers with both Jaxon and Thomas crushing their balls Bryson Dechambeau style down the $9^{\text {th }}$ hole. Jaxon's drive was only a meter behind Thomas Coopers, and both kids were left with only just over 200 meters away from the green for their second shot. Not even big Mick, Gerard or Greg Breasley, were able to launch a ball far enough to compete with the youngsters for the longest drive title. It was only the Greek god of luck "Tyche" acting on behalf of Peter Alphabet that was able to knock them off their perch. Peter hit a good solid drive which flew high and straight. The ball descended its flight path and conveniently landed on the concrete surrounds of a sprinkler mount. His ball took a massive bounce in the air and spring boarded forward at least another 50 meters further than the drive should otherwise have travelled. The ball then hit the downslope of the fairway and rolled on past the long drive marker. It was a miracle of a shot. Perhaps it was another case of divine intervention from "Thyche." the Greek god of luck. Whatever the cause, it resulted in Peter Alphabet winning his $2^{\text {nd }}$ career longest drive title for the club.

Stu Coops is still protesting the long drive outcome. If it wasn't bad enough for Peter to get a cheats bounce off the concrete slab to knock off Thomas Cooper, but then for him to deny Stu the long drive crown because he took a more direct route and hit his ball down the split fairway on the ninth hole which Peter argued was not part of the course. When Alister McKenzie designed the Yarra Bend layout, he created some exciting golf holes including the Par 5 ninth hole where he engineered two different fairway paths, split by a row of trees down the middle. Only the brave, take the more direct route. It is a high-risk tee shot taking on the river and it leaves a golfer with a difficult second shot which requires a high carry back over the trees and the green is protected even more so by the front bunker when playing from the $2^{\text {nd }}$ option fairway. It is a classic, traditional MacKenzie/Morcom risk versus reward set up. On Sunday, Stu successfully navigated his ball onto the short cut stuff on the alternate fairway, however when he called for the long drive marker to be brought down to him, Peter refused. suggesting the ball was not on the fairway. He recruited Jamie and Cam Douglas to support his conspiracy theory, so in the end Stu conceded defeat because it was inevitable, he was never going to win the argument, and he relinquished his grip on the Long Drive title.


Even if you do a search on google images, it clearly shows the fairway is perfectly mown just the same as the other 17 holes on the golf course. According to the club constitution the golf ball must be on the short-mown grass of the fairway to be eligible to win the longest drive title. Alistair MacKenzie would be turning in his grave knowing that a player who successfully took on the most challenging play line that he built into the golf course was being penalized for doing so.

Sometimes risk versus reward pays off, and there are other times when it doesn't. Cam Ross tried to cut the corner and fly the dogleg on the $13^{\text {th }}$ hole; however, he fell short, and he paid the ultimate price. Cam's ball rattled around in the tree canopy before dropping straight down to the base of the tree. When he arrived at his ball he was totally stumped. There was no option other than take an unplayable lie or risk breaking his wrist and golf club and still be hitting the ball in the wrong direction.


Fitzy also got an interesting surprise when he hit his golf ball under the base of a tree. Although he had an unimpeded swing at the golf ball, Fitzy had to dodge a baby ring tail possum that had fallen out of the tree. Whether or not it was Fitzy's drive that knocked it out of the branches we will never know, however as a good Samaritan or because of a little bit of the guilts, Fitzy took off his jumper and tried to encourage the possum to climb back up the tree. It took more than 5 minutes to get the possum to let go of the jumper but eventually it scampered to the safety of the tall branches and waited for the next errant golf ball to knock it down again.


Yarra Bend has an abundance of wildlife. While Fitzy was rescuing the baby possum, just two groups ahead Thomas Cooper was blasting golf balls at the bats nesting in the trees along the Yarra River. About 10,000 of the grey-headed bats live at Yarra Bend Park, after they were moved from the Royal Botanic Gardens in 2003. After Thomas Cooper skinnied his bunker shot out of the bunker on the $13^{\text {th }}$ hole, the population of bats may have dropped by one or two. Thomas was sitting pretty with his ball in the greenside bunker for just four shots, however he almost finished the hole with a Newell when he got too much ball contact and not enough sand. His ball crashed into the trees housing a colony of fruit bats and according to eyewitnesses, at least 2 of them lost their grip on the branch they were hanging from and crashed down into the roaring river below. Thomas claims they were just diving down to try to save his golf ball from disappearing into the river, although they looked more battered and bruised than he portrays.


Interestingly in the absence of the regular contributors, this month there was only 6 Newell's posted from a field of 26 players. Either Yarra Bend is an easier course than most golf courses we play on, or else our Newell tally is skewed by the people who play each month. It would have been interesting to see if we had more Newell's scored if Tony Mac and Rick had of been able to have played. Unfortunately, the boys got cut off at the pass and a last-minute change to golf Australia's vaccination policy meant that they were not eligible to play on Sunday.

While the Newell count was relatively low, the Birdie tally was more significant. As a collective group we posted 12 birdies and 70 pars for the day. Interestingly on most instances the birds could be found in pairs.


Mick Harper found three birdies over his 18-hole journey. Steve Dawson had a matching pair and even Stu Coops also had a pair of birdies including a birdie 2 on the par 3 tenth hole. Jaxon Fitzpatrick stamped his authority on the rest of the field by making a couple of birds, and his reward was a $2^{\text {nd }}$ place ranking for the day. Todd and Tom are often mistaken between one another, nobody is sure which one is which and who made what, however between the two of them they did account for 2 of the 12 birdies made at Yarra Bend on Sunday, and Gerard MacIsaac made up the other one with a birdie on the par 5 ninth hole.


Evidently Tom Kellythorn (the pommie one) is fed up with getting mistaken for Todd (the Canadian boat person). It seems that despite being regular players with the social club for more than 5 years, the majority of us, use their names mistakenly and interchangeably. During the latest Covid lockdown, Tom decided that by growing a goatee beard he would have a distinguishing

who rolled his chip shot from out of the rough and onto the green to finish with his ball closer than the NTP marker. Although Dawso did win the prize for NTP $2^{\text {nd }}$ shot, he failed to capitalize, not only did he miss the birdie putt, but he failed to make par and was left to walk off the green carrying the humiliation of wearing the three-putt monkey vest.

The biggest news coming out of Yarra Bend was when Stu Coops managed to win the NTP prize on the $10^{\text {th }}$ hole. Stu came very close to taking out the NTP on the $8^{\text {th }}$ green however his charity in not measuring the distance between the two markers was left unrewarded when he then went on to three-putt for bogie. For those who have forgotten about the powers bestowed on the Blue Jacket here is a reminder of how it works.
As the Champion of Champions Newell will be able to ask any Sunday Leave Pass member to buy him a drink, it is limited to only receiving one drink per member (beer or soft) over the entire year and it can only be done so, only if he is wearing the Champion of Champion jacket at the time. This of course does not include new members who did not play at least one or more rounds in season 2020 but not exclusive to those who attended the golf trip. So, if he manages himself correctly, he should be looking at up to 50 free beers or soft drinks over the next 12 months. Now that is a prize worth aspiring for.

The other condition is that Newell must be the one who consumes the drink, he cannot use his power to buy beverages for anyone else. There is also a catch where, if Newell asks someone who has previously shouted him a drink, then he must immediately buy them a drink instead. Not that there is much chance of that happening as he has a spreadsheet set up and running.

## Newell can also kick in the balance of $\$ 2$ per shout to upgrade his beer to bourbons if he prefers to.

Another solid performance and a podium finish see's Mick well within striking distance of closing the season out in the bridesmaid's place yet again. Mick shot the low gross score for the day, he needed only 78 swings to complete the 4703-meter journey around Yarra Bend. One can only imagine what score Mick may have been able to produce had he not blown up on the ninth hole where he posted a 9 , on what should have otherwise been a very gettable par 5 hole for him.

It was great to see Chris Westhead submit a scorecard worthy of a top 10 position. This month was Chris' first round with his official club handicap and he certainly was able to show, that the handicapper has got it pretty accurate this time. Chris played very well and matched his equal career best score. With a couple of pars for the day he was also able to win some skins.

Jamie Brunton was a big fan of Yarra Bend. He loved the short trip to get to the golf course, he repeatedly mentioned how pretty the scenery was and the reward for his enthusiasm was a season's best score and a top 5 finish in the points allocation. Jamie's only gripe for the day was losing his ball in the middle of the short rough beside the fairway. What Jamie discovered on Sunday was how it is always harder to find your golf ball when:
A) your playing partner doesn't watch your shot and
B) your playing partner doesn't help you look for your ball when you need a bit of help.

Brent Douglas and Newell Richards have once again featured at the top end of the points allocation and they both coasted past poor Tony MacIsaac who was previously sitting on top of the points ranking. With two rounds left in season 2021 there are 5 players who are all within striking distance of winning the season trophy. With only 10 points separating first to fifth position and a maximum of 30 points on offer, the performances at Morack and Barham are going to be critical.

Where more than one player has the same score the place allocations are determined by a countback.
The count back system is formulated as the following. *Total number of stableford points scored on the back nine holes.
*In the event that both players have the same stableford score on the back nine it then reverts to the number of stableford points scored on the eighteenth hole. If this is the same then it goes to the $17^{\text {th }}$ hole, sixteenth hole, fifteenth hole until a player has a better hole and therefore has a higher stableford score than the other.

In this instance both Brent and Dawso had Nett 73 after their handicap was deducted from the Gross Scores. So, we go back to a countback.

In this example brent ranks higher because he had 16 points compared to Dawso who choked on the back nine holes and could only conjure up 11 stableford points on the back nine and was therefore relegated down a place.

If in the event, that the countback then identifies that both players have had the same stableford points score on the back nine then we go back to the individual holes starting from the $18^{\text {th }}$ hole and compare results until a player had a standout result. In the example shown on the right both Tony MacIsaac and Steve Powne had Nett 74 and 12 Stableford points on the back nine. So, the countback then compares the scores on individual holes starting from the $18^{\text {th }}$ hole working backwards as required. In this situation the scores on holes 18 , were different. Tony scored 2 stableford points compared to Steve who only scored 1 stableford point. Consequently, Tony wins the countback, and the Blue Smurf is relegated back to a lower place ranking. If both scores are equal on the $18^{\text {th }}$ hole, then we go back to the $17^{\text {th }}$ hole, then the $16^{\text {th }}$, etc etc.

PLEASE NOTE THAT THE COUNT BACK IS ON HOLES 10-18 irrespective of whether it is a two-tee start, a normal hit off from the first hole or as in the case of Gardiners Run where we hit off the $10^{\text {th }}$ hole first. It is always the $10^{\text {th }}$ to $18^{\text {th }}$ holes and if one person starts on the $10^{\text {th }}$ hole and the other hits off the first hole then it still remains exactly the same formula.

As a new member of the Social Club the Callaway Handicapping system is used to give the player a daily played to handicap for the first couple of rounds. Once they have played 3 rounds, they are given a temporary club handicap using the original AGU handicapping system. After 5 rounds they are then switched across to the current slope handicapping system.


This system is used for determining fair allowances for social golf events that attract novices or occasional golfers. A player's Callaway handicap is determined after each round by deducting from his/her 18 -hole gross score the scores of the worst individual holes during the first 16 holes of the round.

In the computation of handicaps under this system:

No hole may be scored at more than twice its par

- half strokes count as a whole,
- the 17th and 18th holes are never deducted,

For example, if a player scores 99 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their ( 3 worst holes) +1
If a player scores 82 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their ( worst $+1 / 2$ the $2^{\text {nd }}$ worst hole) -1
If a player scores 120 on the day their handicap would be calculated as the sum total of their (five worst holes) +2
After 3 rounds they will be allocated a temporary handicap using the old AGU handicapping formula and then after 5 rounds they are elevated onto the official Slope handicapping system which was use thereafter for all club competitions.

For those people interested in the mechanics of the handicapping system it can be best explained as the following.

How to calculate a GA Handicap

To calculate a player's GA Handicap:

- you must firstly identify the player's most recent 20 scores,
- you then determine the 'Played To' value for each of these scores,
- you average the best 8 'Played To' values,
- and finally you multiply this average by 0.93 . The resultant figure (to one decimal place) is the player's GA Handicap.
* If a player's handicap record contains a lesser number than 20 scores, the number of scores used to calculate the player's handicap is as listed in the table below.
* There is no requirement for a player's most recent 20 scores to have been returned within a specific timeframe.

For example, the most recent 20 scores may span a period of three years or they may span a period of three months.

* Once a player's handicap record contains 20 scores, the next score they return will result in the oldest of the existing 20 scores being removed (to be replaced by the new score).

Full Technical Procedure for Calculating a GA HandicapSTEP 1 - Use the table below to determine the number of scores to be included in the GA Handicap calculation:

## Number of Scores in Player's Handicap Record

## Scores to be Used in the Calculation

| 5 to 6 | Best/Lowest 1 |
| :--- | :--- |
| 7 or 8 | Best/Lowest 2 |
| 9 or 10 | Best/Lowest 3 |

| 11 or 12 | Best/Lowest 4 |
| 13 or 14 | Best/Lowest 5 |
| 15 or 16 | Best/Lowest 6 |
| 17 or 18 | Best/Lowest 7 |
| 19 or 20 | Best/Lowest 8 |

Note: When the handicap record contains more than 20 scores, the GA Handicap calculation uses the best 8 of the player's most recent 20 scores.

I hope that helps to explain the handicapping system.
The Sunday Leave Pass handicapping process with the one used by golf link and by all golf clubs around the globe using the world handicapping system. Although your SLP handicap is unofficial and therefore it cannot be used to formally enter organized golf competitions and tournaments, it still should be an accurate reflection of your golfing prowess and a measure of what your GA (golf Australia) handicap would be if you subscribed the $\$ 150$ per year to get an official handicap.

Your playing handicap will fluctuate around your documented handicap index. When you play an easy course such as Ringwood or Dorset then you will actually play off a lower handicap than you normally would. On the other days when we invite you to play a harder course such as Rosebud Country Club, Devils Bend, Werribee Park or Barham we will add a few extra shots to your arsenal just to give you more hope of avoiding total anxiety and depression.

For those players not familiar with the scoring process, listed below is the format we use in Sunday Leave Pass competitions. Once all of the players are ranked then the Seasons Championship points are allocated according to the position in the field. The player in $1^{\text {st }}$ place gets 15 points, $2^{\text {nd }}$ place 14 points, $3^{\text {rd }}$ place 13 points, etc. etc. Any player who completes the round however finishes ranked outside the top 14 and is placed between $15^{\text {th }}$ spot to BeerWench then they are all allocated 1 championship point for attending.
For the benefit of the newcomers or the uneducated we thought it would be a good opportunity to go through the player rankings and point scoring system again.

Sunday Leave Pass competitions are run using Stroke so you need to count every shot that you play and you need to finish every hole. Each player's Nett total score is then calculated by deducting the players handicap from the Gross score. If a player doesn't have an official Sunday Leave Pass handicap, then a temporary played to handicap is allocated on the day using the Callaway handicapping system.

Once the players Nett score is calculated they are ranked from lowest score to highest score. (BeerWench) Where more than one player has the same Nett Score (such as in the example below from Gardiners Run last year then the place allocations are decided based on a countback system.

The player with the most points at the end of the year is crowned the Points champion irrespective of how many rounds a person has played. If one person plays 13 rounds for the year and the person in $2^{\text {nd }}$ place has only played 10 rounds but is close to the
same score then that is bad luck to the person in $2^{\text {nd }}$ place. All players are invited to play the entire fixture. We reward participation rather than perfection and performance so if you play more often you will end up with more points.

In order to win the Season Championship trophy, you need to play regularly and consistently to about your handicap or better, and it is the handicapper's responsibility to make sure that this does not happen. After every round, the scores are assessed and then the handicaps are adjusted according to your performance. As was the case last year we have adjusted the handicap formula to take into consideration the difficulty of each golf course, using the course slope index, so it will be remarkably interesting to see how the scores finish up.

Every monthly title winner also becomes eligible to play off for the champion of champions trophy. To qualify as the Champion of Champions a member just needs to win a monthly title. All of the winners from the monthly championships who are attending the golf trip will then play off for the title based on total accumulated stableford points from 9x Randomly selected holes. The Winner is the person with the most points over those 9 nominated holes, and in the event of a tie then a Countback to determine the winner applies.

NOTE: The Winner of the December title is also eligible to win the competition however they only get to count their scores by using only 8 Randomly selected holes.

The odds of a social golfer scoring a hole in one is actually 12000 to 1 and since it took us more than 16 years and had over 20000 attempts before someone in the club was able to make a hole in one on a par 3 holes the chances of someone making another Ace seems to be near on impossible.
(In 1999, Golf Digest reported, "One insurance company puts a PGA Tour pro's chances at 1 in 3,756 and an amateur at 1 in 12,750.") The Golf Digest study even breaking the odds down by quality of play:

- Professional Tour player making an ace: 3,000 to 1
- Low handicapper making an ace: 5,000 to 1
- Average player making an ace: 12,000 to 1
