WARBURTON GOLF


The momentum of a round of golf is often determined by what happens on the first hole. If you get a good one out of the screws on the first tee and you start the day with a good score then your confidence soars and you are usually in for a good day, mess up your first shot, lose a ball or waste a few putts by missing an easy tap in on the green and you can almost guarantee it is going to be a long and frustrating next 4 hours.

One of the signatures for the Warburton golf course is the Circa 1868 silo which stands proud on the fairway on the $1^{\text {st }}$ hole, it is also a performance gauge for your drive. If you can hit your golf ball passed it then you're most likely going to be in a good position and you will get a clear shot to the green, if you fall short then you will be blocked out by the silo and or the trees on the dog leg left hand side of the fairway and you will struggle to make a score on the hole. If you drive anywhere to the left of the 140year old structure then you are destined to be in the trees or out of bounds into the houses and you can kiss your golf ball or at least your chances of making a par good-bye.


El presidente knew he was in for a good day when his first drive got the most extraordinary piece of luck in SLP history. Last month Tom Kellythorn had a hole in one which we calculated the odds of this miracle occurring to be at 20188 to 1 . However, this month Steve O'Sullivan did something which had even greater odds because it has never been done before and probably will never be repeated again. SOS hit his drive through the top window of the Silo and his ball popped out through the other side and kept flying on until it rounded the corner and landed in the middle of the fairway just a short wedge from the green. An unbelievable start to a round of golf.

Thomas Cooper's day was not quite so fortuitous. Thomas who is still new to the game of golf and the SLP golf club is trying to learn from his role model and mentor, SOS. Thomas believes he can learn a great deal more from SOS than he will ever get out of following the trials and tribulations of his Dad (Stu) around the golf course. Mirroring is the best form of flattery and Thomas took the same strategy as his illustrious leader, unfortunately for Thomas he does not have the same pinpoint accuracy (or luck) as SOS had, and Thomas's golf ball missed the window and crashed into the solid wall of the heritage listed landmark instead. His Ball ricocheted 70 meters backwards and came to rest on the fairway, a long way short of the preferred landing zone.


Hopefully, the structural engineers who were called in to inspect the damage on Monday will be able to sign off and declare safe the small dint which quickly spread to significant cracks around the impact zone of the silo. We would hate to find out that Thomas' power drive had caused irreparable damage because the Warburton golf course would not be the same without this magnificent landmark.


Newell Richards was never in any fear of hitting the Silo with his tee shot, in fact he was 190 meters short of the required distance to hit a drive passed it. There was a higher likelihood for his duffed drive hitting the 1970's club house facilities instead because it had the correct direction and trajectory, but Newell failed to have the power to even get there. Evidently Newell has been tinkering with his golf swing this last week (nothing new there) and he decided to tee his golf ball up a little bit higher. This resulted in him hitting a shank from the inside of the hozzle, which caused the ball to bounce 3 feet in front of him, roll through the garden beds, land on the cart bath, bounce over Cliff Rowes head and come to rest just shy of the practice putting green. Rob Underwood claims the ball may have actually gone through Cliffs right ear and out the other side. Although it is definitely a plausible scenario as Newell's drive could have done a through and through journey via Cliffs empty head cavity without interference, the fact that Cliff didn't even know he had come close to a serious injury makes us think it was not the case on this occasion.

Cliff was the focus for target practice, with Big Mick launching some massive drives which landed all around and about him from the group behind. On the $8^{\text {th }}$ hole in particular Mick smashed a drive which landed with in 6 feet off from where Cliff was walking down the middle of the fairway and the ball finished about a further 50 meters in front of him. Micks drive was well over the 320 meter mark on the 515 meter hole, so he was left with just a 5 iron in to the green for his $2^{\text {nd }}$ shot and was talking up making yet another SLP eagle. Unfortunately, Mick missed the green with his 5 -iron approach, robbing him of the chance to putt for an eagle 3. It is worth mentioning that Mick did chip in from off the green for a zero putt however he was only able to write a par on his scorecard because failed to chip in for eagle, and his attempt for birdie also run across the entire length of the green so he had three shots with the wedge before he finally managed to sink the ball into the hole for a score of 5 without the use of the putter.

Mick also had an Eagle putt on the $14^{\text {th }}$ hole however he was almost as inefficient with the putter as he was with the sand iron. Mick did manage to hole his $2^{\text {nd }}$ putt from 10 feet away which gave him his only birdie for the day.

Putting and chip-ins were the feature of the round. After the heads up in the study notes about the speed of the greens from Wayne and Cam, most of the golfers turned up very early on Sunday, in order to do research and spend a good amount of time on the practice green familiarizing with the oncourse conditions and the speed of the greens. They say practice makes perfect, and on this occasion, it must have paid off. As a collective group we set a club record for the lowest average putts per player. Only 5 guys had more than 36 putts and the average putts per member was an incredible 34.37 putts. Barry Hemsley who usually contributes heavily towards keeping the averages high was the best putter for the day. He only used the flat stick 29 times which is 6.5 putts better than his career average of 35.45 . Santa thought all of his Chrstmas' came at once when he finished the day with no 4 putts, only one three putt, and 6 one putt greens and a chip-in on the $11^{\text {th }}$ hole for par.

Colin Ewart only had 14-putts on the front-nine but he still ended up wearing the yellow vest after a 4 putt and 2 x 3 putts coming home on the back nine holes in 19. Colin Still finished the day with 33 putts which is a couple of shots better than his career putting average.

I am not sure whether the conditions were perfect or if it was because Warburton has very small greens, what ever the reason there were certainly chip-ins a plenty. Stu Coops chipped in for birdie on the very last hole to make what was otherwise a miserable day bearable. Adam Cooper chipped in for a birdie 2 on the $12^{\text {th }}$ hole which was icing on the cake for him. Adam finished the day on top of the leaderboard with an impressive score of 88 off the stick which featured $2 \times 2$ 's on the scorecard. Adam went 1 -under par on the shorter holes which is a sure way to keep you scores down low and the reward was 15 championship points and the February monthly title. One can only wonder how low Adam could have gone if he hadn't had 4 x turns at the 3-putt monkey vest, even still with 4 x three putts Adam only used the putter 30 times for the day.

Adam could be accused of shooting Bambi because with his success came the demise of Tony MacIsaac. The Warburton golf course seems to suit Tony Mac's game and the proof of this is that Tony has featured at the top end of the leaderboard on most of the times he has played the course. This month was no different. When he chipped in for a par (5) on the $14^{\text {th }}$ hole Tony was starting to think he was in a position to take home his $2^{\text {nd }}$ monthly title. Unfortunately, not for the first time it was so close yet so far. Tony finished his round with a triple bogey, triple bogey on $17^{\text {th }}$ and $18^{\text {th }}$ holes which gave him a score of 101 which meant he was 2 strokes short of Adam and therefore another $2^{\text {nd }}$ place finish at Warby was the final outcome.

Tony must love the Warburton golf course, which is a stark contrast to Mark Fitzpatrick who hates it with a passion. Fitzy swore an oath that he would never play at Warby again. He has held firm on that promise for the past 10 years, that was until his son Jaxon asked to play this month. It is amazing the things we do for our kids. As it turned out Fitzy committed to play at Warburton and then suddenly he was forced to do it alone after Jaxon pulled out at the last minute claiming a sore back injury. If Fitzy hated Warburton previously, he is certainly going to hate it even more once he finds out that his trip to the hills resulted in him finishing in last position, and a place in the battle of the beer wenches competition at this years golf trip. Marks day started bad and got worse from there. His only shining moment was when he chipped in from off the green on the $2^{\text {nd }}$ hole to avoid scoring a Newell. (Score of 10 or more) With a score in the hundreds ( 109 to be exact) Fitzy finished the day at the tail of the field with a Nett return of 90 . If that was not enough, Fitzy also nearly broke his leg when he locked up the wheels on his golf cart and spun out of control. After doing a 180-degree power slide the cart tipped up on two wheels. It was only that Mark fell out of the driver's seat and was able to use his leg to brace the weight of the cart which prevented the entire thing from flipping upside down and crushing him and Steve Powne. With the day that Mark had had at Warburton, it would not be a surprise to hear that Jaxon would have finished with more than just a pain in his back, it would most likely to have been radiating to his backside by the time Fitzy and his angry pants arrived back home.

The lush couch fairways at Warburton were a recipe for perfect lies and were very easy to hit off however the thick grass coverage when combined with the long rolling hills of the Warburton mountain ranges also made for a very heavy of walk the course. This year more than any other visit to Warby you really felt like you were working hard to get to the finish line. Despite the tired legs and heavy burden on the heart and lungs it is still a much better option to walk the golf course rather than brave the prospect of sitting shotgun in a golf cart with a hooligan at the wheel. As we mentioned earlier Fitzy nearly rolled his cart on top of himself and he was not the only one.


The $18^{\text {th }}$ hole at Warburton was recently voted by the "Inside Golf Australia Magazine" as the best last finishing hole on mainland Australia. And rightfully so, there is nothing more spectacular than watching a drive launch out towards the mountains and then drop for 30 to 40 seconds as it falls back to earth descending the vertical equivalent of 90 flights of stairs. That is of course unless you then have to then jump in a golf cart with Mal Griffiths and complete the same journey. It is one thing for a golf ball to go fast down a hill but not so much for a golf cart especially when you are in the passenger seat with no control of your destiny/fate. According to his co-pilot (Chris Sfiligoj), Mal was hammering his cart straight down the slope when he realized he was approaching where his ball had come to rest. This situation was escalated by the fact that at 4 foot 7 inches, Mal could hardly see out over the steering wheel so he only saw his ball at the last second and also his little legs could not easily reach the brake pedals. To quote Chris's recollection of the incident "We were rolling fast down the steepest part of the hill when Mal saw his ball a jumped on the anchors. We kept skidding for at least 20 to 30 meters on lots of long, wet grass before we spun out of control, the cart did a complete $\mathbf{1 8 0}$ degree turn and we almost rolled over. It was only my counterweight that prevented the cart from flipping and avoided our crash being a major catastrophic incident requiring an airlift operation. Luckily I was heavier than Mal and I was sitting on the upward side of the hill although by the time the cart came to a stop at the end of the crash Mal was about two kilos heavier because he had done a poop in his pants."

Fitzy and Mal are not the only people to have seen there lives flash before their eyes as they have crashed golf carts. Or you could always refer back to a few years ago when Rick Turcinovic also crashed his cart on the last hole at Warburton and lost his glasses in amongst the carnage and debris back in 2016.


Adam Cooper found himself bogged on the $18^{\text {th }}$ hole, however it was much more harmless than any of the golf cart scenes shown in the video above. A special thanks to Barry Hemsley for the photo and his contribution to the blurb. As a matter of courtesy we have sent this image on to Patrick Reed and the PGA rules officials so they can understand what a plugged ball actually looks like and how to handle the situation when it occurs in an event.


Hey Stu, I hope you had a good one.
Brother Adam had a bit of an adventure on the 18th and when he finally got around to chipping up on to the green he hit a ripper that went nice and high and came straight down and plugged into the duckweed green.
I just had to take a pic for the newsletter.

Adam would have had difficulty putting the ball in this position if he hadn't taken a free drop, although had it been Jamie Brunton then he probably still would have been able to find a way to get the ball into the hole. Jamie had 6 one puts for the day including a run of four one putts in a row, which is a very solid effort. Andrew Clarke had the longest consecutive run of putts in a row, however it wasn't necessarily a great outcome. Andrew played 18 holes for 36 putts, which was exclamation pointed by the fact that he did not have a single one putt or a three putt for the round, he never chipped in or received a fine for a four-putt green either. Andrew had 18x 2 putts in a row. I can not recall seeing this stat come up before in any of the SLP club archives.

Avoiding the three-putt monkey vest for the entire day is an accomplishment by Clarkey however without making a few one putts it really does not give him the opportunity to score low. Even Rob Underwood who had the most putts for the day (43) including a 5 putt on the par 3 fifth hole which turned a possible par into an 8 with five simple taps of the flat stick, yet he still had a couple of one putt greens during his game.

Steve Powne was never going to 5-putt the $10^{\text {th }}$ green after he knocked his approach shot close enough to win the NTP second shot prize. At four feet from the hole Steve was able to stave off the big hitters like Mick, Gerard and Cliff Rowe who all put their drives within meters of the green but none of them could not capitalize on their distance advantage none of them were able to hit their chips closer than Steve's marker. Unfortunately, Steve was not able to capitalize either because he missed the birdie putt which then opened up the door for Tim Emmerson who won a four skins jackpot by holing his putt for birdie from about 35 feet from the cup om the $10^{\text {th }}$ hole.

Thomas Cooper was never in the hunt for the NTP $2^{\text {nd }}$ shot on the $10^{\text {th }}$ hole because he never actually got his ball onto the green. Thomas bludgeoned his ball with three grubbers in a row up the short par 4 hole and then out of nowhere he holed a long chip to make his only par for the day.

Several players could be justified in saying the course was playing hard and claim Warburton was tough on them. Fitzy's day came unstuck early when he hit a couple of balls into the creek on the $2^{\text {nd }}$ hole. Fitzy finished the $2^{\text {nd }}$ hole with a nine and that was without even taking his putter out of the bag. Stu Coops also donated 2 balls into the Warburton hydro program on the $2^{\text {nd }}$ hole and it was not he only time he was left playing 5 off the tee or 6 from where it was believed the ball was lost. As the day went on and the hills got harder, Stu was heard claiming that he was lucky how his golf bag was feeling lighter than when he started, probably because he lost 6 golf balls along the journey which lightened the load by reducing the weight he had to drag up the hills.

- $\quad 2^{\text {nd }}$ Hole- Hit 2 balls into the creek on left hand side
- $\quad 6^{\text {th }}$ Hole- Thought it was in perfect position over the corner. Lost ball.
- $\quad 8^{\text {th }}$ Hole- Golf ball just disappeared after a drive down LHS of fairway. Perhaps a tree ate it?
- $14^{\text {th }}$ Hole- Longest Drive hole. First one was close to the fence line. Provisional ball over the fence. Play 6 from here Stu. GRRRRRRRRRRRRRR


Chris Sfiligoj also claims he got the poor rub of the green. While last month's winner Tom Kellythorn was getting the luxury of the members bounce. (where the ball bounces off the trees or rocks back into the middle of the fairway) Chris seemed to get the opposite and his ball found trouble wherever and whenever it could. Chris finished the day with 108 on the score card however most of those were not necessarily strokes played but rather penalties added. Chris knocked his tee on shot on the $9^{\text {th }}$ hole straight into the creek in front of the tee box and also had the largest Newell for the day (Score of 10 or more) when he lost 2 golf balls out of bounds and a tree ate another one.


Even Tony MacIsaac who relishes the Warburton golf course layout, found himself in the bushes on more than one occasion. Rob Underwood was able to capture this classic photo of Tony trying to extricate himself out of the scrub, although it is also highly possible that Undies was just trying to get a sneaky picture of Tony's bum for his personal collection of dodgy shots rather than having anything to do with the round of golf.


Cam Ross has been inspired by the Holey Moley TV program and he took on the following putting challenge. First step was hitting his ball across the narrow bridge, followed by the next stage which was where he tried to run and jump across the creek from one side of the bank to the other. As is the case with Holey Moley TV Show neither scenarios worked. Both Cam and his ball ended up getting wet. Cam putted his ball off the side of the bridge and into the creek and then he failed with his jump and ended up wet to the ankles in the stream.


As the players wrapped up after completing the magnificent $18^{\text {th }}$ hole at Warburton there was little doubt who were the winners and who were the losers. Adam Cooper was the best of the best with an impressive 88 off the stick, Nett 67 . Adam is getting out on the course regularly now that he is technically working form home and the proof is in the improvement in his game. He is now sitting on top of the 2021 points championship leaderboard and more importantly he has secured himself a birth in the Champion of Champions playoff if he goes on the golf trip.

Tony MacIsaac must be wishing for every Sunday Leave Pass event to be held at Warburton. He is by far a better player at Warburton than at any other golf course on the SLP seasons fixture. He certainly put on a great show again on Sunday and was unlucky to only finish in second place. It was great to have Greg Breasley back into the swing of things, and it was refreshing to hear the ping emanating from his driver, we were 4 holes back on the course and we could still hear when ever Greg hit a good drive, which with a score of Nett 72 and a podium third place finish he must have been hitting them good very regularly.

Steve O'Sullivan completed the day with a commendable top 5 finish, with his score of 73 Nett. Interestingly, the difference between $4^{\text {th }}$ place and $9^{\text {th }}$ place was all determined on the countback system. SOS, Newell, Todd Neilson, Wayne James, Steve Powne and Glenn Douglas all had the same Nett score so their place rankings was determined on how well they performed on the back nine.

The count back system is formulated as the following. *Total number of stableford points scored on the back nine holes.
*In the event that both players have the same stableford score on the back nine it then reverts to the number of stableford points scored on the eighteenth hole. If this is the same then it goes to the $17^{\text {th }}$ hole, sixteenth hole, fifteenth hole until a player has a better hole and therefore has a higher stableford score than the other.

The handicapper has realized that the 1.3 strokes he deducted off Adam Cooper last month was not enough, so he has docked yet a further 1.1 strokes to try to slow the momentum Adam has going with his golf at present. Greg Breasley lost more than 0.5 strokes this month and Jamie Brunton, Newell, Phil, Steve Powne, T Mac and Wayne James all received a slight trim from the handicapper.

Mick Harpers stint with a 6 at the front of his handicap did not last long, Micks handicap Blew back out to 7.4. Cam, Col, Greg Parsons, Rick, Undies, Tim and Tom all were gifted a little bit of fat onto their handicaps for Centenary Park. Strangely, SOS who shot Nett 73 and finished in $3^{\text {rd }}$ place was still in favour of the handicapper and he somehow has been allocated an extra 0.3 strokes for his next round despite what can only be recognized as a commendable performance

For those whingers who will be complaining how their handicaps never change yet SOS who came third still goes out I have attached a snap-shot and synopsis of how the handicapping system works.

## HANDICAPS

The changes to player's handicaps are as follows:
BOLD RED NUMBERS- refer to players whose handicap has gone out BOLD GREEN NUMBERS- refer to players whose handicap has come in BOLD BLACK NUMBERS- refer to players whose handicap has remained unchanged NON BOLD NUMBERS- refer to players who didn't play this month, so handicap has not changed

For those people interested in the mechanics of the handicapping system it can be best explained as the following.

How to calculate a GA Handicap

To calculate a player's GA Handicap:

- you must firstly identify the player's most recent 20 scores,
- you then determine the 'Played To' value for each of these scores,
- you average the best 8 'Played To' values,
- and finally you multiply this average by 0.93 . The resultant figure (to one decimal place) is the player's GA Handicap.
* If a player's handicap record contains a lesser number than 20 scores, the number of scores used to calculate the player's handicap is as listed in the table below.
* There is no requirement for a player's most recent 20 scores to have been returned within a specific timeframe. For example, the most recent 20 scores may span a period of three years or they may span a period of three months.
* Once a player's handicap record contains 20 scores, the next score they return will result in the oldest of the existing 20 scores being removed (to be replaced by the new score).

Full Technical Procedure for Calculating a GA HandicapSTEP 1 - Use the table below to determine the number of scores to be included in the GA Handicap calculation:

Number of Scores in Player's Handicap Record

## Scores to be Used in the Calculation

| 5 to 6 | Best/Lowest 1 |
| :--- | :--- |
| 7 or 8 | Best/Lowest 2 |
| 9 or 10 | Best/Lowest 3 |
| 11 or 12 | Best/Lowest 4 |
| 13 or 14 | Best/Lowest 5 |
| 15 or 16 | Best/Lowest 6 |
| 17 or 18 | Best/Lowest 7 |
| 19 or 20 | Best/Lowest 8 |

Note: When the handicap record contains more than 20 scores, the GA Handicap calculation uses the best 8 of the player's most recent 20 scores.

So what happened with SOS's handicap to make it so he comes third and he still goes out, I hear the sookycoach ask.
Well as you can see in the graphic below, each month the $20^{\text {th }}$ round drops off from the table and is replaced by your score from the current month in position 1. In this instance one of the key flagged rounds (Top 8 scores from the 20) dropped off SOS's handicapping spreadsheet. His round at Dorset was a played to a handicap of 10.66 and it was replaced by the next lowest round from his remaining 20 scores. In this instance it was a played to 13.18 at Beacon hills. Given that a played to 10 was replaced by a played to 13 it is inevitable that the sum of his top 8 scores is going to be higher than it was the previous month which means his handicap will have to go out.

For those data analysts and people with attention to detail you will notice that for the next 4 rounds SOS does not have a flag round which could drop off so it is impossible for his handicap to go out, it can only possibly come in on any of those months if he plays to a score of 13 over par or better in any of the next 4 rounds.


I hope that helps to explain the handicapping system. Oh yeah and thanks for the slab of beer you gave me SOS. I appreciated it.
Thomas Cooper has completed his time as a Callaway handicap user, after Warburton he was allocated his official club handicap. Thomas will start his time off a handicap of 27.0 and we will work him down from there. After 5 rounds he will move on to the slope handicapping system like the rest of us and then he will be able to complain week in and week out like Mal and the Supercoach do.

The Sunday Leave Pass handicapping process with the one used by golf link and by all golf clubs around the globe using the world handicapping system. Although your SLP handicap is unofficial and therefore it cannot be used to formally enter organized golf competitions and tournaments, it still should be an accurate reflection of your golfing prowess and a measure of what your GA (golf Australia) handicap would be if you subscribed the $\$ 150$ per year to get an official handicap.

Your playing handicap will fluctuate around your documented handicap index. When you play an easy course such as Ringwood or Dorset then you will actually play off a lower handicap than you normally would. On the other days when we invite you to play a harder course such as Rosebud Country Club, Devils Bend, Werribee Park or Barham we will add a few extra shots to your arsenal just to give you more hope of avoiding total anxiety and depression.

For those players not familiar with the scoring process, listed below is the format we use in Sunday Leave Pass competitions.
Once all of the players are ranked then the Seasons Championship points are allocated according to the position in the field.
The player in $1^{\text {st }}$ place gets 15 points, $2^{\text {nd }}$ place 14 points, $3^{\text {rd }}$ place 13 points, etc. etc. Any player who completes the round however finishes ranked outside the top 14 and is placed between $15^{\text {th }}$ spot to BeerWench then they are all allocated 1 championship point for attending.

For the benefit of the newcomers or the uneducated we thought it would be a good opportunity to go through the player rankings and point scoring system again.

Sunday Leave Pass competitions are run using Stroke so you need to count every shot that you play and you need to finish every hole. Each players Nett total score is then calculated by deducting the players handicap from the Gross score. If a player doesn't have an official Sunday Leave Pass handicap then a temporary played to handicap is allocated on the day using the Callaway handicapping system.

Once the players Nett score is calculated they are ranked from lowest score to highest score. (BeerWench) Where more than one player has the same Nett Score (such as in the example below from Gardiners Run last year then the place allocations are decided based on a countback system.
The player with the most points at the end of the year is crowned the Points champion irrespective of how many rounds a person has played. If one person plays 13 rounds for the year and the person in $2^{\text {nd }}$ place has only played 10 rounds but is close to the same score then that is bad luck to the person in $2^{\text {nd }}$ place. All players are invited to play the entire fixture. We reward participation rather than perfection and performance so if you play more often you will end up with more points.

In order to win the Season Championship trophy, you need to play regularly and consistently to about your handicap or better, and it is the handicapper's responsibility to make sure that this doesn't happen. After every round the scores are assessed and then the handicaps are adjusted according to your performance. As was the case last year we have adjusted the handicap formula to take into consideration the difficulty of each golf course, using the course slope index, so it will be very interesting to see how the scores finish up.

Every monthly title winner also becomes eligible to play off for the champion of champions trophy. To qualify as the Champion of Champions a member just needs to win a monthly title. All of the winners from the monthly championships who are attending the golf trip will then play off for the title based on total accumulated stableford points from 9x Randomly selected holes. The

Winner is the person with the most points over those 9 nominated holes, and in the event of a tie then a Countback to determine the winner applies.

NOTE: The Winner of the December title is also eligible to win the competition however they only get to count their scores by using only 8 Randomly selected holes.

For those who have forgotten about the powers bestowed on the Blue Jacket here is a reminder of how it works.
As the Champion of Champions Newell will be able to ask any Sunday Leave Pass member to buy him a drink, it is limited to only receiving one drink per member (beer or soft) over the entire year and it can only be done so only if he is wearing the Champion of Champion jacket at the time. This of course does not include new members who did not play at least one or more rounds in season 2020 but not exclusive to those who attended the golf trip. So, if he manages himself correctly, he should be looking at up to 50 free beers or soft drinks over the next 12 months. Now that is a prize worth aspiring for.

The other condition is that Newell must be the one who consumes the drink, he cannot use his power to buy beverages for anyone else.
